PROCLAMATION BY THE MAYOR OF THE CITY OF BOVINA

WHEREAS, the President of the United States has issued a proclamation calling upon all the citizens of this Nation to observe Friday, November 11, 1955, as Veterans Day to commemorate and to pay appropriate homage to the veterans of all the wars of this Nation who have contributed so much to the preservation of this Nation; to solemnly remember the sacrifices of all those who fought so valiantly on the seas, in the air, and on foreign shores to preserve our heritage of freedom, and

WHEREAS, the Governor of the State of Texas by proclamation has further requested all citizens of the State of Texas to observe Friday, November 11, 1955, as Veterans Day,

NOW, THEREFORE, I, O. W. Rhinehart, Mayor of the City of Bovina, Texas, do hereby call upon all the citizens of Bovina to observe Friday, November 11, 1955, as Veterans Day. I request all citizens of this City, business enterprises, veterans' organizations and city officials to assist the State Committee for the observance of Veterans Day with appropriate ceremonies.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF I have hereunto set my hand and caused the official seal of the City of Bovina to be affixed.

Mustangs To Meet Farwell

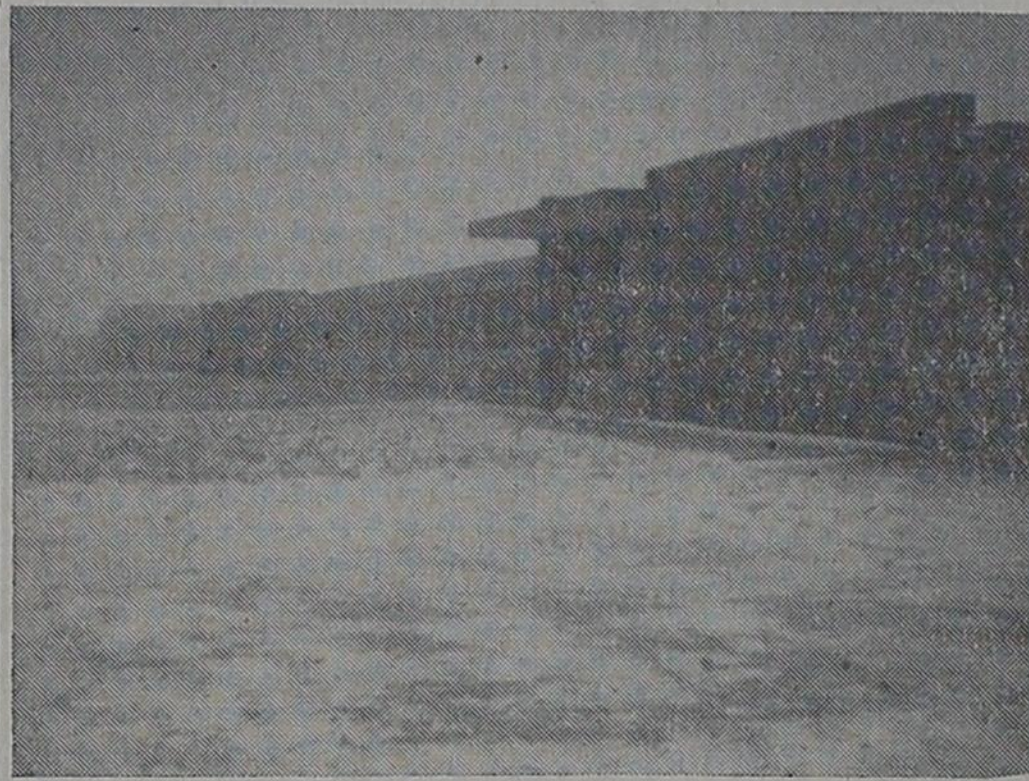
The up and down Bovina Mustangs do battle with their favorite rival, the Farwell Steers, Friday afternoon at 2:30 p. m. at Mustang Field.

