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## City To Be Out Of Water In Few Weeks, Says Mayor

### Frank A. Jones To Join Staff Of Eastland Record

Frank A. Jones, Eastland newspaperman since 1911 with the exception of five and a half years during which he was postmaster here, will join the staff of the Eastland County Record Monday, Jan. 17.

Jones, whose experience on local newspapers began when Eastland was a small village and has taken him through a boom, depression, two wars and two post-war eras, will serve on The Record in an all-around capacity, and will handle news, advertising, and subscriptions.

Henry G. Vermillion, publisher and editor of the newspaper, will remain in that capacity.

During his long career as an Eastland newspaperman, Jones has been correspondent for many of the larger newspapers and press associations, and will continue his connections with the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, Dallas News, Associated Press, Abilene Reporter-News, and others.

During his years in Eastland, Jones has seen and recorded many big stories, including the finding of Old Rip in the courthouse cornerstone, the Santa Claus bank robbery, and the biggest story of them all, the oil boom that followed the first World War.

He will take next week off, Jones said, to rest and to attend to some personal affairs.

### 43 Miles Of Terrace Lines Laid Out By Cooper During 1948

Among other things in 1948, County Agent J. M. Cooper ran 43 miles of terrace lines on 30 different farms in Eastland County, his records for the year reveal.

Of the 43 miles, 27 miles have been constructed, and benefits paid by the Eastland County P.M.A., said Emmett Powell, P.M.A. administrator. However, there also were other terraces completed and paid for during the year by the P.M.A., Powell said.

Copper said that because of the drouth, many miles of the lines he ran will not be completed until rains loosen the tightly packed earth, and he also said that many of the terraces are being constructed this winter.

Most of the terraces, Cooper said, are of the wide base type, from 36 to 45 feet wide. County machinery under the supervision of the county commissioners has been used on most of the jobs, he said.

### Sidelssues

The Eastland water supply problem is acute indeed, as stories in The Record have been pointing out it would be if no rain fell, and this writer's feeling, aside from alarm at the lack of an appreciable water supply, is one of sympathy for Mayor Dan Childress and City Commissioners A. J. Blevins, Jr., Spike Uffelman, W. W. Linkenhogor and Herman Rushing, who are confronted with the task of meeting the public demands for water in some way.

Being a city official in a small town is a thankless task at best, but it is particularly trying at times of acute crisis, when the elected officials are open targets for criticism on all sides.

And in this case, this is so despite the fact that our Eastland officials quite obviously had nothing at all to do with the fact that it has rained very little for the past two years.

Heard that song, "Water, water, clear, cool water," on the radio the other day and the thought popped up that scores of West Texas towns and cities might adopt it as their official song.

Certainly thoughts and conversations along that line have been occupying the brains and tongues of a lot of citizens in this area for quite some months, and there are few years when there is not an area or two here or there in the western part of the state that is not drouth-ridden.

Most Eastland merchants have been pleasantly surprised at the volume of business they have been doing since Christmas.

A great many of them expected customers to disappear after the Christmas rush was over, but it hasn't worked out that way.

Which isn't an unhealthy sign for a town that has been riding two years of drouth, as previously mentioned.

Maybe the oil drilling activity in this area is helping after all.

And have you heard of the most recent acute housing shortage in Eastland?

Of course there was a housing shortage right after the war, as there was all over the country, and it has continued to a degree all the time since.

But several months back you could rent an apartment of some kind any day you wanted to, and houses to rent were not impossible to find, if you were willing to pay the price.

But it isn't that way now. The apartments and houses have been filled, and there are people looking every day for places to live, just as they were two or three years ago.

My own guess is that the Concrete Matreials Company's rock job at Carbon is having something to do with the situation, but I really don't know.

Jack Muirhead, always a ready man with a joke, was pulling one this week on his friends around Eastland.

He would mention straight-facedly to the employer of a woman, "I hear you had to let Miss (or Mrs.) so-and-so go."

The friend almost always would deny it, and ask who said that.

"Oh," Muirhead would reply, "a fellow told me she screamed and you had to let her go."

Then he would confess that the gag had been on a radio program he heard, and he thought it was funny.

Some of his friends, who entered into the gag quite unexpectingly, were not so amused.

Or at least not until they tried it on their friends.

### Judge Collings Joins Court Here; Purchases Home

Judge Cecil Collings of Big Spring, newly elected to the 11th Court of Civil Appeals in Eastland, took his place on the bench this week and contracted to buy a home here to move his family to Eastland.

Judge Collings spoke Tuesday to the Eastland Lions Club under the program chairmanship of John Osborne, and after some amusing remarks of which Judge Milburn Long of the appeals court here was the principal object—Judge Collings said they had grown up together in the same neighborhood—the new Eastland jurist made some remarks on the functions of a service club such as the Lions organization is.

Judge Collings stressed that no such club would get the most out of its existence without rendering definite and continuing service to the town in which it existed.

Judge Collins has contracted to buy the Neil Day home on South Daugherty Street, and Day will move to a new home he is preparing for occupancy.

