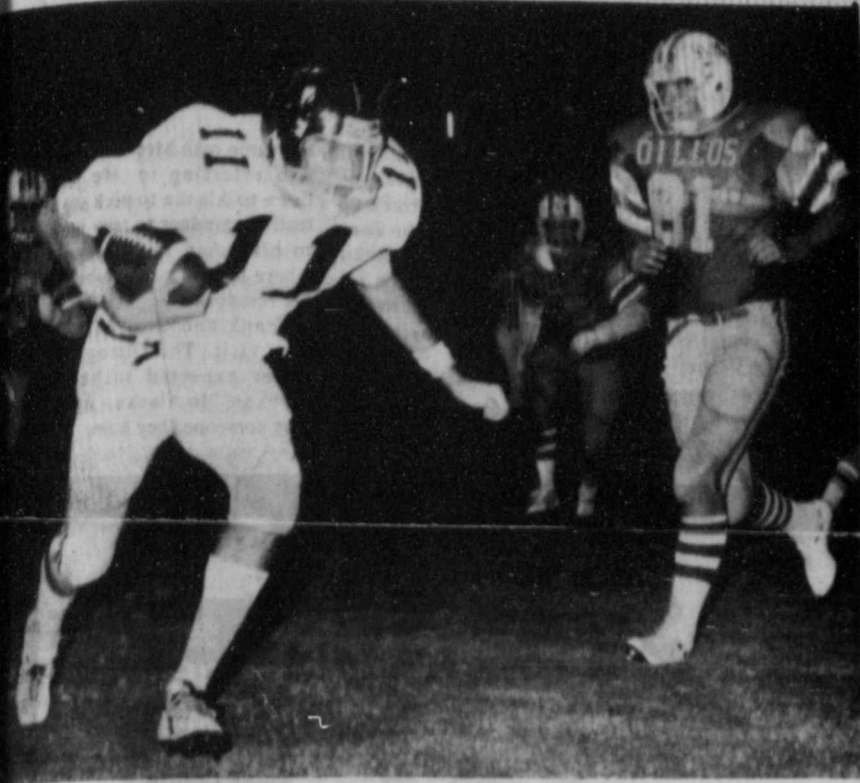

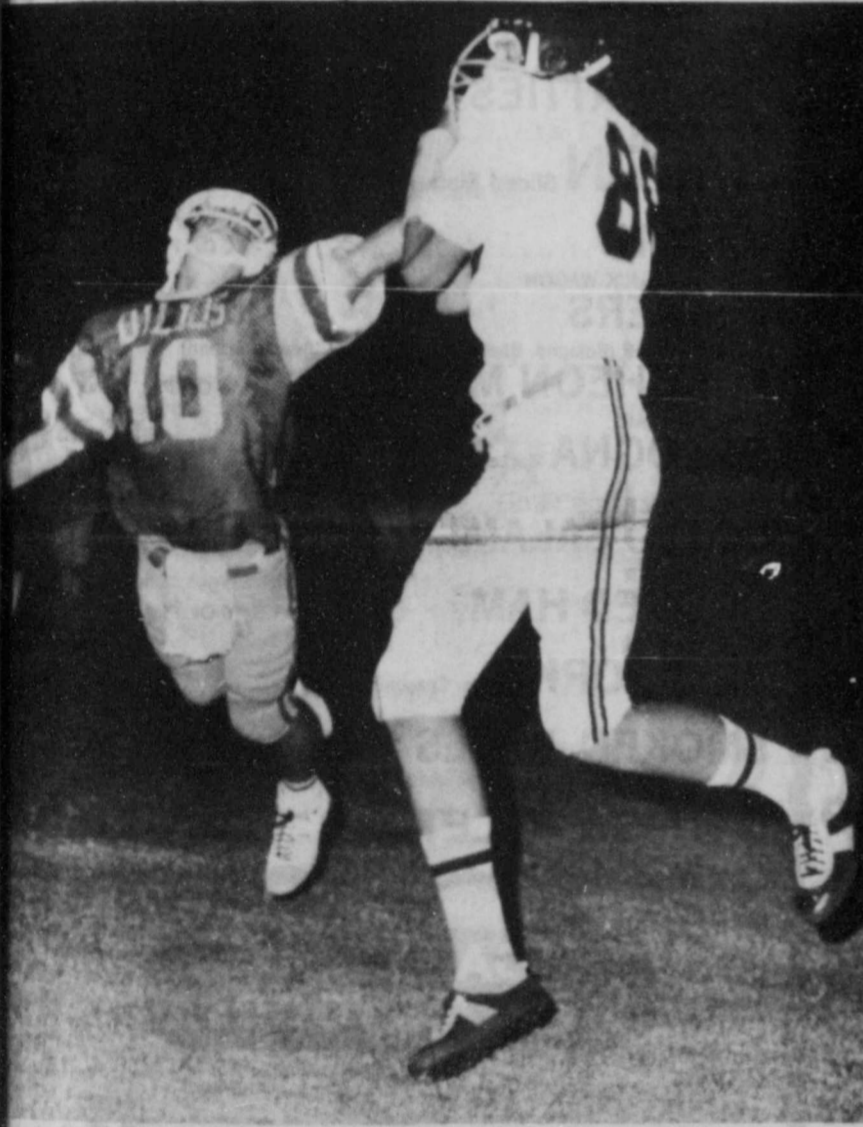
## Touchdown and Extra Point

Mullin remained undefeated in District 6-B six-man football by winning 40-24 over Rochelle last Thursday night. Jeff Shelton led the scoring with four touchdowns. He made a 20-yard run and another for 2 yards. He returned a kickoff for 50 yards and caught a 25-yard touchdown pass from quarterback, Delton Whisenhunt. Whisenhunt also connected with Ricky Minica on a 35-yard TD pass, and Minica

had another touchdown on a 15-yard run. He also kicked two conversions. Jerry King and Ted Hasley paced the defense with 10 and 6 tackles, respectively. Steve Watkins grabbed one interception. Mullin's next test will be against Richland Springs Thursday night, Oct. 12. "I look for a tough game, but we're getting better every week," Coach Luker said.

## Womack's Welding Service Open For Business

Specializing in farm and ranch buildings, Robert will also do any general welding, fabrication or repair work. He has a portable welding rig for on the site welding work. Robert invites the public to come by and see his new shop, and to call anytime for welding services.

The Goldthwaite City Council met in regular session at City Hall Thursday, October 5, and had a light agenda.

City Manager Dale Allen presented the quarterly treasurer's report to the council. All accounts were reviewed and the report was approved as presented. The report is reprinted in its entirety on page 9 of this week's Eagle.

Along with the treasurer's report CM Allen gave the council the percentages of the city departments through the budget for the first quarter of the city's fiscal year. In order to comply perfectly with the budget, a 25% mark should be attained. The percentages were:

Allen stated that the purchase of the new garbage truck was the prime reason that the general fund was out of step with the budget percentage. Other departments are running at a closer margin.

The annual swimming pool report was given. It showed that the city had incurred a net loss of \$786.52 in pool operation for 1978. The total swimming pool fund shows in the red \$961.61.

