PROCLAIMS HEALTH WEEK, MARCH 5 TO 11.

Governor Neff has issued a proclamation designating the week of March 5th to 11th as Health Week, and asks that every citizen of Texas co-operate with the schools, churches, clubs, organizations and city officers in directing attention to and enforcing means that will produce better health conditions and eradicating menaces to the Public Health.

In regard to the proclamation, State Health Officer, J. H. Florence says:

As your State Health Officer, I wish to impress upon the people the real meaning and object of this Health Week. To the average citizen unacquainted with the true meaning of Sanitation, a Clean-up campaign means to him the hauling away of trash, the burning of leaves, the gathering up and destruction of various forms of rubbish around his place which chiefly offend the eye and are of very little real danger to his health, and he leaves the real deadly manaces to health still closely surrounding him because he is unaware of their danger. Therefore, in a few brief words I wish to point out some of these real disease producers and urge each citizen to not only clean up the trash and improve the looks of his premises but to remedy, if possible, all truly dangerous conditions.

PROTECTION THAT WILL REALLY PROTECT

1. Flies are extremely dangerous. They convey Typhoid Fever, Cholera, and other diseases. They breed in manure; they breed in garbage and do not permit them to remain on the place.
2. Mosquitoes are deadly. They cause malaria, yellow fever and other diseases; they breed in standing water and sluggish streams. Drain your premises, screen your houses, cover your cisterns; put crude oil in the streams; destroy tin cans and other water containers.
3. Your open-back, surface privy is a relic of barbarism and extremely dangerous. Flies and small animals carry deadly germs from it directly to your food. Typhoid Fever, Hook Worm Infection and Summer Diarrhea that kills the babies is the result. Build a simple form of sanitary, fly-proof privy; or connect with the sewer if possible.
4. Your water or milk supply may be polluted—have it tested.
5. Have your children and yourself examined for physical defects by a competent physician. It may greatly prolong your life.
6. Find out of your child is attending a school with insanitary surroundings or if he is working under similar conditions. If so have them corrected.
7. See that your garbage is placed in covered containers while awaiting collection and that it is properly disposed of.
8. See if your food comes from a sanitary dairy, slaughter house and meat market.
9. Make a real effort to obtain for your city and county a Whole Time Health Officer who will constantly look after your health.

If you will do some or all of these things Health Week will be of tremendous benefit to the State of Texas. Asking your earnest cooperation. Sincerely yours,

INCOME TAX FACTS.

Former soldiers and sailors, in filing an income-tax return for 1921, should not include as gross income any amount received under the provisions of the war risk insurance and vocational rehabilitation acts and as pensions from the United States for military or naval service during the war.

The special exemption of \$3,500 formerly allowed soldiers and sailors in active service is not continued by the revenue act of 1921. "Persons in active military or naval service of the United States" are allowed only the exemptions granted other individuals, \$1,000 if single (or if married and not living with husband or wife); \$2,500 if married and the combined net income of husband and wife was \$5,000 or less; and \$2,000 if married and the combined net income of husband and wife was more than \$5,000.

An unmarried soldier, sailor, marine, or ex-service man must file a return if his net income from all sources for 1921 was \$1,000 or more or if his gross income was \$5,000 or more. If married and living with his wife on December 31, 1921, he must file a return if the net income of himself and wife and dependent minor children was \$2,000 or more, or if the combined gross income was \$5,000 or more.

ENTERTAINMENT PLANS BEING COMPLETED

Every visitor who wishes hotel accommodations, will upon arrival in the city, go to the Hotel Amarillo, where a list of rooms, not only in the hotel, but out in town may be secured. The committee in charge will see to it that visitors are conducted to rooms, in the residential districts, as well as to hotels, rooming, or boarding houses. The visitors are to be considered in this respect, as the guests of Amarillo, and none will be overlooked who registered at the hotel.