The new Day home will be one of the converted Camp Bowie buildings moved here last year. It also is on South Daugherty, and is the one of the buildings closest to the present Day home.

Day has estimated it will take him about two weeks to get the house completed and ready for occupancy, and he will deliver his present home over to Judge Collings then.

In the meanwhile, the judge is housed in the Connellee Hotel.

His wife and his father, Rev. J. L. Collings of Abilene, a Primitive Baptist preacher, will move to Eastland when he obtains occupancy of his new home.

Rev. Mr. Collings has been in ill health, and recently was made a widower by the death of his wife.

Judge Collings succeeds Judge Leonard Gray of Brownwood on the appeals court bench.

Judge Gray holds the unique distinction of having served a full term and a portion of another on the Eastland bench without having ever been elected to the judgeship.

He originally was appointed to the court on the death of the late Chief Justice Leslie, and later was appointed to serve the term of the late Judge Miller of Brownwood, who was elected but who died before he took office.

### Campaign Opened On Electrical Sales

J. W. McAnally, formerly of Big Spring, has been named division engineer for the Texas Electric Service Company at Eastland, replacing W. G. Marquardt, who will become head of the company's Fort Worth transmission division Feb. 1.

McAnally took over his duties here this week and plans to move his wife and young son here soon. He has been connected with the electric company at Big Spring since receiving his degree at Texas Tech, and during the war was communications officer in the Air Force.

Marquardt became division engineer here last spring when W. D. Maddrey, formerly of Eastland, was transferred to Fort Worth to set up the company's transmission division. Marquardt again will replace Maddrey, who recently has been promoted to Texas Electric's general office as assistant to O. S. Hockaday, superintendent of transmission.

Maddrey will take over his new duties soon after Marquardt assumes his new job with the company in Fort Worth.

### Low Mark Of 18 Is Recorded Here

Eastland's lowest temperature of the season was recorded Wednesday morning at the Leon Power Plant when the thermometer hit a bottom of 18 degrees.

The reading was a degree lower than the previous seasonal low, recorded over a month ago.

Cessation of the north wind that brought the temperature drop caused warmer weather Wednesday afternoon and Thursday, and a continuation of the milder temperatures was forecast for Friday.

And as usual, there was no hint of any rain being in the offing for this area.

Mrs. Eugene Hickman has been appointed Eastland chairman for the annual March of Dimes campaign, and revealed Thursday that her Special Gifts Committee already has raised \$374.50 for the drive here.

Mrs. Charles Cline is chairman of the committee.

Other local chairmen named so far include Mrs. R. D. Estes, of the West Ward School drive, and Mrs. Charles Butler, of the South Ward School drive.

The county drive is for \$5500, with Joe Collins of Eastland, new county treasurer, as chairman for the county. Eastland's part of the county total is about \$1400.

Mrs. Hickman said that a March of Dimes fund-raising dance will be held this year, with the date, place, and other details to be announced later.

Jars for contributions in any amounts have been placed in business houses and other places so the public may join in the giving, Mrs. Hickman pointed out.

Collins has pointed out that the campaign is particularly important in Eastland County this year because the county chapter's funds for fighting infantile paralysis are completely exhausted, and the chapter had to borrow from the national organization last year to keep up the treatment of cases of polio that developed in the county.

Of funds raised, half is kept by the county chapter and half goes to the national foundation for research, and for use in fighting epidemics that arise in the nation, such as the one in Texas in 1948.

### Robertson Services Held At Sapulpa

Funeral services for Floyd F. Robertson of Eastland, who was found dead at his home in Hillcrest Friday of last week, were held Monday at Sapulpa, Okla., in the First Baptist Church, of which he was a member. Military services were held at the graveside.

Death of Mr. Robertson, who had been in ill health for many years, was ruled a suicide by Justice of the Peace E. E. Wood.

Mr. Robertson had stayed at home while members of the family went to town for a while. He was found in the family garage on their return, hanging by a rope.

Officers and a doctor were summoned, and artificial respiration and other revival methods were used for about two hours without effect. It was later found that Mr. Robertson's neck had been broken.

Mr. Robertson was gassed in the first World War, in which he fought in seven major battles overseas.

He was married to Mrs. Robertson, now manager of Altman's Store in Eastland, in 1928.

Three children also survive, Mrs. Henry Lindsay of Henderson, Nev., Mrs. Marian Middleton of Eastland, and Floyd, Jr., two years old. There also are four grandsons.

### Lake Eastland Level Near Lowest Intake

Lack of a quorum at the meeting of the Eastland City Commission Thursday night prevented any conclusive action on the city's water supply problem.

However, Carl Butler was authorized to clean out some old wells below the Lake Eastland dam in an effort to find at least a partial water supply for the city in the event the lake level falls too low.

Eastland's city water supply in Lake Eastland is rapidly running out, and unless heavy rains fall in the next three or four weeks, the city will be virtually out of water, Mayor Dan Childress said this week.

Members of the City Commission were to consider the water problem at a meeting Thursday night, and it appeared probable that restrictive measures to limit the use of water would be instituted by the commission. Possible measures would be bans against use of city water for washing cars, watering gardens and lawns, and other purposes considered non-essential for the preservation of health.