If Smith does not play, Coach

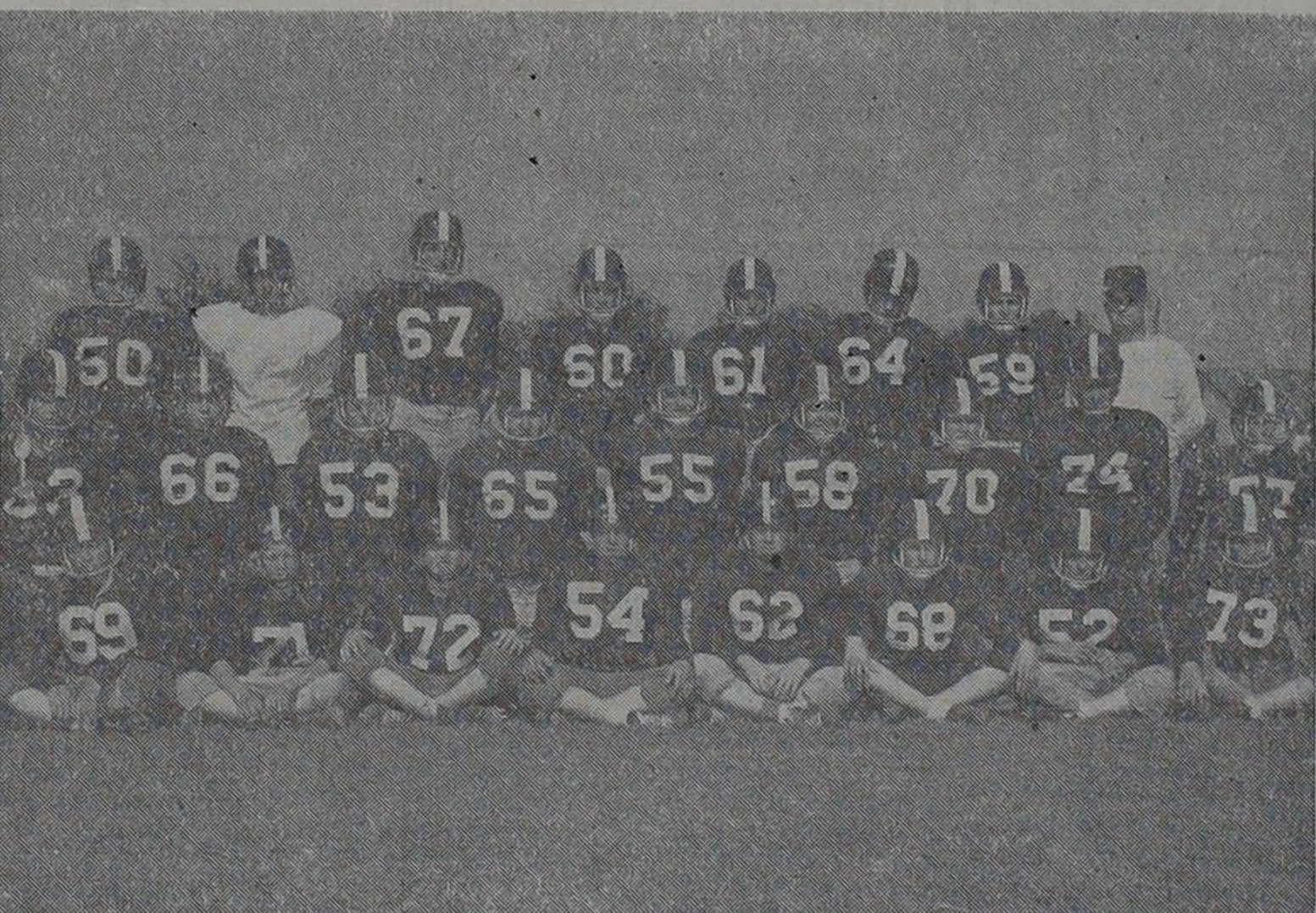

Homecoming, dedication of Bovina's \$600,000 school, and the annual Bovina Mustang-Farwell Steer football game will highlight Veterans' Day Friday, November 11 in Bovina.