Another suggestion of the committee is that those who want rooms at the Hotel Amarillo either write or wire for them, and this matter will receive the most careful attention by those in charge. If other hotels of the city are preferred, then communications with them direct will get results, provided there be no undue delay. But where no reservations are made, the visitors should upon arrival, make their way to the Hotel Amarillo and receive assignment of rooms.

The general committee announces that down to the minutest detail, arrangements for the Auto-Style Show are in hand. Not one item is being overlooked, from the placing of the big American flags in the immense automobile and style show rooms, down to the tiniest electric light to heighten the effective and beautiful decorative scheme. Funeral services were held at the M. E. Church Sunday afternoon at 2:30, with Rev. Bowen in charge, and at the cemetery the Eastern Star, of which Mrs. Pursley was a member, held their beautiful burial service. The church was crowded to overflowing with the many friends who had gathered in token of their love and respect to Mrs. Pursley.

OBITUARY

Bess May Simmons was born at Lone Oak, Texas, on June 9th, 1896. In the spring of 1916 she moved with her parents to a ranch north of Miami, on the Canadian river and later the family moved to their present home near Miami.

On September 7th, 1920 she was united in marriage to Tom Pursley at Miami, Rev. B. F. Jackson, performing the ceremony. In September 1921 Mr. Pursley died at a hospital at Wichita, Kansas, after an illness lasting all the preceding summer.

Mrs. Pursley was suddenly taken ill on Monday of last week with influenza, which later developed into pneumonia, and on Friday evening, her Heavenly Father saw fit to call her home.

At the age of thirteen she united with the M. E. Church, and has been a faithful and loyal member. Hers was a beautiful life, and to have her call one "friend" was an honor. Her life was devoted to the service of others, and her loss makes a vacant corner in the hearts of scores of friends, that can never be filled.

Africa Source of First Men?

Prehistoric Europe Now Believed to Have Been From Africa and Not Asia.

FIND SKULL IN RHODESIA

Believed to Be of General Neanderthal Type, Which Opens Up Possibility That Africa Was Source of Europe's First People.

Washington.—The recent discovery in a cave in northern Rhodesia of a human skull apparently many thousands of years old seems to put Africa on the map for the first time as the probable field of development for men who played an important part in the life of prehistoric Europe. Where the most important old human skulls have been discovered heretofore and what their locations seem to indicate is told in the following bulletin from the Washington, D. C. headquarters of the National Geographic society:

"Europe has long been recognized as merely the stage on which late acts of the great drama of the development of man and his civilization have been played," says the bulletin. "None of the races that has lived in Europe during the long period of man's life on the earth is believed to have originated there. Hitherto all evidence pointed to Asia as the source of the succeeding waves of human immigrants as it was the source, at least proximately, of the thousands of horses, deer and cattle that swarmed into the country during interglacial periods."

Considered Only Bridge in Past. "Hares had come across the land bridges from Africa, but for the most part they had merely used northern Africa as a path, coming from Arabia or farther Asia. The one exception known was the strange appearance along the southern fringe of Europe at one time of a race akin to the negro pygmies of present-day central Africa. But these small negro-like were an unimportant factor and soon vanished."

"So far as Europe is concerned, the Heidelberg men were the earliest known human inhabitants. A single jaw-bone discovered in Germany represents the data from which conclusions have been drawn in regard to this race which is supposed to have lived some 200,000 years ago. They are classed as the first wholly human beings of whom fossils have been discovered, and are supposed to have been later by probably a quarter of a million years than the ape-man whose skull was discovered in Java."

"The Heidelberg men were apparently succeeded about 75,000 years ago by a long persisting type of whom many fossils have been found—the Neanderthal man. Skulls and bones of this widely diffused people have been found in France, Germany, Belgium, Croatia, on the Channel Isles, on the rock of Gibraltar and in Malta. They were cave-dwelling hunters and for more than 50,000 years lived off the herbs of horses, deer, and cattle that abounded in Europe during that period."