### GARBAGE BAG PLAN NIXED

The council voted down the use of garbage bags to facilitate the city's garbage handling. After investigation, it was found that the cost of the bags would be prohibitive and the labor savings in a small city such as Goldthwaite would be minimal. The bags would have cost about 6½ cents each.

The sanitary landfill burning proposition was discussed. A temporary permit from the State Health Department is anticipated in the very near future. All of the guidelines for such a permit have been met by the city.

CM Allen told the council that a hydraulic ripper is needed to cut through the rock at the landfill site. Conventional methods are not successful in digging the landfill trench deep enough. Allen was asked by the council to check into either the purchase of one or the possible renting of one from the county, if one is available.

An item on the agenda to close a street in the northeast part of town was disposed of by taking no action. Several residents of the area were in attendance to voice their opposition to the closing and therefore the council did not vote to close the lane. No one in favor of the closing was at the meeting.

The city council voted to increase the insurance benefit paid to employees by about 30%. The city uses the Blue Cross and Blue Shield group plan. The reason for the increase was that the company was going up on the basic rates. Employees of the city also changed the basic policy coverage slightly, getting what they felt was a better deal for the money. The city pays only the

insurance on the employee himself. Additional spouse or family coverage is left to the discretion of the individual employee.

The rate increase ordinance submitted by Cablevision several months ago, and passed on its first reading, came up for a vote on the second reading at the meeting. It was unanimously voted down by the council.

In another ordinance matter, the council unanimously passed the second reading of the ordinance leaving the 1% sales tax payable to the city on the utility bills. The State Legislature had left it up to the individual cities whether

to continue the 1%. The 4% state sales tax will be dropped in the near future.

