District 27 Court Gets New Faces; All County Officials Re-Elected

Mills County followed most statewide trends in the Democratic Primary Election Saturday, but picked Senator Murray Watson over Congressman Bob Poage and Barefoot Sanders over Ralph Yarborough.

Voting was very heavy in all nine Mills County voting boxes with 1833 persons voting. This is not a record but is a very good turnout. There are approximately 2600 registered voters in Mills County.

Watson, in a losing effort over the district polled 890 votes in Mills County to Poage's 804 in the 11th Congressional District race.

Sanders polled 717 to Yarborough's 670 in the Mills County balloting for United States Senator. There will be a runoff between Yarborough and Sanders.

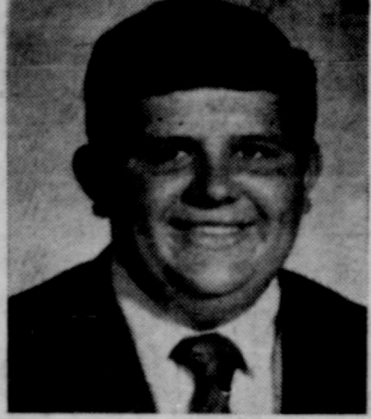
In the Governor's race, Dolph Briscoe was an easy victor, polling almost 1000 votes more than second place Ben Barnes. Votes were Briscoe, 1222; Barnes, 303; Mrs. Frances Farenthold, 177; and Governor Preston Smith, 80.

Bill Hobby polled 565 votes in Mills County to lead the Lieutenant Governor balloting. He was followed by Wayne Connal-

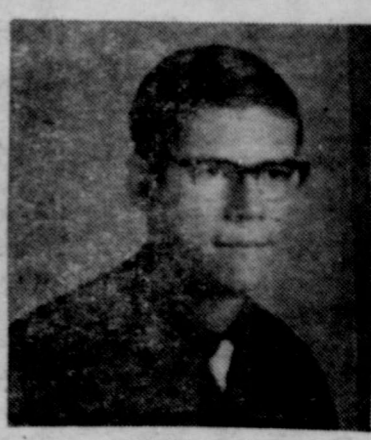

For Commissioner Precinct No. 1, Burtel Roberts was re-elected, receiving 1285 votes to Howard Hoover's 453.

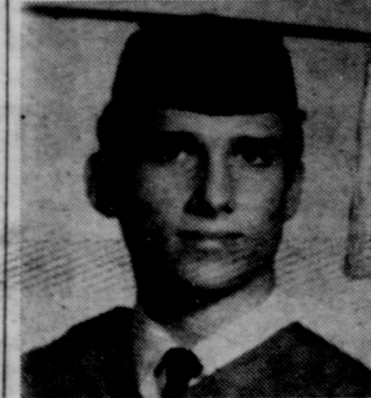
In the race for Commissioner Precinct No. 3, Ray Lindsey defeated his opponent, Ralph Duren by a large margin, 1211 to 552.

**Chet Brooks
Re-Elected To
State Senate**

State Sen. Chet Brooks of Pasadena, son of Mrs. Julia Biddle of Goldthwaite, won nomination to a third Senate term in the Democratic Primary. He has no Republican opposition.

Sen. Brooks defeated his challenger, a wealthy Houston merchant, by a vote of 21,449 to 15,037 in unofficial returns.

The senator, one of only two members of the Senate who voted against the controversial banking bills linked with the Sharpstown scandal, has been a champion of education and health care legislation. He was first elected to the Texas House of Representatives in 1962. After two House terms, he was elected to the Senate in 1966.

Sewer System Growth Indicates Goldthwaite Is Alive And Growing

A sketch of the history of Goldthwaite's sewer system reveals that it parallels our city's growth.

Goldthwaite's original Sewer Plant was built in 1935, with a WPA Grant from the Government and using WPA labor. With this arrangement only a small part of the project was financed locally.

The plans were probably never approved by the Texas State Health Department. The plant consisted of an Mhoff Tank with sludge beds for drain off purposes.

By the year 1940 Goldthwaite had begun to have trouble with the plant and the quality of the water down stream. The trouble progressed and the State Health Department was called to advise what could and what should be done. They recommended that we build a trickling filter to run the water through, to improve the effluent by adding oxygen and remove some of the undigested solids, thus decreasing the BOD (Biochemical Oxygen Demand).

After some two years use it was discerned that the filter was not doing the job as hoped. In fact it was determined that the quality of the water was worse than before the so called filter was installed.

There followed a period of discussion with land owners, citizens, and travelers and also the health department, during which time advice was sought from all sources. Down stream land owners were asked to use the water for irrigation thus solving two problems, objectional odors and dry weather.

In the late forties, L. B. Burnham bought the property on which the plant is located and immediately became interested in use of the water for irrigation. The City Council entered an agreement with Burnham whereby he furnished the land and the City built a lagoon for storage of the water and installed a pump for his use in irrigation. The system has worked very well for some time, but the

increased use of detergents by customers and the apparent belief by some people that it is alright to turn most anything into the sewer, has resulted in the plant not doing a sufficient job to satisfy either the City or the health authorities.

Due to recent legislation the Water Pollution Control Board, has come into being. This body has condemned the facilities which are now operating on only a temporary permit.

Several years ago the city council hired Rady and Associates of Ft. Worth, an engineering firm, to make a complete study of the sewer system to determine the most feasible thing to do on a basis within means. Rady came up with an overall plan of extension of lines and plant improvement at a cost of some \$320,000. The council was reluctant to attempt such an expenditure locally. It was decided to wait until some aid could be had from government sources.

A plan of extension was adopted on a pay as you go basis. With this method sewer connection were made available to one hundred additional customers and relieved some bad conditions around town. Plans are to continue this project as time and money permit.

Plans are drawn and an application has been made to all government departments for approval of plans and help in financing a new and modern sewer treatment plant for Goldthwaite. It is hoped to get a fifty-five per cent grant from the Federal Government and further aid from State departments.

An election will be called soon and further details of this project will be published later. City Manager, W. C. Barnett, and the Goldthwaite City Council consider the sewer system a high priority development.