"These Neanderthal men were much more advanced than the men of Heidelberg, but still they were lower in the scale than any savage of the present day. They were squat, burly, big-headed and thick skulled. Their brows projected markedly over cavernous eyes, they were almost chinless, and their knees were permanently bent. The first skull of these people discovered more than 60 years ago, was so widely divergent from existing skulls that one scientist insisted that it was a malformation. It was only after the discovery of other fos-

sils that the former existence of this race was generally accepted. First Neanderthal Discovery in Africa. "Though Neanderthal remains have been discovered at the very edge of northern Africa, notably in Gibraltar and Malta, there has been no general tendency to look upon Africa as the source of that people. The skull and bones recently discovered in northern Rhodesia, however, are believed to be of the general Neanderthal type and their discovery opens up the possibility that it was from Africa that Europe's Neanderthal horde came. The 'Broken Hill Skull,' as the African fossil is called, is in some ways more primitive than the European Neanderthal skulls though it is believed to be more recent. These facts give added weight to the belief that the skull recently found was nearer than the European fossils to the original point of dissemination of the Neanderthal men."

"The Neanderthal men represented about the last known types of humans with skull development lower than that of present-day savages. When they disappeared 25,000 or 30,000 years ago they were succeeded by the Cro-Magnon men, hunters and also artists, who have left remarkable drawings of animals on the walls of certain caves in France. They were a tall, finely built, intelligent race, the first known men generally rated as belonging to the same species as our Homo sapiens."

Many Ways to Help Jobless

Novel Means Adopted to Relieve Unemployment Situation Throughout U. S.

DALLAS CHURCHES HELP OUT

Chicago Provides Jobs by Forcing Householders to Obey Fire Prevention Laws—Atlanta Citizens Build Homes.

Washington.—Novel means are being employed by various cities and towns throughout the United States to provide work for the jobless, according to reports collected by Col. Arthur Woods, head of the organization charged with carrying on work started by the recent national conference on unemployment.

Summaries of these reports show these means used:

Chicago has made a house-to-house canvass under the direction of 23 battalion fire chiefs to compel householders to remove from their premises all combustible material and refuse as a fire prevention measure. This campaign has created many short-time jobs.

Dallas, Texas, took a church census of its population and each householder was asked if some special odd job, painting, carpentering, gardening or cleaning, could be furnished the unem-

Turkey Hens Fight Off Coyote Till Help Comes

Lakeview, Mont.—A farmer living near here boasts of a flock of turkeys with a fighting strain. He was aroused in the night by a commotion in the turkey corral and, going out with a shotgun, he found the hen turkeys flying at a bewildered coyote from all sides in defense of their young. Not a turkey was killed, but the farmer ended the career of the coyote.

In many battles with the police, they have carried off property of all kinds, even board fences, doors of houses, windows from closed dwellings and benches and chairs from the city parks. Scores of persons have reported the theft of chickens, pigs, goats, sheep, geese, ducks and doves. The increase in crime here is attributed by the police to the cold weather and the shortage of fuel and food.

HALF SHAVED BY LIGHTNING

Montana Rancher Only Slightly Burned by a Freak Bolt From Cloud.

Bozeman, Mont.—A bolt of lightning played a mean trick on Steve O'Donnell, Gallatin valley rancher, a few days ago. It struck a haystack on which he was riding and shaved off the hair of the right side of his head, as clean as a razor would have done, leaving the hair on the left side untouched. The flesh was only slightly burned. O'Donnell was stunned.

