Dissatisfied. That's a good word, we think, to describe the mood of Texas voters Saturday when they cast ballots in Democratic First Primary governor's race.

Amazing it was that Ben Barnes, the fair-haired lad of the state's political machine, could run no better than third in the race, which was of the four-horse variety for practical purposes.

The voters not only rejected Barnes, who was seeking promotion to the state's top political spot from his lieutenant governor's job, but shoved incumbent Preston Smith all the way back to fourth place in the vote totals. From here, though, Smith's fourth place finish wasn't as surprising as Barnes' failure to make one of the two top positions and the runoff.

The opinion here is that both Smith and Barnes had lost the confidence of Mr. Average Texas Voter. They were too close to the stock scandal which rocked the state several months ago to suit the everyday, run-of-the-mill voter.

Barnes said as he campaigned that he didn't even know Frank Sharp, the Houstonian who was the center of the governmental scandal.

Smith pointed out that he, and he alone, stopped the Sharp-promoted banking bills from becoming law.

Those explanations, while probably correct in their own right, were not enough to satisfy the ballot-casters of the great State of Texas.

That Dolph Briscoe, the South Texas rancher-banker, led the ticket isn't as surprising in post-election examination as the fact "that lady," Frances Farenthold, the state representative from Corpus Christi, ran a solid second.

At this point, it's difficult for us to determine if Mrs. Farenthold's success in earning a runoff berth came about because of her own campaign or was helped by that aforementioned dissatisfaction by the voters of Barnes and Smith.

We're proud Mrs. Farenthold is in the runoff. Even though we didn't support her in print, as such, prior to the election, we didn't knock her candidacy except to say that Briscoe would get our vote. We were just like the majority of Texas voters as it turned out in that Mrs. Farenthold was our second choice.

Now, with our two favorite candidates battling each other in the runoff, we're in the unusual, but pleasant, situation where we feel that we can't lose an election. That's got to be a good deal.

Either Briscoe or Mrs. Farenthold would make a good governor, one Texans would like, it appears now, Texas citizens are the real winners now. They'll have a satisfactory Democratic candidate for governor, no matter what happens in the second primary.

A shame it was that Ralph Yarborough didn't get his party's nomination for the Senate outright without having to participate in the runoff. He came oh-so-close to getting a majority of the votes and avoiding a runoff campaign.

However, to look at the bright side of what has already happened at the polls, maybe the added exposure and additional campaigning will aid Yarborough in defeating Republican John Tower come November.

Bovina held onto its Yarborough tradition in Saturday's voting, giving the former senator more votes than his opponent. Such voting continues to put the Bovina box out of step with the majority of Parmer County. That's an out of step position we appreciate, though.

Maybe we can convince some of our county neighbors to back Yarborough between now and the second primary --- and especially in the general election.

Between now and June 3, which is the date of the second primary, tell 'em to ROLL with RALPH in the RUNOFF.

Yarborough is the man to beat Tower this Fall.

Thanks to the fine folks in Parmer County who went to the trouble to cast a write-in vote for us in the race for the chairmanship of the Democratic party in the county.

We appreciated the votes and conversations of encouragement and concern.

Especially were we proud of the vote totals in Bovina, Oklahoma Lane and Farwell. Those are the three boxes we carried, of course.

Probably the most disappointing thing to people who seek office through elections is the small percentage of citizens who vote.

We're guessing that only about

Parmer County Voters Favor Briscoe

Over Weekend --

Rain Breaks Long Drought

Drought-breaking, farmer-pleasing showers fell in the area over the weekend.

This was the first appreciable moisture received here this year.

The showers began Friday afternoon and continued Saturday afternoon and Sunday night.

Total rainfall ranged from one to two inches with .90 recorded in Bovina. Total amounts were higher all directions from town, according to reports.

While not considered sufficient for a prolonged period of time, the rainfall was highly welcome here. There had been no significant moisture here since rain last Fall handicapped the harvesting of row crops.

The area was under a tornado alert for a period of time Sunday afternoon as a funnel was reportedly spotted in the Clovis-Texico area.

Lightning Sunday night knocked out the cable television service here, but this was repaired in a matter of minutes.

Additional showers are forecast for later this week.

New Ruling --

City Says -- 'Bag Grass'

Grass cuttings must be put in plastic bags to be hauled away by the City of Bovina trash truck.

That decision was made at a Thursday night meeting of the city council.

Loose grass cuttings are destructive to the mechanisms of the trash truck, Darrel Read, city employee, explained prior to the council making the decision to no longer handle loose grass cuttings.

