A .38 pistol was found at the scene according to Mills County Sheriff Horace G. Brooks. The case was ruled as suicide. According to Justice of the Peace E. H. Thorne, death occured between midnight Sat-urday and the early morning



epoxy glue is used because it holds better - and epoxy glue is too strong and dangerous for the eye area. The danger is that it can easily get ont skin, and even into the eye. Nor are the lashes as perma nent as the manufacturers want you to believe. In fact, they shouldn't be expected to last more than two or three weeks. And each time they fall out, they have to be replaced, at additional cost. Also, they may be stiffer or longer than natural lashes and will cause even more irritation if they fall into the eye. If you wear contact lens, the new lashes are definitely not recommended.

Stockmen should be on the alert for sand oak poisoning in their livestock, points out Danny Long, County Agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Sand shin oak is toxic to livewhen the plant first buds in the spring. And, with the plant beginning to bud, stockmen should eep livestock out of pastures where sand shin oak is abund-ant, or they should take other steps to reduce losses from ssible poisoning.

One such measure is to provide a good supplementary feed. containing calcium droxide is more effective. Studes have shown that a feed containing 10 percent calcium hy-droxide (by weight) protects calves fed post oak free-choice. Post oak has toxins similar to shin oak

The Texas Agriuchtural Exper-iment Station has developed a ration that has proved effective in warding off sand shin oak poisoning. It contains 600 lbs. ground alfalfa, 1080 lbs. of 41 percent cottonseed meal, 120 lbs. of vegetable oil and 200 lbs.

Each Texas Highway Department district includes about 10 counties and about 2,600 miles of highway.

Sand shin oak poisoning can be very serious in livestock if left uncontrolled. Annual losses in Texas have been estimated at more than \$10 million. And, with grazing conditions short in many counties this spring, livestock will be nore prone to graze the toxic sand shin oak. So, be on the alert.

## **Progressing Well**

Mills County's Easter Seal Rep resentative reported today that the 1974 Easter Seal Appeal of the Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults is going well. Glynn Collier of Goldthwaite, serves as Easter Seal Appeal Treasurer for Mills County.

When contacted for services, Collier will provide the request form to be sent to the Texas Easter Seal Society in Dallas to determine the needs of the disabled person. The Society will provide the service where pos-sible or will adivse the hadi-capped person of the best re-sources available to help him.

However, a buyer's protestations of innocence may not always be convincing. Consider the case of a farmer who bought 24 chickens from a teenager who called at his farmhouse.

In this case, the youth ap-proached the farmhouse furtively by way of a back road. The price he asked was less than one-third of what the farmer was used to paying. And the hour was shortly past midnight

Although the farmer insisted afterward that he was "totally surprised" to learn the chickens had been stolen, a court chose not to believe him.

Result: he was found guilty of receiving stolen property. The court observed that the sale was made "at an hour unusual for honest transactions."

Of course, the major problem in this area is not the occasional purchaser but the professional "fence" who, by providing a regu-lar outlet for stolen merchandise, encourages the thievery in the first place.


Accordingly, most states impose an extra responsibility on businessmen who regularly buy and sell merchandise to watch out for certain suspicious circumstances. Thus a junk dealer, when offered an unusual bargain, may be required to ask more questions about the merchandise than a onetime buyer.

"The duty of diligent inquiry before purchasing," said one court, "protects the junk dealers who buy in good faith and provides nt for those who do not."







Down, Down, Down...Broilers Not Chicken Feed

For the 17th consecutive month, milk production has shown a decline. In Texas, milk production during February dropped four per cent below a year ago, and seven per cent under a month ago. Milk production in Texas during February totaled 244,000,000 pounds.

Milk production per cow averaged 700 pounds during February. This is 10 pounds below last year and 50 pounds below the previous month

Nationwide, milk production during February showed a three per cent decline. Production during the first two months of 1974 was three per cent below the corresponding period a year ago.

Milk production per cow on a nationwide basis stabilized during February. Production per cow was 776 pounds; this is the same as a year ago. But it is six per cent below January of this year.

Milk cows on farms during February totaled 11,227,000 head. This is down three per cent from the same month a year ago.

Meanwhile, dairy price supports to become effective April 1 will be at the lowest level permitted by law-80 per cent.

Continued high cost of production is the main reason for a continuing decline in milk production.

For example, Texas dairymen paid an average of \$137 per ton for mixed dairy feed (16 per cent protein) in January compared to \$105 per ton in February of 1973.

Texas dairymen paid an average of \$86 per ton in February for baled alfalfa hay compared to \$71 per ton in February of 1973.

THE BROILER business in Texas is not chicken feed, according to a summary from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Gross income from broilers in Texas during 1973 totaled \$146,221,000. This is an increase of more than \$50,000,000 over 1972.

Average price received for 1973 was 22.8 cents per pound liveweight. This is the highest average price since 1955 when it was 25.5 cents per pound. The 1973 average price was 8.6 cents per pound higher than in 1972.

Texas is in seventh place in the nation in the number of broiler chicks placed in 1973. Commercial broilers placed in the state last year totaled 178,991,000. This is a three per cent decrease from 1972.






Robert Hunt is one of 54 Howard Payne College student teachers who are now practicing their future professions in Brownwood area elementary, junior high and senior high schools.
