

"A Sunday Afternoon"

We were finally called to dinner and found that everything had not been eaten by the grownups; we ate swiftly and partly because of hunger but mostly because our minds were on the long afternoon of play before us.

As soon as we finished eating, the girls drifted off to themselves to build a playhouse under a grove of liveoak trees. Before the afternoon was over, they would carry small rocks and outline rooms for their playhouse that would rival an architect's drawing. They found a worn broom in the cellar and swept the rooms clean of every twig and leaf; broken dishes were used in the make-believe kitchen and all afternoon long the girls swept, made mud pies and talked in their playhouse.

For we boys every minute was so filled with play that by mid-afternoon we were dizzy with it.

It was only when we looked up and saw the men rise from the woodpile under the post oak tree, that we realized the day wouldn't go on forever. The men had been sitting for an hour or more with their pocket knives open, whittling away at sticks and match stems until there was nothing left; then they started whittling on another in an unconscious, matter-of-fact sort of way. There was an occasional burst of laughter among the men, then they went back to their earnest conversation and absorption with their whittling, chewing and spitting.

As our fathers put their knives back in their pockets and started toward the house we knew they would say, "You boys start gathering up your things. We'll be leaving for home pretty quick."

The company would soon be leaving, so we made one last effort to bring back the early afternoon magic to our barnyard.

We sauntered through the row lot and climbed the barn wall ladder to the hay loft, then looked down on the chickens dusting themselves; the hen's nests lined up in apple boxes nailed to the barn wall were now full of brown and white eggs; we teased the setting-hen hid out in the loft, but she didn't protest with flogs and pecks as she had earlier; we climbed down and threw rocks at the roosters, but they weren't afraid anymore; the barnyard occupants seemed to sense that their invasion by small boys was about over.

As we walked along the lot fence, we let our hands plop against the post; we made one more splash at the goldfish in the watering trough to see them scurry under the rocks Papa had put there to keep the goats from drowning; we visited the dump and chinked bottles then circled the rusty old car body once more; but it was of no use - excitement came slowly when time was running out.

Trailing each other along the edge of Papa's dipping vat, we wondered what it would be like to fall in and maybe even taste a little of the brown stuff inside; we chased an old ewe and her lamb, but she turned on us with a stamping foot.

A saddle resting across the side of a feed trough looked interesting - we thought it might be fun to pretend we were cowboys and ride it, but it didn't compare to riding the calves earlier in the afternoon, until Papa stopped us with, "You boys quit riding the calves. You'll give the milk cows all stirred up."

Out in the hog pen the old sow and her ten pigs lay in mud and corn cobs and we stared silently at them. We crawled up a ladder to the top of the barn where Mama had her peaches drying, and looked far into the distance to see the cows come trailing home.

There was a musty smell and a lonesome darkness inside the corn crib; the corn

sheller was fastened to a big wooden box so we gave it a few turns, then sat on the pile of corn, smelled the clumps of onions hanging from the rafters and listened to the quietness inside.

On our way to the house, we went by the doodle bug town in the soft dirt at the edge of the barn and teased them with a broom weed. We sang, "Doodle Bug, Doodle Bug, fly away home; your house is on fire and your children are alone", over their little round holes; they responded by kicking dirt at us.

As we were near the house we saw two doves dozing on the clothes line so we tried our throwing arm again, but they flew away into the sunset.

The front porch called to us as the day ended and we sat on its edge, hands over knees, waiting for the grownups to say their good-byes.

When the company left we could see small hands waving at the back car windows for as long as they could see; we then turned and followed the walk back to the house.

Eagles Suffer 13-0 Loss To Bangs Boys

Turnabout is fair play. They always seem to say, "But when it's our Eagles who get 'turned about', it's a bad, bad, day."

The Fighting Eagles of Goldthwaite High upset the Early team last week, and this week were upset by the Bangs Dragons. Simple enough to say, but hard to swallow. Just when the flying seemed just right and everything was going in the Eagles favor, the Bangs Dragons emerge to thwart the Eagles plans.

Bangs, having won only one game this year, came out to play in the contest, and the Eagles seemed a little flat. Bangs won 13-0, witnessed by a happy homecoming crowd at Bangs.

The Eagles had their chance on the first drive, following their reception of the opening kickoff. With Mike Lee at quarterback, the Eagles moved from their own 30 yard line to the Bangs 13 yard line. Key play in the drive was a nifty 44 yard aerial strike to end Eddy Welch.