Childress said the level of Lake Eastland was only about 50 inches above the lowest intake valve, and the level is falling about an inch a day.

In theory, that would leave enough water for about 50 days of use, and then some at the lake level below the bottom valve.

But Childress pointed out that as the lake recedes, the shore line diminishes, and that actually the level falls faster and faster if use is the same.

Hopes were high recently for an auxiliary water supply when old wells at the south end of Bassett Street were cleaned out and furnished a big supply of potable and soft water.

But as the pumps continued, salt water intruded, and this week the water was almost pure brine.

It was theorized that old oil wells in the neighborhood that had not been plugged properly had allowed the salt water to intrude into the water sand.

The same thing has happened to hundreds of water wells in Eastland County since the wild oil booms of 25 years or so ago, it was said.

Childress said that it is believed that a good supply of water can be obtained by drilling fairly deep wells in the area below the dam at Lake Eastland. But the drilling, the pipe, and the pumping would be expensive for a city government that is struggling for money, he pointed out.

In any event, such a project would yield enough water for only an hour or two's use a day, Childress believes.

The Eastland water situation was the most critical since the city ran out of water in the early 1930's and water was pumped into the city mains from the Leon Lake, which supplies the power plant with water.

That source no longer would be practical to use, Childress said, and anyway, he said, the water from the Leon Lake then was not fit to use. He pointed out that the city sewer system opens into the Leon River above the head of the lake.

A possible emergency water supply solution would be shipping in water from somewhere, as Coleman has been shipping water by rail from Lake Brownwood for more than a year.

However, the nearest possible rail supply point to Eastland would likely be Fort Worth or Abilene, and the water would be quite expensive after it was put into the city mains here.

Coleman users have been paying \$2 a thousand gallons, and even at that rate it was figured that the City of Coleman was losing \$100 a day on the project, a figure that Eastland could not stand losing for many days.

Ranger was in, if possible, even worse shape than Eastland on its water supply.

The Ranger city lake is extremely low, and city officials there last week forbade watering of lawns and gardens, and the washing of cars, under penalty of a fine, it was reported.

Meanwhile, county equipment was being used southeast of Ranger to try to impound the waters from seepage springs there to add to the city's depleted water supply.

Ranger city officials also were

discussing having to ship water in from somewhere.

Cisco was in somewhat better situation, although there was debate there about how long the Lake Cisco reserve would last.

There was nothing wrong with the water supplies of any of the towns that a good, hard rain would not solve, but it had been July since there was any runoff to speak of into any of the lakes, and that rain, ground-soaking though it was, added only a few inches to the level of Lake Eastland.

Childress said that various former officials of Eastland, and other people, have been saying that there still was plenty of water in Lake Eastland for a long time.

But last week Al LeClaire of the city water department and City Commissioner Linkenhogor covered the lake in a boat and made actual measurements of the water depth at various points, he said.

And the daily gauging of the water depth at the intake does not lie, the mayor said.

Co-operation of all the citizens of Eastland in saving water is the only way to prolong the Lake Eastland supply appreciably, it was pointed out.

Most persons could easily halve their use of water without endangering health or even being too inconvenient.

Members of the Eastland Quarterback Club will meet at 7:30 p. m. next Tuesday in the Eastland High School gymnasium for the election of new officers, it was announced this week.

The meeting had been scheduled originally for Tuesday of this week, but was postponed in deference to the Lions Club program featuring Birch the Magician.

E. M. Pritchard, resident engineer for the State Highway Department, has been president of the Quarterback Club for the past year.

The current club project is completion of the field house and dressing room building at the south end of Maverick Field, a project begun last year but not completed in time for the football season and which has been stationary since.

### Hammers Move Into New Eastland Home

The old Pecos River bridge, subject of poems, songs and Roy Bean yarns, is doomed. The work of demolition is underway or may even be completed.

A new bridge has been built and the old one has been unused for several years.

J. C. Carter, executive assistant for public relations for the Southern Pacific Railway, has made a study of the old structure, which was built in 1892 and was in service till 1944.

A large salvage firm bought the old bridge.

Cowboys, to avoid the long ride down into and up out of the canyon, used to ride their horses across the high bridge. A young and pretty woman, "Pecos Kate," rode across, and when a suitor was too faint-hearted to follow, she rejected him—or so the song says.

Trains used to stop so that passengers could take in the view. Far below was a tiny trickle of silver—the Pecos river. On its bank were even smaller objects, hardly discernible—they were cows.

While the bridge was under construction, a scaffolding broke and seven men plunged to the boulders below. Judge Roy Bean rode over from Langtry to hold the inquest. The bodies were lying in a row. He instructed the jury to return a verdict that "these here seven men met their death by falling from the bridge."

One juror spoke up, "But, Judge, one of them ain't dead."

"Well," said Old Roy, "he will die and I ain't gonna ride 14 miles on a soreback mule to hold another inquest. Officially and legally, he is dead."

The jury so found—and two days later, the seventh victim did pass away.

The old bridge is part of the story of the Southwest. Many old-timers will hate to hear that it is gone.