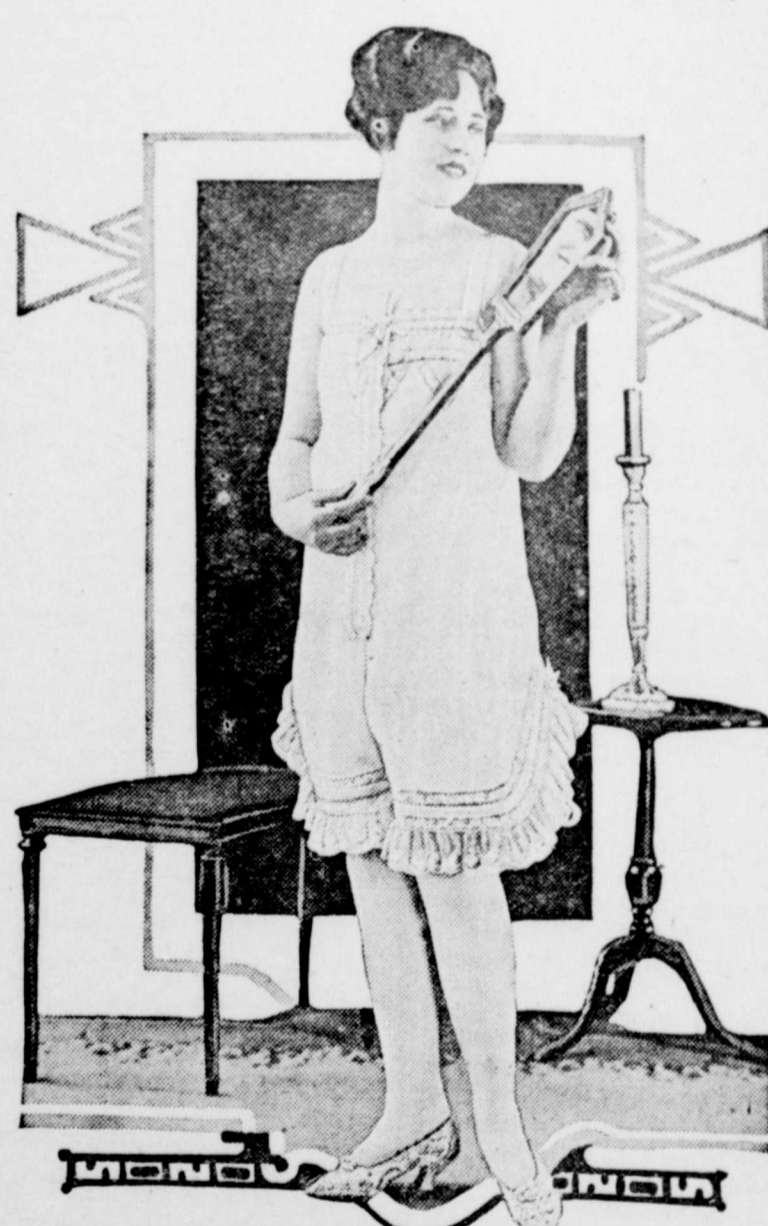
Married Many Couples.

Pretty Things that are made at Home



A LONG with other girdles, in unending variety, come those of black velvet ribbon, to be worn with different frocks. In combination with little steel or mother-of-pearl buckles, like those shown in the picture, or embellished only with tiny bows and knots of the same ribbon, or ornamented with small millinery flowers and fruits, they serve to tone down vividly colored dresses or to tone up those in pale tints that might be too tame without them. Among many ribbon girdles they are about the easiest to make and the most useful, since black velvet ribbon can be worn with any sort of dress.



at the left side is simply a band of the ribbon about the waist—set at a low waistline—supporting long ends that are placed at intervals all around it. Two small flat bows appear at the same intervals, on each hanging end, and these ends are longer than the dress skirt. Where they are attached to the girdle a little buckle seems to take the responsibility of holding them together, but it is in reality only an ornament, for the ribbons are sewed together. It will take a bolt of ribbon to make this pretty accessory.

FARM LIVE STOCK

SHEEP INDUSTRY PROFITABLE

Necessary to Well-Balanced Agriculture and Pays Well if Herds Are Handled Right.

In this country the sheep industry has had frequent ups and downs, and recently it has been very much depressed, but it is an industry necessary to a well-balanced agriculture and usually it pays fairly good returns when flocks are properly handled. Wool is a staple commodity and mutton is a regular part of our diet, though it is much less used than beef or pork. Conditions in many parts of the United States are excellent for sheep raising and there can be little doubt that within a relatively short time the sheep will be more profitable than during the past year.

