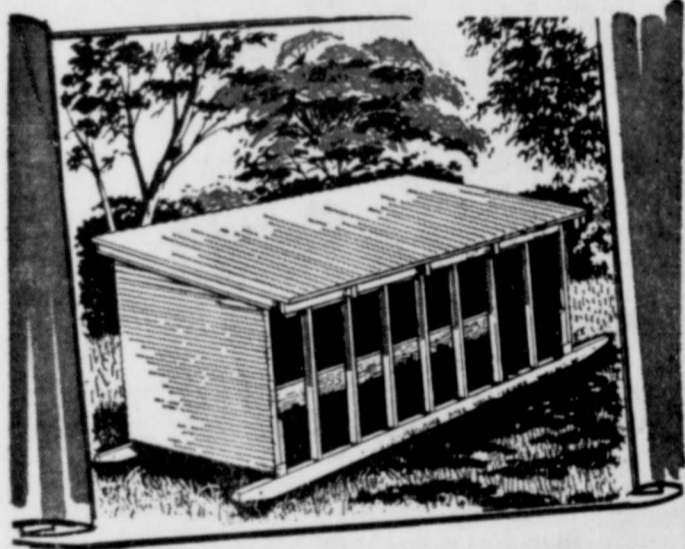

Those crawling grass eaters, leaf eaters, and nearly everything else are hitting us hard. Armyworms are causing many headaches besides eating up our pastures and small grains. The way it looks now they will be with us for a while. It would be advisable to producers to watch their crops or pastures and use controlling measures on the armyworms. Seven or malathion does a good job in controlling these insects and are comparatively safe to handle.

This winter could be a bad one if the armyworms are not controlled and a lot of our grazing is eaten by these insects. There may be several cycles of armyworms which will mean a possibility of more than one spray treatment for the insects.

Livestock producers over the county are urged also to be on the alert for screwworms as numerous cases continue to spread over the Hill Country and Edwards Plateau areas.

Officials of the Mission Screwworm Program report that 24 cases were confirmed last week making this the worst week since the last week in December, 1968. Texas thus far has recorded 138 cases for the year with the entire U. S. count at only 161. And the situation could worsen, according to officials. Screwworm outbreaks traditionally occur in late summer and fall, so producers should check their animals periodically and treat any wounds found. Spraying of herds is also recommended and operations such as castrating and dehorning and other man-made wounds should be put off until winter if possible.

Any larvae collected from wounds should be sent to the Mission Screwworm Laboratory for identification. The mailing address is Box 969, Mission, Texas. Collection kits and vials are available from my office.

Counties in which screwworm cases were confirmed last week include San Saba, Lampasas, Uvalde, Val Verde, Presidio, Meverick, Crockett, Terrell, Bowie, and Kinney.

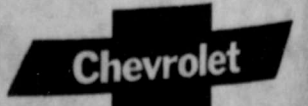

Ward, who will be serving his second term on the Council, is a six-term member of the Texas House, and served during the 62nd Legislative Session as Chairman of the House Committee on Penitentiaries.

In addition to Ward, Council appointees are Rep. Jack Blanton, Carrollton; Rep. Harold Davis, Austin; Rep. Hilary Doran, Del Rio; Rep. Joe Golman, Dallas; Rep. Delwin L. Jones, Lubbock; Rep. Frank J. Lombardino, San Antonio; Rep. Carl A. Parker, Port Arthur; Rep.

Joe Spurlock, II, Fort Worth; and Rep. John Traeger, Seguin. The Texas Legislative Council is charged with directing the operations of a full-time professional staff of research personnel. Council membership is limited to the Speaker of the House and his 10 appointees and the President of the Senate and his five designees.

The Council's work includes study reports requested by legislative resolution and other sources, bill-drafting services during legislative sessions, and a continuing program of statutory revision.

Gov. Preston Smith Approves Two Grants For Central Texas Council

AUSTIN — Two criminal justice action grants totaling \$74,166 for the area served by the Central Texas Council of Governments, Belton, have been approved by Governor Preston Smith.

The money will come from the Criminal Justice Council, which oversees statewide law enforcement planning and administers funds from the U. S. Department of Justice for crime control projects in Texas.

One grant, for \$36,086, will go to Bell County Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center to provide diagnostic and consultation services for courts and probation departments in the six-county area. These counties are Hamilton, Mills, Lampasas, Coryell, Bell and Milam.

Local matching contributions of \$14,678 in kind and \$2,952 in cash will assist the project.

Included in the services to all courts in the region will be comprehensive psychiatric and psychological examinations to aid in pre-sentence evaluations.

This project actually is an expansion (to include adult offenders) of one funded in 1970 for the Bell County Juvenile Court and Juvenile Probation Department. During the first grant period the county made 86 diagnostic evaluations of juveniles and provided more than 600 hours of consultation and treatment.

Central Texas Council of Governments also will receive \$38,080 for a regional police management study. Comprehensive surveys will be made for the cities of Temple, Killen, Belton, Copperas Cove and Harker Heights and for the Bell County Sheriff's Department.

The other five counties and cities served by CTCOG will be surveyed, but only as relates to regional coordination and cooperation. Local matching funds of 7,250 in cash and \$13,616 in kind will be provided.
