The Eastland machine dropped its opener two weeks ago to the classic Cisco Lobos, 20-6, and last week took a 39-6 humbling at the rough hands of Coleman.

The Rangerites were shelled, 18-7 by the Jacksboro High Tigers in their initial '52 combat two weeks ago, and last Friday night suffered another set back—19-7—at Stamford.

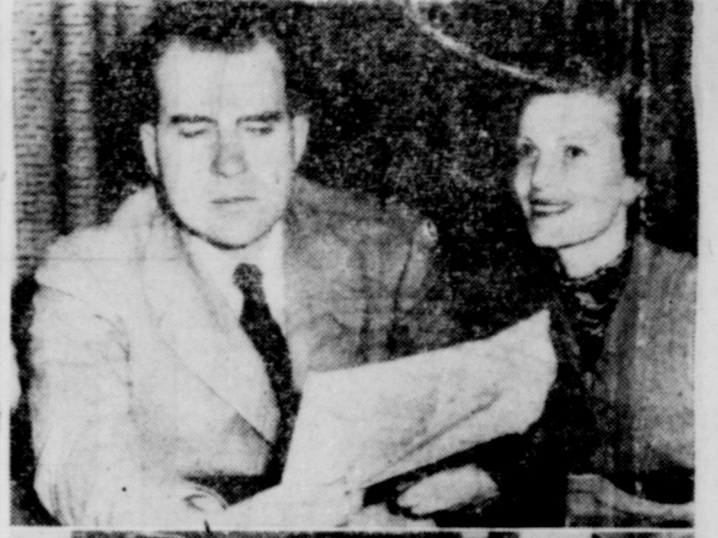
WHEELING, W. Va., Sept. 25 (UP)—Elated Republican leaders said Thursday the Eisenhower-Nixon ticket has emerged "stronger than ever" from a trial unprecedented in American political history.

They hopefully closed the books on the campaign crisis which began one week ago with the disclosure that vice presidential candidate Richard M. Nixon had accepted an \$18,235 private expense fund from wealthy California supporters.

Dwight D. Eisenhower, who had insisted that Nixon prove himself "clean as a hound's tooth" or quit the race, in effect renominated his running mate at a dramatic face-to-face meeting Wednesday night in this smoky Allegheny city.

John W. Turner, 65, prominent Eastland attorney passed away at his home in Eastland, Wednesday afternoon shortly before 3 o'clock. Funeral services will be conducted from the Hamner Funeral Home at 3 o'clock this afternoon, with Rev. Philip W. Walker, long time pastor of the Eastland Methodist Church and close friend of the deceased, in charge of the services. Interment will follow in Eastland cemetery.

Five Communist Leaders Indicted

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25 (UP)—Five Communist party leaders were indicted by a federal grand jury in St. Louis Wednesday on charges of conspiring to advocate and teach the violent overthrow of the government.

He was commissioned a second lieutenant in the field artillery on Aug. 31, 1918. While in the army he met Virgil T. Seaberry with whom he organized the law firm of Turner & Seaberry in Eastland on Jan. 1, 1919. They have practiced together continuously for almost thirty-four years.

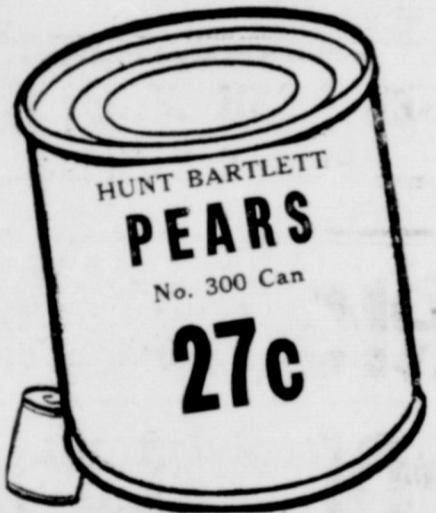
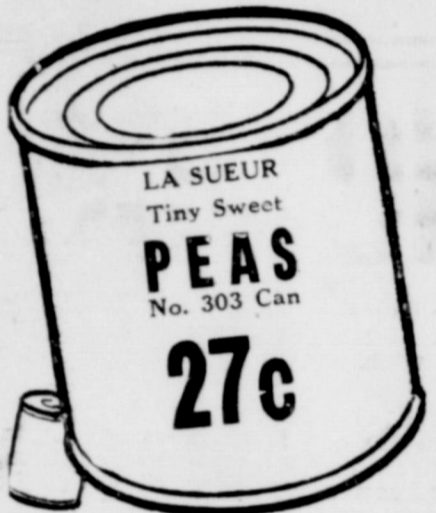

