# Family Land Heritage Program **Underway Here**

County Judge Herbert Faulkner and Texas Historical Commission chairman Mrs. M. F. Horton are working with the Texas Dept. of Agriculture in registering area farmers and ranchers who qualify for honors in the Family Land Heritage Program for 1975.

The program gives recogni-tion to those who have kept land in the family for 100 years or more, maintaining continous agricultural operations, Agriculture Commissioner

John C. White explained. Last year over 560 families qualified for certificates and inclusion in the Family Land Heritage Registry, which contains brief histories of all the farms and ranches, the names of current owners, and pictures of early settlers.

"The Texas Dept. of Agriculture has received many requests for the Registry - from universities, historians, and government agencies. It provides an interesting record of agriculture in the early days of Texas, as well as anecdotes about members of families.

"We also included notations on the 100-year-old structures on the property, no matter what condition. This information can be invaluable to researchers," White stated.

"For this reason, we are trying to register all those who qualify - - not only to give these people some recognition, but also to have a permanent record of pioneer agricultural producers in Texas."

Application forms are available from the county judge's office. Once completed, the forms must be certified by the county judge or his designate. They are then mailed to the Texas Dept. of Agriculture with any pictures of early settlers which can be copied and returned. Deadline is Aug.



# "Come Alive In '75" **County Crusade** Slated July 7 - 11

The Mills County Crusade, "Come Alive in '75", will be held July 7 - July 11, 1975. Services will begin at 8:00 o'clock each evening at Eagle Field in Goldthwaite. The crusade is sponsored by the Ministerial Association and various churches of Mills County.

Evangelist for the crusade will be Peter McLeod. Reverend McLeod is presently serving as pastor of the historic First Baptist Church in Waco, Texas. He is a native of Shotts, Scotland, having come to the United States in 1955. Prior to moving to this

country, Mr. McLeod completed his education in grammar school, high school and college of engineering in Scotland. He also holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Grand Canyon College in Phoenix, Arizona, and a Bachelor of Divinity degree from New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary in New Orleans, La.

Following his graduation from New Orleans Seminary, he served as pastor of the First Baptist Church in Fort Oglethorpe, Ga. for two and

one-half years. In July, 1966, he was called as Associate Minister of the historic Second Ponce de Leon Baptist Church in Atlanta, Ga ministered there until July, 1968, when he moved to Central Baptist Church in Lexington, Ky. On July 6, 1969, Rev McLeod began his present pastorate at First Baptist.

He has had wide experience in leading evangelistic emphases in both the church and on college campus.

In February of 1970, Rev. McLeod was chosen alumnus of the year at Grand Canyon College. In this same year, he was named one of the Outstanding Young Men of America, being nominated by New Orleans Theological Seminary. Mr. McLeod is married and has two children.

In some areas of the county, there is a growing interest in early weaning of lambs. This procedure seems to be practical for a number of reasons. Research has proven that milk production of most ewes declines rapidly after the second week and is of minor importance after 8-10 weeks.

Aside from the decline in milk production, a lamb's digestive tract after 9 weeks of age is practically the same as that of an adult.

The most commonly used guideline is a weight of 45 pounds or 9 weeks of age. Highlights

Freezers need defrosting and a thorough cleaning before storing the new crop of fruits and vegetables. Consumers should consult their freezer use-care booklet. But if it's misplaced, here are some suggestions.

Unplug the freezer and remove all frozen food. Store the food in a cardboard box or wrap newspapers around it to prevent thawing.

Place clean towels in the bottom of the freezer. Pour cold tap water along the sides to thaw the frost. Using a wooden spoon may help loosen the frost, but don't use metal because it will scratch the lining of the freezer.

As the towels absorb the water, wring them out and replace. When all frost has been removed, wash the inside with one quart warm water to which one tablespoon baking soda has been added.

Rinse with clean water and wipe dry. Replug freezer and wait about 30 minutes before replacing the food.

Most homemakers prefer using the plastic freezer bags cover boxes. This protects the bag from getting holes in it during storage and freezes in a uniform shape for a better

This season may be a good time to purchase a blancher. Since it's necessary to use one gallon of water for each pound (pint) of vegetables, a large blancher may be the best kind to buy. A water bath canner is suit-



Soon after this family arrived, others followed, and these noble people, the original pioneer settlers, with their bare hands, a trust in the Almighty God, and a love for each other, welded a way of life and put together a County we can all be proud of today.

Some of those that came were veterans of the Civil War; some were looking for a new home and a different way of life; others came for adventure and desire to push Westward. There were, however, a few things in common with all those who cast their lot to raise a family in this new and hostile land; most were of Protestant Faith; most were of Caucasian extraction; and all were without money. This was their stock in trade, and it seemed to work.

It was a custom, when hunting a homesite, to first find water, either a spring or a running stream. Then the first families, with the help of neighbors, erected their homes with hand hewn logs. The willing neighbor was always there to help till the soil, kill the hogs, erect a barn, or gather a crop in need. This was Social Security in its original form.

it was in this manner that homes were established, children were born, churches were organized, and meetings were held under brush arbors. Then there had to be schools. At first, they were instituted on a subscription basis, and a family could subscribe to send as many of his children as he had money to pay for. Most families had money to send at least part of their children. Teachers were hired, and the school term lasted about three months. If the rains failed to come and crops were short, the teachers were paid with everything from molasses to bacon, ham, or promises. Soon, however, the communities came under the Free School Act, and teachers were paid from \$20.00 to \$30.00 per month and the terms lasted about four months. children then attended school free.

Hospitals were unheard of, and doctors lived far away from most families. Childbirth was one of the major problems, but with the splendid knowledge of a number of the older women in each community, this problem was taken care of, and
