Driving a ship by electricity means revolving the propeller shaft from a motor. To supply the power to turn this motor a generator must be operzited somewhere else in the vessel, just as generators in power houses make current for street railways. On board ship these generators may be driven by an economical steam turbine or by a Diesel engire.

Cost of Operation Cut in Half.

The records of the electrically driven New Mexico of the United States navy, show that oil consumption is lowered about one-third by the use of electricity as motive power and the cost of operation is cut in half, principally as a result of the reduced number of men necessary in engine room CTEWS.

It is not only possible for an officer to operate an "electric ship" with small levers from the bridge, but, if need be, virtually the entire engine room mechanism can be handled by one man. Among the many advantages attached to electricity as seapower are the added hull space for cargo and the greatly reduced fuel

Pears will be in the market until Thanksgiving time and after. One of the preserve combinations which will be new to

> some is: Pineapple and Pear Conserve .-To each pound of fruit allow

three-fourths of a pound of sugar and three-fourths of a cupful of boiling water. Dissolve the sugar in the water and let it heat to the boiling point. Cut the pears in halves, lengthwise. Remove the cores and skin and add to the hot sirup; let cook until the pears are tender. Add, for each pound of pears, one can of pineapple, the slices cut in quarters; add the sirup from the can and cook until the fruit is transparent. Can and seal as usual.

Pineapple Cream.—Boil one-third of a cupful of sugar and half a cupful of grated pineapple, juice and pulp, until it makes a soft ball in cold water. Pour in a fine stream on the white of one egg beaten stiff. When cool fold in one cupful of cream beaten light, add a tablespoonful of lemon juice and fill the mold, chill and let stand until firm.

Plain Sponge Cake.—Beat the whites of three eggs until stiff and the yolks until thick. Into the yolks gradually beat one cupful of sugar, add one tablespoonful of lemon juice and two tablespoonfuls of cold water. Fold in the whites and one cupful of sifted flour alternately. Bake in a tube pan thirty to forty minutes.

Tuna Chop Suey .- Put one tablespoonful of butter in a frying pan, add one cupful each of celery and onion, one pound of fresh pork cut in hits; cover with one cupful of water, a can of mushrooms and the liquor from them. Cook slowly for one hour, add one cupful of chopped peanuts, one cupful of tuna flaked, salt and pepper. . Cook one-half hour longer and serve.

Tuna in Peppers .- Cut the stem ends, removing the veins and seeds of six green peppers. Soak the peppers in cold water, beat four eggs slightly, add one cupful of milk, two cupfuls of tuna and one cupful of bread crumbs, salt and pepper. Pack the mixture into the peppers, sprinkle buttered crumbs over the top and brown in the oven. Serve piping hot.

Tuna Loaf.-Beat one egg until light, add one cupful of bread crumbs, one cupful of sweet milk, salt, pepper, onion juice and one cupful of flaked tuna. Press the mixture into a buttered loaf pan and bake twentyfive minutes. Garnish with hardcooked eggs and serve with drawn but-

ter sauce. Tuna Sandwiches .- One cupful of flaked tuna, two teaspoonfuls of creamed butter, one teaspoonful of lemon juice, one teaspoonful each of minced tarragon, chervil and gherkins. Mix well, adding a dash of paprika and salt if needed and spread on very





### QUALITY OF ROAD MATERIALS

Bureau of Public Roads Seeking Information of Especial Value to Highway Engineers.

Such important questions as how hard a heavy motor, truck pounds a pavement when going at 5 miles an hour and at 15 miles an hour are being answered by investigators for the bureau of public roads, United States

And finally the truck was equipped with pnepmatic tires 42 by 9 inches and blown up to a pressure of 142 pounds per square inch. The test demonstrated very clearly the bad effects on old tire is likely to have on a road surface and the greatly lessened impact produced by trucks when they are equipped with pneumatic tires. The tests show that as the vehicle's speed increased the impact from the old hard rulfer tire increased greatly. The impact from the new hard rubber tire was somewhat less.