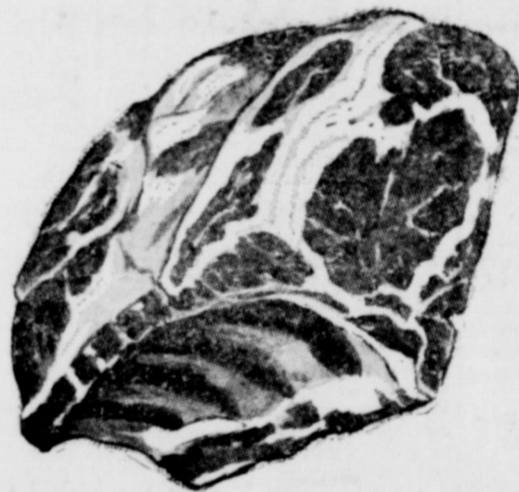

H-SU Coach Is Sweating; Golden Hurricane Next

Murray Evans, head football coach at Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, has only one problem this week. But that one is enough.

It is the University of Tulsa Hurricane, which will be the Cowboy's second foe of the young football season Saturday in the Oil City.

On paper and on the field Tulsa, which was the nation's top offensive team last year with an average of better than 480 yards in eleven games, figures to be better this season.

This week Evans and his associate coaches, Larry Cunningham, Bill Scott, and J. W. Steadman, must find a defensive alignment which can keep the Hurricane from creating too much havoc—a pretty large order for any team.

When Tulsa and the Cowboys met for the first time last year, the Hurricane knocked the Cowboys, who established a record 37 pass interceptions last season, completely out of the pass defense department, with eight completions for 320 yards and two touchdowns. Tulsa also rolled up 218 yards on the ground to bring its yardage for the season to 5,282 yards and down the Cowboys 33-14.

Evans is also troubled with his own offense. Last Saturday's loss, 26-7, to Arizona State of Tempe, showed that the Cowboy backfield definitely misses the services of Dunny Goode, second best runner in the land last year, and Bob Hart, all-Border Conference quarterback.

Evans will have to design his defensive patterns without the services of Maurice Waggsback, two-year letterman center, who will be out of action Saturday because of leg injuries sustained in the game with Tempe.

The Hurricane figures to be better this season of the strength of 16 regular offensive and defensive starters, who are all set to lead the Tulsa team to national grid power.

Returning are Howard Waugh, burly fullback who was the nation's third rushing leader; Jim Prewitt, all-Midwest tackle; Tom Miner, all-Missouri Valley Conference end; Willie Roberts, great pass catcher; Quarterback Ronnie Morris, seventh in total offense last year; and All-American guard Marvin Matuszak.

Polio Cases Drop Over State Area

AUSTIN, Sept. 25 (UP)—Polio cases in Texas dropped to 117 last week, the lowest total since June 14, the State Health Department has announced.

The new cases boosted the year's total to 3,752, an all-time high record. The mark had been set several weeks previously, when the number of cases surpassed the previous high for a full year of 2,778 set in 1950.

During a similar period last year only 1,356 cases had been listed.

The 117 cases compared with 151 for the previous week.

29-Hour Riot At Illinois State Prison Is Ended

CHESTER, Ill., Sept. 25 (UP)—The screams of a wounded youth stilled a 29-hour riot at Menard State prison and, one by one, 300 rebellious convicts were checked Wednesday for their grievances and concealed weapons.

Michael Seyffrit, director of the state department of public safety, took charge of an investigation into prisoners' grievances that included a demand for "more meat and less gravy."

State police helped regular guards watch over the restless prison of 1,884 convicts. Six hundred prisoners started rioting Monday night. An armistice was reached Tuesday, but 300 convicts broke the truce Tuesday night.

