


Electrical wiring crews worked steadily last week in order to finish in time for the employees of the Patty's of Texas factory to start back to work Wednesday.




Monthly Bus Rides

Dear Sir: One of the fine things about living in a small community is how the citizens "arise for the occasion" especially during an emergency. Once in a while, late at night (and it seems to be always late at night) we have to call someone in to donate a unit of blood. When we do, it is usually a life saving matter. I do not believe that I have ever been turned down yet. And what a great feeling this gives us when in a few weeks we see our neighbor or friend and we say "There goes old Joe with some of my blood in his veins" and then a few jokes always follow. For some reason the feeling

is just not the same when the mobile unit comes to town and some person we do not know from some town we're not sure of draws our hard made blood and puts it in a cold box and takes it off somewhere and puts it in a big ice box with lots of other blood from communities like Brownwood, Coleman, Santa Anna. This feeling is not nearly as dramatic. However, the feeling should be even more so when we understand what happens to our blood and how a community blood program works.

To start with, our unit of blood is checked, then checked again and then checked one more time to make sure it is safe to use. Some of the machines used cost thousands of dollars.

Another interesting thing is the fact that all blood is not alike. There are 8 main different types. Let's say that you have AB Negative blood which is the rarest of all. I know of only one person in this community with this type. Say you come into the hospital and need surgery and the doctor wants two units of blood ready in case you need it, which is a very com-mon situation. Now, we go to this big community ice box, reach back at the back and take two units of AG Neg. off the shelf. You do fine in the surgery and the blood is not used, so back to the shelf it goes to be available for someone else in some other community. Unfortunately human blood will

only keep for 21 days. In a community blood program, blood becomes world travelers. Our unit of blood may go to some-


