SMALL BOYS AT FIRES INMERKE

When a fire alarm is turned on in Merkel the crowd in attend. ance is somewhat different from the crowd that goes to a fire in large oity and is explained as follows.

## In a large city no children-are

 allowed on the scene at all andtheir assistance is not needed and there is danger of their get ting injyred if not killed. In when the department was called West building and to the alarm West building and to the alarm
at the Merkel Bottling Works, which are both fresh on the minds of Merkel people, there was in attendance at these fires no less than twenty small boy ranging from seven years to perhaps fifteen and no where in the crowd could there be seen parent who seemed duty-boun of his child. Naturally the mothers were not there for they did not have time to reach the scene as quick as did their hus. band or their small boy who was running loose on the street some where.
On both of the above mention could be seen to run directly boys danger where they might int danger where they might ge
hurt at any moment. The reason for there being so many mall boys around the West building fire was no doubt caused
by the fact that the respectiv parents took for granted tha their son was not in any danger at all and never would get in the
way of the firemen in the discharge of their duties but at the same time no doubt those parent of wherp their boy was or what he was into.
To an puteider it makes them shudder to see a small boy de liberately fun into augh danger yet is very evident that it is no the boys fault but the fault of the parents in not looking after the welfare of their child propery. It would be weil for every mother and father in Merkel to take into consideration the fact bears an enchanted life and would not get hurt under any circumstances for it would be very sad to the fireboys should there be a death as result of some child running into such danger without being able to see it. This is intended to scare for the fact is a scary one and af parents will but take it upon themselves to consider the matter it will look small boy running into the rea of the Jones Barber shop to look at the fire even before the wate had stopped flowing from the Whil
While parents and others consider this they might bear in mind that their personal services are often times a hinderance to the fireboys and it would be much a clear field than to have the scene congested by sight-seers of any age whether old or young. At any time the fireboys ne
outside help they will call for it
and it will then be time enough for the outsider to offer his assist nce and not before.
But do not forget that it is your boy that is in danger and not the ohild of your neighbor for if you do not know just where your
child is when the fire alarm is urned in it is most likely tha you can find him on the scene if you will take the trouble to go and see

Senator W. J. Bryan was brought in Sunday night over the Abilene \& Southern from Anson in a very serious condition and lies in the Abilene Hospital today (Monday) in a semi-comatose condition from the effects of a fall in an attempt to repair a piece of broken wire fence Su In the fall two ribs the sixth and seventh, were broken in addition to the bruises about the head, shoulders and face and internal injuries of the head. It seems that Mr. Bryan and one of his ranch hands had gone out Sunday morning to look after some gaps in the fences through which some cattle had been esoaping from the pastures and in trying to mend a broken place in a wire Mr. Bryan tore out a staple by pulling too hard which precipitated him to the rock about ten feet below with the above results.
The accident occurred about four miles from the ranch house and Mr. Bryan was carried to Hamlin where he received temporary medical attention and relatives at Abilene notified by telephone. Judge K. K. Legett and Dr. S. C. Gage left at once in an automobile for Hamlin and found Mr. Bryan in an unconscious condition.
Arrangements were made at onçe for a special train over the A. \&S, to Anson, where olose connection was made with the Abilene \& Northern for this oity. - Abilene Reporter.

## dining with negroes

The Rhode Island Progressive exeoutive committee gave a dinner to Colonel Roosevelt at his hotel after tonight's speaking. At the table with Colonel Roosevelt were Edwin F. Tutle, chairma including Julius Mitchell of Providence and Dr. John Matthews of Newport, negroes. Three women, one of them a daughter of ex-Governor Garvin, attended the dinner as guests of the committee.
This significant paragraph, from the Associat ed Press account of Colonel Roosevelt's visit to Rhode Island, will be highly edifying, no doubt, to those Southern men who are herding with th Bull Moose.
It was said of the Booker Washingtonluncheon in the White House that the negro educator hap. pened to be present when President Roosevelt was served in his private office, and the ciroumstanoe was to be regarded as a deliberate act of social equality. There was no accident about the Rhode Island dinner; the two negroes present were invited, as were the three women, and the guest of honor no doubt was consulted. Indeed, he only applied in a social way the doctrine of his fetter to Julian Harris of Atlanta, whereit: justified the exclusion of Southern negroes the inclusion of Northern negroes in the new par ty. The edujated and respectable Southern ne gro is as worthy of political and socia! recogni tion as the educated and respectable Northern abhorrent socially and as dangerous politically as the debased Southern negro. The differentia tion which Colonel Roosevelt makes is brazen hypoorisy.

On the face of it the Rhode Island dinner was delifberately designed to flatter the negro in Northern doubtful states, and the shocking pity of it is that white women consp

Last session at the Un reshman cexas three blind boys entered the in scholarship among the first one hundred students of the Academic Department. One of these oys came from Houston, another came from Tioga, and the third came from Beeville. All hree had been prepared for the University at the State Blind Institute, also a free institution locatd at Austin. The three blind boys were con ducted from class by kind-hearted comrades and instructors; they took notes of lectures in a special kind of shorthand invented for the blind; and at night they wrote up these notes neatly
e typewriter.
They lived throughout the year at Brackenridge Hall where board is cheap. They joined freely in the sports and jokes of their companions. Now nd then some of the students read aloud to them he lessons for the next day. At the end of the year all three stood among the best of their class, and next year they will return to go on with their

## ollege education.

## E. V. White talks

On July 16th Mr. E. V. White of the State De partment of Education spoke upon the progress nade in local taxation in Texas before the morning session of Rural School Education Week, eld at that time at the University of Texas. Mr White said: "The past four years have witness da marvelous growth iu the educational senti ment of rural communities. Before that time very ew common school districts levied a specia chool tax and practically none had issued bonds or the construction of school houses.
