Highlights

AUSTIN, TEXAS — Annual public hearings to determine auto insurance rates were held here this week (July 10) amid predictions that premiums will drop again this year.

Insurance Board Chairman Joe Christie expressed hope that evidence will bring a reduction for insurance buyers in most of Texas' 40 statistical rating territories.

This year's hearing was conducted against a backdrop of new legislation and a price freeze which applies to insurance as well as the usual review of accident frequency, claim cost and inflationary factors.

Laws which must be considered are comparative negligence, repeal of the guest statute, personal injury protection and the new deviation or competitive rating plan.

Texas Safety Association will also ask additional credit for persons completing the defensive driving course. Board rules now allow a 10 per cent reduction in auto insurance rates for those certified as having taken the course.

Meanwhile, House Insurance Committee Chairman Rep. Ben Bynum of Amarillo predicted the average premium will drop 10 to 15 per cent when new rates are set this fall.

Competitive rates may mean drops of as much as 20 to 30 per cent for drivers with good safety records, Bynum said. "Nobody can definitely state what the final rates will be until the statistics and the impact of new insurance laws are weighed in detail after the hearing," said Christie.

REVISION SCHEDULE SET — The Constitutional Revision Commission will meet here July 27-29 to review policy presentations of its seven standing committees on specific areas.

Commission members will hold briefings for the press during the three-day meeting. Members of the Texas Press Association and Texas Association of Broadcasters will meet with commission members on Friday, July 27.

Commission action on the committee reports will be taken September 6-8 and 13-15.

Consideration of the final document is slated for meetings September 20-22 and 27-29, and the presentation, together with supporting reports, November 1, followed by briefing of legislators in December.

Commission members bogged down at a recent meeting here on adoption of basic guidelines for their mission and postponed consideration of a statement of principles until their July 27-29 meeting.

Instead, they agreed tentatively to write a "revised" constitution — the minimum assignment of voters last November 7 when they directed wheels be set in motion toward overhauling basic state laws. Two members thought even that non-specific commitment was premature.

House and Senate committees, meanwhile, have been named to make preliminary plans for the January-May constitutional convention, draft rules and agree on procedures.

14 MORE GAS SUITS FILED — Atty. Gen. John Hill has filed 14 more suits to recover full market value of royalty gas produced from state lands. The first such suit was filed May 18 against Exxon Corporation.

The state contends it is not limited by long term contracts, nor to any regulated ceiling prices promulgated by the Federal Power Commission.

Defendants, according to state allegations, are selling gas at about 20 cents per 1,000 cubic feet, or less, while the market value is around 45 cents per 1,000 cubic feet.

Suits now filed cover about 80 per cent of all lease contracts involving gas royalties, Hill said.

COURTS SPEAK — A four-year prison term assessed Amarillo former State Rep. Walter Knapp for using \$1,200 worth of state-issued postage stamps to buy a used pick-up truck was affirmed by the Court of Criminal

Appeals, on a three-to-two split vote.

The same court reversed and remanded conviction and 20-year sentence of a Mineral Wells man for alleged delivery of heroin because of testimony concerning beatings by police officers.

AG OPINIONS — Law requiring finance reports by House speakership candidates is clear as to who may and may not contribute, the amounts, extent of expenditures allowed and other matters, Attorney General Hill held.

Department of Public Safety, Hill said in another opinion, is governed by statute which requires certification of accuracy of seller's invoice in purchases through the State Board of Control. Other purchases requiring disbursement by the comptroller form the operator's and chauffer's license fund must be accompanied by the vendor's certification of the invoice's accuracy in the usual manner, Hill continues.

APPOINTMENTS — In a major reshuffling, Gov. Dolph Briscoe appointed William T. Keenan of Houston executive director of the Governor's Committee on Aging, replacing Mrs. Carter Clopton of Austin.

Briscoe, at the same time, named Alton O. Bower of Austin chairman of the Committee on Aging.

Other recent appointments J. R. Taylor of Amarillo and John Biggs of Vernon to the Animal Health Commission.

Dr. Margaret Cigarroa of Laredo to the Board of Mental Health and Mental Retardation. Dr. Richard Hooker of Austin as gubernatorial school finance advisor.

J. R. Porter of Dallas to Tex. Mass Transportation Commission.

ROAD CONTRACT LETTING OFF — Monthly state highway contract lettings scheduled July 24-25 for 18 projects costing about \$22 million were cancelled due to failure of Congress to approve a federal aid bill.

