Bigger Truck Coming -

Garbage Truck, Bags **Discussed By Council**

will be implementing some new garbage procedures in the near future, partly because of a new garbage truck, and partly because of a new plastic bag program.

The City Council voted unanimously to enter into a lease-purchase agreement for the new 20 cubic yard machine with Davis Equipment Co. of Waco. Price for the truck and all related equipment was \$19,500.

The new truck, City Manager Dale Allen explained, is a rear loader. The garbage is placed in a large box and then lifted over the top and into the tank. The 20 yard machine will hold about twice as much as the 16 yard model in operation now. The different method of loading the reason for the difference

The new truck will be in operation in a few days.

IN REGARD to the plastic bag proposal, the city council discussed the idea of supplying all city garbage custom ers with plastic bags, to be used only for garbage, and that this would greatly speed up the process for collecting trash in the city. Customers would be urged to use the bags, but, at this time, it would not be compulsory. The bag method has been To Meet Today tried and proven in many cities in the United States, and is one method of keeping costs at a minimum to the

available at the City Utilities office. Final decision on the matter will come at the next council meeting, according to Mayor J. D. Harper.

COUNTY JUDGE James W. Ledbetter met with the council. His concern was the utilities at the Senior Citizens Center in Goldthwaite. The cost of the utilities is underwritten at this time by Mills County, and the Judge wanted to see if the City Utilities could help in some way to alleviate the expendi-

He pointed out the many services rendered to the people of the community at the center, and that its use greatly benefits our area.

Mayor Harper stated that the city heartily endorses the center and all of its activities and programs. He also stated that the city, under present policy guidelines could not furnish any discounted utilities, or contribution to the

The council pointed out that the city has no unmetered utility users. In recent years, the Little League Park, and the High School football lights were the last unmetered outlets in

CM Allen reported that the two wells recently put into operation by the city are now in full service. The two wells, furnishing about 188,000 gallons of water per day, are located north of Goldthwaite.

With the recent low conditions of the river, the city council has felt somewhat at ease because of the wells that were refurbished.

that both the off-channel storage reservoirs adjacent to the Colorado River are full. This will supply the city about 60 days of water under

normal circumstances.

The lease of the 12 acres of land used by the Mills County Commission Co. came up for review by the Council. It was voted unanimously to continue the \$540 annual lease and extend to June Clifton a ten-year contract for the figure. Clifton, had been operating under a lease made in 1970 with Glen Love. A new contract was sought because improvements to the buildings and pens are anticipated by the present management.


Bro. Cotham, for the past six years, has been working as a full-time evangelist

percent loss. 2. The program has been extended thru September 12, 1978 in Mills County.

3. If producer has filed application between May 15 and July 14, application will be extended thru Sept. 12; therefore, producer must come by ASCS Office and file an application to be eligible.

4. Any feed bought and fed

before application is filed will not be eligible for cost share 5. Any production of oat, hay or milo in 1978, or carried over from 1977, will be considered as feed on

6. Hay or other feed purchased since April 15, 1978 that is on hand the date application is filed, is eligible for cost share if fed before Sept. 12, 1978.

7. Eligible livestock are cattle, sheep, goats, swine & Other guests in the eligible horses which have months on the date applica-

O. L. "Bodie" Bodenhamer was national commander of The American Legion, 1929-1930 and the fifth Department Commander of Arkansas during 1922-23.

A native of Goldthwaite, Texas, "Bodie" graduated with honors from Howard Payne Baptist College at Brownwood and Baylor University at Waco. He was an English teacher at San Marcos Baptist College when the U.S. entered WW I in 1917. He volunteered for military service, entering the Army in the infantry as a private and was discharged a major 26 months later.

'Bodie'' moved to El Dorado, Arkansas in 1921, where he served in many civic organizations, and sponsored the Arkansas service Bureau to assist exservicemen in handling claims for compensation, hospitalization, insurance, etc. At the 1929 National Convention in Louisville, he was elected national commander of the American Legion. He died as a result of burns in a 1933 explosion in an oil field near Henderson,

Many memorials have been erected in memory of Bodenhamer including a 20-acre park in El Dorado, A marker for the park was presented to El Dorado in September 1976 by Mrs. Bodenhamer as her bicentennial project.

He was instrumental in locating the Veterans Hospital in Waco, also. We can't afford to forget men like "Bodie."

