US Tankman Uses Bazooka

With U. S. Eighth Army At The Front, Korea, July 13 (UP)—An American tankman fired his cannon repeatedly at a group of heavier, more powerfully armed North Korean tanks yesterday, but the shells just bounced off them.

The tankman, whose name must be withheld, jumped out of his tank, grabbed a bazooka from an infantryman and in a few seconds knocked out two tanks with point-blank fire at vulnerable spots.

A moment later, he was killed by North Korean machine-gun fire.

TOKYO, July 13 (UP)—Nearly 50 B-29 superfortresses blasted a key North Korean military target with 500 tons of bombs today in the mightiest single air blow of the Korean campaign.

Rat Control Program Starts In City Monday

A rat eradication program will be started in Eastland Monday under city ordinance No. 328, a recent control ordinance, I. C. Heck, city manager, has announced.

The ordinance calls for the prevention of the spread of ratborne diseases and infections by the elimination of insanitary conditions associated with such diseases, by the extermination of rats, and by ratproofing of structures and maintenance thereof in a ratproofed condition, and providing for penalties for the violation thereof.

V. A. Cross, representative of the State Health Department, made a report to the city commission on March 10, 1950, to the effect that he had made talks before the Rotary, Lions, Garden and Civic clubs with reference to the program, and that there were no negative votes on the rat eradication program, Heck stated.

12 Farm Boys To Scramble For 6 Heifers

Twelve qualified 4-H club boys and Future Farmers will scramble for six registered Jersey heifers on the second night of the Ranger Jaycee rodeo, Thursday, July 20.

Beverly Dudley, Jaycee committeeman, said that the boys would be picked on their qualifications for raising the stock.

Five of the calves were purchased by Ranger businessmen; the sixth calf is the produce of the calf that Floyd Woods won in last year's scramble.

Because of the value of the calves, the boys will scramble for pigs, marked by numbers. The pigs are greased.

On the third night of the rodeo, the boys that did not win calves the second night and additional qualified farm boys will scramble for six registered Duroc pigs.

Again stand-in pigs will be used.

C. W. and Rex M. Alworth of Ranger and Midland have completed a well in the new Dorward Field of Southeastern Garza county.

The well pumped 154.46 barrels of 39 gravity oil daily by a Railroad Commission potential test.

Production, Rex Alworth reported, is from the San Andres lime of the Permian zone at a depth of 2,540 feet. Top of the pay was at 2,448. The producing zone was treated with 5,000 gallons of acid.

Their offset well to the producer is drilling at 2,401. Additional locations are being staked.

MacArthur Reports Of 500 Casualties; Tells Other Losses

US Troops Praised For Heroic Holding Action By General Mac

TOKYO, Friday, July 14 (UP)—Columns of Communist tanks struck out for the mountain passes of Central Korea today in a flanking drive designed to slice in behind the American forces along the Kum river defense line before Taegon.

The North Korean push around the East flank of the Americans was reported by field dispatches and Gen. Douglas MacArthur's midnight communique.

24 Pilots Enlist For Korea Duty

LONG BEACH, Calif., July 13 (UP)—An entire squadron of 24 Navy reserve fighter pilots volunteered for active duty as a unit because "we long ago decided that we would stick together," their commander said today.

It was as simple as that, said Lieut. Commander Collin Oveland, 32-year-old leader of the reserve fighter squadron 781 based at Los Alamitos Naval Air Station here.

"We talked about it over beers many times," said Oveland, handsome auto salesman from San Diego, Calif. "We long ago decided that we would stick together."

Every one of the pilots in the squadron and six ground officers volunteered for carrier duty. In addition, 35 of the group's 70 enlisted men also volunteered.

Choate, Fair Spud In Gray 9 Miles North

Choate and Fair Drilling company of Cisco have spudded in the Gray No. 1, offset well to the Jackson well, located about nine miles North of Ranger.

The Jackson was recently completed as a substantial producer.

The Gray No. 1's location follows: 150 feet from the North and 150 feet from the East lines of the South 200 acres of section 79, block 4, TP railroad company survey in Stephens county.

Eastland Marine To Leave States

Gene Townsend, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lon Townsend who live near Eastland, is with the group of Marines reported to be leaving the United States today for the Korean War area.

Townsend joined the Marines in October 1948. The group is reported to be leaving from Camp Pendleton today.

Target, Schools' Window Panes Aim, Good; Cost, Taxpayer Money

The target for today and several days past seems to be the window lights in the various school buildings in the city, Ross Rucker, secretary of the school board has announced.

The aim has been very good, also, considering the damage done. In the South Ward School alone there are 141 window panes either broken, cracked, or that have holes in them.