Police fired at least 20 tear gas bombs and volleys of shotgun shells from riot guns at the windows in the five-tiered east cell block building then. The prisoners used fire hoses and tore steel from the walls and fixtures and hurled it at the authorities.

A shotgun pellet hit Paul Turner, 18, Decatur, Ill., in the face. Turner, who was wielding one of the fire hoses, fell to a catwalk and his piercing screams brought silence in the cell block. The rampaging prisoners shuffled off to their cells and guards entered and locked them in.

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Court Charges Tulsa AFL Heads With Contempt

TULSA, Sept. 25 (UP)—Leaders of an AFL Machinists Union Wednesday faced contempt citations in connection with the 40-day strike against the Gas Pump Burner Mfg. Co., plant here.

The citation came shortly after County Attorney L. J. Bicking filed aggravated assault charges against two union members, Phillip J. Stewart and Wade Jones.

District Judge W. Lee Johnson set hearing for Oct. 1 on the citations, filed on complaint of company attorney Robert Huff that a restraining order issued earlier this month had been violated.

Stewart and Jones were charged after Raymond Stout, a plant employee, told Bicking he had been beaten.

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Gov. Stevenson Remains Mum

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Sept. 25 (UP)—Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson returned here Wednesday after a campaign swing along the eastern seaboard and refused to elaborate on his position on the use of private funds to supplement the salaries of state employees.

Asked by reporters if he would hold a news conference before he leaves Friday on another campaign tour, Stevenson said he did not know.

Rejects Nixon's Demand
A newsmen noted that Stevenson had refused to give any list of employees who received the money and asked if Stevenson also would refuse to list the donors.

The governor said he didn't know whether he would want to issue such a list. He then ended the interview by repeating that if he has anything more to say on the subject "I'll say it."

At Baltimore, he rejected Sen. Richard M. Nixon's demand that he disclose the names of the officials whose salaries were augmented with cash gifts.

it is a great improvement over the former Versions. It is much easier to read, as modern English has been substituted for antiquated and seldom used old English words.

The meaning, in most instances, has not been changed. In fact, so far, we have found none. Sentence forming has been improved upon, and even a child in tender years, may now read and understand the Bible.

This Bible was not published for the purpose of modifying the real meaning of the Scriptures, but rather for clarifying them. A reader may pick up this book and begin reading and read for an in-

definite period without having the chain of thought broken. In the older version this is not true, for while sentence formations may be good and they may be true, yet are put together in such fashion a reader may have to do a hand spring in order to get its real meaning. The new Bible may be read, with understanding, as rapidly as you would read a newspaper or magazine.

Assuming that the King James Version really is The Scriptures, which we seriously doubt, so far as translation is concerned, we have nothing to lose and much to gain by using the New Bible. Should you find a passage that seems too modernistic, you still have your King James Version to refer to.

We are not a modernist of any fashion, but the new book has not led us astray so far.

That's not to say there won't be any conference activity this week—every major conference in the nation will have at least one league game, with the Big Ten opener between Ohio State and Indiana heading the list.

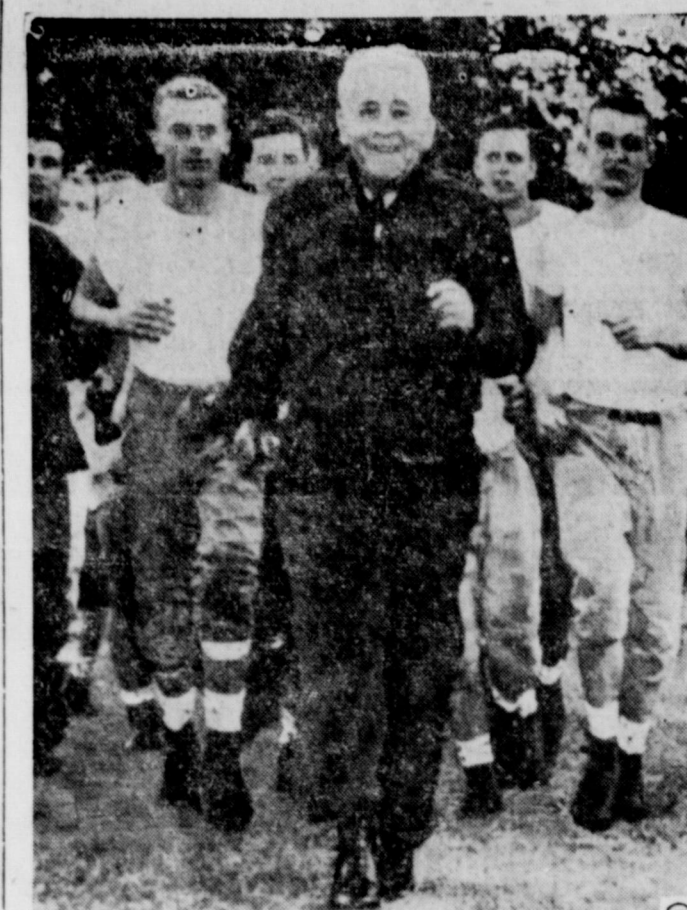
Judging from the thrills and surprises that marked the first big day of the season last Saturday, this big gridiron schedule should take a lot of headlines away from the final stages of the baseball pennant races. And, also, judging from last Saturday, there will be some upsets.

