



The Chief also issued a word fireworks, and commented that he hopes the community will have a safe and fireless Christmas.



However, since some families find it difficult to pay this full price, the schools will provide these lunches free of charge or at a reduced price to those children who are determined by the school administration to be unable to pay for

in the strictest confidence. Any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school lunches, such as prolonged ill-

ness in the family, unexpected expenses due to fire, flood, or any other disaster of this nature: seasonal unemployment and similar emergency situations, will also be considered. If a family is not satisfied

with the decision made on their application, it may request a hearing to appeal the decision. This request may be made orally or in writing to the administrator of the school at the superintendent's office.