Present conditions of depression are abnormal, just as the period of unusual prosperity was abnormal. There is a surplus of wool on hand in the country now, but it is being used up faster than it is being replaced by production on American farms. Even now mutton and lamb are in sufficient demand so that, in connection with wool, sheep raising is a good business. In the farming areas more attention is paid to mutton making; the range men have given more attention to wool, but now depend more on the returns for lamb and mutton than they have in the past.

FORESTS TURNING OUT MEAT

Transform Into Marketable Product Weeds and Grass That Otherwise Would Be Lost.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.) Through its issuance of paid grazing permits to stockmen the forest service of the United States Department of Agriculture not only secures for the government a considerable sum of money, but it transforms into a marketable product weeds and grass that would otherwise be lost. In addition, grazing reduces the fire hazards in the forests.

In one year, it is estimated, the national forests turn out approximately 300,000,000 pounds of lamb and mutton and 500,000,000 pounds of beef. Many lambs are born in the forests and leave their mothers only when they are ready to be

shipped to market. The 14,000,000 sheep and cattle that move into the forests every spring are drawn from a wide area of surrounding territory, and in the fall they pour out in great streams to such central markets as Chicago, Kansas City and Omaha, where they are turned into meat products that go to all parts of the country.

PLAN TO MARKET LIVE STOCK

Study of Costs and Methods Being Made by United States Department of Agriculture.

The United States Department of Agriculture is making a study of the costs and methods of marketing live stock, beginning at country points. The work is to be done mainly in a number of selected areas in important live stock sections of the country. The plan is to select areas, usually consisting of several counties, and to study carefully the costs and methods of as many of the existing agencies in each area as can furnish any satisfactory information. The study will include mainly country buyers, local shipping associations, local elevators shipping live stock, and independent shippers. In several instances the work is being done in cooperation with the state. A number of men from the department are now in the field collecting data on the subject.

Value of Purebred Sire. The greatest value of a purebred sire is his ability to produce offspring that are better than their dams in type, or production, or both. If he lacks ability to do this he is no better than the animals he replaced.

Warming Water for Stock. The practice of heating or warming the drinking water for live stock during the winter has been followed pretty generally by most live-stock farmers, using anything from an old boiler to a modern tank heater.

More Jobs on Buildings.

Atlanta has formed a club of five hundred citizens, each of whom has pledged the building of a dwelling to be rented at a reasonable figure, thus giving employment to many and also helping the housing situation.

Boston has asked all employers to increase the number of their employees by at least one and as many more as is possible.

New London, Conn., runs special entertainments in the theaters with local talent. The unemployed were allowed to sell tickets and retain a good percentage of the proceeds. Civil service rules are suspended in Cambridge, Mass., so that many persons can rotate in the same jobs.

Houston, Texas, maintains a gang of laborers ranging in number from two hundred to six hundred, paying them \$1.25 a day, and if they have dependents supplementing this by charity. Employers are urged to apply to the city for labor, which is supplied from this gang.

St. Louis.—Fifty pounds of brass passed a gold test applied by John Miller, assayer and pawnbroker, and was bought by him for \$7,000. Miller said the chemicals he used evidently had been tampered with. The two men had asked \$13,000 for the metal.

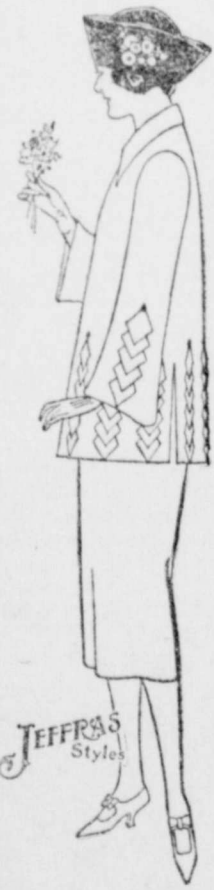

CONCERNING VICTORY NOTES

Desiring to be of service to its readers, many of whom own Victory Notes, the following information is presented by The Chief with reference to the June 15, 1922, call by the Treasury for 3 3-4 Victory Notes and the temporary redemption pri-

ilege relative to Victory 4 3-4. Inquiries indicate there has been some misunderstanding on the part of the public.

