RIGHT TO ISSUE REFUNDING BONDS.

Freight Rates Not Affected by Refunding of Securities.

Houston, Texas .- The right to reissue maturing securities in excess to The end of a wire caught him in the Railroad Commission valuation State of Texas, although such securities were legally issued prior to the passage of the Stock and Bond law. The opinion of men engaged in financing railroads was sought by the Texas Welfare Commission, recently adjourned. Mr. R. S. Lovett, executive head of the Harriman lines, gave his views in part, as follows:

"Every railroad company ought to The existing bonds of the Houston & Texas Central, for instance, (and pany in the state except those who ruling of the Commission) have been outstanding for more than twenty years. Nineteen Millon Dollars Expended Last Year in Fight Against the Dread White Plague.

Nearly \$19,000,000 was spent in the anti-tuberculosis campaign in the Unitel States during the year 1912, according to the fourth annual statistical statement of expenditures in this movement issued by the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis. The expenditures. during the year for sanatorium and hospital construction and treatment make the largest single item in the total, amounting to nearly \$16,800,000. This is an increase of nearly \$5,000,-000 over the same group of expendi-tures for the year 1911. The antituberculosis associations and committees spent over \$765,000, while dispensaries and tuberculosis clinics spent over \$500,000. Over \$415,000 was spent for the maintenance and establishment of open-air school and fresh air classes, which is more than double the amount spent for this purpose in 1911. Official, state and municipal expenditures outside of the maintenance of institutions, which are included in the other totals, amounted to \$280,000. In addition to these figures, about \$500,000 was spent by hospitals for insane and penal institutions in caring for their tuberculosis ity." But he is also German, and

Banner Dry-Farming Year.

The dry-farmers are reported to have immense yields nearly everywhere this year. The preparation of the land by dry-farming methods resulted in the retention of considerable amounts of moisture which fell prior to the seeding of the crop, and since, for that matter. Without this preparation the water would have rapidly disappeared and when needed for crop production would not have been available. Certain sections of Montana and considerable areas in Colorado report immense crops of small grain, due wholly to dry-farming methods, says the Orange Judd Farmer. When it is recalled that the amount of work necessary to prepare the land for a dry crop is not so very much greater than by the ordinary method the great value of dry-farming to a large part of the Missouri valley and the Rocky mountain slope is very aparent.