High school bands from Bovina, Farwell, and Friona and American Legion posts from Bovina and Farwell will parade through downtown Bovina in the afternoon. The groups that will be in the parade will form at the end of North Street between Gulf Oil Corporation warehouse and Triplett Cattle Company. The parade is scheduled to start at 1:30 p. m. Plans are being made to get highway patrolmen to direct the traffic during the parade.

After the parade, flag raising ceremonies will be held at Mustang Football Field, says W. H. Willoughby, superintendent of Bovina Schools.

Andy Rogers, state senator from Childress, will deliver the main address at the dedication ceremonies of the school building. Rogers' speech topic was not known. The dedication will begin at 10:00 a. m. and will be held in the auditorium of the school building.

The invocation at the dedication ceremonies will be given by Rev. W. R. Beard, pastor of the Bovina Methodist Church. The Bovina High School Band, under the direction of Wayne Stevens, will present three numbers—"The Star Spangled Banner," "Maroon and White," and "United Nations March."

Following the band's presentations, the Junior Wilsonaires, a local girls' trio, will sing "Are You From Dixie?" and "Wake the Town and Tell the People." Judy Roach will follow with "Twelfth Street Rag." Kay Leake will sing "Why Don't You Fall in Love With Me." Billy Charles, "The Little Red School House," Nickie Woeful, "The Breeze," Paula Kay Kerby and Elaine Fuller, "Goodnight Sweetheart, Goodnight," and Harriet Lou Charles, "It's a Great Night For Singing."

Mustangs Have It Rough, Lose to Anton 26-7

Bovina Mustangs, suffering an "off" night after being "up" against Kress Kangaroos the week before went down to defeat in the hands of the Anton Bulldogs at Anton Friday night.

Before a crowd of almost as many Bovina fans as Anton fans the Mustangs were never in the running and trailed by a 19-0 count at the half-time period.

In what was their poorest showing of the season, the Mustangs got behind early in the first quarter after Larry Ezell had kicked off for the locals and an exchange of

fumbles had given the ball back to the determined Bulldogs.

A 15 yard penalty helped the winner's cause, but it was a sensational catch by 158 pound, senior end, J. Bass of a quarterback R. Burdette pass that climaxed the scoring drive that began on the Anton 44 yard line.

Bass, running in the left flat, reached out almost to the point of falling to get the pass on his finger tips and then tucked it under his arm and scampered over the goal line for the first touchdown. A passing attempt for the extra point

was foiled by the Mustangs and Anson led 6-0 just 15 plays deep in the district 3-B ballgame.

Following the kickoff, the locals were forced to punt from their own 32. Darrell Read, quarterback, punted out of bounds on the Bulldog's 33. From that point, Anton started a drive downfield that featured a 19 yard run by William Detwiler. Detwiler ran from the 29 to the 10 and was stopped by the last man who had a chance at him—Ezell. As the first quarter ended, the Bulldog's second long drive of the quarter had carried

them to their opponents three yard line.

R. Howard, 130 pound junior back, went across for the second touchdown on the first play of the second quarter. Detwiler failed in his running attempt for the extra point and the Bulldogs were in the lead, 12-0.

Read took the ensuing kickoff on the eight yard line and returned it to the 33. Julius Bradshaw picked up four to the 37 and then failed to gain. Read passed incomplete to bring up fourth down and six yards needed for a first.

Read punted out of bounds on the Anton 31 and from that point the Bulldogs set up still a third successful drive for their third touchdown. Burdette and Bass again teamed together to provide the outstanding play of the drive. Burdette passed from the 26 to Bass on the nine. Bass and two Mustang defenders went up in the air after the ball but Bass came down with it in his possession.

In two attempts to move across the goal line, Detwiler had the ball on the one foot line and R. Lambeth added the scoring touch

and Anton led 18-0. Bass kicked the extra point to boost the score to 19-0.

Read almost got away on the kickoff following the third touchdown. He took the ball on the 21 and returned it to the 39 before he was brought to the ground. A Read pass to Ezell, who was behind the secondary defenders, was too tall, and three unsuccessful plays later the winners took over on downs. They had time to run one play before the gun sounded the end of the first half.

