REFLECTIONS FROM LIFE

Did it ever occur to you that all the good things in life come to you as gifts from God? Let us look and see. Let us read John 7:22 where we learn that Christ's glory was given to His people. "The glory that thou givest me, I have given them."

This chapter is in reality the Lord's prayer—not "Our Father who art in heaven, etc." which is the model prayer. But the entire 17th chapter of John is the Lord's prayer. The Son was speaking to the Father—unburdening His soul, "you and I were remembered at prayer."

He had accomplished the tasks God had given Him, and was making his report, yet He took time out to remember us. He had all the glory that God and the Christian world could offer. He was the King of Kings—the Saviour of a lost and dying world. He was the only begotten Son of God—his to the throne, and in complete union with God. Yet this glory He divided with us making us heirs of God and joint heirs with Him. What a noble manifestation of love!

At times it is hard to believe that such could be true, but we have the word of this sinless man that it is, so we must believe. Maybe it's more than we deserve, yet Christ did not think so. His kindly authority was manifested—He gave us a fore-taste of Glory Divine.

He has promised other things He would do if only we have faith to accept and believe Him.

Yes, Christian men and women are really partakers of this glory. Then in serious moments we realize that He is the only door of admission to the happiness of heaven.

In that glory we are truly Sons of God, and Christ, with Him, are all one in Christ, and our very nature will reflect this great truth.

But if we are Son's of the Father, we ought to resemble Him. If God is our father, we will and do have a family resemblance. If God is our Father we will keep up a family communication. And if God is our father we will surely inherit the family mansion, which is in heaven.

We cannot do these things by proxy. We must decide and speak for ourselves. If we really love the Father and His Son, our Saviour, we will have a desire to be more than a blacksheep. We will desire to do His will, and by so doing pattern our lives after the Son.

We can't imagine a luke-warm Christian, for if we have accepted a share of Christ's glory, we will have a desire to do something about it. We will want to let the world know about it, for it is a gift of priceless nature.

To be a child of God, and joint heir with His Son, you must be a Christian, and this will prompt you to let your light shine.

Luke-warm Christian is the individual who gets his name on some church roll, and then depends upon God's great love to save, even though he has never had a change of heart. He does not love Christ and does not seek to pattern after Him, but rather just lets nature take its course.

If you really believe in Christ, trust and love Him, you will not be satisfied with anything short of an active Christian life, which we feel, will be puny enough at best.

So after examination you learn that you are not enjoying your

The new venture is scheduled for a depth of 1,995-feet.

Location is 150 feet from north and east lines of Section 25, Block 2, ETRR Survey.

A new location also was reported for neighboring Palo Pinto County.

'Cita' Will Lead New Master—

Blind Rangerite, New Dog Due Home Tuesday

Out in California today, a happy blind man who lives in a world of darkness—63-year-old Morris Caudle of Ranger—and a sleek, alert German Shepherd "seeing eye" dog are within a few days—next Tuesday, to be exact—of the Rangerite and his new, steadfast companion will return to Caudle's home at 1004 Haig Street.

The new canine, who'll guide his master around the home and wherever the blind man may choose to walk, is named "Cita."

The animal, who has been in training with Caudle for the past month, will be the blind man's guiding eyes—yes, and also a true friend and constant companion.

The dog was presented the Rangerite as an outright gift by International Guiding Eyes, Inc., an organization sponsored by the International Association of Machinists, the "Union with a Heart," and supported entirely by voluntary contributions from labor, fraternal, service clubs and other groups and individuals in all walks of life.

A heart-warming drive for funds in Ranger and Eastland—all voluntarily contributed by kind, understanding individuals—made possible Caudle's round-trip air flight to California to get his new dog.

Sharing in the fund-raising effort were the Lions Clubs of Eastland and Ranger, the I.O.O.F. Lodges of both cities, and The Ranger Daily Times and the Eastland Telegram.

The fund resulted from a story—tagged "the irony of fate"—which told the plight of the blind Ranger resident who's aged little dog, 12 years old, was in poor health and unable longer to properly serve as a guide and companion to his master.

USDA Is Big Loser Through Price Support

The Agriculture Department reported today a net realized loss of \$61,146,000 in carrying out the farm price support program in the fiscal year which ended June 30.

This compares with a net realized loss of \$67,352,000 in the preceding year. The peak loss—\$46 million dollars—occurred in the fiscal year ended June 30, 1951.

The average annual loss since the price support program began in October, 1933, is in the neighborhood of 73 million dollars.

