## MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS FOR "FINCHING"

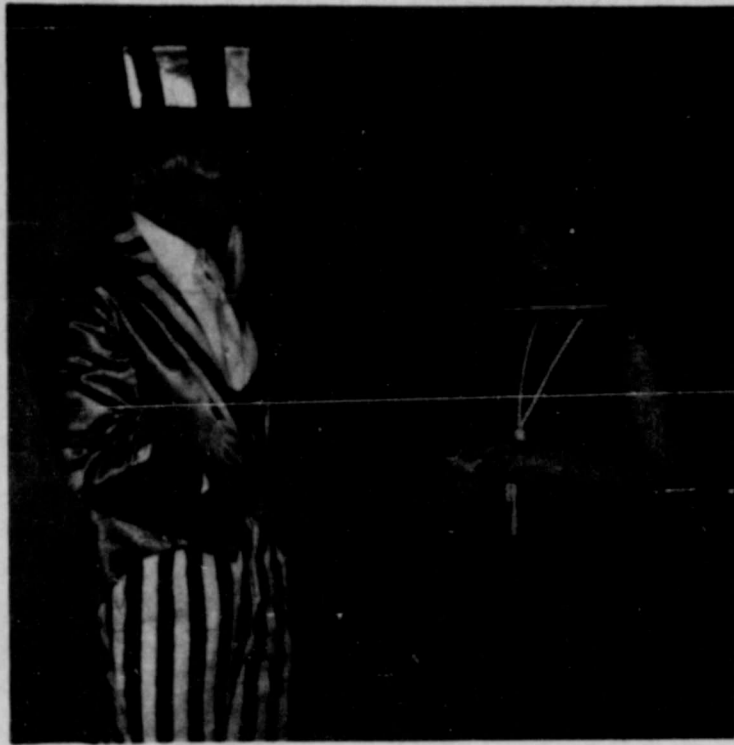
- 1. A wide-brimmed hat, one pair of light pants and 120 boot discount house.

## Attend CTCA Public Hearing

Rev. Dan Connally and Harry Mathews were among the eighty-three citizens who attended a public hearing in Temple recently sponsored by the Central Texas Council on Alcoholism.

This marked the first step in receiving input from all segments of the population of seven counties in Central Texas in producing the regional portion of the State Plan for Prevention, Treatment and Control of Alcohol Abuse.

Task groups were announced at the meeting and seven groups of people agreed to share their knowledge and beliefs and return on March 14 to arrive at a consensus as to their suggestions for methods of implementing services to alcoholics and their families as well as expanding all forms of alcoholism programming to realistically deal with this ever expanding social and health problem.

## MULLIN RODEO ASSN. TO MEET TONIGHT

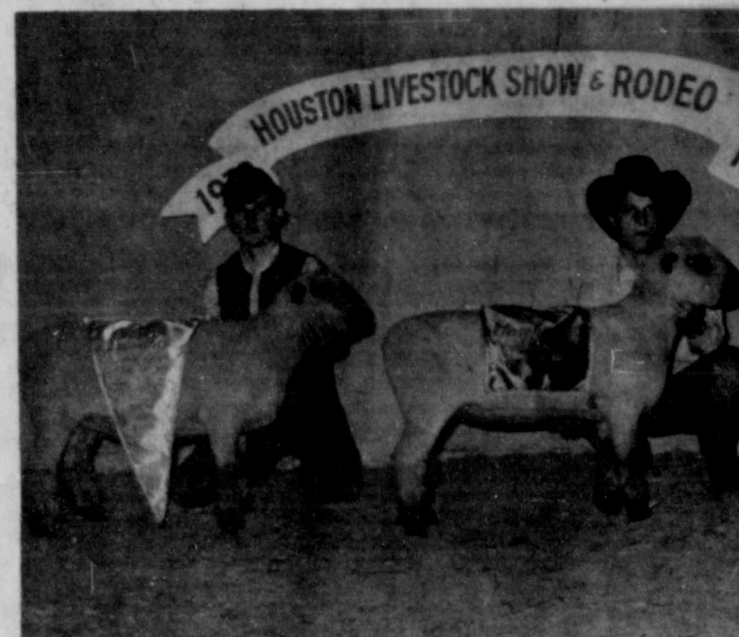
The Mullin Rodeo Association will meet at 7:30 p. m. Thursday March 15th, in the agricultural building at Mullin High School.