With first and ten from the 13, Stephen Coronado hit right guard for five yards. A pass to Welch was incomplete in the end zone on second down. Coronado tried the same play again, this time for no gain.

A costly delay of game penalty gave the Eagles fourth and ten. Another pass try to Welch in the end zone proved off the mark and the ball went over to the Dragons.

This failure to produce didn't seem to bother the Eagles too much, as they came back in a couple of minutes, following a fumble recovery by David Livingston and marched to the Bangs 24 when passes failed to get the first down. This time, the Eagles seemed visibly hurt when they did not produce the score.

When the Bangs offense decided to click, it took only three passes to get into the end zone. The Dragons put six on the board with 3:50 to go in the first half.

The second and final score of the game came after a low snap was bobbled by Randy Benningfield as he was punting and the Dragons took over on the Eagles 10 yard line. Three running plays netted the score. The PAT was good and the game ended that way 13-0. Time

remaining was 6:09 in the third. After the ensuing kickoff, the Eagles drove down to the Bangs 18 when on first down, a pass interception halted the drive. And then early in the fourth quarter a trio of pass receptions by Mike Connolly and one by Benningfield set the Eagles up on the Bangs 26 yard line. And again on first down, Lee was sacked and the ball squirted out, and Bangs recovered.

And that still wasn't all, the Eagles Darrell Martin recovered a Dragon fumble late in the game on the Bangs 25 yard line. But, on first down again, Bangs intercepted a Lee aerial on the four yard line. One more play and the game was over.

Ironically, it was Bangs passing that hurt the Eagles most during the game, as the Dragons amassed 106 yards of passing, and all were at critical points in the contest. The Eagles were supposed to be on top of the passing game and the Dragons were to be weak. Just gives evidence to the fact that high school football is to say the least, unpredictable.

City Council Discusses Varied Agenda At Meeting

The regular meeting of the Goldthwaite City Council was called to order by Mayor J. D. Harper at 7:00 p.m., October 6, 1977 in the Goldthwaite City Hall. Members present were Mayor Harper, Frank Bridges, Charles Childress, Loy Long. Members absent were Tom Cody Graves and Felton Wright.

City Manager Dale Allen and City Secretary Mildred Taylor were also present. Minutes of the September meeting were read and approved. The City Operations report was presented by Manager Allen. The Council reviewed and approved the September bills in the amount of \$70,934.07, including a payroll of \$11,500.42.

A quarterly Treasurer's report was presented to the Council, showing the following account balances:

An annual report from Mgr. Allen about the Swimming Pool showed 9,919 swimmers had participated in the pool activity during the summer.

Members of the Council discussed the petition of Senior Citizens group for cash donation, which was tabled from the last regular meeting. Alderman Long moved the request be considered in the 1978-79 Budget planning for Revenue Sharing funds. Alderman Bridges seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

A new Fireman Pension & Retirement Fund law will require City participation with volunteer fire departments. The estimated cost will be \$12 per month per fireman. Because of the nature of the local department, high cost to city tax-

payers and low return to retired firemen, Alderman Bridges moved the City elect not to participate in the program at this time. Motion was seconded and carried.

Discussion followed about cost of fire fighting and it was noted that City firemen and equipment have responded to 72 fires in the County and 8 inside the City during the last 14 months. An average fire-fighting cost is \$365 per month to the city.

It was agreed that costs for fires outside the city should be shared by all concerned agencies.

Manager Aflen presented the resignation of Fire Marshal Paul Henderson. Alderman Long moved that Ancle Morgan be appointed Fire Marshal. Motion was seconded and passed.

A rate increase is being sought by LCRA, wholesale supplier of electricity to the City. With figures now available, it appears a portion of the base rate charge is being transferred to the add-on fuel charge, which

will reflect a nominal increase to Goldthwaite users. There were no reports or requests from Councilmen.

City Manager Allen reported on various work projects—

*) Unemployment insurance will cost 1% of payroll, effective January 1, 1978.

*) Alderman Bridges moved the low bid from Saylor Chevrolet for a dump truck be accepted. Motion carried.

*) The Council unanimously approved that employees may carry over for 1 year, up to 1/2 earned vacation leave, to be used as sick leave when necessary.

*) Employee health insurance premium is increasing November 1st.

*) A complaint about tax evaluation of General Telephone facility was shared by Mgr. Allen. The Council requested this and all other such complaints, questions or concerns, be presented in writing.