At a replacement cost of about 65 cents per window, it will cost the taxpayers \$91.65 to replace windows in the one building alone. Three windows were smashed with large rocks (the rocks were lying underneath the windows on the inside) but the majority of the

"Enemy enveloping forces are attempting to negotiate the Taek mountain passes in an attempt to break through between Taegu and Taegon," MacArthur reported.

Such a breakthrough would cut the arterial transport lines between the Americans digging in along the Kum river and the big American entry port of Pusan on the Southeast coast.

U. S. Superforts struck the most powerful air blow of the Korean war. Nearly 50 of them showered 500 tons of bombs on an unidentified North Korean target.

Dirty weather in the battle area cut into the round-the-clock assault by American and Australian fighters on the Korean forces directly behind the lines.

MacArthur reported in a special statement that the United States had suffered fewer than 500 casualties so far in the war. They included 42 killed, 190 wounded and 256 missing. Many of the later were expected to turn up sooner or later.

"American ground units in Korea are fighting one of the most skillful and heroic holding actions in history," MacArthur said. The regular midnight communique, trailing well behind field reports, said American and South Korean forces "continued to withdraw before numerically superior forces to take up defenses behind prepared positions and natural barriers."

The main movement to which it referred was the U. S. withdrawal to the South bank of the Kum, a dozen miles North of Taegon.

It was after the positions in the U. S. sector were stabilized along the Kum that front reports said Communist troops, armor and artillery were reported wheeling Eastward to join the big scale flanking maneuver.

MacArthur reported that two Communist divisions, the fifth and 15th, were mauling South Korean forces around Chungju, 52 miles Northeast of Taegon. The South Koreans were falling back in the general area to the East of the U. S. positions.

Reinforcements believed to be Korean veterans from Manchuria are reported in Seoul, MacArthur reported.

Day Announces For Re-election To Tax Office

Neil Day, incumbent tax assessor and collector, has made the following statement of his qualifications:

"In announcing my candidacy for re-election to the office of Tax Assessor and Collector, I do so with the knowledge that this is one of the most important offices in Eastland County.

"This office has the responsibility of assessing and collecting your taxes and in this manner secures the necessary money for the operation of your County Government.

For those of you who do not know me personally, I was born and reared in Eastland county. I am 43 years of age, married the former Miss Jane Angstadt, and am a member of the First Christian Church in Eastland, father of 4 girls and 2 boys, served with the U. S. Navy in World War II. I am a member of the American Legion Post No. 70 and V. F. W. Post (No. 4136).

Since I have been your tax assessor and collector, expenses and costs of government have increased considerably, but your county tax rate of .60c per hundred dollar value has been maintained, and this rate compares with the adjoining counties as follows: Erath county .74c; Palo Pinto county .95c; Callahan county .80c; Stephens county \$1.10; Brown county \$1.00; and Comanche county .85c.

While serving as your tax assessor and collector the tax valuation of Eastland county has been raised from approximately nineteen million to twenty-four million dollars. This has been accomplished by raising value on property carried too low and lowering value on property carried too high, and by placing value on new improvements of old property.

Other school buildings in the city have suffered similar losses to that of South Ward.

"Vandalism of this sort is not in keeping with the usual high standards of citizenship exemplified by the children of Eastland," Rucker said.

Rucker urged parents to check their children who own air rifles and see if they are guilty of these acts.

"School officials are proud for children to enjoy outside school playground equipment during the summer," Rucker stated. "But if the acts are repeated, other measures will have to be enforced."

Mexico May Send Army

National defense ministry spokesmen emphasized, however, that no decision on the subject has been reached. They added that they did not know whether Mexican aid would be limited to Air Force units or whether ground troops might also be offered.

The driver, M. M. Miller, 26, told officers he picked up the two men at a bus station. They first directed him to a West Dallas address, but pulled guns and told him to "keep driving."

Outside Dallas city limits, Miller swerved the car into a ditch and jumped out. He said the two men fired four shots at him, one striking his hip.

The men backed the cab out of the ditch and drove away. Officers found the car behind a ball park at Terrell.

Miller was released from Parkland hospital after emergency treatment.

Presbyterian Women Hold Mission Study Monday At Church

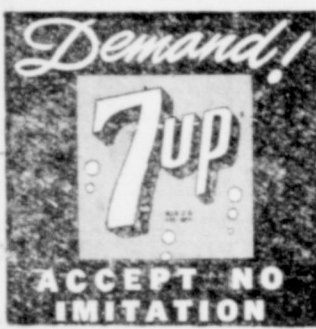
Members of the Women's Auxiliary of the First Presbyterian Church met Monday evening at the church for mission study.

Air Force Releases Breakdown Of Specialty Personnel Needed

The Air Force has released a breakdown by military occupational specialty and by specialty serial number of the military personnel which are needed to augment the Air Force.

