RESIDENTS IN OTHER states apparently share the problem that we in the Panhandle area of Texas have inherited due to the "one man, one vote" concept—more taxation and less representation.

This week we read that residents of two small islands off the coast of Massachusetts, Martha's Vineyard and Nantucket, have found themselves slighted in that state's recent redistricting and realignment of their state legislature.

A state referendum passed in 1974 in Massachusetts trimmed the state legislature from 240 to 160 members. Nantucket, which has a year-around population of 6,000, and Martha's Vineyard, with a population of 8,000 found themselves lumped with a mainland district, although this district has no direct ferry connections with the islands.

So, in January, local leaders decided to dramatize their problem by voting to secede from the state, and posing the idea that they might even establish an independent nation.

Last week, the island leaders marched into the statehouse in Boston, and unfurled a flag proudly exhibiting a seagull, and declared themselves independent of the motherland of Massachusetts.

Neighboring state governors of Vermont, Connecticut and Rhode Island got into the act by offering to annex the two islands, if Massachusetts didn't want them.

State leaders called the islanders' action absurd, while grappling for a solution to the problem. But historians point out that residents of these islands can't be taken lightly. After all, they point out, Martha's Vineyard joined Massachusetts in 1692 only after seceding from New York!

So, watch out, Austin. We could secede, you know.

THE RECENT RASH of plane crashes have raised new questions about the comparative safety of air travel.

Although you might have thought otherwise, the number of plane crashes is not increasing. In 1976, the U.S. airline industry had the fewest accidents in its history, and the lowest number of fatalities in 20 years, even though a record 2.5 billion miles were logged and the number of passengers hit an all-time high of 220 million.

Private and corporate airplanes have a lesser safety record than the commercial flights, and this explains why you hear about more crashes involving small planes.

But, according to the latest travel statistics, flying commercially is still ten times as safe as driving, based on deaths per miles of travel. However, compared to trains and buses, flying is a bit more risky, the figures show.

The two jumbo jets which crashed in the Canary Islands on March 27 and claimed more than 575 lives, involved charter flights. Figures were not readily available on charter flights versus regularly scheduled flights, but it could appear that such flights are more risky.

Also, figures released by the London Sunday Times indicate that foreign airlines are apparently less safe than those in the United States. The study showed that the U.S. airlines were four times as safe as the world average, and 25 times as safe as airlines in Eastern Europe. The reason cited was the U.S. safety standards which are stricter and more stringently enforced.

Foreign countries, it was pointed out, usually adopt each new American safety standard, but not until several years after it has been in force in the U.S.

Close Vote Marks City Council Race

A moderate turn-out of city citizens cast 252 ballots Saturday in designating their choices for two vacancies on the City Council.

Rouel Barron was the recipient of the highest number of votes for any council candidate with 127, and Fred W. O'Hair also was elected, receiving 100 votes.

Ken Horn, running to succeed himself, was given the nod by 72 balloters, while Norma Whitten collected 94 votes; Radford Venable, 41; Jim Carey, 34, and Dwain Nance, 27.

Dickie Garner was the write-in choice of one voter. Billy Whitecotton, whose term of office also expired this month, chose not to be a candidate.

The 252 votes were 29 short of the 281 cast in the 1976 elections, when three councilmen and a mayor were chosen, and 35 less than the record 287 who participated in the electoral process in 1970.

Barron and O'Hair will join holdover councilmen Vernon Estes, Bedford Caldwell and Dickie Clayton on the council when the new members are sworn in at the regular council meeting on Thursday night.

Estes, Caldwell and Clayton each have one year remaining on two-year terms, as does Mayor Tom Bonds.

Jay Sherrill, Jr., served as election judge with Mrs. Donna Roming and Mrs. Lou Nuttall assisting as clerks.

The election was held at the American Legion Hall. Warm, soft winds prevailed until near dark, following Friday's blustery, dust-laden weather.

Vandalism Noted In Sheriff Report

Parmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace has reported that several incidents of vandalism occurred in Farwell on recent Friday and Saturday nights.

The destruction involved two occupied dwellings, two vacant houses, an apartment complex under construction, which received damage in excess of \$800, and the breaking of seven street lights encircling Farwell schools.

