Many of the students in the Mills County schools are members of the 4-H, FFA and FHA groups, and will be exhibiting their projects at the annual show.

IT GOT COLD!

The cold blast of winter that swept across Texas didn't miss Mills County and certainly cooled things off here this week.

The temperature dipped down to around the 10 degree mark, according to a number of unofficial reports for Tuesday morning. Wednesday morning it wasn't quite so cold with readings around the 20 degree mark.

Goldthwaite received 25.22 inches of rain during 1970, according to official record kept by weatherman Harry Allen.

This is a big decrease of over 14 inches in precipitation compared to 1969 when 39.86 inches was measured here.

July and November were two months when no measurable rain fell here. January, and December were two more months that had a low reading with January 44 inch and December 42 inch.

Mills County Commissioners' Court at the December meeting adopted a plan to elect all four county commissioners on a county-wide basis to meet the court required re-districting of precincts.

County Judge Cecil Egger stated that the plan was approved by a majority vote and it is to go into effect with the next election.

The Court had voted some time ago to re-district the commissioners' precincts to meet the legal requirements but no further action was taken until the last meeting when the county-wide vote plan was approved.

Under the newly adopted plan all four county commissioners will be elected by voters of the entire county.

The only special requirement included in the plan, according to Judge Egger is that a candidate seeking election as commissioner to represent a certain precinct, the candidate must be a resident of that precinct.

For the balance of the winter months the cattle sale will be held on Friday along with the sheep and goat sale. Cattle will be sold beginning at 10:30 a. m. and the sheep and goat sale will begin at 12:30 p. m., they stated.

The cattle sale will not be held on Monday, January 11, but it will be held on Friday, January 15, along with the sheep and goat sale.

Bank Deposits Still Going Up In Mills County

Bank deposits in Mills County show another record year of growth with an increase of over a \$million during the past year, according to condensed statements of condition of Mills County State Bank, Goldthwaite and Farmers & Merchants Bank, Priddy, appearing in this paper.

In Mills County State Bank deposits on December 31, 1970 were \$11,851,298.75 while a year earlier on December 31, 1969 they were \$10,762,188.40.

Loans and discounts also are up. On December 31, 1970 they were \$8,198,060.07 compared to \$5,287,752.47 on December 31, 1969.

Total resources climbed more than one \$million during the year from \$11,912,665.98 to \$13,255,064.94.

Deposits in Farmers & Merchants Bank went up during the one year period from \$468,952.55 to \$489,752.92.

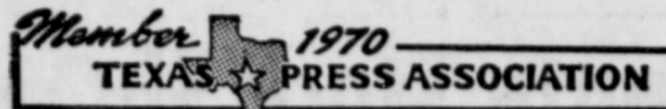

Aliens Must Report Address During January

District Director, John W. Holland of the Immigration and Naturalization Service stated that aliens in the United States will be required to report their addresses to the Attorney General within the near future. All aliens, with few exceptions, who are in the United States on January 1 each year must report their addresses by the end of that month.

Only the following classes of aliens are excused from this requirement: (1) Accredited Diplomats; and (2) Persons accredited to certain international organizations.

Forms with which to make the report can be obtained from any Post Office or Immigration and Naturalization Service Office during the month of January. Also, this year the reporting requirement has been broadened to additionally provide for the mailing of completed address reports directly to the nearest office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

The cards will still be received at all post offices and Immigration and Naturalization Service offices as in the past. Mr. Holland said that the law provides severe penalties for failure to comply with the reporting requirement.

Approval Of Funds For Head Start Includes Goldthwaite And Priddy

Texas Office of Economic Opportunity Director George P. Taylor today announced state approval during the past two weeks of an Office of Child Development grant of \$45,600 in new federal funds to Hill County Community Action Association, Inc., in San Saba for Head Start programs.

This grant is funded under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act and is effective January 1, 1971, through December 31, 1971. Of the money allocated, \$28,128 is for Full Year (Part Day) Head Start and \$17,472 is for Summer Head Start. All programs are delegated.

San Saba Independent School District (ISD) is the delegate agency which will operate three Full Year (Part Day) Head Start classes in one center five days a week, six and one-half hours a day, serving 42 children ages 4 and 5. Also involved in the program are three teachers, three non-professionals and six volunteers.

Llano ISD will operate two Summer Head Start classes in one center five days a week, six hours a day, serving 24 children 6 years of age. Also involved are two teachers, one other professional, four non-professionals and six volunteers.

Goldthwaite ISD will operate two Summer Head Start classes in one center five days a week, four hours a day, serving 30 children ages 5 and 6. Also involved are two teachers, one other professional, three non-professionals and four volunteers.

Priddy Common School will operate one Summer Head Start class in one center five days a

week, six and one-half hours a day, serving 12 children ages 5 and 6. Also involved are one teacher, one other professional, four non-professionals and five volunteers.

Work is scheduled to get underway on the third phase of the sewer expansion program which will be in the south part of the city.