To fill these shortages the Air Force initially is seeking volunteers from its active reserve components and former Air Force servicemen.

Officers now possessing critical military occupational specialties may request recall through the nearest reserve unit or by application to the headquarters of the nearest numbered Air Force. Recall will be for one year.

Qualified airmen now in the active reserve may voluntarily request recall for a minimum period of one-year by making application through their reserve units.

Recall will be in the grade presently held in the active reserve. The present voluntary recall of reservists is limited to male personnel and is in addition to the normal program for enlistment of men and women in the Regular Air Force.

The proposed call of reserve airmen to active duty are as follows:

Petroleum storage technician; Information center operator; Radar operator; Airplane hydraulic mechanic; Aircraft approach controller GCA; Bombsight and automatic pilot repairman; Remote control turret mechanic-gunner; Communications supply technician; Aerial mine technician; Engineer supply technician; Airplane armorer-gunner; Intelligence specialist; Telephone and telegraph equipment repairman.

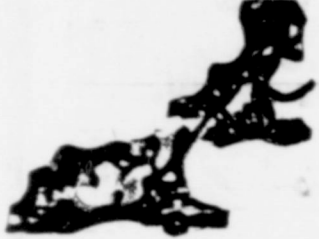

"The government of Mexico has fixed its position on the regime of Gen. Francisco Franco in Spain and ratifies that there will be no resumption of relations with that country," acting Foreign Minister Manuel Tello said.

Texan Walker Takes Command Of United Nations Forces In Korea

TOKYO, Japan, July 13 (UP)—Lt. Gen. Walton H. Walker, a 60-year-old swashbuckling tank expert from Texas, took over today as commander of United Nations ground forces in Korea.

Walker, commanding general of the U. S. Eighth Army since September, 1948, succeeded Maj. Gen. William Dean, who reverted to his permanent assignment of division commander.

The change in command was announced in a special communique from the headquarters of Gen.

Douglas MacArthur, supreme commander of UN forces.

The communique was released only a few hours after Gen. J. Lawton Collins, U. S. Army chief of staff, General Hoyt S. Vandenberg, Air Force chief of staff and Admiral Arthur Radford, Pacific Fleet commander, arrived in Tokyo by air for conferences with MacArthur.

But observers said the change implied no criticism of Dean. They said that a higher officer was appointed to command the ground forces because they now have been built up to a point where a general of Walker's rank normally issues the commands.

MacArthur's announcement said Walker took charge at midnight at an advanced command post in South Korea.

It said the Eighth Army now had assumed the responsibilities

previously assigned to the group designated "U. S. Army forces in Korea," which group now is discontinued.

Walker, a square-jawed native of Belton, Texas, is a carbon copy of the late Gen. George Patton in action, except for his rotund figure. Like Patton, he loves tanks. And like the late general, he likes to swagger around with a pair of .45 caliber revolvers strapped to his hips.

It was Walker who took command of the 20th corps in France when Patton was promoted to commander of the Third Army. Taking up where Patton left off, Walker helped hurl the Germans back through the Rhineland.

From May 1945 to May 1946 he was commanding general of the Eighth Service Command at Dallas.

Then he commanded the Fifth Army with headquarters in Chicago until sent to Japan to take over the Eighth Army, which occupies Japan.

The three stars of rank which

Walker wears originally belonged to Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and later to Gen. Patton.

Patton personally presented them to Walker April 27, 1945, in a ceremony on the banks of the Danube when Walker was promoted for leading the 20th Corps through West Germany past the fortress of Metz.

A 1912 West Point graduate, Walker wears 21 decorations, including the Silver Star with Oak Leaf cluster for personal bravery.

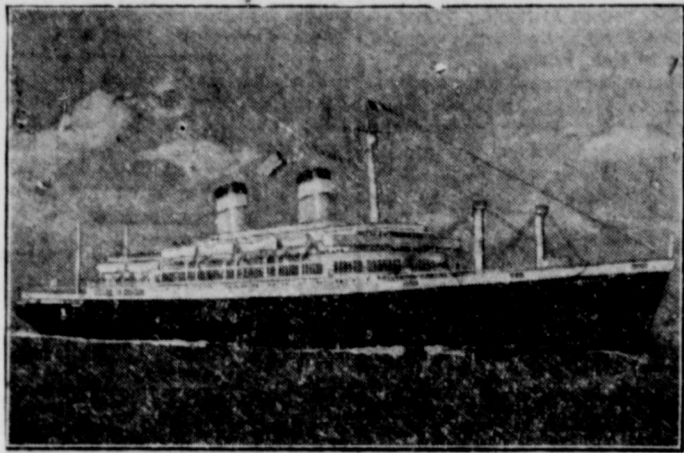
