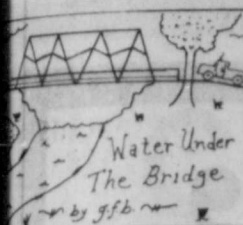

Following a season of eight straight losses, the Eagles used a fine running attack and stinging passes to pick up the come from behind District 10-A victory.

On the Eagles first possession of the contest, the Eagles fine quarterback Jett Johnson moved down the line to the right, faked to fullback David Livingston, pulled the ball back at the last second and broke through the Ranger line-backing crew before they knew what hit them and from then on it was a foot race, with Johnson racing and the Bulldogs in hot pursuit. The play covered 55 yards and was the spark that ignited the Eagle boosters that raged all night long. The point after try was blocked.

A nifty interception by Tony Corona began the Eagles next drive for piddit. And to finalize the score, a nice pass from Johnson to big end Kenny Saathoff covered the last nine yards. It was a difficult catch, directly over the head, but Saathoff's fine hands did the job, putting the Eagles on top 12-0. The PAT again failed.

The Eagles rested on their laurels a little in the second and third quarters, as the Bulldogs reeled off three straight touchdowns, the last coming off an intercepted pitch-out from Johnson to Livingston, that was read perfectly by a Bulldog line-backer.

And that tallied the score at 18-12 in favor of Ranger.

But the Eagles regained their composure, and using a play that had gained many yards all night, Johnson high-stepped for 29 yards and a touchdown, knotting the score at 18-18. The educated toe of kicker Mark Lewis propelled the ball through the uprights for the point after, and the Eagles were in the lead, never to be threatened again.

The final people-pleasing score by the Eagles came in the fourth period when an apparent incomplete Johnson pass was regained by Ted Tucker, who sped some 63 yards for an Eagle score. The ball was tipped up by a Ranger defender, but Tucker concentrated on the ball and made the catch. It all happened right in front of the Eagle stands.

The Eagles defense had no trouble in containing the Bulldogs for the remaining four minutes of the game.

Mrs. M. F. Horton reported that the money sent to the Texas Historical Commission at Austin for the San Saba Peak marker has been returned and that the application for the marker has been withdrawn for the present. All information compiled for the application is on file at the Mills County Museum, in the event more information makes it possible and advisable to re-submit the application. Mrs. Horton also reported that all information on historical markers for the past four years is also on file at the Museum.

Miss Love Gatlin attended the meeting and expressed her gratitude and that of Mrs. Bowles' daughter, Mrs. Mary Piccione, to the Mills County Historical Commission for having had the book, "A No Man's Land Becomes A County", by Flora Gatlin Bowles, reprinted and for making the book available to many who did not have a copy.

Mrs. Campbell reported that sales on the book are going well. By Thursday noon, 143 books had been picked up at the Museum and 57 had been mailed, under the capable supervision of Julian Evans.

Public Health Clinic At Senior Center Nov. 22

A Public Health Clinic for immunization against polio, measles, mumps, rubella,

diphtheria, pertussis, and tetanus will be held in Goldthwaite on Wednesday, November 22, 1978 between 10:30 a.m. and 12:00 noon, at the Senior Citizens Center.

At present, children entering school in Texas must be immunized against all of the above diseases except Mumps and tetanus. In September of 1979, mumps will be required for all children through age seven. As of September 1, 1978, all children between the ages of 18 months and 12 years

were required to be immunized against measles. After this year, the maximum age of the child requiring immunization will be raised to 15. Parental histories of measles will be acceptable until September 1, 1979, and after that, must be verified by a physician's statement. Parents need to have an up-to-date immunization record when your child enters school. It should be validated by a licensed physician or public health clinic.

The Policy Development Committee, composed of Mr. and Mrs. Chester Huggins, chairman; Nick Sublett and Arnold Head, presented the results of the policy development meeting at the Mills County annual membership meeting. The policies adopted at the annual meeting were:

- We encourage restaurants serving American beef to advertise the fact and encourage Farm Bureau families to patronize these restaurants.
- We recommend that public schools teach English to non-English speaking students in grades kindergarten through third grade.
- We re-affirm our committed Farm Bureau policy favoring 'the appraisal of all school tax properties to be left in the hands of the local school boards using local appraisers' and 'oppose state-wide or area-wide methods of property evaluation'.
- Our rural population and agricultural enterprises must be adequately represented in

the state re-districting procedures in 1981.

- We oppose payment of political debts by appointment to financially lucrative or prestigious positions. We insist the appointive positions be filled on basis of individual merit and competency.
- We object to discrimination against legitimate farmer-stockmen by the ASCS in favor of deliberate non-producers. Specifically, livestock feed payments made to persons who have made no attempt to produce feed for their livestock.
- We urge exploration and acquisition of world markets for American produced commodities rather than a government-guaranteed parity program because such a program would necessitate government regulation.
- We insist that the Legislature provide for the taxation of intangible property and also insist that the tax assessors do their jobs and properly assess all intangible property.