Also, council members agreed that tree trimmings must be cut in three-foot lengths and

bundled before they will be hauled by the trash crew.

Speaking for the council, Mayor Johnnie Horn said, "We'll appreciate the cooperation of the people in regard to these new rulings, which were made because of necessity."

Council members agreed to have additional street lights, possibly as many as four, installed in Bovina's Eastview Addition --- on Second and Third Streets, south of Highway 86.

Mrs. Farenthold Places 4th Here

A light turnout of Parmer County voters gave overwhelming support to Dolph Briscoe for governor in the Democratic Primary Election Saturday.

Briscoe, who was the statewide leader, carried each of the county's eight voting boxes.

In the race for the senatorial nomination, Barefoot Sanders captured the lead in this county while Ralph Yarborough was the leader across the state. Here, Sanders had 820 votes to Yarborough's 555. Only in the Bovina precinct did Yarborough lead over Sanders. That was by a 106 to 92 margin. The two will meet in the June 3 Second (runoff) primary.

Only 1592 Parmer Countians cast ballots, less than half the number which were registered to vote.

In addition to favoring Briscoe and Sanders, Parmer voters were strong in their support for Wayne Connally for lieutenant governor, giving him a total of 762 over his closest competitor here, Bill Hobby, who received 331. The two will meet in the June 3 runoff.

There were no contested county races as Charles Lovelace, sheriff; Hugh Moseley, tax assessor-collector; and Hurschel Harding, attorney; were re-elected to four-year terms without opposition.

There was local interest in the election in the Farwell and Oklahoma Lane precincts as voters there decided on a county commissioner and a justice of the Peace.

Guy Atchley of Lariat ousted incumbent commissioner Guy Cox for a seat on the county court by a 285 to 205 margin. Ray Mears was elected Farwell justice of the peace as he defeated Wanda Walker, 331 to 118.

Parmer County voters expressed themselves as being highly against bussing of school children for racial balance of numbers as they voted 1086 to 192 in favor of a referendum to outlaw bussing.

In a county-wide write-in election for the chairmanship of the Democratic Party, Hollis Horton of Friona defeated Dolph Moten of Bovina 340 to 253.

Moten carried the boxes in Bovina, Farwell and Oklahoma Lane while Horton led in the other five. Nelson Welch, who has held the position for the past several years, was not a candidate for re-election.

In the governor's race, Ben Barnes, who was third across the state, was the second choice in this county, picking up 226 votes. Preston Smith received 206 and Mrs. Frances Farenthold, who earned a runoff spot with Briscoe in state-wide voting, received 132 Parmer votes.

Republicans in the county voted in four boxes --- Bovina, Friona, Farwell and Lazbuddie. They favored Albert Bell Fay as their gubernatorial candidate in a field of six.

Also, the Republicans here favored the ban on bussing referendum and voted one-sidedly against a referendum on Daylight Savings Time which was on their ballot and wasn't on the Demo ticket.

The twirling ensemble of Tandra Rogers, Lezli Williams, Susan Heflin and Tammy Hutto received a I (superior) rating. In solo twirling contests, Dianna Naegle and Pam McCormick received II ratings and Betty Whitecotton a III (above average).

"We heard some real nice compliments on the group and were proud of the showing our band made," said Harris.

Over 900 junior high bandmen from Class A schools were involved in the contests.

Judges were Buck Hughes of Spur, Willis Giddins of Plainview Estacado and Jerry Bartley of Abernathy.

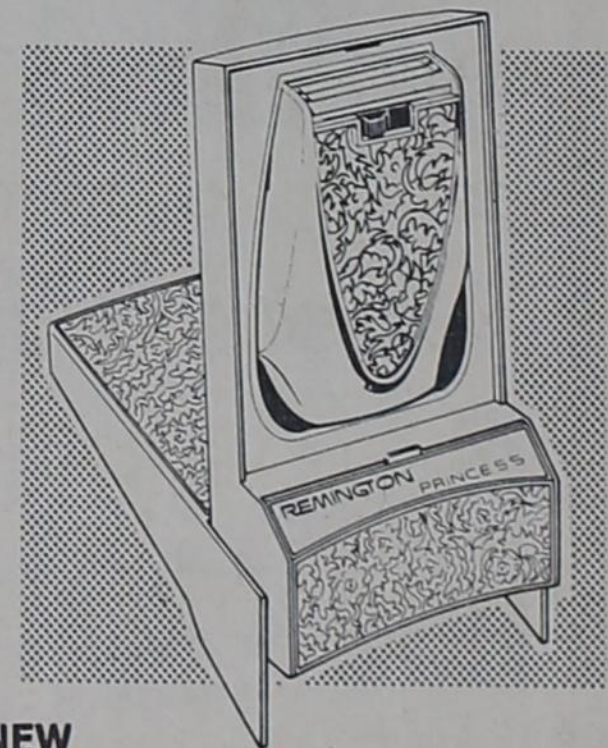

McCulley is a former employee of the government's currency and accounting department in Washington, D.C.