The two chief victims of the opening day show were Texas Christian, which suffered a 13 to 0 defeat by Kansas in front of the national television cameras, and Kentucky, upended 25 to 6 by surprising Villanova.

Ex-Army Stars Shine An odd note here was that both upsets were sparked by backs who performed for West Point until they were swept off the Plains by the "cribbing scandal." Gil Betch was the man who tossed two touchdowns passes for Kansas, and Gene Filipki was he hard-running back who ripped through Kentucky's forward wall.

Maryland, ranked the nation's No. 2 team, narrowly averted an even greater upset by Missouri in a 13 to 10 game.

In addition to the Ohio State-Indiana battle, conference play this week will be highlighted by Ivy League—Columbia-Princeton; Big Seven—Colorado-Oklahoma; Southeastern—Georgia Tech-Flori-

Georgia Tech Is Week's Top 11; Texas Rates 7th

Georgia Tech, an impressive 54 to 6 victor over The Citadel, last weekend, crowded power-packed, but untested Michigan State for the No. 1 spot in the United Press football ratings this week.

Although Michigan State does not open its season until Saturday when it meets its traditional rival, Michigan, the 35 outstanding coaches who make up the United Press rating board accorded Coach Biggie Munn's team top

position in the first weekly ratings of the new season.

But so impressed were they with Georgia Tech's showing that the Southeastern Conference team was ranked No. 2—just 36 points behind Michigan State. The Midwest team, the pick of the coaches in their pre-season ratings, received 14 first place votes and a total of 276 points while Georgia Tech received six first place ballots and a total of 240 points. In the pre-season ratings Georgia Tech was ranked third.

Maryland is Third Maryland, rated second at the start of the season, dropped to third place with 211 points after it barely managed to beat Missouri, 13 to 10, in its season's opener last Saturday.

In addition to Georgia Tech, California, Kansas, Villanova and Duke gained stature as the result of their victories in the first weekend of play of the 1952 season.

California, rated fifth pre-season, was given fourth place with 188 points as a result of a convincing 34 to 13 triumph over the College of Pacific.

Texas Moves Up Texas, with a 35 to 14 victory over Louisiana State, advanced from tenth to seventh place. Southern California, which buried a highly regarded Washington State team, 35 to 7, was placed eighth whereas it rated no better than a tie for 13th place in the pre-season predictions.

Kansas, 13 to 0 upset conqueror of Texas Christian, drew ninth place against its pre-season rating of 12th. Villanova, which failed to receive a single vote in the pre-season balloting, received 42 points, good for 13th place, as a result of its 25 to 6 triumph over Kentucky.

Duke with a 34 to 0 victory over Washington & Lee, received 28 points for 14th place against its pre-season placing of 19th.

In all, eight teams were given first place votes; Michigan State 14, Maryland 8, Georgia Tech 6,

Kansas and Oklahoma 2 each, and California, Texas and Southern California, 1 each.

In addition to Michigan State, three other teams which have not opened their seasons were voted among the first 10—Oklahoma in fifth place, Illinois sixth and Wisconsin tenth.
