La Nora Price Receives Award In Twirling

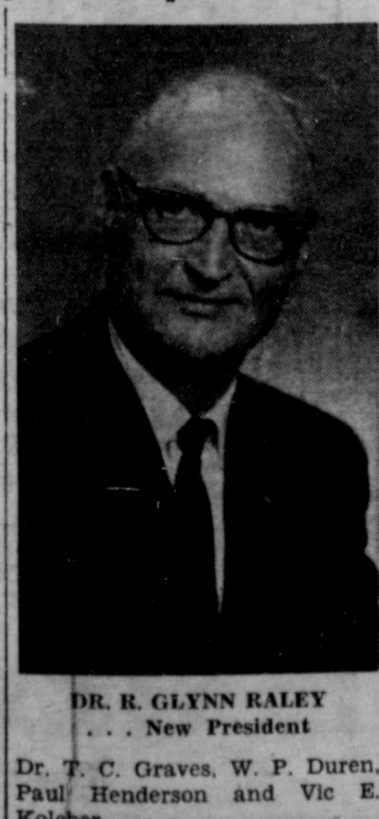
La Nora Price received superior rating in her twirling ability and was awarded a gold medal award at the University of Texas in Austin last Friday, June 18.

Political Pot Warming Up For 1972 Election

The Political Pot is warming up for the 1972 election.

Lieutenant Governor Ben Barnes the past week announced that he will be a candidate for Governor of Texas in next year's elections.

Barnes announced his decision at a news conference at the State Capitol. The announcement ended speculation whether Barnes would seek the Governorship or run for the United States Senate.

Barnes, at 33, has more than ten years of experience in public office in Texas. He first won election to the Texas House from De Leon in 1960. He was elected Speaker of the House in January, 1965, and was re-elected to that post in 1967, thus becoming the youngest Speaker in Texas history to serve two consecutive terms.

In his first bid for statewide office, Barnes was elected Lieutenant Governor in November of 1968, and became the first candidate in the history of Texas to poll more than two million votes. He was re-elected to a second term in November of 1970.

Lt. Col. Wayne Massey Is Adopted "Son Of Cavite City," Phillipines

Lt. Col. Wayne Massey, Commanding Officer, Marine barracks at Sangley Point Naval Station, Republic of Phillipines, has been "adopted" as a "son of Cavite City," according to information received here.

Massey is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jess Massey of Goldthwaite. He has been in the Marines nearly 30 years and in his present post for the past 23 months.

Mrs. Massey and their daughter, Cathy, returned to the states in May and Col. Massey is expected to return in July.

Following is news story about Officials of Cavite City honoring Col. Massey with special citation making him a "son."

"SANGLEY POINT NS, R. P. — Officials of Cavite City have reversed course on the oft-told story of American servicemen adopting children, and have 'adopted' a Marine here as a 'Son of Cavite City,' according to base spokesmen.

"Lt. Col. William W. Massey, commanding officer, Marine barracks here, was cited for his 'remarkable public relations and understanding,' in dealing with the people of Cavite City, and he has 'saved the good relationship' between the base and the

town on many occasions, according to the citation making him a 'son.'

"Massey was also cited for his aid to the people of the city during Typhoon Patsy, when he 'showed deep concern' for the victims of the typhoon, which did extensive damage to the city.

"In addition to helping the people in the city, Massey was credited with helping to save the lives of fishermen who were washed from their boats up against a sea wall on the base.

"Massey said he is 'deeply pleased' with the honor. He is the first Marine at Sangley Point ever to receive the honor."

The park committee has provided funds for the caretaker to insure park maintenance for the past several years through voluntary donations from interested citizens.

The committee originally started the drive with the idea of enlisting a minimum of 100 interested persons to donate \$1.00 per month, or \$12 a year, to do the job.

In the past a number of boosters have contributed more than the \$12. This has made the drive quite successful and has helped to do away with personal solicitation campaign.

The committee raised \$1302.00 last year. This took care of the maintenance job and provided a little extra that is always badly needed.

Mills County Park Fund Drive for 1971 was opened by the committee last week with an appeal for "At least 100 persons to contribute a minimum of \$12" to insure park maintenance for this year.

W. P. Duren, Chairman, has announced that the response to date has been good and the committee is hopeful that the \$1,200.00 will be forthcoming in a 30 day period. This year the drive was started late so the need is a bit more pressing.

With 19 parties giving \$285.00 the first week the committee feels that the goal will be reached in the 30 days.

