# Rev. Fr. Boesmans Is New Catholic Pastor



REV. FR. BOESMANS  
New Priest for County's Catholic Groups

The Rev. Father Camille Boesmans, native of Belgium and a Catholic missionary priest until late in 1948 when he was forced to leave his work in North China by the Communists, is the new pastor of Eastland County's Catholic churches—St. Rita's Church, Ranger; St. Francis Church, Eastland; and Holy Rosary Church, Cisco.

Prior to arriving here to assume his new duties last week, Rev. Fr. Boesmans had served in Okarache, Okla., from February, 1949 until his recent transfer into the Dallas Diocese.

The husky, personable young priest, a handsome 33-year-old clergyman, is a native of near Louvain, Belgium. After completing his study and training for the priesthood at University of Louvain, he left Belgium and was engaged in missionary activity in North China for a year prior to being forced to leave by invading Communists. He arrived in the United States late in 1948 and was assigned to Oklahoma. Rev. Fr. Boesmans was in Belgium during World War II and was an enlisted man in the Belgian Army prior to its demobilization when the country was occupied by Nazi German troops early in the second global conflict.

**Frior to leaving Okarache, Okla.,** for Ranger where he now is making his home in the rectory next door to St. Rita's Catholic Church, Rev. Fr. Boesmans was honored with a gala farewell party at the Holy Trinity Church in that Sooners community.

Present among the hundreds of guests were members of the Boy Scout troop of which Rev. Fr. Boesmans had been scoutmaster for four years. The scouts, following eloquent praise and farewells, presented him with a shaving kit as a parting remembrance. Other groups of the Oklahoma church bestowed gifts on the departing assistant pastor, and Father Von Elm, pastor of Holy Trinity, presented Rev. Fr. Boesmans with the keys and the title to a new Chevrolet as a farewell gift from the parish.

**In a front page story,** The Okarache Chieftain lamented the loss of the young clergyman and said "Father Boesmans endeared himself to all, both young and old alike."

"He came to be loved and respected by everyone and especially the school children who so eagerly awaited their day of religious instruction each week."

"They were never disappointed. Only the most urgent appointment or other religious duty kept him from the classroom. Every adult, Catholic or non-Catholic, received the benefit of his priestly ministrations."

## Ritz Theatre Destroyed In Strawn Blaze

A major fire, one of the worst in Strawn history in recent years, completely gutted the \$35,000 Ritz Theatre Tuesday night.

The blaze, discovered by two alert Strawn residents at 10:50 p.m., was finally controlled and extinguished just short of an hour later—at 11:40 a.m.

Quick quenching of the fire, located at the corner of Main and Front Streets in the downtown area, and vigilant work of the members of the Strawn Volunteer Fire Department and visiting fire fighters from nearby Ranger kept the disastrous blaze from spreading into adjoining buildings—office of J. N. Stuart & Sons Estate and Community Public Service Company on Main Street, and the CPS warehouse and offices of the Featherlite Corporation on North Front Street. Only minor smoke damage was reported by adjoining occupants.

A passing Texas & Pacific freight train, consisting of a long string of loaded tank cars, had been scheduled for a brief stop just across North Front street. However, when the engineer spotted the ravaging flames, he throttled his diesel ahead to get the inflammable cargo out of the danger area.

Walter Kostha and Dave Grissom spotted the blaze at 10:50 p.m. when they saw the flames through the glass door of the theater at the box office entrance, on Main Street. The movie house had been closed for about 15 or 20 minutes prior to the start of the blaze, Mrs. F. T. Whitaker, owner and manager, said. Raymond Puchanan was employed as projectionist.

Kostha turned in the alarm and brought firemen of the Strawn Volunteer Fire Department. Additional aid from Ranger also was quickly summoned. Hundreds of persons swarmed to the area to witness the downtown blaze.

The loss, estimated at \$35,000, was not fully insured, Mrs. Whitaker said. Origin of the fire remains unknown.

Wednesday morning firemen roped off portions of Main and North Front Streets to protect passers-by from a possible cave-in of the fire-gutted walls which are cracked and could easily tumble in.

It was the second fire in the theater, an old Strawn landmark, in recent years. The movie house was gutted by another inferno back in December, 1948—little more than 10 months after the disastrous blaze which completely demolished the big Strawn Merchandise Company and which also is rated one of the worst conflagrations in the city's history.

The theater, established back in the hey-day of Strawn as a coal mining center, was completely rebuilt and was re-opened by Mrs. Whitaker. She and her late husband bought the movie house on April 27, 1946.