The council heard a petition signed by 37 Goldthwaite residents, asking the council for some action in the cleaning of a house and lot in the city limits. The petition listed the area as a "fire hazard and unsightly." The council accepted the petition and instructed the city manager to contact the owner and try to satisfy the petitioners. If no action can be extended by personal contact, the matter may be turned over to local and state health officers and fire department personnel.

It was the consensus of the council that there was a hazard in the area.

City Manager Allen issued his regular monthly report. Topics included:

- The Dairy Queen and Landrum Ford were notified that they could not continue to be served with untreated water by the city. The Dairy Queen is in the process of digging its own well and the situation at Landrum is unknown. A November 1 deadline for the cutoff was issued by the city last month.
- A request for water in the same area as the Dairy Queen and Landrum was not allowed. A drive-in conven-

ience grocery store and self service gas station will be built on the west side of Highway 183-84 in the future. For the same reasons as the dropping of other customers in the area, the request could not be granted.

- The low-pressure cut-off in the water line serving the Chaparral addition of the city has been mounted in the line. It was set down the hill so as to maintain the 20 pounds of pressure as required by state law, in order for the city to receive water approval.
- Tony Bosquez is still off the garbage truck route having injured his foot. Boys from New Horizons Ranch have been working the garbage truck route for the city.
- The city dump trucks were reviewed by the City Manager. The one that was damaged by vandalism was repaired and was paid for by insurance, in the amount of over \$1000. The dump truck that had the wheel break has also been repaired. Both are now on the job.
- The city street sweeper has been repaired and is now operational. It was damaged when it was backed into some time back. Insurance carried by the other party paid for the damages.
- Additional warehouse space is needed by the city. A 40 by necessary shed will be built to house the new garbage truck and large bucket truck. The city warehouse is located off Old Friddy Road.
- Allen reported that the city sewer and water departments could use the services of a ditch witch, or similar machine to handle small digging chores. The use of the back hoe is sometimes too damaging to streets to make it practical. Possible renting of one for a short time to see if it will do the job was discussed.

A two-car collision occurred about 8:00 a.m. Wednesday at the intersection of US Highway 183 and Highway 16, in the city limits of Goldthwaite. Sharlene Johnson and Jackie Koen, both

girl students at Goldthwaite High School, were injured in the wreck. The extent of their injuries could not be determined at press time. The driver of the other vehicle, Glenn Paul Runnels, also a

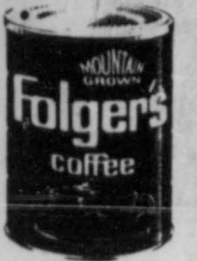

# CANRED Conducts Study To Determine Mills Needs

The Child Abuse and Neglect Resource Demonstration (CANRED) is a research pilot project funded federally and operated by the Texas Department of Human Resources from its Regional office in Austin. The CANRED pilot project has attempted to determine the services needed by abused and neglected children and their families and the community resources available to meet those needs in your county as well as several others. This effort has been conducted at the request of the Federal government in order to test procedures developed for possible nationwide use.

If you are interested in having a complete report of findings please contact Alice Craven, Director CANRED Pilot Project, Austin, phone 512-458-1161.

The major primary need identified for Mills County was Counseling, as it appeared as a most frequently mentioned need for three of the four data sources that responded.

The second primary need is Financial Assistance. The need for financial assistance was supported by Protective Services case records, staff,

and other community resources. Parenting Education is the third primary need identified by Protective Services staff, other community resources and political and community leaders. One political and community leader responded that this "service is not available".

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The fourth primary need, General Health Services, was a most frequently mentioned need by Protective Services case records, staff and other community resources. Of three comments referring to gaps in service, two stated that the "service is not available" and one stated the service is "available but in need of expansion".

Pre-delinquent Counseling and Job Placement were tied for fifth and sixth primary needs.

The seventh primary need is Family Planning. It was a most frequently mentioned need by other community resources and by political and community leaders.

Food Stamps, Employment Related Services, Housing, Juvenile Probation and Outpatient Mental Health Services were tied for the remainder of the primary needs.

CANRED was only able to obtain limited information within Mills County on which to base their report. It did not prove possible to interview clients and response rates to the mail-out questionnaires were disappointingly low. Some possible reasons for the low response may be that many who were

surveyed were unable to respond because of a lack of knowledge about child abuse and neglect, or because of a lack of knowledge about community services available to serve the needs of abusive and neglectful families. Others simply did not understand the intent of the questions.

Improved communication concerning Protective Serv-

ice programs and community resources would yield a more accurate needs and resources assessment. The information contained by the needs and resources assessment does, however, provide an indication of possible problem areas in service delivery that can be further addressed through resource development and coordination activities.