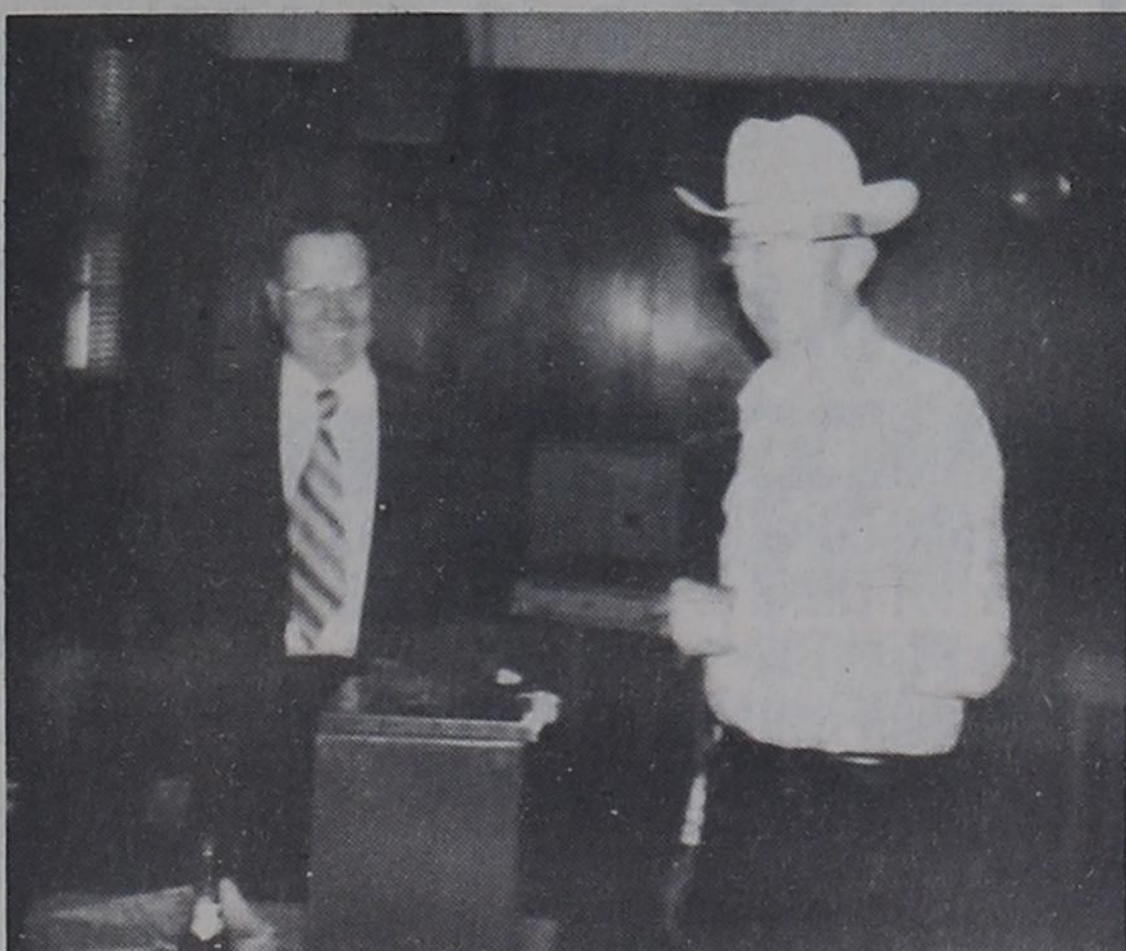
Dwight Whitaker, Friona, reported to the sheriff's office the loss of a planter box from his farm 3 1/2 miles east of Bovina.

Several residents of Texico and Farwell complained of having recently received obscene phone calls.



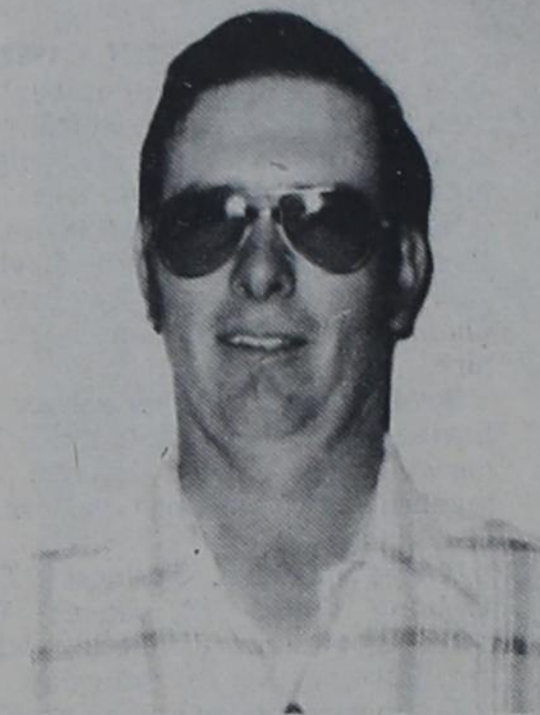
CASTING BALLOT...P.O. Dixon, left, is shown depositing his ballot at the school election here Saturday,

Good Turnout In School Vote

Three hundred, seventy-one persons cast ballots on Saturday, April 2, in the school trustee election, returning one incumbent and electing two new trustees to the board of Bovina Independent School District.