Secretary of the Treasury Mellon has called Victory 3 3-4 Notes for redemption at par and accrued interest June 15, 1922. After June 15 these bonds, because they have been called, will bear no interest. It is to the owner's advantage to surrender them at that time, or any time before at par plus accrued interest, and reinvest the proceeds. For reinvestment, the U. S. Government Savings Organization at Dallas has suggested the New Issue of Treasury Savings Certificates which are to be had at postoffices or through banks in \$1,000, \$100 and \$25, maturity value denominations, costing, respectively, \$800, \$80 and \$20.

These are registered in the owner's name when purchased and are loss-proof as well as depreciation-or market fluctuation-proof. They mature five years from date of purchase; bear 4 1-2 per cent, compound semi-annually, if held to maturity. Over a period of five years they yield 25 per cent on the investment. They are cashable at purchaser's option before maturity. Ownership limit is \$5,000, maturity value. Until March 15, The Treasury has authorized The Federal Reserve

Bank to receive 4 3-4 Victories from owners who desire to sell them to the Government at par plus accrued interest. If held after that time, unless the purchase period is extended, the 4 3-4 Victories will run on till maturity, which is May 23, 1923. Those who desire may take advantage of this temporary period and convert their bonds into cash. Reinvestment in Treasury Savings Certificates of the New Issue has been recommended. Owners are advised to consult local bankers for specific advice.

"I wonder if people think my name is funny. It never strikes me as funny but I heard the other day that one of the other monkeys said he thought it was a queer name."

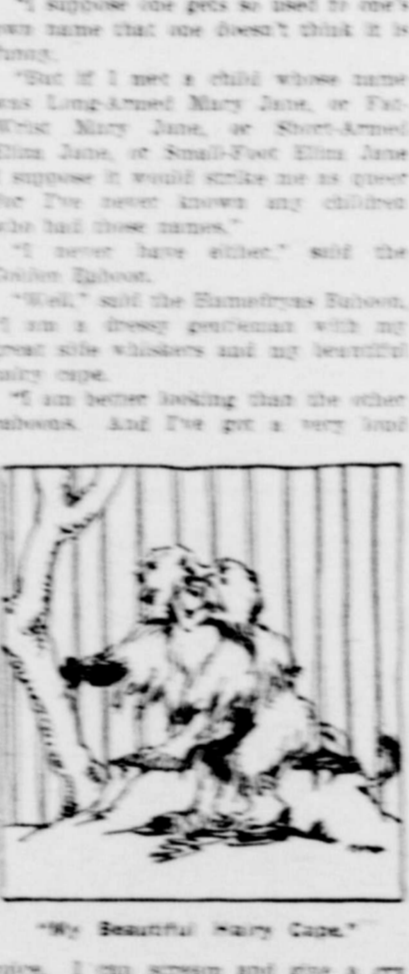
"I suppose one gets so used to one's own name that one doesn't think it is funny."

ALL BENEFITED BY ZONING

Minnesota Newspaper Points Out the Advantages of Farming and Comprehensive Plans.

The prosperity of a city depends much on how it is built. It is always an advantage to a city to draw to it those well able to support themselves, because they become supporters of the city and pay their share of the taxes. The amount of taxes that newcomers can provide is enormous. By paying attention to the proper points in city building the city establishes the very thing that brings this population without cost to itself.

Cities grow by natural means sometimes. A water power may develop a large city, but the city itself may be built in a clumsy way and without beauty. One factor in city building is arrangement. This is why some laws are proposed so that a home builder of any class may feel sure that his surroundings will not be spoiled by the invasion of unsightly things that are wholly unnecessary.

The best goal of a city should prevail over the more selfish desire of some property owner to make money regardless of his neighbor. There is just as much chance to make money under the zoning law, however, as there is without it, and even a greater one.