Texas Highway Engineer B. L. DeBerry said the state had no alternative. Highway aid bills have been tied up in conference committee after the U.S. Senate and House passed different versions. Dispute is largely over diversion of highway trust fund revenues to urban mass transit.

The Highway Department in recent months has been financing all highway construction with state funds under an interim congressional action calling for reimbursement at a later date when the congressional bill is passed.

CITIES HONORED — San Antonio, San Marcos, Temple and Lubbock have been designated as national bicentennial communities.

The cities are to be recognized nationally during the Bicentennial observance of the American revolution in 1976. Thirteen other communities in Texas will also have bicentennial programs submitted for consideration.

SHORT SNOOTS — Harry Hubbard, AFL-CIO state secretary-treasurer, is challenging Roy R. Evans for the organization's presidency here in convention this week.

Governor Briscoe has asked designation of Newton County as a major disaster area due to June floods.

Hearing by the Railroad Commission on Coastal States Gas Corporation's request for rate increases has been postponed until July 23.

A House sub-committee's investigation of Artesia Hall continued here this week.

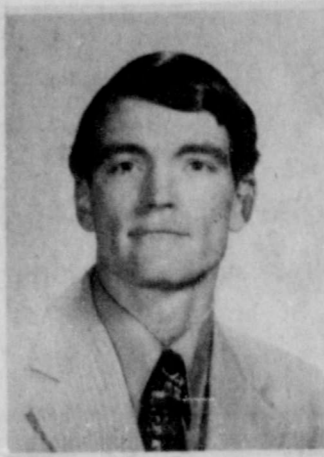
Thomas M. Phillips of Houston has been selected as the 1973 recipient of the Outstanding Alumnus Award of the University of Texas School of Law.

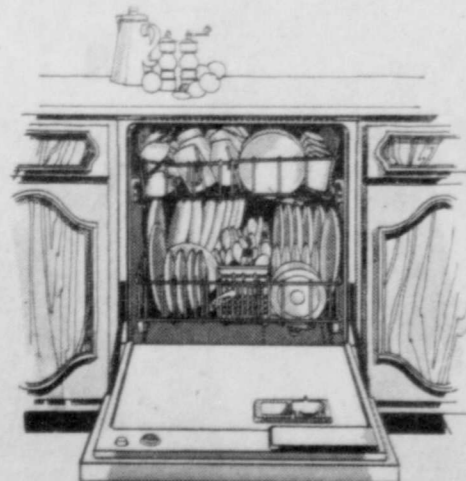





Dateline — Washington

BY BOB POAGE
U. S. Congressman

Early this week the Supreme Court ordered another revision of Texas Congressional Districts. In recent years many of our courts and many of our people have become so obsessed with the idea of "pure" democracy that I am afraid they are about to destroy the "representative" character of our government. In theory it is all fine to suggest that every District from which a governmental official is selected should have exactly the same number of people as every other similar District. But in practice, this often does not give the type of representation which I think is needed.

I think our country would be better served if each state could select for itself and in the manner it sees fit its representatives, as I am sure the farmers of our Constitution intended. Those who

have always lived in large cities have no understanding of the part that geography and distance play in proper representation. Nor do those who have not served in legislative bodies understand the importance of personal contacts between a representative and his people. While I am interested in letters and telephone calls from Dallas and Houston, I am not nearly as concerned about them as I am with communications from any place in our District, like Meridian or Rosebud, and every Congressman feels the same way.

A Congressional District in which there are 600,000 people, but which has been stable enough over the years to give the people an opportunity to know their Congressman, is likely to get much more actual representation (that is, reflection of the people's per-

sonal views) than a District of 300,000 where the lines have been changed so frequently that the people have had no acquaintance with the individual who tries to represent them. I therefore, feel, it was most unfortunate that the Supreme Court should decide (subject to unlikely review by the trial court) that the lines of all of our Texas Districts should be changed simply to assure that there was absolute mathematical equality in the number of people in each District. Actually, this equality existed only in April 1970 — the date of the Census — and is changing daily.

