Federal Grant To Aid Local Head Start Program This Year

Governor Preston Smith today announced his approval of the past week of an Office of Child Development grant of \$50,000 in new federal funds to Hill Country Community Action Association, Inc. in San Saba for Head Start.

The grant is funded under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act, and is effective January 1 through December 31, 1972. Of the money allotted, \$38 are for Full Year (Part Year) Head Start with classes conducted nine and one-half months, and \$17,472 are for Summer Head Start which will be conducted two months by separate agencies.

In San Saba, three Full Year (Part Year) Head Start classes will be conducted in one center five days a week, six and one-

half hours a day, serving 45 children ages 3-5. Staff includes three teachers, three nonprofessionals and 27 volunteers.

Goldthwaite Summer Head Start is a delegate agency which will conduct two Summer Head Start classes in one center five days a week, four hours a day, serving 30 children ages 5-6. Staff includes two teachers, one other professional, four nonprofessionals and four volunteers.

Priddy Summer Head Start will conduct one Summer Head Start class in one center five days a week, six and one-half hours a day, serving 12 children ages 5-6. Staff includes one teacher, one other professional, four nonprofessionals and two volunteers.

Girl Scout Cookie Sale Starts Here Next Thursday, February 10

Plans for the 19th Annual Girl Scout Cookie Sale of the Girl Scouts of Texas Council have been set for February 10 through February 19. Girls will be selling larger family-size packages this year. The same five flavors will be offered and most of the packages are twin-packs. The new-flavored shorties are tri-packed.

Mrs. Ronald Davis is serving as community cookie chairman. Goldthwaite and will issue tickets to troop cookie chairmen Thursday morning, February 9. They, in turn, will issue cookies to girls in the troop. Scout leaders have completed their

special training for the sale and are now in the process of training girls in the troops the procedures to be followed during the sale.

Goal for this year for Goldthwaite Girl Scouts has been set at 1,296 packages or 108 cartons. The total Council goal is 6,000 cartons.

Profits of the annual cookie sale go to develop and maintain the Council-owned resident camp at Lake Brownwood. The troops will retain 10c for each package sold by troop members. Individual girls who meet the Council quota of 24 packages per girl will receive a special "patch" to wear on the camp uniforms or the Girl Scout "patch jacket".

In addition, girls who sell 36 packages will be awarded both a "patch" and a \$5 partial campership to apply on the resident camp fee at Camp Wood Lake. Individual girls may earn up to two \$5 camperships by selling 72 or more packages of cookies. One campership may be applied for each week a girl attends camp. Last year, a total of \$4,766.40 was retained in troops throughout the council and 988 partial camperships were awarded girls. A total of 1,603 girls met their individual quotas last year.

Predator Population Growing

Mills County Livestock Raisers have been alarmed recently by the frequent slaughter of animals by predators.

Coyotes, red foxes, and some wolves have been found in most

all parts of the county and they continue to kill lambs and young goats. Some producers have recorded losses as high as 30 to 40 head.

County Agent Larry Daniel

contacted the Texas Predator Control Department and advised them of the situation. They will send two "trouble-shooters" to Mills County beginning Monday for two weeks of intensive hunting and trapping.

Livestock producers should report all incidents to the County Agent and should be on the lookout for predators.

Mills County does not have a full time trapper and efforts are under way to secure one for the county if livestock producers so desire.

Don Busby Announces Candidacy To Judgeship Of 27th District

Don Busby of Belton made the following statement when he authorized the Eagle to announce his candidacy for District Judge of the 27th District Court, subject to the Democratic Primary election on May 6, 1972.

"Dear Friends: In September I filed for District Judge of the 27th District Court which includes Bell, Lampasas, and Mills Counties.

"I want to point out that even though Mills County does not have a large case load in the District Court, when something does arise it is very important that a judge be available. It is also very important that the judge be someone knowledgeable in the law from all angles and one who is fair, but yet stern when need be.

"At 31 years of age I am able to be available and give of my time as I am needed. At present, I am serving as District Judge of the 146th District Court in Bell County; was in private practice in Johnson County as assistant district attorney; was Killeen's first full-time City Attorney; Bell County's first County Court-At-Law Judge; and Texas' youngest district judge.

"I invite you to inspect my record which will show that among being a responsible public servant I also believe in putting forth 110% effort.