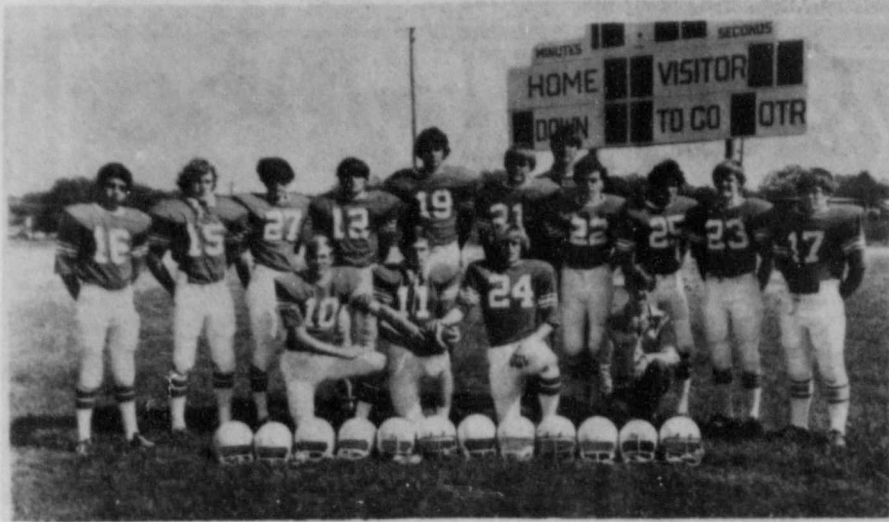

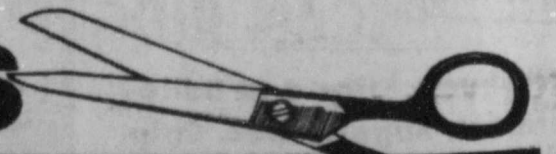

One hundred and twenty-two women from 16 clubs throughout the zone attended the meeting.

