## ABOUT 62,000 FORD PLANT WORKERS WALK OUT AT NOON

DETROIT, May 5 (UP)—The CIO United Auto Workers union struck the Ford Motor Company today in a walkout that could close Ford's industrial empire and idle a total of 135,200 workers in 33 cities within three weeks. About 62,200 workers began a strike at Ford's River Rouge and Lincoln-Mercury Assembly and Manufacturing plants shortly before noon, EST, in protest against alleged "speedup." More than 59,000 of the strikers are from the key River Rouge Plant which sprawls over 1,076 acres along the Detroit River.

The walkout came after failure of company executives and union officials, headed by International President Walter Reuther, to effect a settlement in last minute negotiations.

As the strike word flashed through the plants, workers dropped their tools and streamed out of the shops. Some of the first out came from the "B" building where the speedup at Riv Rouge was alleged.

Strikers quickly established a picket line at Gate No. 4, main entry to the River Rouge plant. They carried signs saying: "Ford is on strike."

Meanwhile, John S. Bugas, Ford vice president in charge of industrial relations, came out of the negotiation session in a downtown office building and said the union and company had not been able to reach an accord. Minutes after the strike started, a large group of pickets massed at Gate No. 4 turned away an automobile that attempted to enter the plant.

At 12:05 P. M. EST, a company official said "the strike is on," then he returned to his office. A company spokesman said the negotiations would continue. About 30,000 workers were on duty in the River Rouge Plant when the strike began. The remainder of the 59,000 production workers at the plant are on night shifts.

In addition to the 62,200 strikers and thousands of maintenance employees, Ford has 46,100 production workers in its other plants across the nation. The River Rouge and Lincoln-Mercury plants supply these plants with parts. The halting of 1,600-foot Ford assembly line and 1,100-foot Lincoln-Mercury line cut off daily production of 4,700 automobiles and trucks. Pickets massed at the gates of the 1,075 acre River Rouge plant, with signs denouncing the "speedup."

It was the first major strike against Ford since 1941 when the UAW struck for nine days and won bargaining recognition. Ford dealers throughout the nation faced the threat of empty showrooms. A company spokesman said dealers had an average of two and one half cars on hand. There is no factory backlog. The walkout could force shutdown of Ford plants in 33 cities in a week to three weeks.

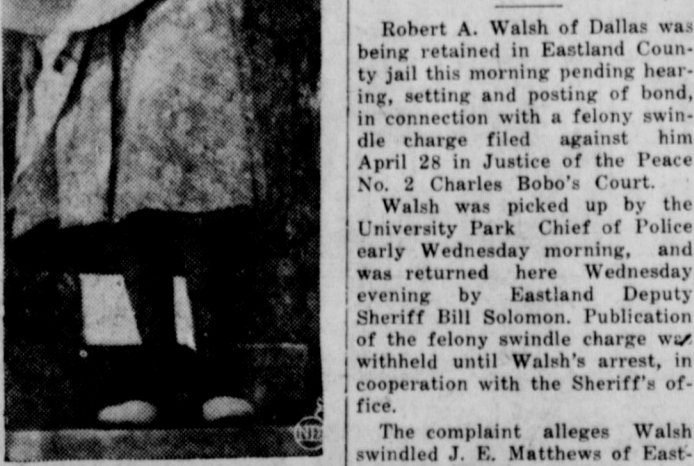
## Texas Wheat Prospects Good

AMARILLO, May 5 (UP)—Prospects are good for a wheat harvest of 90,000,000 bushels or more in Texas this season. This is the opinion of Frank White of Dallas, representative of a milling firm, who told the 33rd annual convention of the Panhandle Grain and Feed Dealers yesterday that prospects were much brighter than a year ago.

He hinged his forecast for 90,000,000, to 95,000,000 bushels on a big "if"—if no serious unforeseen factors intrude. The Texas harvest last year was 56,000,000 bushels, but the bumper year of 1947 saw reaping of 124,000,000 bushels. White said there had been no reports thus far of rust or bug damage in the Panhandle.

H. B. Hindley of Tulsa was elected president of the association. Other officers included R. L. McCellan of Spearman, vice president; Joe S. Morris of Amarillo, secretary-treasurer; and directors O. D. Dinwiddie of Hart, Earl Rife of Stratford, J. A. Pittman of Hereford, L. V. Nelson of Claude and H. J. Hughes of Panhandle.

## SHANGHAI SENDS FORCES TO AID KASHING DEFENSE

SHANGHAI, May 5 (UP)—The Shanghai garrison headquarters threw a division of reinforcements to the battle for Kashing today to stem a Communist drive up the railroad toward Shanghai's southwest defenses. The Nationalist troops dug in on a short semi-circular defense line five miles west of Kashing, which is 50 miles southwest of Shanghai, to meet the Communist assault.