In the 11th District we will gain a number of fine constituents. We get all of San Saba, McCulloch and Brown and parts of Coleman, Comanche and Erath Counties. These are good people. I am happy to have them in our District but we will also be losing about the same number of fine people from Parker and the Western half of Williamson County. The net result is that we will have a total of 15 full counties, and only parts of four other counties in our District where neither the Congressman nor the constituents are going to know just exactly where the line is. I fear the court has strained at a goat and swallowed a camel and that the people will get a theoretical equality of numbers in each District, but will lose the very practical benefit of real personal representation.

It is good to be home and to meet my friends (we are in Texas this week). I have visited some of our new territory, some of the area which came into the District last year, and some of the counties which have been in the 11th District for many years. While I have been favorably impressed with our new territory and our new constituents, I realize, and I hope our people will realize, that it is going to be utterly impossible to have the personal contacts we have had in a smaller District. This is unfortunate, because people are best represented when they know and have frequent contacts with their representative. We will, however, do the best we can to at least know the problems of the different parts of the District if not the problems of the individuals and where we can help on individual problems, don't hesitate to write us. It is better to write than it is to phone, because we always need details such as serial numbers which we are much more likely to get correct in a letter.

I have never seen crop conditions look more favorable over our area, although as is usually the case at this time of the year most of the country would like to have "just one more" good rain. This is a great tribute to our Central Texas farmers. Just two months ago it did not look like anyone would be able to plant any crop because of the prolonged rains. We are too prone to overlook the fact that it took lots of work, planning, and a large investment in supplies and machinery to get this crop going. Farmers can't make those investments without the assurance of a fair return,

and if they don't make these investments, our supply of food and fiber is certain to be short. This is of vital importance to all our people. We must have food and fiber of it. That is why the Farm Bill which will be considered in Congress next week is just as vital to city people as it is to farmers.

This bill simply attempts to protect farmers from any disastrous drop in income. Without this assurance it will be impossible to finance the production of the food and fiber our people must have. In the long run, people cannot help themselves by driving farm prices down too low. When production is reduced prices are certain to ultimately go up to levels higher than would have otherwise been necessary. Who is there who does not realize that the recent freeze on the price of chickens at a level at which they cannot be sold at a profit is sure to reduce the supply in a few months? Who is there who is not concerned that the freeze on the price of milk is not likely to send so many milk cows to market that we may face a shortage of milk?

Without a farm bill consumers as well as producers are going to be hurt. The Senate has passed a bill with very high target prices. I would like to see farmers get these prices, but the Administration has repeatedly pointed out that they fear the expense of such a bill and made it very clear that the President will veto any bill containing these figures. I am convinced that he will do just what he says he will do in this regard.

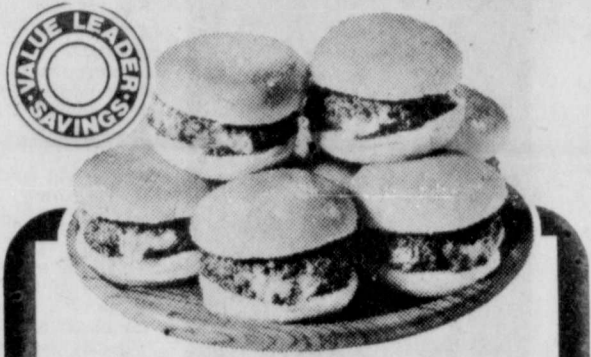

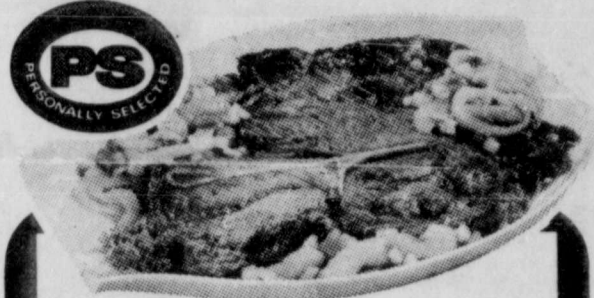

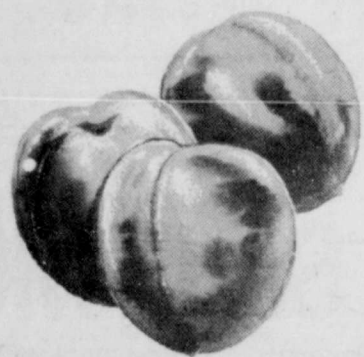

From the County Agent

Coastal Bermudagrass, being one of the primary pasture grasses in the state, is well deserving of special attention by farmers and ranchers. Recently, there have been questions regarding cultural and management practices for coastal. It is hopeful that the following information will be of help.