VALUE OF PROPER PLANNING

Fundamental Business Idea in Looking to the Future Development of the Community.

Town and city planning do not find their value in developing the esthetic side alone, but also apply the sound business fundamentals of maintenance and improvement to the community, declared B. Leroy Young, speaker of the Massachusetts House of Representatives, in an address at the eighth annual conference of the Massachusetts Federation of Planning Boards. By directing proper provision of water supply, sewage disposal, housing facilities, adequate municipal buildings and local forest reserve, he said, they work for the enhancement of citizenship in its relation to the community, the state and the nation.

As an opening to the conference, citizens of Winchester acted as hosts to the members of the federation on a tour trip of inspection of the many developments of the town which make it pre-eminent among communities where town planning has been carefully and intelligently applied. The first evidences of this were a large playground and park, a redirected stream and an attractive bridge, which have replaced unsightly tanneries and cemeteries and permit an unrestricted view of the community center.

Home Ownership Best.
Aside from the security which the home owner enjoys, the possession of his own home should be the ambition of every man. Naturally the first step is the most difficult, for the purchase of a home means a cash payment that is usually well beyond the \$1,000 mark. Once that hurdle is taken, however, the other payments are easy, for they should not exceed, at the outside, \$75 a month on the kind of a home the average man can afford. When the current business depression, with its deplorable unemployment situation, goes by the boards I believe many more Americans will see the wisdom of owning their own homes and thus increasing the percentage of our people who are free from the clutches of the land lord.—Washington Post.

To Hurry the Zoning.
The Chicago zoning act should be put into effect as quickly as possible. Many a beautiful residence neighborhood has been ruined by the steady encroachment of factories, coal yards and the like and the sooner the city is zoned the sooner this ruinous loss will be eliminated. It would also be a positive assurance to a man building or buying a home that his property will not lose value through the introduction of low-class improvements, and will also tend to stabilize real estate loans as well as reduce the lumber.—E. C. Rose in Chicago Daily News.

Although the activities of the independent relief organizations were up for attack, speakers were careful to emphasize the need of relief in Russia as distributed by the American relief administration.

JOBS GO TO EX-SERVICE MEN

British Legion Secures Promise from Government to Give Employment to Former Soldiers.

The British Legion, formed from three veteran organizations with constitution and by-laws modeled after the American Legion, has secured a promise from the English government that in public works for the benefit of the unemployed 75 per cent of the jobs shall be given ex-service men.

With King George's approval, the Legion works through Britain's consulates and all employers showing a preference for ex-service men are permitted a special seal and their names are inscribed on the King's Roll.

The British Legion, sponsored by Field Marshal Haig, came into being in July, 1919. It has 1,300 posts and a membership running into millions. It is nonsectarian, nonpolitical and one of its ideals is the sanctifying "of our comradeship by devotion to mutual service and helpfulness." It is preparing to send unemployed ex-service men to British Columbia and Australia, where they will be welcomed. "The ultimate goal of the Legion," says Lord Haig, "must be the uplifting of the whole empire, the creating of a happier and more God-fearing community."

TO AID THE EX-SERVICE MEN

Henry Opydycke's Job Is to Speed Up Veteran's Bureau Work in Second District.

Lubricating the machinery now in motion for the care of veterans in New York, New Jersey, and Connecticut, is the task assigned to Henry G. Opydycke. His job will be to speed up the work of the United States Veterans' bureau in the second district, where he has been appointed manager.

"Service for the ex-service man" is the policy announced by Opydycke, who since the war has been active in the Broadway post of the American Legion. In his plan to rehabilitate the soldier he aims to bring the school work directly under government supervision so that exploitation of veterans, through contract schools, will be impossible.

The new appointee is a veteran of two wars.

MAY REMODEL UNION JACK

Ireland's New Position in British Empire Likely to Bring Change in Famous Flag.