Telephone reports from Kashing said the sound of artillery and rifle fire was audible from the north and west. Troops on Shanghai's western perimeter 12 miles from downtown began chopping down groves of trees in the swanky Hungjao residential area to build tank traps and blockhouses.

These defenses apparently were intended to help stop the Communists on the southwest approaches if they should break through the Kashing line. The troops also tore down bamboo fences, converting the slats into sharply pointed stakes. These they planted in clusters in the fields, apparently to obstruct infantry movement.

The afternoon communique by the Shanghai-Woosung garrison headquarters said two Communist columns numbering several thousands were defeated in the Taichang area northeast of Kunshan, 25 miles west of Shanghai on the Nanking rail line.

The exodus from Shanghai slowed up today, with airlines reporting that the rush to leave is falling off. But the economic situation continued to deteriorate. Operation of the public utility system was threatened with a breakdown as a result of mounting internal pressures caused by the Communist siege.

More difficulties were created for the Nationalist defenders yesterday when Shanghai's biggest fire in years destroyed 4,000 "mat shed" houses near the city's inner western defense perimeter and made more than 20,000 homeless.

## Old Rip VI Has First Workout

First workout was had this morning by Old Rip VI, Eastland's famed horned toad which will be entered in the thirteenth annual California Horned Toad Derby at Coalinga, Cal., May 21, it was announced by Bob Moore, official trainer.

Moore, who resides in an upstairs apartment at 305 North Daugherty, reported he took the toad for a romp up and down the stairs early this morning to build up the leg muscles of the toad. The Eastland Chamber of Commerce entry in the derby is a direct descendant of Old Rip I, who lived after being entombed for 31 years.

After a week of training, old Rip VI will be shipped via air mail to California, where a welcoming committee will be on hand to greet Eastland's derby entry.

## ONE FOR RIFLEY Fowl 'Fouls Up' McKelvain Car On Local Street

Turner McKelvain of Olden had his Anglia (English) Ford car stall on an Eastland street early Wednesday afternoon. McKelvain got out, raised up the hood to look at the motor, and out jumped a brown leghorn hen. A check revealed the fowl had "fouled up" the spark plug wires, causing the engine to stall.

Adjusting the plug wires, McKelvain loaded up the chicken, started the motor and went on down the street. An employe of E. P. Stephens Typewriter Co. of Eastland, McKelvain has no idea how the chicken got in the motor unless it crawled up in there from the ground and rode from his home, located seven miles away, into Eastland.

## 91ST DISTRICT JURY FINDS NO NEGLIGENCE IN ACCIDENT

After a deliberation of 25 hours, a 91st District Court jury made a return in favor of the defendants in a civil suit filed by Patsy Nance and others against Wesley Isenhower and others, all of Cisco asking \$100,000 in damages as result of an automobile accident. With 63 special issues to consider, the jury found the defendants were not negligent in the accident and plaintiffs were not entitled to recover damages.

Judge George L. Davenport's formal judgment in the suit, is pending filing of a motion for same defendant's attorneys. Judge Davenport stated this morning it was expected the motion would be filed within the next couple of days, with the judgment to be based on the findings of the jury.

The jury went into session Tuesday at 1 o'clock, following eight and one-half days of trial, and brought in their return Wednesday at 2 P. M. A previous trial of the case in 1948 resulted in a "hung jury". The suit resulted from an accident in Cisco in November, 1947, in which Miss Nance was an occupant of a vehicle being operated by Mary Poe of Cisco, which was involved in a collision with a vehicle operated by Isenhower.

Miss Nance, attractive young girl, has been confined to a wheel chair since the accident and is permanently paralyzed from the chest down, according to physician's testimony in the trial. Isenhower is a student in Texas A. & M. College. The other youthful defendant in the case was Mary Poe of Cisco.

Parents of all the youths were involved in the complex civil suit. Jurors were: W. R. Burelson, and R. A. Brown, Desdemona; J. B. Mosley and C. J. Langhite, Olden; J. B. Caudle, Eastland; J. J. Barron and J. A. Holloway, Carbon; Wyatt Jacobs, F. A. Eason and John W. Love, Ranger; C. C. Cooper and R. F. Walton, Cisco.

The host of legal array for the parties involved in the proceedings were: Turner and Seaberry of Eastland and Willard K. White of Cisco, representing the Nances, plaintiffs; Claud Williams of the firm of Robertson, Jackson, Payne Lancaster and Walker of Dallas, and Carl Springer of Abilene represented the Isenhowers, defendants; John Alvis of the firm of Wagstaff, Harwell Wagstaff and Alvis of Abilene, and Earl Conner Sr., of the firm of Conner and Conner of Eastland, representing the Poes, defendants.

## Husband Denies Split With Ingrid

ROME, May 5 (UP)—Dr. Peter Lindstrom was quoted today as professing "indissoluble affection" for his actress wife, Ingrid Bergman, who has been reported romancing on the volcanic island of Stromboli with Roberto Rossellini, Italian movie director.

