During World War II, Mrs. Berry worked as War Service Chairman, Goodwill Chair-

### Museum To Feature Carothers Paintings

The changing cases at the museum will feature heirlooms belonging to Mr. and Mrs. O. O. Smith for the next several weeks.

Included in the display will be antiques from the W. P. McCullough family, parents of Mrs. Smith and early settlers in Mills County, as well as heirlooms from Mr. Smith's family.

There will also be momentos from Barnes & McCullough Lumber Company, one of the early businesses formed here - just after the turn of the century.

The artist changing display will feature paintings by Mrs. Nathan Carothers. Mrs. Carothers is a very talented local artist and her paintings will be enjoyed by all museum visitors.

Two new donations of great interest have been added to the museum display - an apple peeler, used in the late 1800's and early 1900's for peeling peaches and apples, and a very rare "ruffle iron" used in the early 1900's for ironing ruffles on petticoats and dresses. These two valuable antiques were donated to the museum by Charles and Liz Reynolds in honor of their parents, Lloyd and Alta Cline Reynolds.

### Breakfast Program Initiated

The Goldthwaite school will begin the 1978-79 school year by inservice for the teachers the week of August 21st - 25th.

Students will report for classes on August 28. They should be in the classroom by 8:10 a.m., as classes will begin promptly at 8:20 a.m.

Mr. Gilbert Davis, the Superintendent, stated that they would try dismissing the 1st and 2nd grade, non-bus students at 3:00 p.m.; grades 3rd through 6th will be out at 3:20 p.m.; and High School students at 3:30 p.m. Any Elementary student can stay until 3:20 when all Elementary students will be boarding the buses, in order to leave before high school is dismissed.

There will be only morning classes for kindergarten children this year. Students will come at 8:20 a.m. and be dismissed at noon. There will be no afternoon kindergarten

this year. Parents will pick up the children at noon. Buses will only pick up and deliver children in the morning and afternoon.

Registration for grades Kindergarten through 8th will be the first day of school, August 28. High School students will register on Wednesday, August 23 as follows: Seniors 9 - 10:30; Juniors 10:30 - 12:00; Sophomores 1 - 2:30; and Freshmen 2:30 - 4:00.

There will also be a breakfast program for students and teachers if they desire it for the coming year. House Bill 136 passed the 65th Legislature requires schools to provide a breakfast program for students if the school has 10% of enrolled students eligible for free and reduced lunches.

Breakfast for students that do not ride the bus will have breakfast about 7:45 a.m. Bus students will be allowed to eat when their bus arrives at the school. The Elementary lunchroom only will be used for the breakfast program. Both High School and Elementary lunchrooms will be open for the lunch program as in the past.

The breakfast program provides free breakfast for those qualifying for the free lunch program. The reduced price, for those who qualify, will be 10 cents. Other students will pay 35 cents,

and adults will pay 50 cents. Buses will follow the same routes and schedules as they have in the past.

Students will have the first holiday September 4, 1978, Labor Day.

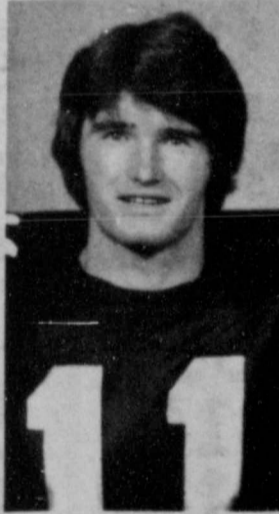

## City Water Supply Hurt By Damaged System

City of Goldthwaite water customers were asked to refrain from any unnecessary use of water Tuesday, due to the complete breakdown of the system that brings the water to town from the reservoirs adjacent to the Colorado River.

City Manager Dale Allen said Tuesday night that both the pump and the 125 horsepower electric motor were out of commission. The two should be back in service by Friday, he added.

Cause of the breakdown has not been determined. The large valve, located on

the line just following the pump, was closed. This valve is extremely hard to close, due to the pressures exerted at this point. The closing of the valve caused the pump shaft to melt under the strain, and then the motor malfunction was not far behind.

The mishap could have been the result of vandalism, Allen said, because the valve was not only completely closed, but was tightened. Mills County Sheriff H. G. Brooks and other officers investigated the situation, but could find no evidence of

any outside tampering.

The city water system is not at a standstill, however. A smaller pump was put on line at the reservoir, and coupled with the two recently renovated wells, the city has about 75-80% capacity to meet daily demands. The citizens compliance with the cutback will certainly alleviate the problem.

The large pump was replaced just three weeks ago. Allen commented that the city is trying to build a back-up system that would be used in the event of such a breakdown occurs again.

The Third Court of Civil Appeals ruled Texas attorneys general have no authority to sue state agencies to invalidate their decisions.

The Court of Criminal Appeals held John Whitmore is entitled to another trial for capital murder because new testimony of a co-defendant is now available.

The Texas Supreme Court turned down a Houston television personality's suit to stop a telephone message being used by the American Nazis offering a bounty on non-whites who attack whites. The court found the message "disgusting," and encouraged local efforts to stop it, however.

The Sunday closing laws have been upheld again by the Supreme Court.

Third Court of Civil Appeals knocked down Comptroller Bob Bullock's attempt to tax bank holding company profits from national banks which they control.