"My record will also reflect that I believe that probations should be granted sparingly and then only when the person convicted has a good chance of staying out of trouble and becoming a good citizen.

"It is unfortunate that Mills County does not have a resident District Judge, however, I wish to offer the next best thing and that is to be available on a regularly scheduled basis.

"Please allow me the chance to serve Mills County as your District Judge. I pledge to you that I will work unselfishly to serve you."

Mohair Industry Boosted By Younger Generation 'Return To Nature' Idea

The mohair industry is alive and well and 1972 promises to be a banner year with stronger prices and increased demand both nationally and internationally for goods made with mohair and wool fibers.

This evangelistic message was voiced by Eli Bloom of New York, executive vice president of Hayward-Schuster Woolen

Mills Ltd. to over 125 members and directors of the Mohair Council of America attending the organization's annual meeting here.

For Angora goat producers this encouraging and inspirational news came not only from Bloom but several other speakers as well. Bloom told his audience that his company is most confident that in the next five years the mohair and wool industries will rebuild and solidify their position and the mills will be making many new, exciting fabrics of mohair, wool, camel hair, cashmere and similar natural fibers.

Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White re-emphasized the optimistic outlook for mohair and encouraged the growers to stay with their Angora goat. He said his department put top priority on assisting mohair producers with promotional and marketing activities. "Our agency wants to be a partner with you," he declared.

Ed McManus, director of the Mohair Council's New York office, said the "return to nature" movement among younger people in the U. S. has helped the mohair industry. There is a growing awareness that Mother Nature still maintains the greatest laboratory and that a miracle fiber doesn't have to come out of a test tube," he said.

Noel C. Fry of Del Rio was elected to his third term as president. Also re-elected were Walter Pfluger of San Angelo, vice-president, and James T. Hunt of Sonora, secretary-treasurer.

January 31 Is NOT Last Day For Voter Registration

Secretary of State Bob Bullock said today that despite some newspaper articles and radio bulletins to the contrary, voter registration does not end on January 31.

Secretary Bullock said, "I am aware of at least two newspaper articles and several radio announcements which state that January 31 is the last day for voter registration. Apparently there is some confusion about the new voter registration law passed by the last legislature. Under the new law, voters can register any time during the year. However, persons must register at least 30 days prior to an election, to be able to vote in that election."

Bullock stated that his office was mailing a reminder of the new voter registration law to all County Tax Assessor/Collectors who are responsible for issuing voter registration certificates.

District Judge James K. Evetts Announces For Re-Election

District Judge James K. Evetts, this week authorized the Goldthwaite Eagle to publish his announcement for re-election to the 27th District Judgeship.

Judge James K. Evetts: "Ladies and Gentlemen, for some forty years now it has been my privilege, our privilege, Grace and mine, to serve the people of this District in various capacities. City Judge of Belton, my first job; County Attorney of Bell County, which I ran opposed by a splendid gentleman now deceased, Waldo Riley; and for District Attorney where I served for sixteen years, counting the three and a half years that we stepped out to serve in the Armed Forces during World War Two as a combat soldier; and then now for almost twenty years as District Judge of the 27th Judicial District comprising Bell, Lampasas, and Mills Counties.

During that time I studied prior to the time I ran for District Judge under three of the great masters. As county attorney it was my privilege to help and study under the Honorable Henry Taylor, Sr., who was then district attorney, one of the truly great district attorneys that this or any district in Texas has ever known.

During that time it was my privilege to serve under the Honorable Few Brewster, District Judge of this district, who later went to the Supreme Court and died on that Court. And then to follow the Honorable Wesley Dice, one of the greatest and finest judges, trial judge and appellate judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, that this state has ever known.

All of that was preliminary to my becoming District Judge. I wanted just one thing from the time that I have started. I wanted to make the people the very best that my abilities would permit in whatever job that I was serving my people. I am candid to admit that I have prayed daily that I would measure up to the high trust and the faith that the people of these three wonderful counties have placed in me; the trust that I would see to the safety of their homes, and possessions, and sometimes even their lives. I wanted to make the best County Attorney that it was possible for a man to make with my limited abilities. I wanted to make the best District Attorney that it was possible to make with my abilities. I wanted to make them the ever-marched out with the husbands and brothers and the sons of this great district when the country needed them. I wanted to make them the best District Judge that it was possible to make with such abilities as I have.

