This increase results in a net gain into the School District's treasury of only about \$4,200.00.

Superintendent Gilbert Davis reported that throughout the state, school districts have been raising tax rates and evaluations tremendously to cope with rising costs and with the fact that some state monies have been reduced in recent years. Brownwood, for example, has raised evaluation 70 percent and has increased the tax raw by 15 cents. Davis commented that the local board and administration has tried its best to avoid unnecessary expenses and keep the costs of running the education complex at a minimum.