## Parents Urged To Start Children's Immunizations Early

In view of the new law requiring immunizations for entrance to school, parents are urged to start immunizations for their children early in life.

Immunizations for diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis (DPT) and polio should be started about 2 months of age. Measles and rubella should be given at 12-14 months of age. It is very important that all immunizations be completed and boosters given as needed.

If your child needs any of these immunizations, they will be given at a free clinic which will be held on Thursday, March 22, 1973, from 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. at the Goldthwaite Elementary School

cafeteria for children of all ages. REMEMBER — A personal immunization record showing dates and kinds of immunizations received must be kept on each child. All immunizations must be validated by the doctor or health clinics. Please bring these records to the clinic.

AUSTIN, TEXAS — Top legislators have settled down to the budget-writing job which will decide whether lawmakers — and the taxpayers — will be confronted with a tax bill this year.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe said new taxation must be avoided — for the second legislative session in 20 years — and offered a budget which would require no new revenue.

Further, the Briscoe budget would leave \$300 million in unobligated funds on the table to meet unforeseen court developments in the public school finance case and uncertainties of welfare-spending requirements.

Briscoe's no-new-tax proposals met generally favorable reaction from legislative leaders and rank-and-file legislators, although some differed with him on specifics.

The governor delivered to a joint session of the House and Senate a \$9.6 billion biennial appropriation recommendation — \$391.6 million above the present level of general revenue outlays and federal revenue-sharing income.

Even with the addition and the holding back of \$300 million, Briscoe was \$174.1 million under former Gov. Preston Smith's last budget draft for 1974-1975, and \$91.6 million below the Legislative Budget Board's recommendations.

He recommended \$240.3 million more for education; an \$111.3 million increase for the state departments and agencies; \$23 million more for public health, hospitals, mental retardation and youth institutions; and \$11 million more for the courts and legislature.

While governors' budget recommendations are generally ignored, Briscoe's were promised careful review, although House and Senate appropriations bill drafters had already concluded their hearings when he offered his set of figures.

EDITORS INTERVIEWS — Texas newspaper editors will converge on Austin Monday, March 19, to seek "editorial" and "column" material.

Legislative Day for editors will feature meetings with Governor Briscoe, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, Speaker Price Daniel Jr., Sec. of State Mark White and Atty. Gen. John Hill — and hometown legislators.

Current issues of interest to Texas editors and publishers include revision of the Constitution, judicial reform, penal code reform, drug laws, election laws and "reform legislative package" by Speaker Daniel. It includes revisions of the Open Meetings Law, Free Flow of Information Bill — newsman's privilege measure — and Open Records Bill.

LEASE SALE NETS \$7.4 MILLION — An oil and gas lease sale on state-owned lands — largest since 1966 — brought the state \$7,451,278 in bonus payments for the permanent school fund.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong said renewed interest in oil and gas production on state lands is due largely to increased demands for energy fuels.

A total of 113,737 acres were leased at an average per acre price of \$65.31.

For the first time in recent years, the highest bid was over one million dollars. Houston Oil and Minerals Corporation bid \$1.5 million for 394 acres in a Galveston County submerged tract.

CONSTITUTIONAL REVISION BEGINS — The 37-member State Constitutional Revision Commission held its first meeting Saturday after legislators failed to register enough protests to block appointments.

The Commission was bombarded with criticism because its ranks did not include more women, blacks, Mexican-Americans and youth. Several areas of the state also felt they were insufficiently represented on the blue ribbon body.

First task of the Commission will be selection of staff, choosing quarters and dividing into subcommittees to split up work which must be completed by Nov. The Legislature will convene as a Constitutional Convention next January and a 10-member legislative committee has been authorized to plan that historic session.

POLLUTION HEARINGS — Hearings are scheduled in Houston, Dallas and San Antonio April 4 to consider state controls on autos and trucks in the drive against air pollution.

