

Schlueter's Legislative Outlook

There are times when I am amazed at the cost of government. Small, insignificant practices could be eliminated in the various governmental agencies and save the state enormous amounts of cash.

The State can change procedures carried out on the local level and save millions

for local taxpayers. Rep. Dan Kubiak, of Rockdale, tacked an amendment on to the House Education Bill which reduced the public school term from 180 to 174 days. This reduction of six days will provide a savings of approximately \$4.5 million dollars to the local school

districts. Consolidation of various departments and agencies, which have overlapping jurisdictions and duties, could save taxpayers untold millions. It would provide for fuller utilization of employees and trim excess per-

sonnel from the budget. Sen. Walter Mengden, of Houston, has a unique ideal which he applies in the other chamber. Mengden attempts to include, in every new state program, a self-destruct clause. Under his proposal every program would go out of existence after six years, unless the Legislature acted to renew the program. This approach forces the Legisature to review the effectiveness of a program and gives us a chance to view the

cost-benefit relationship. This proposal is another money saver which the State could utilize to save the

taxpayers money. There are a number of money saving ideas for government and I am willing to act on them, because they save the taxpayers money.







People needing help in Mills County received a total of \$757,745 in care and services--primarily for medically-related assistance-during fiscal year 1976, the State Dept. of Public Welfare says. commodities are provided to

In its recently released annual report on welfare expenditures, the Department said the statewide total of joint state-federal programs was \$1,076 billion, with the Federal Government providing about 2/3 of the funding. Federally-financed food stamps and commodities added another \$318

All recipients of welfare assistance must meet stringent guidelines, set by both levels of government, for

Over-all, medical payments in Mills County totaled \$698,554, with \$572,459 going to nursing homes and institutions; \$40,563 for pre scribed drugs and \$85,532 for all other health care.

Under Medicaid provisions, the "other" health care includes such diverse assistance as physicians' services, eye treatment, eye glasses, hearing aids, dentures and medical screening for children of needy fami-

Only a fraction of the total expenditures in Mills County, \$6,466, went to Aid to Families with Dependent Children, the only welfare program in Texas which provides direct cash payments to recipients.

Statewide, AFDC payments averaged \$105.42 per month, per family. Only Tenn., Alabama, Georgia, South Carolina and Miss., all with per capita incomes lower than Texas, have smaller grants.

The disbursement for food stamps in Mills County was \$41,828 and, for commodities, \$10,897. The Federal Govt. pays the full cost of the