The 371 total was considerably below the 423 votes counted in 1976 and 58 ballots under the all-time record 429 returns of 1975.

However, it was only the sixth time 300 or more electors marked ballots in a school election—in 1976, 423; 1975, 429; 1970, 360; 1966, when 320 voters defeated a \$600,000 school board proposal; and in 1964, 300 voters cast ballots.

Re-elected to another three-year term, James Clayton led all candidates, receiving 278 votes, followed by Keith Garner, 200, and Tom Ware, 199. Ware eked out a

two-vote victory over Jon Lin Riddle, who garnered 197 votes.

The results for other candidates: Don Spring, 138; Laurence Kriegel, 40; Dale Berggren, 33.

Holdover board members are C.C. Naegle and Earl Whitten.

Leslie McCain was the election judge with Don Murphy serving as his assistant, and Mrs. Pat Sherrill and Mrs. Ernestina Minter acting as election clerks.

The next regular school board meeting will be held on Thursday, April 14, at which time the new members will take the oath of office and the board will be organized for the coming year.

This meeting will be a combined business-dinner meeting for hold-over and new members and their wives.

Her alternate is Christine Vargas, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Vidal Vargas.

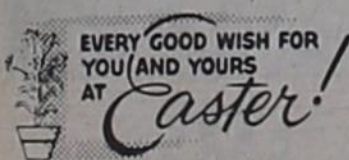
These girls were selected with advice of principal and faculty of Bovina High School. The selections are made on the basis of leadership, character, integrity and scholarship.

AGRI-FACTS

Econometricians are coming to the American farm. The rush to the farm is caused by the unusual price fluctuations farm commodities have been through during the past few years. What an econometrician tries to do is build a computer model of the world situation for a particular commodity... like wheat. He puts into the computer all data on wheat crops... how much is planted... where it is planted... what affects yield, etc. Then after hundreds of facts are in place the fun really begins with suppositions of actions and reactions. If the price drops 20 cents a bushel, how much will be stored rather than sold? how much will be deleted from plantings? and so on. Most major agricultural companies are already subscribing to one of the econometric forecasting services and some are now being planned for use by individual producers.

Health Fair Held Tuesday In Friona

A "Parmer County Health Fair," sponsored by Parmer County Family Living Committee and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, was held at the Community Center in Friona on Tuesday, April 5.

Exhibits were provided by the State Health Department; Lung Association; Heart Association; Hi-Plains Eye Bank; Arthritis Foundation; Extension Service; Texas Department of Public Safety; Diabetes Association; March of Dimes; and Central Plains Mental Health-Mental Retardation Center.

Families are often faced with stressful situations for which they have no immediate solutions. Tension or stress may be the result of changes in the normal routine. Illness or death, disagreement with a loved one and financial worries, even vacations and holiday seasons cause some tension for families.

"Facing the problem squarely and evaluating what is happening is the best way for families to cope effectively with a stressful situation," says County Extension Agent Jana Pronger.

Family stress is one of a number of topics to be explored in a one-day program for the public at St. John's United Methodist Church in Lubbock, April 21.

Entitled "The Family Living With Change--The Early Years," the event is being sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in cooperation with the South Plains Development Program family living task force.

Five phases of the family's early years will be studied, according to Jana Pronger. They include pre-marriage (concepts of dating), marriage, pregnancy, in-law relationships, and living with children.

Dr. Frederick Mears of Texas Eastern University psychology department in Tyler is featured speaker, says Miss Pronger. His presentations will focus on changes within the family that lead to stress and how to cope with them.

The program, which is from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., will include exhibits by several Lubbock service agencies who are also participating in the workshops.

"The family today is bombarded by one crisis after another, no matter what their economic or educational status is," says Miss Pronger. Stressful situations break up families and even lead to physical illness, and, if widespread enough, will eventually harm the basic structure of our society.