Texas Air Control Board will conduct the hearings and weigh advisability of transportation con-

trols to meet national ambient air standards. Further hearings may be held.

SHORT SHORTS

Too few poor are receiving any benefits from millions of dollars spent on welfare, a House interim committee reported.

Texas Water Rights Commission reaffirmed its position that the plan for navigation of the Trinity River is feasible.

Justices of the peace and constables served notice they plan to "zap" a proposed constitutional amendment to overhaul the court system — and abolish their jobs.

Hunting and fishing license fees would be increased under a bill given House committee approval.

Governor Briscoe will present awards to five outstanding Texas manufacturers at the fourth annual Governor's Industrial Expansion Awards Conference here May 10.

New state banks are being sought at Sierra Blanca and Irving.

Revenue from cigarette taxes decreased from \$17.1 million in 1972 to \$16.8 million last month.

INFORMATION BILLS — Lieutenant Governor Hobby said he is optimistic that a strong press "shield" law and a tougher open meetings bill will clear the senate soon.

The lieutenant governor said the shield law will not only protect newsmen from having to divulge sources of confidential information but also will grant privilege to all information they obtain in the course of their official duties.

HIB 10 — The House-passed shield bill — got a rough reception in the Senate Jurisprudence Committee last week, but Sen. Chet Brooks of Pasadena said that doesn't mean it is logjammed there.

"The hearing just provided an opportunity for some members of the Senate to vent their hostility against the press," said Brooks.

Sen. A. M. Aikin of Paris is the sponsor of the broader shield bill which provides that no newsmen can be forced to disclose any information received or any source of information obtained in the course of news-related activities. The privilege would be no protection in actions for libel, slander or invasion of privacy.

About 150 citizens have been invited to attend the Austin session and provided a "grass-roots" input into the legislative process.

"To be meaningful," said Strong of the conference, "it must explore not only the ethics of legislators, but the ethics of the citizens as well, since the legislature is merely a reflection of the mores of our society."

COURTS SPEAK — The Supreme Court declined to overturn San Patricio County land claims involving thousands of acres and millions of dollars in spite of an attorney general's contention that the case may deprive the permanent school fund of all unsurveyed public school land.

In other recent rulings, the Court held:

+The Fort Worth Court of Civil Appeals was right in ordering uninsured motorist benefits paid to a man injured when his brother's car, on which he was working, was struck by an uninsured driver.

+Lower courts should be reversed in holding that a Corsicana district judge is qualified to hold his office although he has not practiced law or been a judge for four years before election. The High Court itself refused to decide.

APPOINTMENTS — Governor Briscoe named Frank G. Evans III of Houston associate justice of the First Court of Civil Appeals, to succeed Tom F. Coleman who resigned. The Senate promptly confirmed Evans, who was a Briscoe campaign aide.

Briscoe reappointed Brig. Gen. Willie L. Scott of Austin and Col. Belisario D. J. Flores of San Antonio as assistant adjutants general for the Army and Air National Guard, respectively.

James Horton's 800-pound Hereford steer calf, "Late Model," last Friday was judged the Grand Champion of the San Angelo Livestock Show — making three grand championships won by Mills County 4-H Club boys in three state livestock shows entered this year.

H. E. Patton, superintendent of the Goldthwaite Ind. School District, announced his resignation this week.

Mrs. R. V. Littlepage was the hostess for the G. A. Girls on Friday, March 3, for the purpose of studying their manuals.

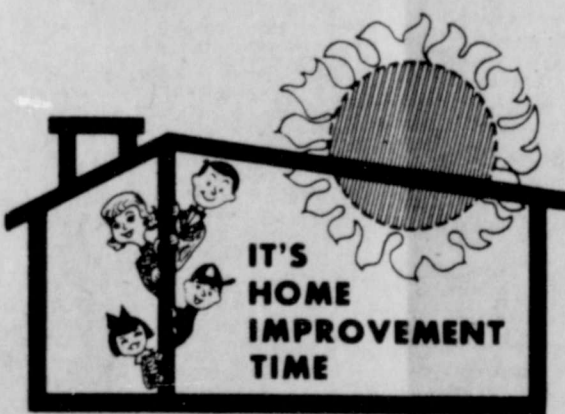

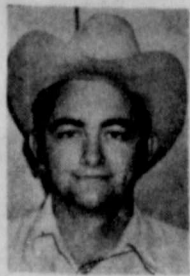

Pasture and Forage Clinic: A Pasture and Forage Clinic will be held Monday, March 19, 7 p.m. at the Mills County State Bank Meeting Room. The Clinic is being sponsored by the Extension Service and is free to the public.

