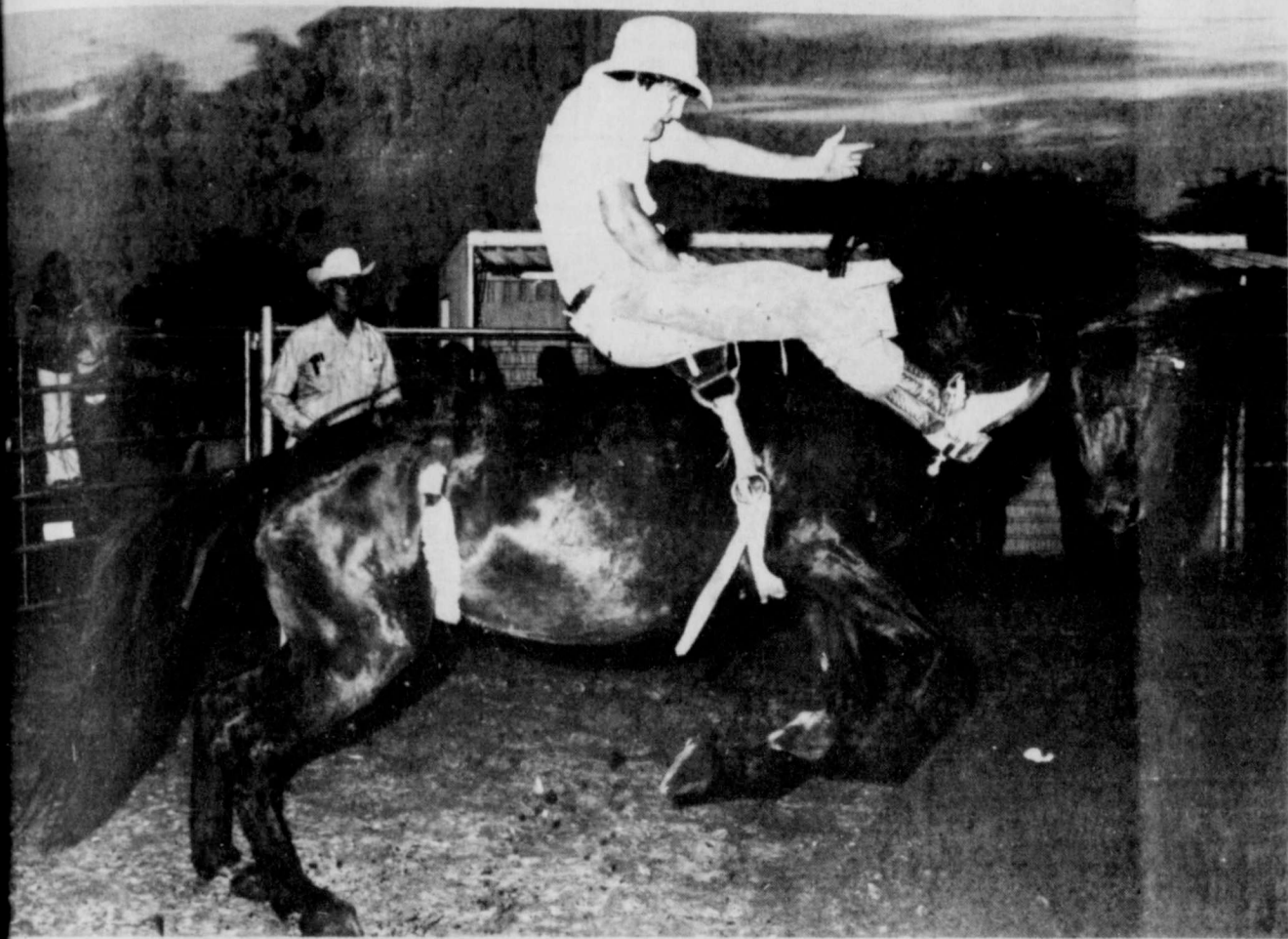

Twenty-Seven Eagles Report For Football Workouts

Workouts for the Goldthwaite High School footballers started Monday morning. Twenty-seven eager players reported for the first morning's session. A few more boys are expected to show up for workouts within a few days.

According to announcement by Head Coach Gene Auldridge, 13 starters were back from last year's team, seven from the offensive and 6 from the defensive.

Two-a-day workout sessions will be conducted this week in preparation for the opening of the '74 football season. With the beginning of school next Monday, workouts will go to a regular afternoon schedule.