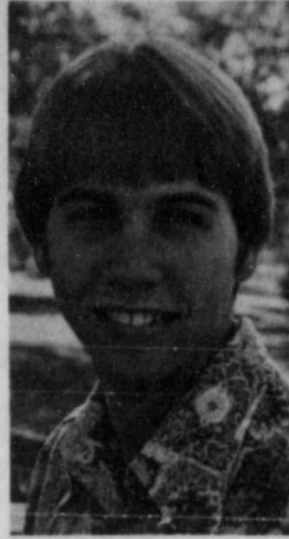
Mark C. Vlasak Featured In Who's Who

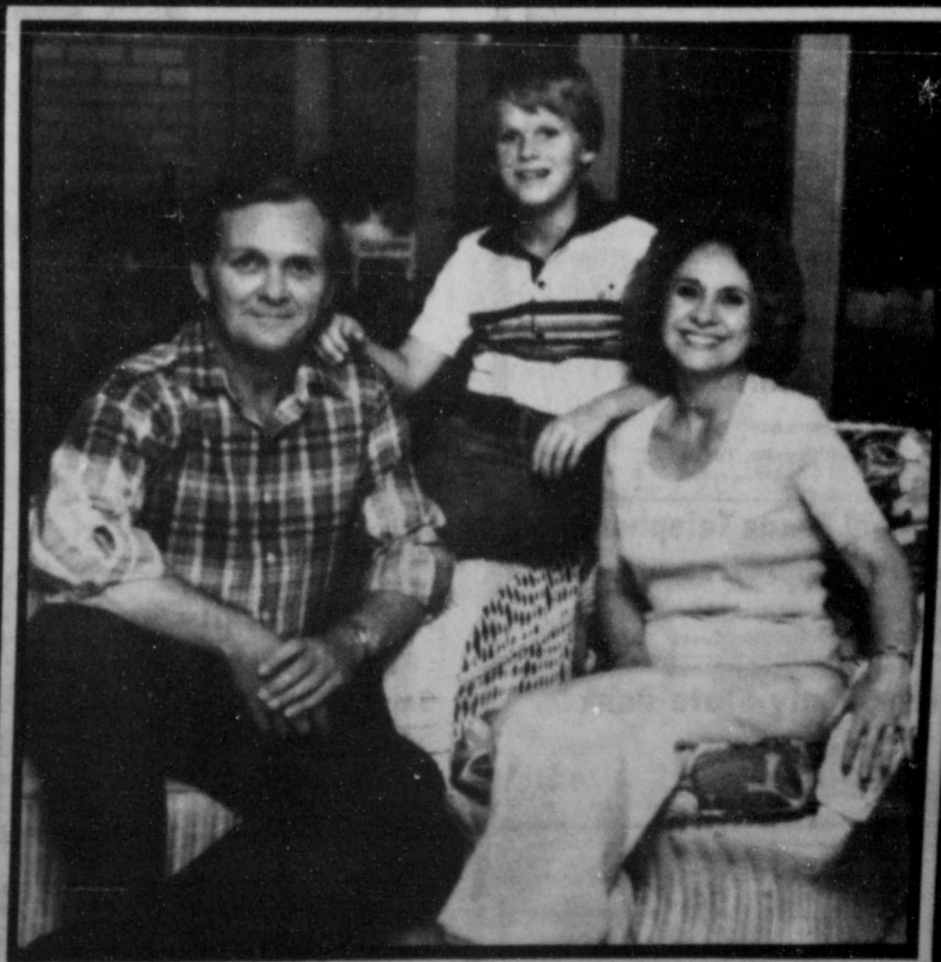

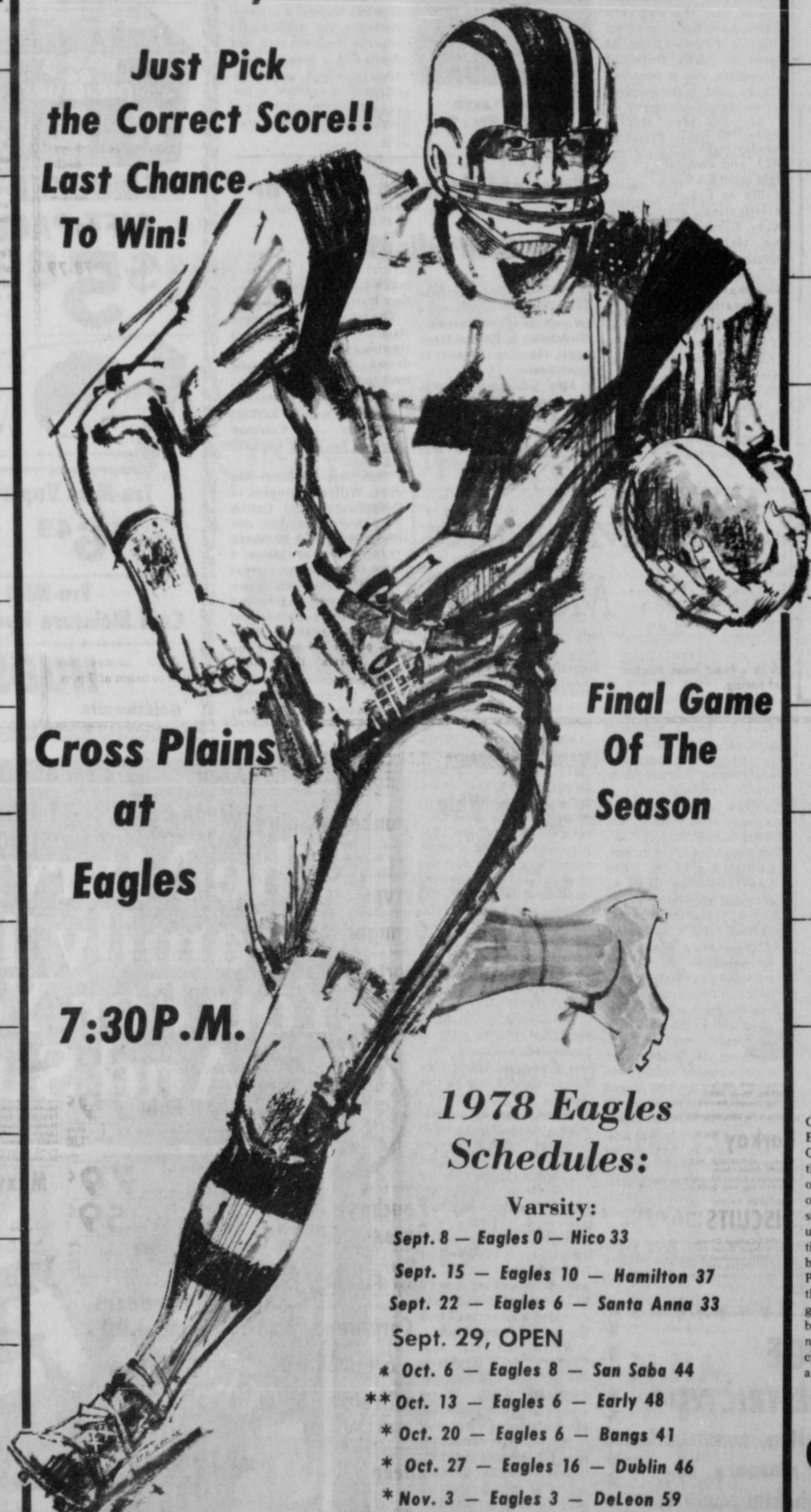

After that, the future for gas energy still looks good. The technology for gasifying coal is a fact, not some fantasy of the future. And our nation has enormous coal deposits.

Converting it into gas makes sense. Because gas burns clean and doesn't pollute, it also makes economic sense, because this gas can be distributed through the pipeline system we have, and the families who have gas appliances can keep right on using them.