The diagonal red cross in the Union Jack stands for Ireland. The original national flag was the banner of St. George, a plain red cross on a white background. In 1606 the Scottish flag, a white diagonal cross and a blue background, was blended with the white upright cross, with a blue background of the diagonal white cross being added.

On the death of Charles I the cross of St. George again became the national flag, but in 1706, after the union with Scotland, the cross standard with the blue background was restored. In 1801 the red cross of St. Patrick was superimposed on St. Andrew's cross, making the present Union Jack.



The Lubbock team was coached by Mowry, the man who coached the Texas Boys' Team which won out at Macon, Ga., this winter, thereby winning a free trip to England, Scotland, and the continent. The Lubbock team was not a great deal superior to our boys, and all in all we placed more rings of livestock correctly than any other team in the contest. Miami placed 9 rings, Wheeler, 8 Lubbock 7, White Deer 7, Canyon 4, and McLean, 3. Miami placed low on giving reasons.

In Dairy Cattle, we met our Waterloo. Here Lubbock ranked first, White Deer, second and Miami third. Lubbock was first on hogs, and Miami, second. In judging beef cattle, Miami was first, and Pinkney Dear was high man on the Miami team, with Frank Cox and George Coffee second and third. Claude Locke, replacing Raymond Nelson, who made the team, was alternate. Frank Cox placed four rings right, Pinkney Dear, 3, George Coffee, 2 and Claude Locke 1.

In dairy cattle, in the ten highest, Frank Cox was sixth and Pinkney Dear was ninth. In hogs, Pinkney Dear was fourth, George Coffee was sixth and Claude Locke, ninth. In beef cattle, Pinkney Dear was fourth, and a tie with Frank Cox for the same place. In the whole contest, Pinkney Dear was sixth man, Frank Cox, seventh and George Coffee, tenth. All three were in the ten highest.

The contest gave more satisfaction this year than last year. The work was more than could be well done in one day. The boys started to work at 8:30 a. m., ate lunch at 12:45—1:15 p. m., and completed their last set of reasons at 7:30 p. m. If you don't think they were busy, ask them how they would like to go thru the same thing next Friday. Last year one ring was placed. This year, 2 rings of Jerseys, 1 of Holsteins, 1 of Poland China Gilt, 1 of fat barrows, 1 of Duroc Jersey gilts, and 1 ring of Herefords were placed. Last year written reasons were given on one class. This year oral reasons were given on 1 class of Jerseys, 1 of Holsteins, 1 of Poland Chinas, 1 of fat barrows, and 1 of Hereford Bulls. Last year four teams competed White Deer, McLean, Lubbock, Canyon, Wheeler and Miami.

Eighteen minutes were given to place the rings; three minutes to look them over; thirteen to go over the class and a final two minutes to set the picture in the judges' mind. Two minutes were given for reasons.

The teams came out in the following order: Lubbock, 1st, White Deer, 2nd, Miami, 3rd, Wheeler, 4th, Canyon, 5th and McLean, 6th.

The class in Vocational Agriculture is doing some good work this year. The project has brought into the county, eight purebred sows; five Durocs, purchased for \$301.40, and three Poland Chinas purchased for \$165. One dairy project, one chicken project and eleven steer projects are under way while two grade Poland China projects are just being completed.

ON BORDER LINE OF SANITY

Danger Signals Which, if Heeded in Time, May Save the Afflicted From Insane Asylum.

The history of most cases of insanity can be traced back through a progressive series of symptoms to an early day when the patient was looked upon as normal except for some trifling peculiarity. In the Indianapolis Medical Journal, Dr. Max A. Babr describes some of the peculiarities which in certain temperaments may combine with a train of circumstances to bring their possessor if not to the insane asylum at least to the borderland of insanity.

Self-depreciation, conceit, self-pity, exaggerated tendency to shun society, selfishness, suspiciousness and jealousy, exaggerated conscientiousness and scrupulousness, which in their normal development are virtues but in their exaggerated form make of their possessor an unsocial person are all characteristics of this kind. Moodiness and irritability, touchiness and oversensitiveness also fall into this class.