## H'll Be 100 Or More Today And Tomorrow

## Larry Falls Is Flight Engineer Korean Air-Lift

Airman First Class Larry R. Falls, 105 Ammerman Street, Eastland, a flight engineer with the 483rd Troop Carrier Wing's King-Gypsy Squadron, makes an entry in the logbook of his U. S. Air Force C-47 Skytrain while on a Korean airlift mission. Falls is charged with flying every mission of the plane, inspecting it carefully on the ground at every stop, and making all necessary repairs—either on the ground or in flight. The Kyushu Gypsies, based in a tent-city near the front, airlift supplies, mail and personnel to combat units throughout Korea. Gypsy C-47's have carried more than half of the 290,000 sick and wounded moved by Combat Cargo since the war began. Gypsy Skytrains are also charged with supplying UN units on islands off the Korean coast, landing on green strips and the wet sand of low tide beaches to do the job. The Kyushu Gypsies got their nickname from their original home in southern Japan and their more than 20 moves since that time.

## August Draft Quota Lowest For This Year

Lowest draft quota of 1953 was announced today by Selective Service headquarters in Austin. Only 1,235 Texans will be drafted into the U. S. armed forces during the 31-day month of August, the announcement said.

State Draft director Paul Wakefield said local board quota will be mailed the first week in July.

The quota is Texas' share of the national August call for 23,000 men, Texas' July quota announced previously is 1,286. The June call was for 1,749.

Only 48 of the state's 37 local boards received calls for preinduction examinations in July, Wakefield said. He said it was doubtful if all would receive examinations quotas in August.

The August call is to be filled with men 20 years old or older where possible but boards will be authorized where necessary to fill calls from men under 20, he said.

## June Hot, But July, August May Be Cooler

This is a red-hot June. How about July and August? That's one of the most frequent questions tossed around during this sweltering stretch of the Eastland County vicinity's sizzling heat wave.

With more than two weeks of 100-degree weather already registered in this area, are even hotter days due during the remainder of the summer?

A hot June doesn't necessarily mean a hot July.

Meteorologist J. W. Zimmerman at the Dallas U. S. Weather Bureau said today that June often has been hotter than July.

"If we could get an east or northeast breeze, the temperatures would drop," said Zimmerman. "But it won't get cooler as long as the wind is from the southwest."

Those winds from the southwest are extremely hot, he explained, because they come from the dry areas of Central Mexico where no rain has not fallen for several years.

And there is a reason why the winds are from the southwest instead of the east. When a pressure system from west to east, it has a flow of air around it. It produces a front of cool air, but just ahead of this cool mass is an area of hot air, resulting from a southerly twist to the current.

"We're in that hot area," said Zimmerman. "For some reason, the pressure systems won't come far enough south to bring us the cool front, right now a system is sitting stationary north of us, and we're resting in the hot area of the front."

What causes pressure systems to move like they do is not known, said Zimmerman.

"If we could move them like we wanted, we could have rain or any weather we want."

Put all weathermen can do now is figure out how the pressure system will move, and forecast the weather accordingly.

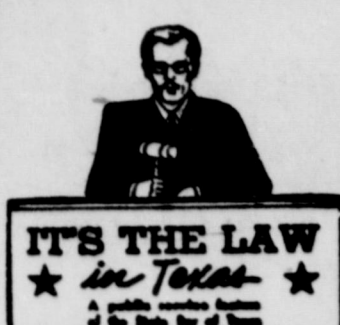

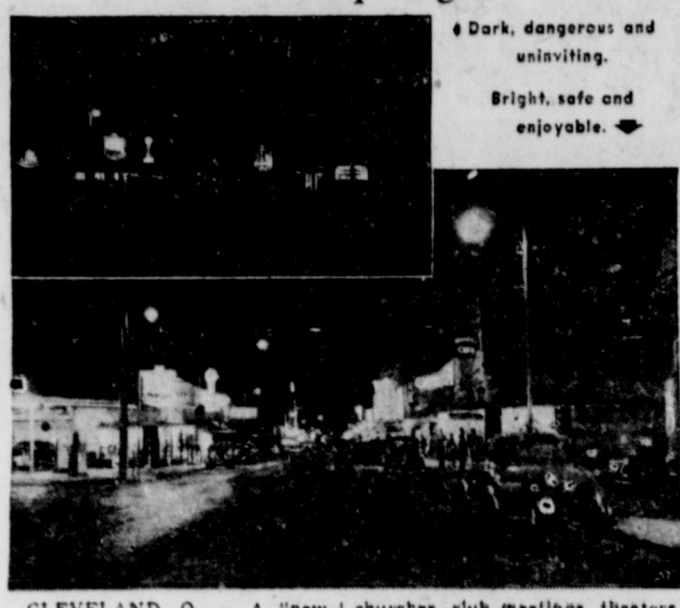
## INDICTMENT NOT EVIDENCE OF GUILT

What does indictment by a grand jury mean? Lawyers find that many persons are inclined to confuse indictment by a grand jury with a court conviction for a crime.  
This misconception is unfair to anyone who becomes the subject of a grand jury investigation. Justice, in the United States, is based on the theory that a man is innocent until proven guilty, and public opinion should withhold its verdict until the courts have had an opportunity to determine guilt or innocence.  
An indictment is simply a written accusation presented by a grand jury to the district judge. It charges some person or persons with a crime. It is not a conviction. When a grand jury indicts a person it merely affirms that there is sufficient reason for him