Newsman in Messina, Sicily, said Dr. Lindstrom told them neither he nor Miss Bergman intended to seek a divorce, since there was "no reason for dissension between us."

The Hollywood physician, who flew to Italy after reports of a Bergman-Rossellini romance circulated internationally, came back to Rome this morning. He eluded newsman as effectively as he did when he first arrived last Friday, and disappeared. Meanwhile Miss Bergman and Rossellini went back to work on Stromboli, filming the movie "After The Storm." The work had been suspended since Lindstrom arrived in Italy. The principals went to Messina for their meeting with Lindstrom.

Mrs. Dutton was a member of the Church of Christ. Survivors include the Rev. Dutton of Olden, another son Bill Dutton of DeLeon, and Mrs. White.

## Houston Doctor Killed In Crash

HOUSTON, Tex., May 5 (UP)—Dr. L. W. Raney, 77, died in a hospital here today, 20 minutes after his car collided with a truck at a busy intersection (Dennis and Smith). Dr. Raney received severe head injuries, hospital attendants reported. A traffic investigator said the Raney car bounced off the truck, jumped a curb and struck a woman pedestrian, breaking her leg. The truck driver was not hurt.

## SENATE FINANCE COMMITTEE LIFTS LID ON TEXAS SPENDING

AUSTIN, May 5—(UP)—The lid was off on spending in Texas today.

Senate finance committee members, meeting two and one-half hours late yesterday, approved expenditures that would put the state \$54,000,000 (M) in the red. They did not heed a warning from Gov. Beauford Jester who earlier had complained that \$50,000,000 (M) would be written off the wrong side of the State's ledger if something were not done about spending.

The \$50,000,000 figure, announced by the state comptroller, was based on expenditures already proposed, but not finally passed, as balanced against anticipated income during the next two years.

At the end of the meeting, which had been called to slash two major appropriation bills, Sen. Keith Kelly of Fort Worth said: "This is one meeting that I'm not proud of."

Approval was given to expenditures totaling \$126,449,138. They included:

\$51,549,138 — operation of state departments for the next two years.

\$65,400,000 — Appropriation for higher educational institutions of the state for the next two years.

\$4,954,000 — public junior college appropriation.

\$2,000,000 — creation of a medical branch of the University of Texas at Dallas.

\$1,000,000 — creation of a medical branch of the University of Texas at San Antonio.

\$500,000 — creation of a medical branch of the University of Texas at Temple.

\$5,000,000 — soil conservation.  
\$1,000,000 — creation of a Lamar Technological College at Beaumont.

\$400,000 — deficiency appropriation for Texas State University for Negroes at Houston.

The committee, headed by Sen. James E. Taylor of Kerens, tightened its purse strings on higher education and departmental bills, however.

Of the \$6,353,000 lopped off, \$2,300,000 was hacked from the departmental bill, while \$4,053,000 was cut from the higher education bill.

The higher education bill came out of sub-committee with \$8,300,000 shaved off, but committee members put back into the bill:

\$2,397,000 for the University of Texas School of Dentistry at Houston.

\$1,350,000 for atomic radiation research at the M. D. Anderson Cancer Hospital at Houston.

\$500,000 for expansion of the University of Texas Medical School at Galveston.

Although the committee met primarily to slash appropriations, it first approved the higher education loan and then added some \$4,000,000.

**To Learn Housekeeping**  
BEREA, O. (UP)—Baldwin-Wallace College plans to revive its course in home economics for men to aid harrassed fraternity house stewards who are having trouble balancing budgets and diets for their "brothers." The first unit in the course will include the study of nutrition, preparations of meals and food service.

## Jury Finds Giles Guilty In Death

BEAUMONT, May 5 (UP)—The jury in the District Henry murder trial of Robert Henry Giles, Jr., charged with shooting Elbert L. Langston, still was deliberating early today.

The case, which has attracted wide attention, went to the jury at 8:25 last night as the state demanded the death penalty for the 30-year-old defendant.

Giles took the witness stand yesterday and said he vaguely re-

membered incidents of the night of March 25 when Langston was slain in a rice field near Nome in Jefferson County.

Giles testified that he remembered shooting at someone that came near the auto in which he was sitting.

"It might have been Langston," Giles said. "It probably was. I believe I fired the pistol twice."

The prosecution promptly pointed out that the testimony was in antithesis to what he had told investigators the day after the slaying. Giles made a statement then that he could remember nothing of the previous

night's incidents. While on the witness stand, Giles told of going AWOL from the Army in the latter part of the war and said that he currently was free on bond from an indictment on charges of assault to murder at Houston.

A psychiatrist testified that Giles was a "constitutional psychopathic inferior."

Langston, 23, of Houston,

Giles and two other men spent a part of the night of March 25 in Beaumont beer halls.

William Earl Palham, one of the trio, has been charged in the murder case. However, the other member of the party, John Brunson, was no-billed and testified as a state's witness that Giles fired the fatal shots.