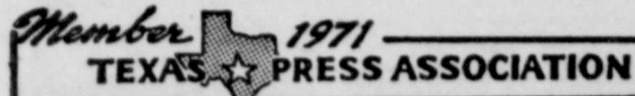

**U. S. Bond Sales
Report In Mills
County For April**

April sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Mills County were \$5,759.00, according to County Bond Chairman, W. P. Duren. Sales for the first four months totaled \$21,893.00 with 36 per cent of the 1971 goal achieved.

Sales in Texas during April totaled \$17,799,730, while year-to-date sales were \$69,658,537 with 38 per cent of the 1971 goal of \$181.9 million achieved.

Nationally, Savings Bonds sales during the month totaled \$463 million, 26.7 per cent above 1970 sales. Sales for the four-month period amounted to \$1,838 million, 18.1 per cent above a year earlier.

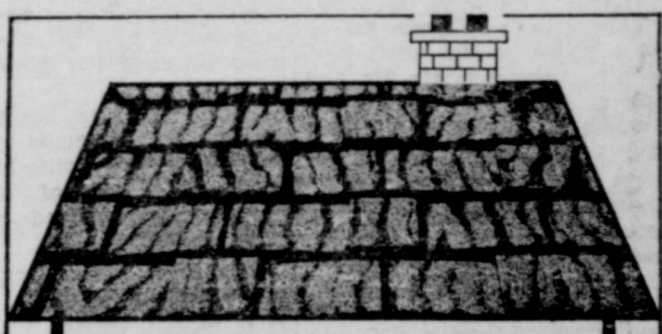

Lets go fishing. This is a favorite past-time of a lot of people and you can have good fishing right out of your won stock tank. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department offers a service which is very beneficial in improving your fish quality in tanks or small lakes. The Department will stock your tank with either a combination or with just one species of the following fish: Channel Catfish, Black or Largemouth Bass, Crappie or white perch, and Sunfish.

The main requirement of the State Parks and Wildlife Department is that all fish presently in a tank be killed out or removed from the tank before receiving the fish from them. Application blanks have to be filled out by the owner which can be obtained at my office. A local rancher, Ben Geeslin, has already filled out his application for Channel Catfish. He lost nearly all of his present fish population due to the hall storm in May.

The number of acres of pasture required to run one animal unit has always been a big problem in the ranching business. In the past several years, much work has been done on improving grasses for pastures. There are now several good improved grasses which have shown to aid a rancher in his grazing program. Coastal Bermuda has been around a long time, and has proved to be successful with proper fertilization and management. There are now other improved grasses such as TAM Wintergreen Harding grass, Klein grass, fescue, and others.

A local rancher, E. E. Hilliard of Mullin, is currently involved in preparing his land to plant fescue and TAM Wintergreen grass for supplemental grazing. Improved grasses are one answer to our grazing problem. However, these grasses do require a certain amount of fertilization and management. A Pasture and Forage short course which is to be held at Texas A&M University on June 24-25 is open to anyone interested in attending. This short course will present a lot of good information on improved grasses and pasture management.

Brush and weed control is another important way of maintaining good pastures. Mesquite control requires time, labor, and money but is can be done successfully. Control can be handled by aerial spraying or by hand spraying. A better per cent of kill comes from the trunk spraying of mesquite with a mixture of 1 cup of 2,4,5-T to 3 gallons of diesel or kerosene. Spray the trunk of the trees up about 12 inches from the ground to the point of runoff.

Spraying time for mesquite varies with weather conditions but the best time is from July-August. However, some local ranchers have already started spraying. Pete Geeslin started spraying this week for mesquite and brush.

Homeowners may be hurting their lawns and trees without knowing it. During these hot summer months, lawns should be given a good soaking (equal to about 1 1/2 inch rain) around three times a week. Trees should be soaked at least once a week. By sprinkling a lawn just a little each day puts lawns in extreme stress if one or two days are missed without watering. Trees are the same. By only wetting the top of the ground, trees put feeder roots to reach near the top of the ground and when not watered every day, they will be put under extreme stress and will die off leaves and branches to be able to support the rest of the tree.

County Sheep Producers Favor Referendum

Results of county-wide mail referendum concerning Agreement between the American Sheep Producers Council Inc. and the Secretary of Agriculture were announced by Ralph Duren, Chairman of Mills County ASC Committee.

Of the eligible votes counted, 102 ballots representing ownership of 49,733 sheep were cast in favor of the Agreement, and 37 ballots, representing ownership of 9,962 sheep, were cast against the Agreement.

The Agreement provides for continuance of the financing of advertising and sales promotion of lamb and wool by the American Sheep Producers Council, Inc. by deductions from shorn wool and unshorn lamb payments for the 1971, 1972 and 1973 marketing years as authorized by Section 708 of the National Wool Act of 1954 as amended.

Mr. Duren indicated that the number of ballots cast represents approximately one-third of the eligible producers in Mills County.