**Facts from a pro on driving to survive.**

**Q. Why are some yield signs red and others yellow? Should they be treated the same way?**  
—L. G., Seminole

A. Both signs require you to yield to traffic at an intersecting street; however, the yellow is gradually being replaced by the red. Texas and other states are participating in a new system of traffic signs in which visual cues substitute for word messages. The new red color distinguishes the yield sign from the yellow cautionary signs and as with the red stop sign, indicates that there is a specific procedure you must observe.

**Q. Our children enjoy riding in our house trailer on long vacation trips. Although they keep themselves amused this way and can't bother my husband when he drives, I wonder if it is safe.**—P. J., Cuero

A. No. In fact, it is against the law. Any abrupt movement of the trailer could toss them against a dangerous object or cause something to fall on them and injure them. Instead, keep your children buckled up and occupied in the back seat of your car with games, books and puzzles.

**Q. Living on the Gulf Coast, I'm no stranger to rain. I know hydroplaning tires are dangerous. At what speed does hydroplaning begin, and what can I do to avoid it?**—B. N., Friendswood

A. Hydroplaning—losing traction on a wet road surface—can begin at speeds as low as 30 mph. At 55 mph or more, the tire can lose complete contact with the pavement, causing you to lose control of your steering and braking. Extra-wide tires and tires with thin threads will hydroplane at lower speeds. During a storm or when there is standing water on the road, slow down. And avoid driving with badly worn tires.

**Q. During hot weather, my gasoline tank seems to leak when filled up. Is this dangerous and why does it do it?**—D. B., Lufkin

A. Barring such problems as a faulty gas cap, there are two probable explanations for your gas tank leak. Gasoline is pumped out of the ground where it is kept cool. When in your tank, it is exposed to heat and expands, thus causing it to overflow if you've filled your tank. Of course, you can't fill your tank completely with gas. There will always be an air pocket and air, too, expands. If your car is parked uphill when refueling, the air pressure will force gasoline out of your tank. But if you park facing downhill, only air will escape. Since gas leaks are always dangerous, it would be wise not to fill your tank too full and, whenever possible, park your car facing downhill when refueling.

**Q. Is it legal to allow small children to sit in my lap while driving?**—K. N., Millsap

A. There are no laws that specifically ban carrying small children on your lap. However, there is a state statute that prohibits drivers from carrying passengers in such a way that they interfere with the driver's vision or driving mechanisms or control of the vehicle. Even if you're driving only two blocks to the neighborhood grocery, carrying a small child on your lap could interfere with your ability to steer, prevent you from turning to look over your shoulder when passing or backing, or limit your field of vision. Should you have to brake suddenly, the child could pitch forward and injure himself, or you could lose control of your car trying to restrain him.

The safest place for children to ride is in the center rear seat. Buckled up. If your children are under four years of age or small enough to slip out from under a seat belt, then they should ride in a child seat or infant carrier or car bed. Pets, too, do not belong in your lap while you're driving. Even a minor distraction could cause a major collision.

**Q. My youngest son is about to get his first motorcycle and I would like for him to learn to ride it well before he goes out onto the streets. Where can he get lessons?**  
—J.H., Arlington

A. Fortunately, in your area, the Euless Police Department conducts beginning motorcycle courses several times a year. The cost is small and the course is pretty comprehensive. Contact the Euless Traffic Safety Officer for more information. In other areas, check with local cycle dealers. They usually know about existing courses offered by the local authorities and motorcycle clubs.

**Q. I hit a curb last week and a "bubble" developed on the tire. I'm still driving on the tire and it hasn't given me any trouble yet. Is it okay or should I change the tire?**  
—J.R., Round Rock

A. The "bubble" or "blister" is caused by a weakening of the strands within the tire brought on by hitting the curb. That means the structure is weak and you could have a blowout at any time. Change the tire immediately and don't keep it as a spare. It isn't safe to drive on even for a short distance.