The meeting adjourned at 9:25 p.m.

course, students should be ready to take and pass the G.E.D. examination. A high school equivalency diploma should better qualify these students for better jobs.

2) English As A Second Language - This course is designed for those people who speak another language other than English as their first language, but would like to learn to speak and write English well. This class is being taught by Delores Humphries each Monday and Tuesday nights from 7 until 9 p.m.

Ranchers Watching Outcome Of Suits On Depredation

Sheep and Goat producers will soon have an opportunity to demonstrate their concern over their dwindling rights to protect their livelihood. Perhaps opportunity is the wrong word; it's a necessity, and the situation that created the necessity is regrettable at best.

A recent Federal suit charges two Real County men with killing golden eagles, a third with conspiracy to kill eagles. At present, information about the case is very slim, but sheep and goat industry spokesmen see it as a possible landmark case involving the right to protect livestock from depredation.

Hospital Report

At the TS&GRA Fall Meeting, Oct. 6 in Junction, members voted to establish a trust fund to help these men with their defense. The fund, appropriately named "Safe-guard Ranchers' Rights", is not to be administered by or in any way connected with the Association proper. Voluntary contributions will support the fund and Association directors as individuals will appoint trustees to administer the proceeds.

TS&GRA executive secretary Bill Sims introduced the proposal after receiving a number of telephone calls and letters supporting such a fund.

"The Association meeting just gave us a timely opportunity to sound people out on the idea," says Sims. "And we found that the fund had overwhelming support."

Sims added that, regardless of the outcome of the legal action, sheep and goat producers have a serious stake in the matter. "We've got to get the point across that we have a natural right to protect our livestock, and that we're solidly united in

our concern for that right." As for the case itself, Sims reminded producers that legal expenses in such an affair can be staggering, whatever the outcome.

"Surely there are enough people in the business to help these men without it strapping us."

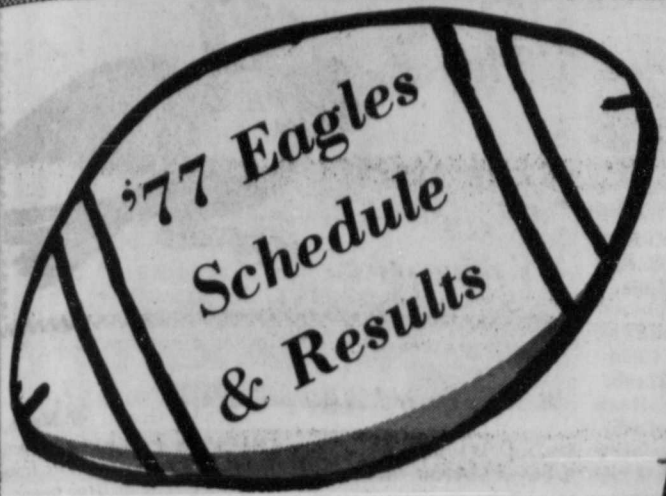

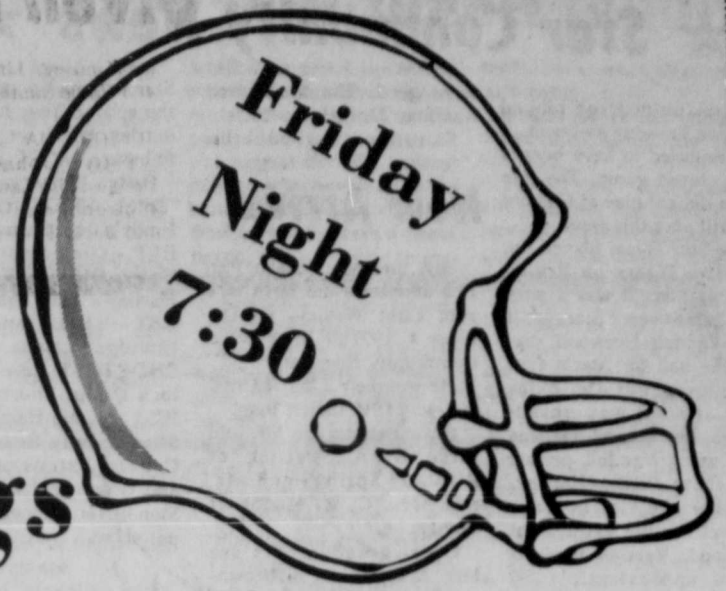

Farm and ranch fires not only produce great financial losses, but in many cases have totally terminated a producer's business.

