Says All Millionaires Are Perjurers.

There has been an attempt to de-
cry the charges made against the

Clara Driscoll Married.

New York, July 31.—Long before
they were born began the romance
which culminated tonight in the
marriage of Henry Hulme Sevier and
Miss Clara Driscoll. It may be said
to have had its inception as long
ago as 1836, when Col. James Bowie,
Davy Crockett and their little band
of insurgents, in their defense of
Texas' independence from Mexico,
held the Alamo Mission, near San
Antonio, for ten days against Santa
Anna and a force of 6,000 Mexicans
before they were wiped out of ex-
istence.
Mr. Sevier, who is a descendant
of John Sevier, first governor of
Tennessee, went from that State to
Texas in 1832, Miss Driscoll was also
a resident of Texas.
Young Sevier and Miss Driscoll
were brought together at a social
gathering, forming an acquaintance
which reached its climax in marriage.
Mrs. Sevier herself comes of fight-
ing stock. She is the daughter of
Robert Driscoll of Corpus Christi,
Texas, reputed to be one of the

wealthiest men in the State and
known as the Texas Cattle King.

break all previous records. Its
yield should be 2,703,641,000 bush-
els, as compared with 2,497,034 last
year. The record crop was in 1902,
when the total harvest of corn was
2,523,648,312 bushels.

that a reclassification of mail for
foreign countries has been estab-

to those countries at the rate of 12c
per pound. The weight of the
package must not exceed four
pounds and of the value of fifty
dollars. It formerly cost \$1.60 to
mail a four-pound package, which
we can now send for 48 cents. This
however, applies only to articles
sent to foreign countries.—Clay
