ANOTHER PROMINENT PANHANDLE CITIZEN GONE TO HIS REWARD

J. W. Talley of White Deer, the subject of this sketch, was born in Washington County, Texas July, 15, 1857 and departed this life in Amarillo November 19, 1921.

The funeral services were held in Pampa November 20. The ministers taking part in the services were: Revs. Whately pastor of Baptist church of Pampa, P. J. Merrell, pastor Christian church, Pampa, J. H. Bone pastor Presbyterian church Miami and White Deer and B. J. Jackson of Miami.

The deceased grew to manhood in Washington County, moved to Bell County in 1877. In 1881 he was married to Miss Ellie Thompson.

To this union was born five children, three boys and two girls. He is survived by one brother, R. J. Talley, and all five children, and a host of relatives and friends.

The deceased moved to the Panhandle in 1892 and has resided in Miami, Pampa, and White Deer ever since. He professed religion and joined the Methodist church in 1914.

In the passing of this good man this country has sustained a heavy loss.

He had been one of our most prominent and useful citizens for almost a third of a century. We never knew him to turn down a worthy cause or fail to carry his part of any burdens.

He has always stood for the best in community life, and been on the right side of every moral question. In the early settlement of this country that was sometimes hard to do. He was prominent in business affairs, and has done as much in settling and developing this great country of our as any other man.

The esteem in which he was held was shown by the very large number at his funeral, said to be the largest ever witnessed in this part of the Panhandle, and the beautiful floral offering.

FIGURES IN HISTORY'S PAGES

Mount Demavend, Paradise of Zoroaster, Has Seen Many Cupolas Rise and Fall.

Just as Mount Olympus in Greece was the home of the gods, so 355 Demavend in Persia is the paradise of Zoroaster. Many legends have enveloped this great mountain peak, which towers over 18,000 feet above the plains, and it is held in superstitious awe by the natives, so much so that the only way to secure a guide is to offer him a month's salary.

Mount Demavend outcrops in proportion any mountain in Europe, and is the highest peak in south-western Asia. The fire worshippers and Persian classical poetry tell about the tyrant Zohak, who halted in his world-wide tyranny, was chained Prometheus-like upon its peak. Almost at its very base the mother of Zoroaster was born.

The peak marks the eastern limit of rains of the Assyrians before the rise in power of the great kings of Persia. It overlooks, on its eastern face, the mountain home of the great Parthian empire. Alexander the Great paused beneath it in prospect of Darius III to send expeditions through the nearby passes. Antiochus the Great marched by it against the Parthians, and westward along the route came Genghis Khan, Kullagu Khan and Timurlane with their ravaging mongol horles.

WELL-BALANCED RATIONS GIVE GREATER EGG YIELD

Every person who keeps poultry is sure to be impressed sooner or later by the importance of feeding a well-balanced ration, especially for the production of eggs. Ordinarily a balanced ration means a ration has the proportions of carbohydrates, protein and fat that have been found to produce the best results, but new things are being discovered that need to be given consideration in balancing a ration. For instance, it is now thought that it may be well to have a balance between the acid and the alkaline feeds and that there is a possibility that the continued use of an acid-forming diet may lead to a greater susceptibility to certain diseases.

The grain mixtures that are commonly used by poultrymen are acid. Mash mixtures containing sufficient quantities of digester tankage, meat and bone meal, dried milk, or dried blood will be alkaline. The acid in feed mixtures can be overcome by these feeds just mentioned and by ground limestone and oyster shell. This further emphasizes the necessity of feeding a mash containing an amount of meat scrap or some feed of this kind. Green feed and fresh milk should also help to overcome acidity.

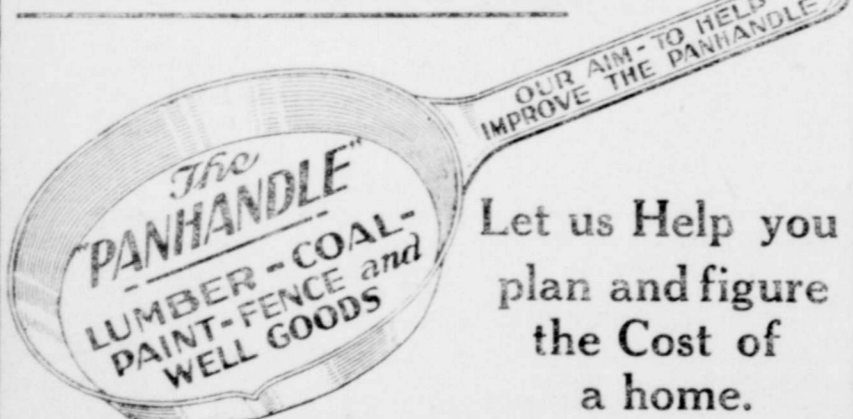

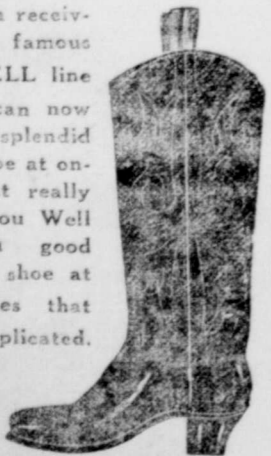

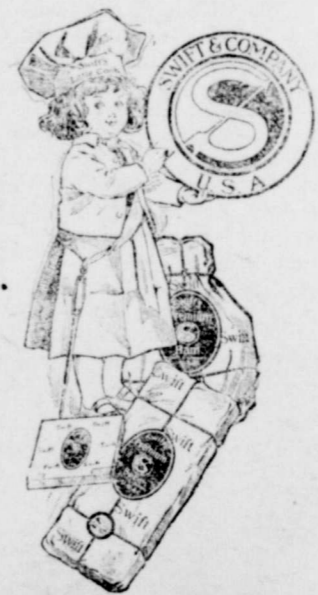