Recently for the first time in all the years that I have served the people have I lost even one day due to illness. I have been ill for the better part of the last couple of months, but my doctors all say—from the three great hospitals in this county—that I am fully recovered and they strongly, unanimously recommend that at the age of sixty-four I continue active in my job. I assure you that if they are in error and I am in

The homemakers enrolled in the home furnishings home study series will be doing homework along with the youngsters for the next few weeks. The women, all busy wives, mothers, homemakers and professionals, are engaged in a six-lesson self-study series to learn about how to select and use interior furnishings. And like the kids, they have homework, too!

The first, and one of the most important lessons in the home study series, centers around home furnishings planning. It's a fact that a well-appointed home never happens by chance. It is always planned by someone with a great deal of know-how, whether by the homemaker herself or by a professional designer.

In furnishing a single room or a whole house, the rules of the game that assure success are

basically the same.

Analyzing needs of the family members is the starting place for a sound plan. Since most rooms must be used for several activities, make a list of how the room will be used. This will help determine what furniture is needed and the general mood of decor.

Plan on paper by using a scaled drawing of the room or area to be redone. Scaled drawings can be used to determine the best arrangement of furniture in relation to convenience, appearance and use.

Making an inventory of furniture items on hand as well as a list of what is needed is essential. Should the list of what is needed be a long one, a plan for spreading purchases over a 3 to 5 year period may be in order.

Furniture budgets vary in size from family to family and must be determined on an individual basis. Amount of income, size of house, size of family, stage in family cycle, plus values and goals, influence the furnishings budget. A logical approach to acquiring furnishings is to invest the greatest sum in those items that receive the most severe wear and are of most lasting nature, such as sofas, chest of drawers, an outstanding painting, or a good sleep set.

Decide on a style that is in keeping with the family's way of living. Matched pieces in any style tend to be monotonous. The current trend is to let one style predominate and inject other styles for interest and variety.

Functional requirements demand that furnishings serve their intended use, whether comfort, convenience, aesthetic, or a combination of these.

Quality in furnishings depends not only on the quality of the ingredients, but the combination and application of these within the completed item. Generally, a wide range of quality exists in every furnishings item — all the way from custom - order handcrafting, through complete mechanization for mass production. Consumers must learn to read labels, ask questions, and to examine each furnishing item carefully. Before making a purchase, shop around and compare prices as well as quality. Good design in furnishings is available in every price range.

TEMPTATIONS—

By ERNEST ROPER
Pastor Of The Mullin Methodist Church

The fact of temptations is universal in the life of mankind. Whatever or wherever its source may be, it is the common heritage of mankind. In the Bible, from the days of Adam and Eve, we find man confronted with this problem. St. Paul, in Romans 7-21, expressed this principle in these words: "I find the law to be that I who want to do right am dogged by what is wrong." (Goodspeed's Translation). Thus we see that temptation confronts each and every one. We can not escape it, we can overcome it by and through the power of God.

Jesus speaking in the eighteenth chapter and seventh verse of the Gospel of St. Matthew, said: "It is necessary that temptations come." (R S V). In order to better understand this statement, let us examine the meaning of the word "necessary." Among several synonyms given, these three appear: "inevitable," "essential," "needful." Now with these ideas before us, let us substitute each of the words in the quotation above and we have this reading: "It is inevitable that temptation come" or "It is essential that temptation come" or again, "It is essential that temptation come."

This brings us now to the question, Why is it necessary that temptation come? Among the answers which might be given, I would like to lift up two. First, Because God wants obedient sons and daughters, and not mere puppets. God has endowed us with freedom of choice, and without freedom of choice there would be no truly human life as God intended it to be. There could be no possibility of moral and spiritual at-

tainment. We would simply be puppets on the stage of human activity, moved about by an external force or will. Our response to temptation determines the way our soul shall go.

The second answer to the question of why temptation comes is to be found in the writings of St. Peter. "Be glad about this, even though it may now be necessary for you to be sad for awhile because of the many kinds of trials you suffer. Their purpose is to prove that your faith is genuine. Even gold, which can be destroyed, is tested by fire; and so your faith, which is much more precious than gold, must also be tested, that it may endure." (Good News for Modern Man). As gold is refined and purified by fire, so also may our faith be strengthened and increased by and through trials and temptations. To him that overcometh will be given, with each victory, a new realization of the power of God in any life.

Several SS Reports Can Be Made Early

Early in the year is the time for several kinds of reports concerning social security. Glen McNatt, of the Brownwood Social Security Office, says it is very important that people affected be aware of their responsibilities.

