"Elect Three Commissioners Or None"

"The Citizens Must Elect Candidates If They Are to Have a Majority In the City Hall."

The meeting was opened by Mr. Geo. Bryant, and immediately turned over to Mr. Frank Judkins, chairman. He explained that the first mass meeting was called by Mr. Geo. Bryant about 6 weeks ago, and at that time R. N. Grisham, M. McCullough and Allen Dabney were nominated to run for City Commissioners to take the place of the three whose terms expire. Mr. Grisham and Mr. Dabney refused to run, but Mr. McCullough has filed his name as a candidate. Mr. Judkins stated that "if less than three citizens' candidates are elected there might as well be none. If the people are to stand together for their rights in this movement they will have to elect three men for these places, otherwise they might as well sit down and surrender to the gas company, and pay these excessive bills."

The other two men who have filed their names along with

Mr. McCullough are K. F. Page and Jim Horton. These two men said Mr. Judkins, "are representing the gas company. The people did not nominate them, and they are never present at the meetings, so it is likely they are for the gas company." He also stated that "approximately 75 per cent of the people in Eastland are paying more for gas bills than they are for groceries and this situation is unendurable. We must have some relief from this high rate."

Mr. Judkins stated, "that the people are so far united, and more than 80 per cent believe we are paying too much for gas. We are not getting a square deal, and must have three men to represent the people or go home and forget the thing was ever started. Any man of good standing, plenty of backbone, and who is interested in the welfare of Eastland will be elected. Little prejudices will be forgotten. A man is unfit to hold the office if he is not fully representing the people who put him there. He must have the will power to stand up for the rights of citizens of Eastland."

Mr. Grisham, who spoke briefly, said: "I want the situation corrected, and nominate Alex Clark to serve in my stead." He discussed Mr. Clark's ability to handle the

Citizens Organize for Fire Prevention

National fire prevention week will be observed in Eastland from April 6th to 11th inclusive at the invitation of Fire Chief Hennessee, a group of Eastland citizens, including insurance agents and representatives of civic organizations met Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock in the City Hall and outlined plans for fire prevention.

The public is asked to give the Boy Scouts every possible assistance when they call at the homes as a program of inspection has been outlined for them.

The boys will be there to help you and it is very important that you aid them in every way possible in making their check of bad wiring, trash, weeds, etc. that might be the cause of fire.

Among the things Professor Bittle mentioned in a brief talk was his invitation for the public to visit the schools and encourage Fire Prevention thru the children. The children in the grades are making posters

which will be placed in each down-town business house window.

Fire Chief Hennessee said "The only way to prevent a fire is to remove every cause."

Mr. E. E. Freyschlag, who had already made an investigation of methods used in other cities suggested that a Fire Prevention Committee be appointed by the Chamber of Commerce as a permanent organization to make a survey of the city and determine the insurable values to prevent over insurance, as well as to work out the educational features of the campaign. Dr. Tanner, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, was present and accepted the responsibility of getting the program under way.

proposition, and emphasized the fact that he is the kind of man the city needs, and put Mr. Clark in nomination.

Mr. T. M. Johnston was nominated also, and agreed to serve in the interest of the citizens. This fills the vacancies made when Mr. Dabney and Mr. Grisham refused to run. Mr. Judkins stated that "we are not fighting corporations, but trying to bring about a cheaper gas rate of this gas corporation we now have in our city. The light company in Eastland is a corporation, but they willingly reduced their rates, and fell right in line with prices of other commodities, but all the while the gas situation grows more depressing."

Mr. Grisham, Mr. Judkins and Mr. Dabney all offered their services in behalf of the city any time needed and their good will goes with the movement. They say that all three candidates nominated at these meetings are of the same mind and accord, have the right views of the matter and are ready to work.

Mr. Dabney stated that "the gas company does not have a representative who is a home owner in the city of Eastland. They send money gatherers down here the first of the month to gather up all they can, take it to other cities. The heart and soul of the gas company is elsewhere."

Mr. Judkins said before adjourning the meeting that "if any other nominees appear on the ticket other than M. McCullough, T. M. Johnston and Alex Clark they are put there by the gas company, and will not represent the people. About five or six years ago when this gas company was trying to get in here, there was an election and the gas company went to neighboring communities and brought in voters under the pretence that it was only a "straw vote" and got more than 40 outsiders to vote. If any one votes illegally in this election I will go as far as the law will

allow to prosecute that person." There will be another mass meeting held in the County Court Room on Monday night, April 6th. The whole citizenship of Eastland city is requested to attend.

BAPTIST CHURCH NEWS

There were one hundred and thirty-one additions to the church during the two weeks' revival campaign which closed on last Sunday night. Seventy-four joined for baptism and fifty-seven joined by letter and restoration.

Evangelist C. Y. Dossey, who conducted the revival proved to be a forceful and effective preacher. He won the hearts of his hearers from the very first service. His messages were clear cut and did not compromise at any point, yet they were clean and wholesome and not of the extreme sensational type.

The revival crowds grew from the very first service. During the second week the lower floor overflowed and many had to be seated in the balcony each night except the one night when the weather was unfavorable. On Sundays the crowds taxed the capacity of the new church building as all available space was filled with chairs.

The Sunday school has rolled up a new attendance record each Sunday this year when the weather has been favorable. But on the last two Sundays we have gone beyond all expectations with five hundred and eight present for the closing day of the revival. The average for the entire five Sundays of March was four hundred and seventy-five.

Sunday, April 10th is to be a great fellowship day. At the morning service the right hand of fellowship will be extended

to the one hundred and thirty one new members. It is planned to have six hundred present for the Sunday school. All are requested to come early that a picture of the Sunday school may be made at 9:40. This Sunday marks the 3rd anniversary of the coming to Eastland of the present pastor.

Another baptismal service will be held on Sunday night. Twenty of the seventy-four still remain to be baptized. Others are expected to join for baptism on Sunday morning. Let the entire membership be present Sunday night for the pastor's 3rd anniversary message and the baptismal service.

The Eastland church was host to the quarterly meeting of the Associational B. Y. P. U. on Sunday afternoon. About three hundred were present for this meeting.