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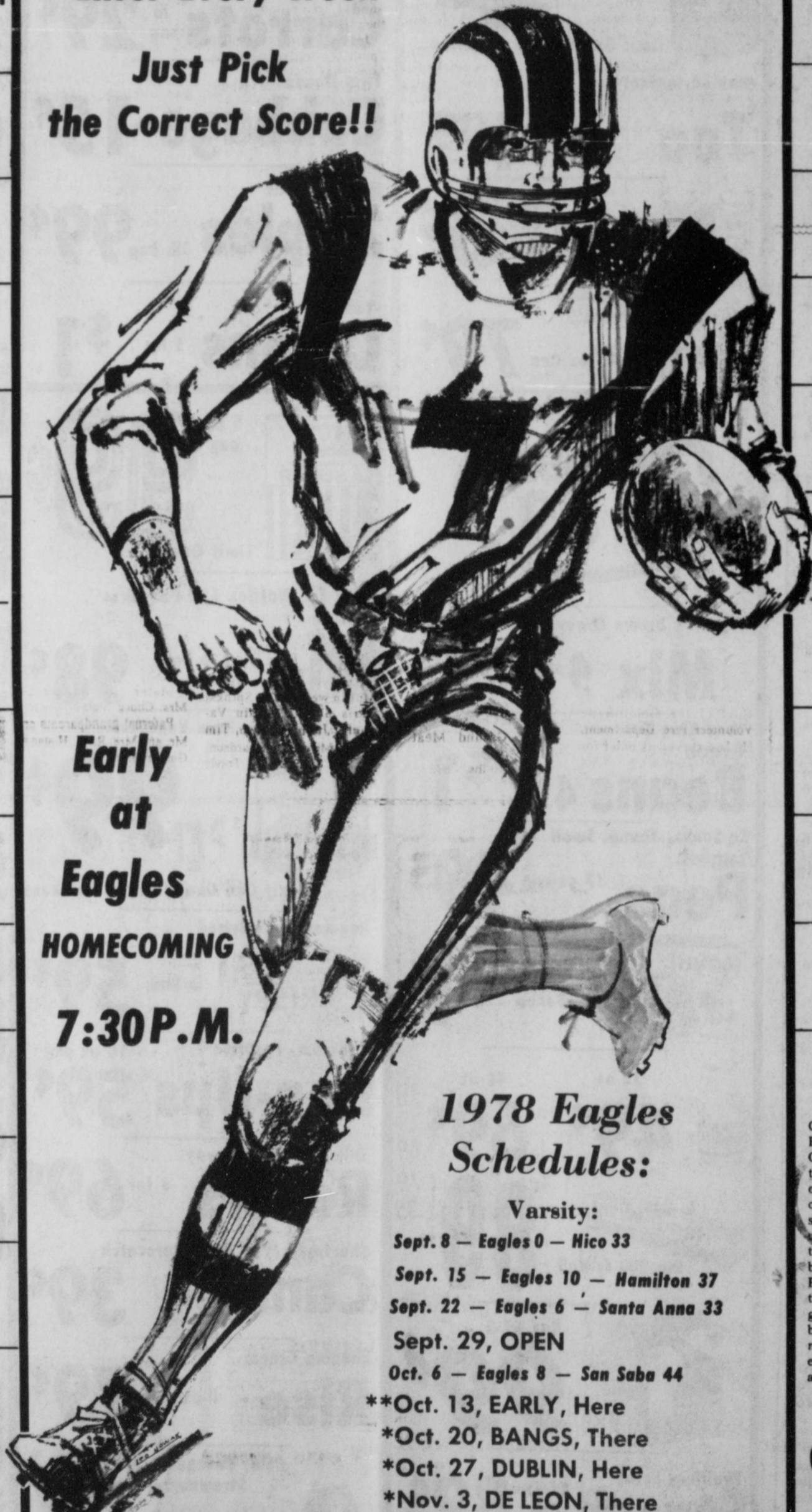

**BEAT-THE-BUS BREAKFASTS**

When the kids skip breakfast so they won't miss the school bus, they still miss a nutritious start in life that day.

"Beat-the-bus" breakfast ideas offer easy ways to give kids a nutritious start every morning -- and enough time to catch the bus.

Breakfast foods in easy-reach places -- ready for "instant fixing" -- and the alarm set 15-30 minutes earlier are the secret ingredients in "beat-the-bus" breakfasts.

Whatever the menu choices, just have the makings in easy reach -- and think ahead.

For example, one "beat-the-bus" menu might be fruit juice, cereal and toast. Here's how to make it ready for "instant fixing":

**FRUIT JUICE**

Reconstitute it, if it's frozen, and put the pitcher in the refrigerator. Make sure nothing is in front of it. In the morning, it is ready to grab. Milk placed next to the fruit juice also will be ready for easy reach.

**CEREAL AND TOAST**

If dry cereal is the choice, place it on a shelf in easy reach -- ready for instant fixing the next morning. Make toast while you set the table.

If cooked cereal is the family favorite, buy the quick-cooking variety.