Pastures and forages are very important to the livestock industry in Mills County and will continue to be the primary factor in increasing the stocking rate of our ranch land. Speaker for the clinic will be Dr. John Chapin, Area Agronomist for the Extension Service. Dr. Chapin will discuss the different types of improved grasses for pastures and forages available such as coastal, Klein, TAM, etc; fertilization required; management, stocking rates, and other needed information.

The Clinic will be informal and participants will have time to ask questions throughout the clinic.

The time for starting the spraying schedule of peaches and plum trees against several insects, the major one being the plum Curculio, the small worm that infest the fruit of peaches and plums. The spray schedule consists of 5 sprayings, the first beginning when 75 per cent of the blossom petals have fallen. Time and insecticides to use are as follows:

First spraying (when 75 per cent of blossom petals have fallen) - 1 tablespoon Dieldrin to 3 gallons of water.

Second spraying (10 days later) Same mixture.

Third spraying (10 days after second) Same mixture.

Fourth spraying (14 days after third) - 2 tablespoons Sevin to 3 gallons of water.

Fifth spraying (21 days after fourth) - Same mixture as the fourth spraying.

This schedule is important to follow. The chemical, Sulfur, at the rate of 9 tablespoons to 3 gallons of water can be added to each of the spray schedules for added protection.

The Mills County Program Building Committee is conducting a survey to determine estimated death losses of sheep, goats, and calves from coyotes and other predators. In a few days, each livestock producer in Mills Co. will receive a questionnaire from my office asking for this information.

This information obtained from these returned questionnaires will be used in educational purposes to higher officials in an attempt to get the use of chemi-

cal's back as a control of predators. Since chemicals were banned, predator numbers have increased considerably and death losses doubled. This questionnaire is very important and the return of requested information could be very beneficial. If you are a livestock producer but do not receive a questionnaire from me, please contact my office and request one. By working together, we can accomplish our goal - no losses from predators.

## THE MILLS MINISTER

When Jesus Christ was born into this sinful world, Matthew reports that he had some very important visitors. We read, "Now when Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of Herod the king, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, saying, 'Where is he who has been born king of the Jews?'" They were so wrapped up in their own petty affairs that they completely disregarded Jesus. Today there are still many who are indifferent to Christ Jesus. These people may call themselves religious but they are too busy to be bothered very much. They ignore the source of all true religion.

(3) There was the reaction of the wise men, the reaction of adoring worship. These men were overwhelmed with love for the child. They wanted to give their best gifts to him. Countless people today have also realized the love of God shown in Jesus. They have come to understand what Jesus offers them. Therefore, they dedicate their lives to loving, praising, and serving Him.

Dolman sleeves—"big" in current fashions—tend to rip out easily. "Although they appear

roomy, Dolman sleeves have limitations. When the wearer's arm is down, the curved underarm seam is loose and floppy. Once her

arm is extended, the seam becomes tight—causing stitches to pop or the seam to rip.

A homemaker can do several things to prevent these problems both in constructing garments and improving ready-made fashions.

One is simply reinforcing the underarm seam by stitching close to the original seam line. Thus, even if the first row breaks, the second one will back it up.

Two other methods involve use of bias tape. After the original seam is made, stitch a piece of bias tape right over the seam line. Clip seam allowance along the curve—but don't clip the bias tape. This clipping eases strain and

tension while the bias tape strengthens the seam.

Another method requires clipping the seam allowance and pressing it open. Lay a piece of bias tape over the opened seam and stitch about one-eighth inch on each side of the seam line.