January - February - March is an enrollment period for medical insurance under Medicare for those who passed up earlier chances to enroll. People past age 65 and who were born October 1903 or later can still enroll.

Self employed people with at least \$400 net earnings are to submit their self-employment social security tax reports as part of their income-tax reports. They send these reports for social security using "income tax forms" even if their income is so low they do not have to file income-tax reports.

People who received social security benefit payments during any of 1971, who were under age 72 during any part of the year, and who had earnings of over \$1680 during the year, are required to send to the Social Security Administration an annual report of earnings for 1971. McNatt cautioned that filling an income-tax form does not constitute this annual report required on beneficiaries, and that it is due anytime from now to April 15.

December Bond Sales For Mills Co. Total \$5,936

December sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Mills County totaled \$5,936, according to County Bond Chairman W. P. Duren. Sales during 1971 amounted to \$87,266. This represents 145 per cent of the sales goal of \$60,000.

Texans purchased \$15,207,564 in Savings Bonds during the month. Total Bond sales for 1971 were \$199,830,508 for 110 per cent of the state's goal of \$181.9 million. One hundred six counties and twelve districts in the state achieved their 1971 sales goal.

Nationwide, December sales totaled \$439 million—a 14.4 per cent increase above December 1970. During the calendar year 1971, sales of E and H Bonds amounted to \$5.5 billion. This is 114 per cent of the National goal of \$4.8 billion.

\$59.2 Million Borrowed From Cattleman's PCA

The 4-H Adult Leader Association will meet Saturday, Feb. 4, 8:00 p.m. at the show barns Goldthwaite. The Adult Leader Association has been very active since its formation in 1968. This meeting is very important and all members are urged to be present. Possibility of holding monthly meetings on a station basis in each of the larger communities will be discussed. Various leader projects will be decided upon also.

Texas recorded 444 screwworm cases in 1971, making the worst since 1968. Fifty-six counties had screwworm outbreaks in 1971. The county with the largest number of confirmations was Val Verde with 67. Comanche County had 27. Mills County had less than 10 confirmed cases. More than 1.6 billion sterile flies were dropped in Texas in 1971. All livestock owners should be on the alert for worms because no months really free of screwworms. Cases have already been reported in Webb County since January 1st.

A workshop for structural control operators is set for February 21-23 at the Ramada Inn College Station. Discussion will be featured on cockroach control, Toxicology of pesticides, flying insect control, control and identification of pests and insecticides.

Next week, the San Antonio Stock Show opens with the Gold Champion Steer of the County Livestock Show competing for higher honors. Lindsey, Mullin 4-H, will

be showing her polled Hereford steer which was the top steer of our local show. Her brother, Randy, will be showing a Short-horn steer.

All boys and girls in 4-H or planning to enroll in 4-H who would like to feed a steer, heifer or bull should contact me at my office or home. Now is the time to be looking around for a good steer project, and I am looking for calves for other 4-Hers. If you are interested in some other type of project, please let me know and I will help you.

Wool, Mohair Inventories Less Than Last Year

Inventories of wool and mohair in Texas warehouses are at the lowest level in several years, reports Ryeburn (Bull) Crawford of Mertzon, president of the Texas Wool and Mohair Warehouse Association.

"The inventory reported by warehousemen as of January 1 puts the wool and mohair industries in a good position for 1972," Crawford said. "This is the first time in several years that we have not had a large stockpile of wool and mohair on hand. With the demand for wool and mohair showing an increase in recent weeks, we should see some price improvements during the new year," he commented.

Total mohair on hand as reported in a recent warehouse survey by the association amounted to 3,427,837 pounds of grower owned mohair. Not included in the report is the mohair in speculator hands, estimated at several million pounds. Total wool on hand was 755,344 pounds, Crawford said.

The mohair inventory showed the following amounts in stock: 1,483,192 pounds of fall adult, 152,633 pounds of fall kid, 173,400 pounds of fall yearling hair, 1,407,201 pounds of spring adult and 211,411 pounds of spring kid.

The amount of wool on hand included 109,445 pounds of fall wool, 21,000 pounds of eight-months, 249,882 pounds of lamb wool and 375,017 pounds of 12-months wool.

The inventory figures were compiled by the warehouse association from reports submitted by 52 warehouses located throughout the state, Crawford said.