"This program will help the individual to cope with the early years of the family from pre-marriage to establishing in-law relationships," Miss Pronger adds.

She says community leaders across the South Plains are making

plans to bring delegations to the program. Sponsors believe 400 to 500 people will attend.

The program is one of a three-year series of meetings on family relationships. Next year's program will emphasize dealing with changes of the family during the middle years, and the third year will emphasize family changes during the late years.

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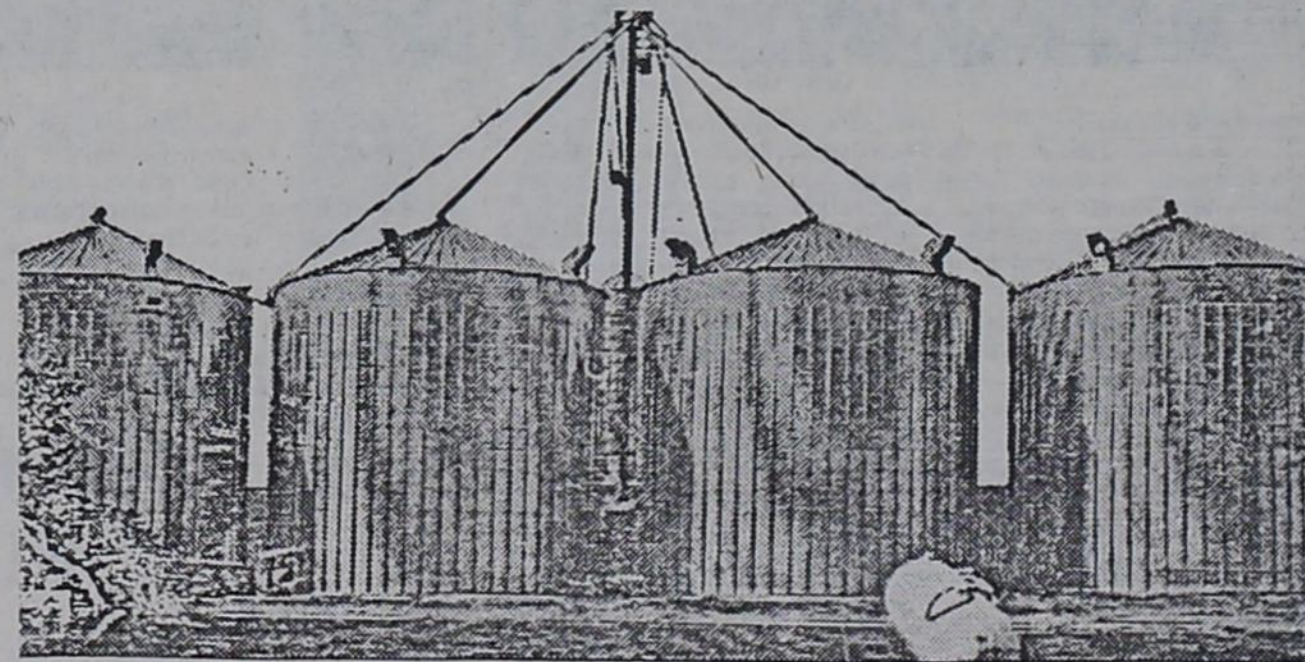