LCRA NEWS—

Drought In The Lower Colorado River Basin Is Taking Its Toll

A long hot, dry spell in the lower Colorado River basin is responsible for the lowerthan-average lake levels and severe damage to a portion of

the Texas rice crop. Climatological data compiled by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Climatic Center in Asheville, N. C., shows 2 severe shortage of rainfall was recorded at 15 selected stations in the San Saba. Llano and Pedernales Rivers watershed in 1977. The combined deficit of more than 65 inches of rain last year is 22 percent less than the normal.

"This has contributed greatly to the lowered lake level at Travis this past year," says LCRA General

Manager Charles Herring. Inflow to Lake Travis. which is already 20 feet below the average of 669 ft. mean sea level for this time of year, is also running behind that of recent years. LCRA records reveal that the drought has taken its toll, causing a decrease in inflow of 74 percent during the first

five months of 1978, compared to the average inflow for the same period for 1973 through 1977.

Average total inflow for January through May for the five-year period is 821.240 acre feet, compared to 1978 figures of 211,258 acre feet.

'This lack of inflow from norma! rainfall amounts in the watershed is really hurting us." says Herrring. "but I hate to think what conditions might be were there no reservoirs at all."

Adding to the difficulties caused by subnormal rainfall is the evaporation rate at Lake Travis. Records for January through May 1978 show a loss of 51,582 acre feet compared to 42,190 acre feet for the same period last year, a 22 percent increase. Total loss by evaporation from Lake Travis last year was 122,026 acre feet, or approximately 39.6 billion gallons.

Climatic conditions in a four - county rice-growing region on the Gulf Coast are not much better, says Herring. LCRA each year supplies irrigation water for many rice crops, and this year the demand is greater than normal because of similar drought conditions

Matagorda, Wharton, Colorado and Jackson County residents are witnesses to the longest, driest spell of weather oldtimers have ever seen for this March-to-July period, says Dr. James Stansel, scientistin-charge at the Texas Agricultural Experimental Station at Eagle Lake.

Stansel's records at the station reveal a 34 percent deficit in rainfall, compared to a 24-year mean for the

Evaporation also is hurting many rice farmers, adds Stansel, because the rate has soared to as high as .48 inch per day, up .23 inch from the

"The rice farmers are using every drop of water that comes down the river from LCRA." Stansel explains, adding that wells in the area are also pumping their capacity. "However. some fields at the end of the canal line are still not receiving adequate water supplies. Not a drop being wasted."

Stansel estimates that because of unusual rainfall occurences, shortages of rain, and a higher-thannormal evaporation rate, five percent of the rice crop has already been severely damaged, with another 20 percent reported as "moderately damaged."

"This year's drought is a perfect example of how the system of dams and reservoirs were designed to be used to conserve water for downstream permit holders," says Herring. "I wish that levels at Lakes Buchanan and Travis were higher than they are, but we cannot make rain, only store it as it falls on the watershed."

LCRA engineers estimate that Lake Travis elevation may drop below 640 feet msl by October if there is not sufficient rainfall before

Facts from a pro on driving to surving

Q. The other day an ambulance came up be hind my car. It had its headlights and flasher parking lights turned on, but no siren or m lights. Should I have pulled over out of he way?-L. T., Austin

A. Whenever an emergency vehicle sounds a sirent bell or flashes a red light, motorists must pull over the curb and stop. These are warning devices requi by law and they should be obeyed. However, time an emergency vehicle signals to you in any way it is a good idea to slow down and give way to it right. Stop if you can do so safely.

Q. Which lights are the safest to use if m have to drive in fog?-R.N., Angleton

A. When driving in fog, dust, heavy rain or ode adverse weather conditions, always use your list beam headlights. Bright lights will only hinder yo visibility more. And fog, for instance, will refe bright or high beam lights almost like a mirror. Y should also remember to switch to your lower beam when within 300 feet of following or 500 feet d meeting another vehicle. And never look directly into approaching headlights. The brightness could no mentarily blind you.

Q. I try to drive at the speed limit but I old feel as if I'm being forced to speed by the gaters. Is there any way to handle them!-M.L., Kellerville

A. The best way to discourage a tailgater is to slow down. He can then either pass you or slow do himself, making it easier for him to stop safely if you should stop. Slowing down will also increase yo distance from the vehicle ahead of you. Even if the driver brakes suddenly, you will have enough room! roll to a halt and thus lessen your chances of being by the tailgater.