## Main Street, U.S.A., 1953 Acquiring A New Look

CLEVELAND, O. — A "new look" is coming to Main Street, U.S.A.  
The nation's smaller towns are acquiring a big-city appearance by brightening up their main thoroughfares with new street lights.  
Representatives of The National Street and Traffic Safety Lighting Bureau, traveling the country's highways, report a 25 per cent increase in night activities in towns with newly-lighted main streets. More people are shopping at night and evening attendance at

churches, club meetings, theaters and sports events is at a new high. Many towns report their stores open every evening and many out-of-towners taking advantage of evening recreational and other facilities. More tourists are reported stopping overnight.  
Officials of these "new look" towns say they relighted their main streets to curb night accidents and crime and have been greatly surprised at the increased evening business, civic pride and community activities which have followed the relighting.

or her to stand trial. That is as far as the grand jury goes.  
After that, the judge and the trial jury take charge of the case. At the trial the indictment is simply the State's pleading in the case, to which the defendant may plead "Not Guilty." The trial jury is instructed by the judge that it must not consider the indictment as any evidence of guilt.  
All felony offenses in Texas, that is all offenses punishable by imprisonment in the State penitentiary, must be prosecuted on an indictment by a grand jury. A grand jury may indict an individual for a misdemeanor, an offense punishable only by a jail sentence or by fine, but this is rather an unusual procedure.  
Misdemeanor cases are customarily prosecuted on the basis of an "information" filed by the County Attorney. This serves the same function as a grand jury indictment.

The importance of a grand jury verdict is this: If it votes a "True Bill"—that is, if someone is indicted—the District Attorney must prosecute the person indicted; but if the jury votes a "No Bill"—that is, not to indict—the suspected person cannot be tried.

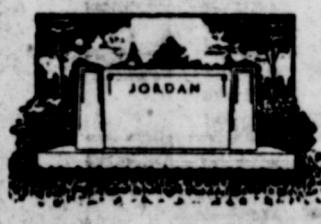

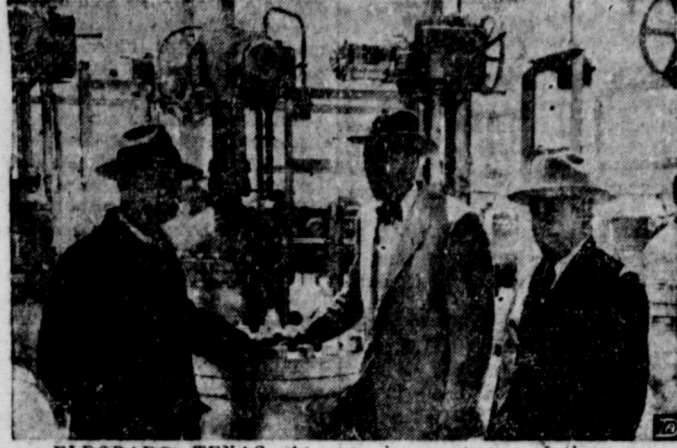

Silage Crops Are Sought By Area Farmers

"It's an ill wind that blows nobody good," is an old saying and one that applies to the farmers who have corn and other crops which are burning up before the ears mature, for the group of seven farmers and dairymen around Ranger who have prepared trench silos, are anxious to buy these crops and harvest them for silage.

The first of such corn crops was harvested last Saturday and was purchased by the group from Thomas M. Fox, consisting of six acres, which harvested better than one ton per acre.

Doubtless there are many more farms in this immediate area whose corn or other green crops will not mature and this group of men would like to purchase any green crop that is suitable to put up for silage, Galloway said.

The silage harvesting machine which was made available to the group through the efforts of the agricultural and livestock committee of the Chamber of Commerce, got its initial workout last Saturday in harvesting the corn crop bought from Mr. Fox, and reports are that the machine performed perfectly.

Morris Newham, chairman of the agricultural and livestock committee, states that he believes this arrangement will prove beneficial to both the farmer who has a crop to sell and to the group who have

prepared trench silos. If the drought continues members of the group who have prepared silos will have difficulty in getting sufficient crops suitable for silage to fill their silos, and their willingness to buy the failing corn and other green crops should be helpful to all concerned, Newham states.

Only row crops can be harvested by the machine, and farmers having corn or other green crops for sale are asked to notify the Chamber of Commerce, telephone 31, or the Owen Implement Co., telephone 556, and they will be put in touch with the members of the group who are anxious to get the crops.