Measure water into a saucepan the night before -- and just turn on the heat the instant you roll out of bed.

While the water comes to a boil, put bread in the toaster, and set the table. When the water boils, add the cereal. Then place milk container on the table. So far, only five minutes have been used.

Let the cereal set a few minutes -- while you start the toast and get dressed. Set a timer to go off in five

minutes. Be sure to put it in hearing distance. When it rings, breakfast will be ready.

If the wake-up alarm was set 30 minutes early that morning, the kids still have 20 "extra" minutes -- for a "beat-the-bus" breakfast.

He is soon to learn that he isn't the "star" in his class or among his peers. He then acquires a feeling of insecurity and tries to cope with this problem. But the biggest problem of all that has snow-balled concerns lively children that have good perception. If they have parents whom they can bully, they go berserk. They find themselves living in a hostile world protected only by servile and cowardly underlings. Surely they reject the traditions of the parents. Why would they accept the norms of social behavior of a despised slave?

All of these seemingly endless writings and discussions bury the cause and its resolution like some vast evasion, as if we cannot face the simple truth.

I can show the cause and at the same time lay a cornerstone upon which to build a program in the home. It requires only two words... weak parents.

My next target is the scientists. They told us that the universe is 2 billion light years across. Later they announced that it is 10 billion light years in diameter. Then they announced that it is infinite. Then they said it is finite. Later they tell me that it is shaped like a globe, then a pear, finally a yo-yo. The time has come to put them out of business, and send

them packing to go to some quiet place and think the thing out all over again. With one stroke of the pen, I scatter them in frightened flight. I now ask: What is the universe IN?

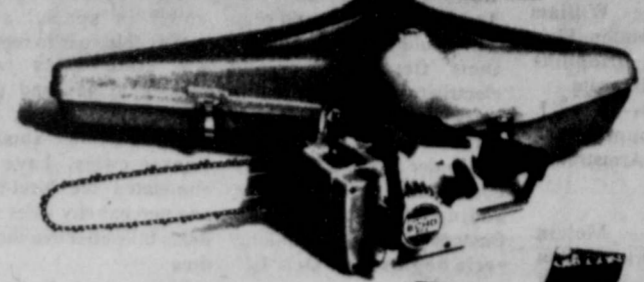

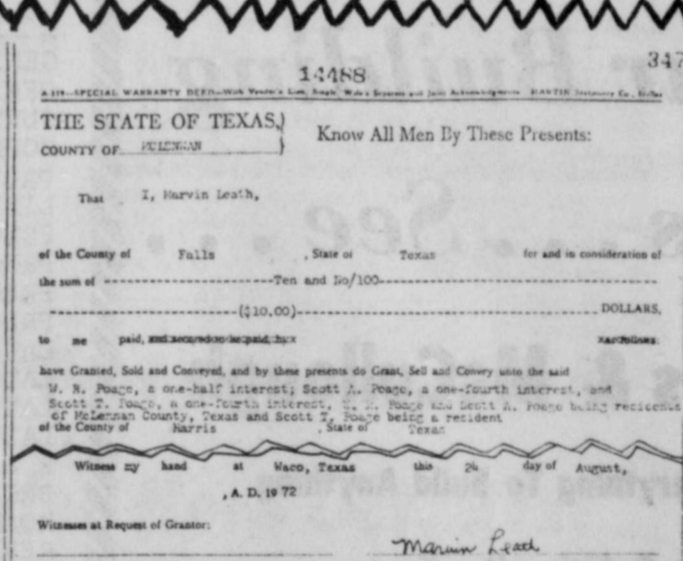

### Sales Tax On Utilities To Be Eliminated Oct. 1

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that Texas homeowners and renters should not be alarmed if their October gas and electricity bills continue to carry the state and local sales tax.

"Under the law, the utility companies will continue adding the tax on their October bills if their billing cycle begins after Oct. 1."

Bullock said. The Texas Legislature voted in special session earlier this year to repeal the 4% state sales tax on residential gas and electric bills effective Oct. 1.

In addition, some 125 Texas cities have also eliminated the local-option, one percent city sales tax on those bills effective the same time.

This means, Bullock explained, that a customer whose billing period is Oct. 3 through Nov. 3 will get advantage of the tax break as of Oct. 3.

A customer whose billing cycle is Sept. 25 through Oct. 25 will continue to pay the sales tax through Oct. 25.

Bullock said elimination of the state sales tax on gas and electric bills will save homeowners and renters \$150 million a year.