Auldridge urges all fans to come up to the field and witness any of the sessions. Afternoon sessions will be conducted at 6 p. m.

Two assistant coaches will be working with Auldridge this season. Danny Spradley, returning from last year, will be working along with newly acquired assistant Perry Farley.

"Optimistic is the word for the '74 Eagle football season. Looks like a great season is ahead for the GHS Eagles."

Auldridge remarked.

The first scrimmage will be held at Burnet on August 23rd with the second scrimmage to follow on August 30th here at Eagle Field against Santa Anna.

Goldthwaite's first football encounter this season will be with the San Saba Armadillos on Eagle Field Friday, September 6.

Let us all work together for the education of our children, and let us do this in an enjoyable way. All of us working together can accomplish this.

The Goldthwaite Independent School District will give each student the first day of school a guideline and an application blank for application for free or reduced lunches.

If a family meets the income requirements, they should apply for the lunches. Parents will be notified if they have been accepted about five days after the school receives your application. The application must have a list of the number of people in the family, family income and a few other questions besides the signed application. They will be kept on file for adult purposes in the office of the Superintendent.

Supt. Gilbert Davis reminds all parents that good, well-balanced meals will be served at the high school and elementary school lunchrooms.

Mr. Davis encourages parents to get their children to eat lunch either at the school or at home since well-balanced meals are so important to each child.

Youth-A-Rama To Continue Through School Year

The Central Texas Council of Governments is now accepting registration for the Youth-A-Rama Program for the fall school semester. Throughout the summer, the Mills County Office has been sponsoring this program allowing teenagers to hire themselves out for odd jobs. A teenager can call or come by in order to list his or her services with the Mills County Office. The phone number to call is 648-2622. At present, there have

been teenagers whose services varied from window washing and housework to gardening, running errands, and pet care. Any adult wishing to get in contact with a teenager for odd jobs can call or come by the office located in the County Courthouse for a referral. The hours and pay are negotiable strictly between the employer and the teenager. For this type of temporary employment, it is not required to pay the minimum wage set up by the Federal government.

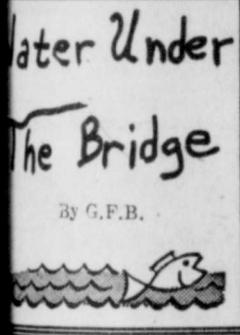
The Mills County Office of the Central Texas Council of Governments hopes to continue with the response from both teenagers and adults it has received with this program. The goals are to help those in need of temporary help as well as to provide the youth with extra spending money. This office will act as a referral point for any teenagers wishing to work after school or on the weekends. The times available will be subject to time outside the classroom.

From the County Agent

MILLS COUNTY EXTENSION AGENT

The Mills County 4-H organization will soon be getting back into full swing, after two months of vacation events and numerous other special activities. Clubs will begin to meet on a regular basis in September and Club activity will resume as always.

We would like to take this opportunity to remind all youth and parents of the opportunities for young people in the 4-H organization. Membership and participation in 4-H as well as all Extension sponsored activities is offered to all people regardless of race, color, sex, or national origin. The only requirement for 4-H Club membership is that you must be between the ages of 9 - 19.

Learning opportunities are unlimited in the 4-H organization. Project areas range from foods & nutrition to Beef Cattle Production. There are presently over 200 Mills County Youth enrolled in the 4-H Club Program. These youth participate in various club, county, area, district and state activities throughout the year.

If you are a young person between the ages of 9 - 19, or if you are a parent with children interested in "Learning By Doing", we encourage you to

consider the 4-H program. For additional information, contact the County Agent's office.

The success of agriculture production relies heavily on basic biological processes. Each of the farmer's crops, wheat, milk, corn - is the result of a natural growth process; an ongoing, continuing process that can't be turned off like a water tap.

Each grain crop takes several months to grow. You can't cut out a thousand bushels of wheat in a month just because you want them. You have to wait for the right season, the right time to plant, the right time to harvest.

With animals the wait is longer than with grain. It takes from 1 1/2 to 2 years from the time a steer is born until he is sent to market and the meat appears in the supermarket's steak and hamburger.

Six months pass between the birth of a litter of pigs and their appearance as more on the market.

Producing a broiler is fast. Today with a new type of chicken, a new type of feed, the industry produces a three-pound broiler in only eight weeks.