Special emphasis to reduce such losses is the subject of National Fire Prevention Week, October 9 - 15.

Many farm and ranch fires losses are associated with the use of tractors and machinery. Common causes of tractor and machinery fires include defects in fuel or ignition systems, improper methods of refueling, smoking and matches, overheated engines, sparks from exhaust systems and various sources of friction.

The agent points out the following preventive measures:

- Use good practice when refueling, taking special care to prevent spills or contact with hot surfaces.
- Permanently ground fuel storage tanks to prevent a

buildup of static electricity. Further, be sure the storage tank is electrically bonded to the tractor through the hose or a separate bonding wire before refueling.

- Tolerate no smoking near fuel operations or near materials which are highly combustible.
- Watch for and repair leaks in fuel lines, carburetors, pumps, filters and exhaust systems.
- Keep engines and machinery properly tuned and lubricated to avoid backfiring and friction.
- When using flammable materials while overhauling, degreasing or repainting, work only in a well-ventilated place or outside. Also, be cautious about welding and other sources of heat or sparks.

Dear Sirs:

We have completed the audit of your school for the year ended August 31, 1977 and the report has been mailed under separate covers.

Your school financially has continued to improve. Your Operating Fund has increased by approximately \$7,000.00. Your cash balance was at August 31, 1977, \$101,694.29 and even though this amount is a healthy figure, it will only finance your school operation for a little over 2 months and, in my opinion, continued care should be exercised concerning your spending.

As we audit some 36 different school districts, we can compare your school with others of similar size and in doing so, we can state that financial condition is as good if not better than the average school of your comparative size. Your Fixed Assets amount to \$767,615.00 and your Bonded Indebtedness amounts to \$140,000.00. You have in your Interest and Sinking Fund \$49,356.91 to apply against the Bonded Indebtedness.

During the past year, your operating revenues amounted to \$427,982.00 as compared to \$408,228.00 in the prior year. Your expenditures for the past year amounted to \$420,904.00 as compared to \$423,762.00 in the prior year. In the year 1975-76, your expenditures exceeded your revenues by \$15,533.00 while in the 1976-77 year, your revenues exceeded your expenditures by \$7,077.00. In our opinion you have succeeded in holding your expenditures to your revenues.

We wish to express our appreciation to your Superintendent and his staff for the excellent records that have been maintained for the past year. It was indeed a pleasure to audit your school records for the year ended August 31, 1977.

While it would be impossible to cover the entire audit report, we have attempted to point out some highlights. If you should have any questions concerning your financial record, please do not hesitate to let us know and we will comply insofar as we are able.

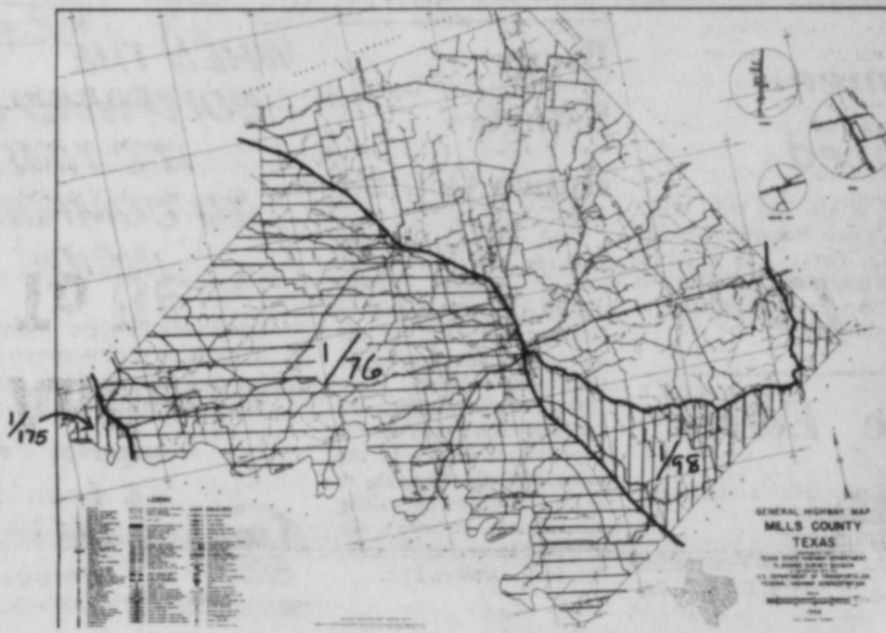