Texas ranks 46th among the states in comparing state taxes as a percentage of personal income, according to Comptroller Bob Bullock.

## Mills County Extension Highlights

County Judge James Ledbetter in a special proclamation, at the request of the Mills County Farm Bureau, has designated July 25-31 as FARM AND RANCH SAFETY WEEK. The theme for this year's observance is "Manage to prevent Farm and Ranch Accidents". This marks the 35th annual observance of National Farm Safety Week.

"Having our county proclamation is the best way we know to get this important safety message across to our people," said Troy Berry, Mills County FB president. Sponsored jointly by the National Safety Council and U.S. Department of Agriculture, the observance emphasizes the need for farm safety as a means of reducing farm accidents that hamper agricultural productivity and cause great personal loss to many farm families annually.

In his proclamation, Judge Ledbetter said "Safety management is an integral part of good farm and ranch business management." He suggested that a safety plan be tailored to fit a particular farm or ranch operation. The Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department has tabulated farm fatalities for the past ten years. Approximately 200 deaths occur each year (not including traffic) in well over 100 different counties.

The average annual breakdown for the major causes of farm fatalities is as follows:

- Firearms - 33; Drownings - 32; Fires & burns - 32; Falls - 22; Tractors - 21; Machinery - 16; Animals - 10; Suffocation - 9; Electric Current - 8; Poison and Tetanus - 4 or 5; Lightning and Tornadoes - 1 or 2.

### Value of oil, gas

AUSTIN, Texas (Sp1.) — The value of oil should not be based on the "historical cost" of finding and developing it but on what it would cost to replace such reserves at today's prices.

That's the opinion of Dr. Glenn A. Welsch, a University of Texas accounting professor, who says relying on such historical costs can be misleading to energy policy-makers when the price of a barrel of domestic crude oil has risen to about \$8 and that of Middle East oil to about \$14.

Dr. Welsch headed a UT study that has devised a new method for determining the replacement cost of oil and gas reserves. The method, called "equivalent purchase cost," is a mathematical model that includes a mix of many economic variables.

## Extension Highlights

Not enough calories or selected nutrients is the most common cause of under-nutrition in the United States' pre-schoolers.

The nutrient most commonly lacking in the diet is iron. Of all the nutrients, the iron allowance is probably the most difficult to provide in the diet.

Lean meat, deep green leafy vegetables, and whole grain or enriched cereals and breads are the best sources of iron in the daily diet. Also, liver, other organ meats, dried fruits, legumes, shellfish and molasses are iron rich foods.

Most infants receive some type of iron supplement due to the fact that milk, the principle food in the diet at that age, is a poor source of iron.

Mild anemia caused by insufficient intake of iron does not seem to have any direct effect on intelligence. It does, however, cause a decrease in attentiveness and an increase in irritability. Iron deficiency affects the child's ability to learn because if he is unattentive, he misses some of the learning process and then has that deficit throughout the learning cycle.

In addition, poor nutrition impairs the child's defenses against disease.

Poor physical growth is also evidence of undernutrition. However, children grow at different rates, so this is hard to measure, and social and environmental factors do play a part.

Some of the areas of the child's life that may be

affected are reading ability, concentration, motivation and agility. Undernourished children are less active and do not participate fully in activities in their environment.

Under use of detergents is the most common cause of poor washing. Too little detergent may remove soil, but it allows the soil to redeposit, causing gray or yellowed clothes.

It will also cause gray-white streaks which show on dark clothes. In addition, not enough detergent can cause linting, mainly in hard water.

If the water is extremely hard, add one-third to one-half cup of a packaged water softener with the detergent.

Determine the amount of detergent to use by the following measures: load size, degree of soil, and water hardness.

Use more than the recommended amount of detergent for these conditions:

- very hard water,
- very dirty clothes,
- large loads of clothes,
- the extra water volume in large size automatic washers
- and lower water temperature.

Use the low water temperature in the washing machine for special washing purposes; however, in general, the colder the water, the more difficult it is to get clothes clean. One reason is that the performance of laundry products is reduced as water temperatures decrease. For this reason, the most useful means of saving hot water is to use cold water for rinsing most loads.

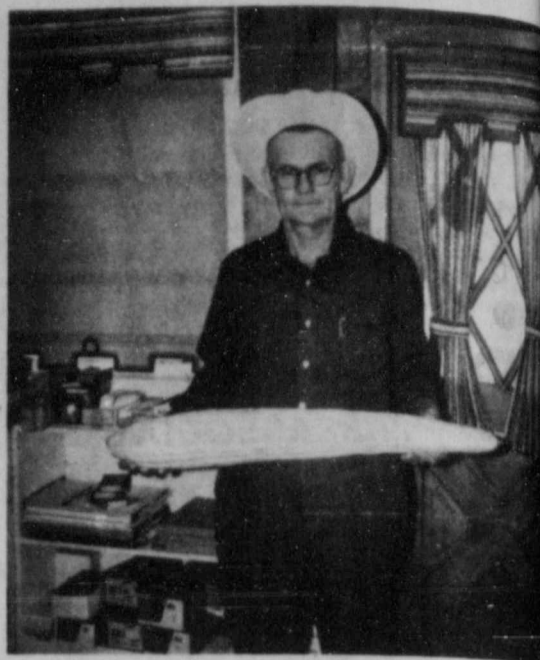
Approximately 300 volunteers were present for the gala occasion.