The time of planting for coastal depends upon the area. Spring is generally considered to be the best planting time except in the extreme southern part of Texas. Fall is the best time for planting in extreme South Tex. because the weed problem is less severe at that time. Seedbeds should be well prepared, clean and firm and the soil surface practically level or smooth. Coastal Bermuda should not be planted in established stands of other perennial grasses.

Fertilization is necessary for quick establishment on soil of low to medium fertility. A soil test is the best and most accurate means of determining the type and amount of fertilizer needed for good growth.

Rate of planting is primarily determined by the availability of sprigs. The maximum spacing recommended for sprigs is 3 feet apart in 3 to 3 1/2 foot rows, which requires a minimum of 9 bushels of sprigs per acre. To get a more rapid ground cover, the sprigs may be spaced 18 inches apart in the row requiring 15 bushels of sprigs per acre or 12 inches apart in the row requiring 27 bushels of sprigs per acre. The rate can be increased even more at the discretion of the producer.

The ideal sprig placement is for one end to be 6 inches deep with the other end at or barely above the soil surface. Sprigs should not be covered more than two inches.

Grazing management is an important part of a good pasture program. Grazing should be controlled to prevent as much

trampling of forage as possible and to provide for maximum utilization. Rotation grazing will increase beef or milk yields from a high producing coastal pasture more than any other management practice in most areas of the State.

Hay from Coastal Bermuda

is generally of good quality. Coastal should be cut for hay when the plants are 14 to 18 inches high. The hay should be left in the swath until it is cured. The stage of plant development is directly related to the protein content of the hay. Generally speaking, the hay should be cut before it reaches 5 weeks growth. The protein content of the hay decreases as the matures.

Nitrogen is the most important nutrient in grass production. When moisture is available, coastal bermuda pastures should receive 30 to 60 pounds of nitrogen each time they are grown down or cut for hay or silage.

AUSTIN — The phrase, "Sign your name on the dotted line," can sound quite inviting after you've waited for credit approval on a loan or time purchase.

That may be the flattering sign that you're a good credit risk. But it is not wise to rush into any contract.

If you read any installment contract carefully, you should find a statement in bold type, cautioning: "Notice to Buyer—Do not sign this agreement before you read it, or if it contains blank spaces." The statement also puts you on notice that you are entitled to a copy of the agreement.

In order to meet state and federal requirements on credit agreements, the contract must tell you the difference between cash price and credit price, less down payment and-or trade-in; list any additional charges, such as credit insurance premiums, and spell out the total number of payments to be made by you, as well as the amount of each monthly or weekly payment due.

If you already have insurance which would cover your note amount or the secured property if anything happened to you, or, if you have an insurance agent with whom you would prefer to deal, let the creditor know. He cannot require you to buy the policy he may offer.

Be certain the agreement contains the name, as well as the address, of the lender or creditor; the correct date on which you made the note, and the date for final payment. And, if the creditor is taking a lien or other security on your property, make sure that that detail is included in the contract.

If you are negotiating a home improvement, ask to see the "certificate of satisfaction" which the seller must furnish you. But heed the warning that you should not sign the certificate of satisfaction until the work has been completed, and until you know that you are satisfied with it.

That may seem like a lot of detail. But it is not complicated.

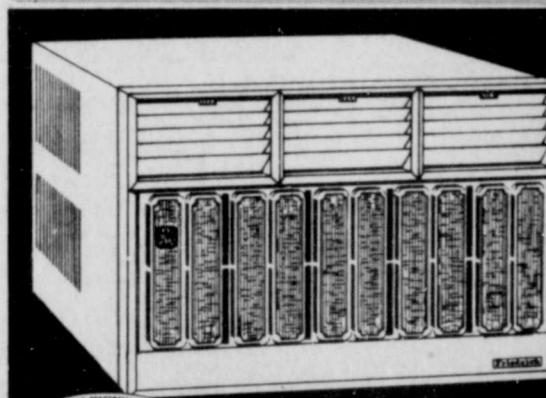
Just remember to read carefully every section leading to a space for your signature. And be certain you understand it to your own satisfaction.

Most merchants or lending institution officials will be more than happy to answer any questions. In fact, some are exceedingly scrupulous about not allowing you to sign until they believe there is no room for misunderstanding.

Take advantage of the occasion to review the obligation you're accepting.