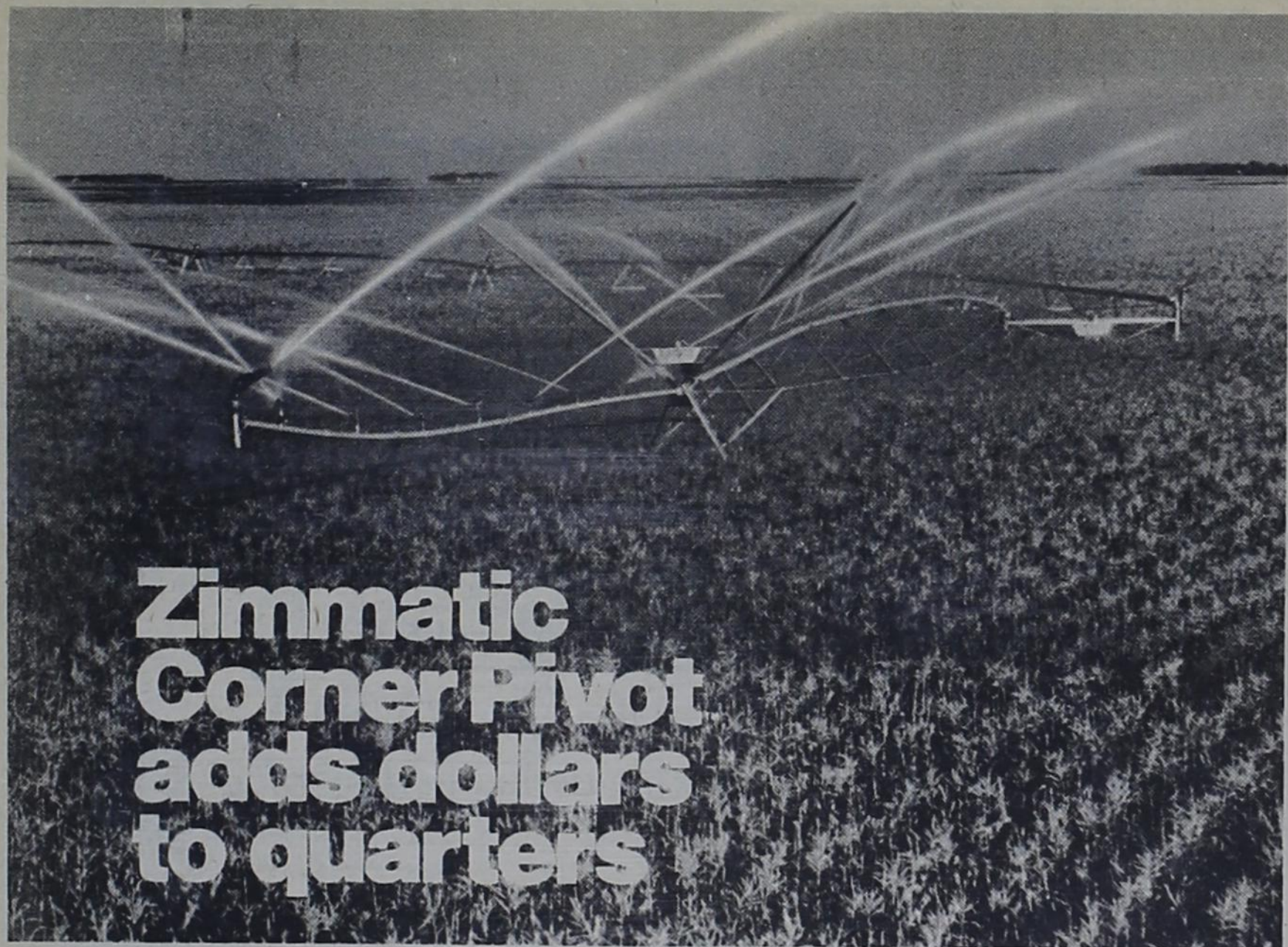

 1 teaspoon baking powder 1 tablespoon vinegar
 1 teaspoon salt 1/2 cups milk

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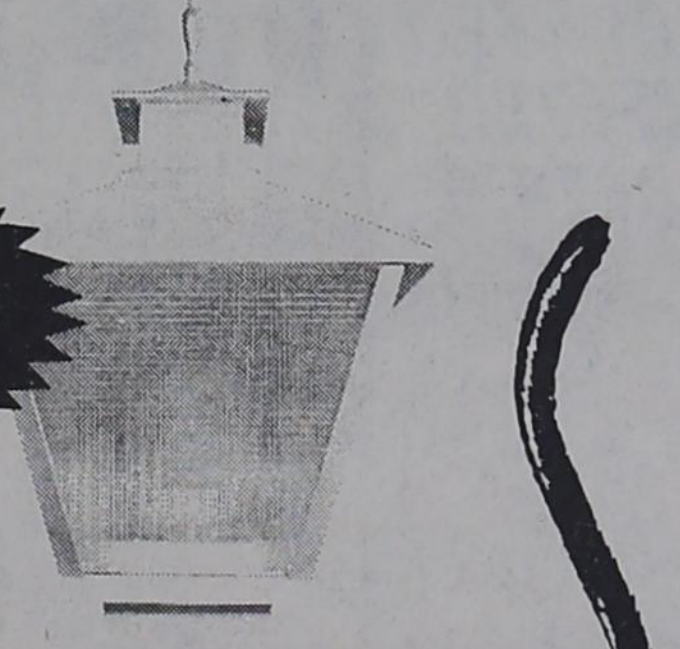
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