The net loss in the last fiscal year resulted largely from sales of corn and wheat. These losses were \$20,526,524 and \$18,886,296 respectively.

As of June 30, the Commodity Credit Corp. had an investment of \$3,476,300,000 in the price support program. Loans totaled \$1,137,592,000 and inventories of commodities acquired under the support program, purchase agreements totaled \$2,338,737,000.

Corn, cotton, tobacco, and wheat, in that order, accounted for the bulk of the loan total.

The net realized loss since the start of the program now totals \$1,456,000,000.

An election is to be held at 2 p.m. Oct. 6, 1953, in the County Court room for the purpose of electing a supervisor for subdivision 5 of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District. Subdivision No. 5 includes that portion of Eastland County in the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District lying north and east of the MKT railroad which runs from the town of Gorman to the town of Cisco, and extending to the Wichita Falls and Southern railroad on the east. A small area of Eastland County including that area north of the baseline road and west of the Canyon road is not in the district at the present time but is in the process of annexation. This area lies northwest of Cisco. Eligible voters are those landowners and wives living within the district boundaries.

The other supervisors of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation district are A. D. Gibson, sub-division 1, Dublin, Texas; Walter Fritts, sub-division 2, Comanche; Dean Gardner, sub-division 3, De Leon, and B. B. Hickman sub-division 4, Rising Star.

Strawn Girl, 4, Fatally Burned; Buried Friday

Funeral rites for little Ester Nunez, four-year-old Strawn Latin-American girl who died in a Strawn hospital Wednesday as a result of serious burns, were held at St. John's Catholic Church in Strawn Friday morning at 9 a.m.

Rev. Fr. Loos, pastor, officiated, and interment was in Mt. Marion Cemetery with Triplet Funeral Home, Strawn, in charge of arrangements.

Rosary was said for the deceased girl at the Strawn funeral home Thursday evening at 8 o'clock.

The girl, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Amelia Nunez, died in the hospital Wednesday afternoon four hours after she had been rushed there following a tragic accident, which occurred in the yard of her parents home Wednesday morning.

The child picked up a can of kerosene in the Nunez home and in doing so spilled some of the contents on her dress. A group of boys and girls were playing around a bonfire in the backyard and one of the youngsters poked a flaming stick toward the child, igniting her clothing. She burst into flames and was fatally burned. As soon as the blaze was extinguished she was rushed to the hospital where she died a few hours later.

Survivors include her parents and nine brothers and sisters, all of Strawn.

13 Per Cent Above Pre-Korean Level—

Living Cost Soaring

The rising cost of living continues to inch upward.

According to government reports today, the advance that started last February moved up in August to a record high—12 per cent above the pre-Korean level.

The increase of three-tenths per cent, to 115 per cent of the average 1947-1949 base period, means an automatic three cent an hour wage increase for 1,300,000 rail workers next month. Their wages are tied to the cost of living index with adjustments being made every three months.

The three cent hourly increase, coming on top of a 10 cent rise the rail workers already had gained because of higher living costs, will add an estimated 100 million

Two of District 7-A's top-rated teams—Coach Ed Hooker's consistently-improving Eastland High Mavericks and the potent DeLeon Bearkats—fought to a 7 to 7 draw before a packed stadium in DeLeon Friday night.

It was Dad's Night for the host Bearkats, but even for papa they were unable to sufficiently overpower their stubborn Red & Black rivals to make the evening a successful and victorious event.

The Eastlanders held a slight edge all the way.

And though statistics show they had a bare advantage, fumbles proved the difference, probably, between a tie and a victory for the spirited charges of Coach Hooker who went into the District 7-A melee with a one won-one lost record for the newly begun pigskin campaign. The Red & Black-ers bobbed the ball on five occasions to lose it to their Bearkat foes.

The contest was deadlocked for 36 nerve-wracking minutes, and the tension didn't subside until Eastland broke the ice to power-house into cash country in the final quarter.

Teeling off in the fourth stanza from their own 46-yard stripe, the Mavericks rolled down to the one-yard line on a slashing 53-yard drive. From the one, Fullback J. D. Hanson smashed over to score. Bobby Peterson, reserve back, booted the point with a perfect kick from placement.

It looked like a win for the Eastlanders, until fleeting minutes later as the nip-and-tuck ebbed to an end. The determined Bearkats began to roll from their own 42-yard marker. They barreled down to the Eastland 2, and there Fullback M. L. Nance piled over for the Kats' lone tally. A jump pass—Quarterback Fred West to Right End Clyde Noonkester—was good for the point and tied the count.