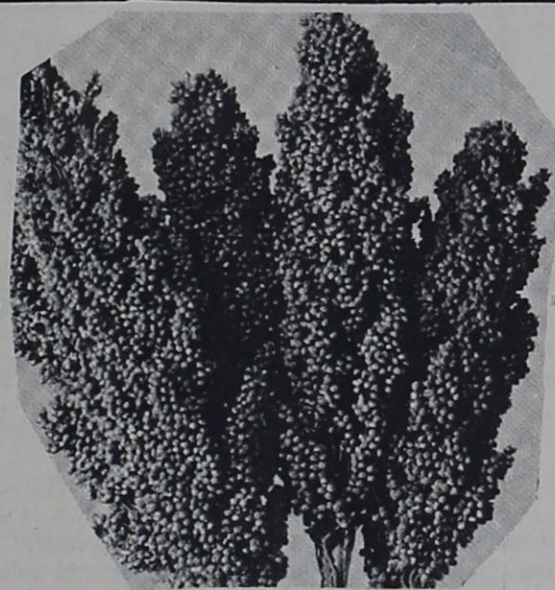

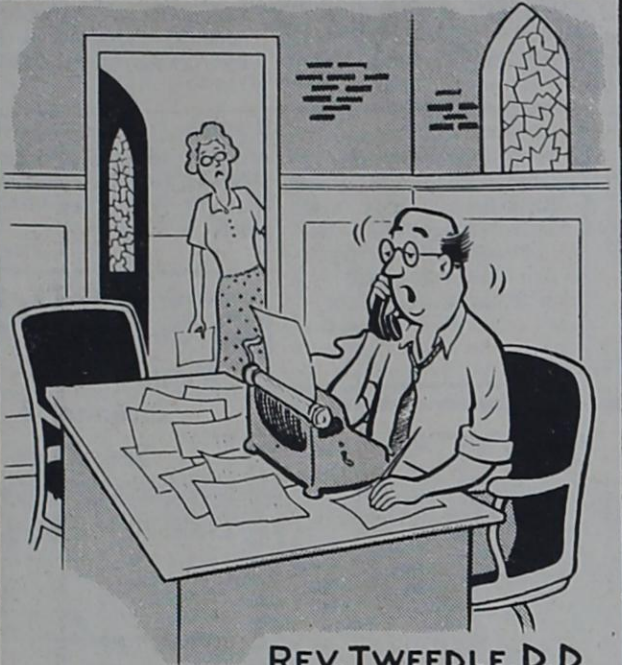

Mis-Using Our Lord And Savior Jesus Christ

I have some serious misgivings about some emphases some are placing on our Lord Jesus Christ these days. One area that bothers me considerably has to do with the way that both young and old mis-use the Lord in trying to justify many of today's actions. Burton Coffman, in a recent article, made four significant points. May I share them with you:

- (1) Jesus had the Holy Spirit without measure (John 3:24), yet there never was manifest any extremism. He never rolled in the straw or cast dirt in the air.
- (2) Jesus never dressed like John the Baptist in an extreme way. Judas was paid to identify him -- consequently there was nothing bizarre in his physical appearance to identify him.
- (3) Jesus never advocated civil disobedience -- in fact any kind of disobedience! He came to fulfill, not destroy. He was not a nudist, an exhibitionist, an extrovert or introvert. He never sanctioned rebellion, revolt, or violence.
- (4) Jesus never was an advocate for victims of social injustice. In Luke 12 he refused to take sides with abuse in inheritance. Jesus did not come to alter society but to change men. Jesus paid his taxes although legally exempt, kept the Sabbath Day, read the scriptures, attended the synagogue, and worked as a carpenter. He even rebuked Simon the Pharisee for not keeping social amenities!

Paul said, "If any man have not the spirit of Christ, he is none of His." "Let this mind be in you which also was in Christ Jesus." (Col. 3:2; Rom. 8:9) What this world needs is for more to act like Christ. We need to stop trying to justify many of today's actions by Christ, but be like Christ.