EDITORIAL COMMENT

Doesn't Help

There is an Interscholastic League rule that says that spectators should not get any closer to a high school football game than the fence that encloses the field. Bovina fans are guilty of breaking this rule in numerous cases.

When the fans cross the fence and walk or run up and down the side of the field with the teams, they jeopardize their favorite team's standing in its district.

Being across the fence isn't, in itself, bad. But the things that can happen as a result of fans being too near the field are. In a way, a man who is a loyal fan can't be blamed for wanting to be near his team. But the grandstands and bleachers weren't built for decoration.

The rule hasn't been enforced at Bovina or at any other District 3-B games that we know about, but Superintendent W. H. Willoughby has announced that the rule will be brought to the attention of the crowd before the Bovina Mustang-Farwell Steer game Friday.

As mentioned before, being near the sidelines isn't bad. But such remarks as "Get the referee," "Kill 'em," "They're (the opposition) paying the referee," are.

It would put things in a pretty sad state of affairs if a team was kicked out of its district because it had a bunch of hard-headed, unsportsmanlike people for fans.

Not only are these fans apt to hurt the team's district standing, but it doesn't help the team to play a better game in any way. An organized cheering section would probably do a lot more good.

Can you expect a group of high school players to be good sports when their adult leaders won't follow Interscholastic League rules?

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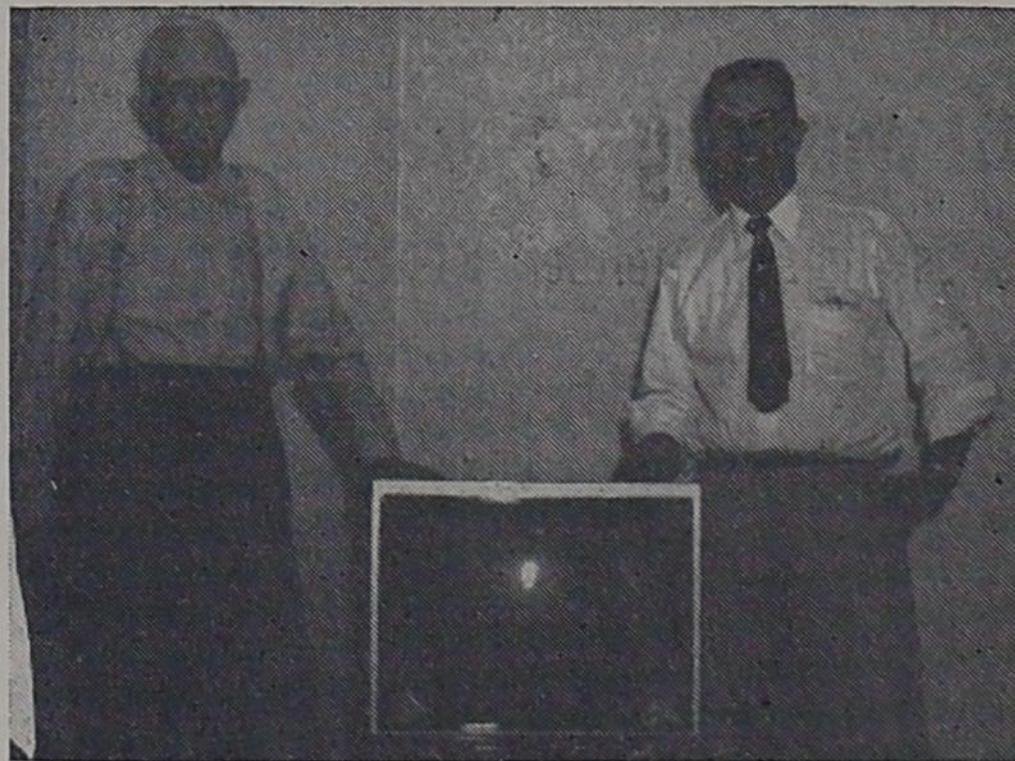

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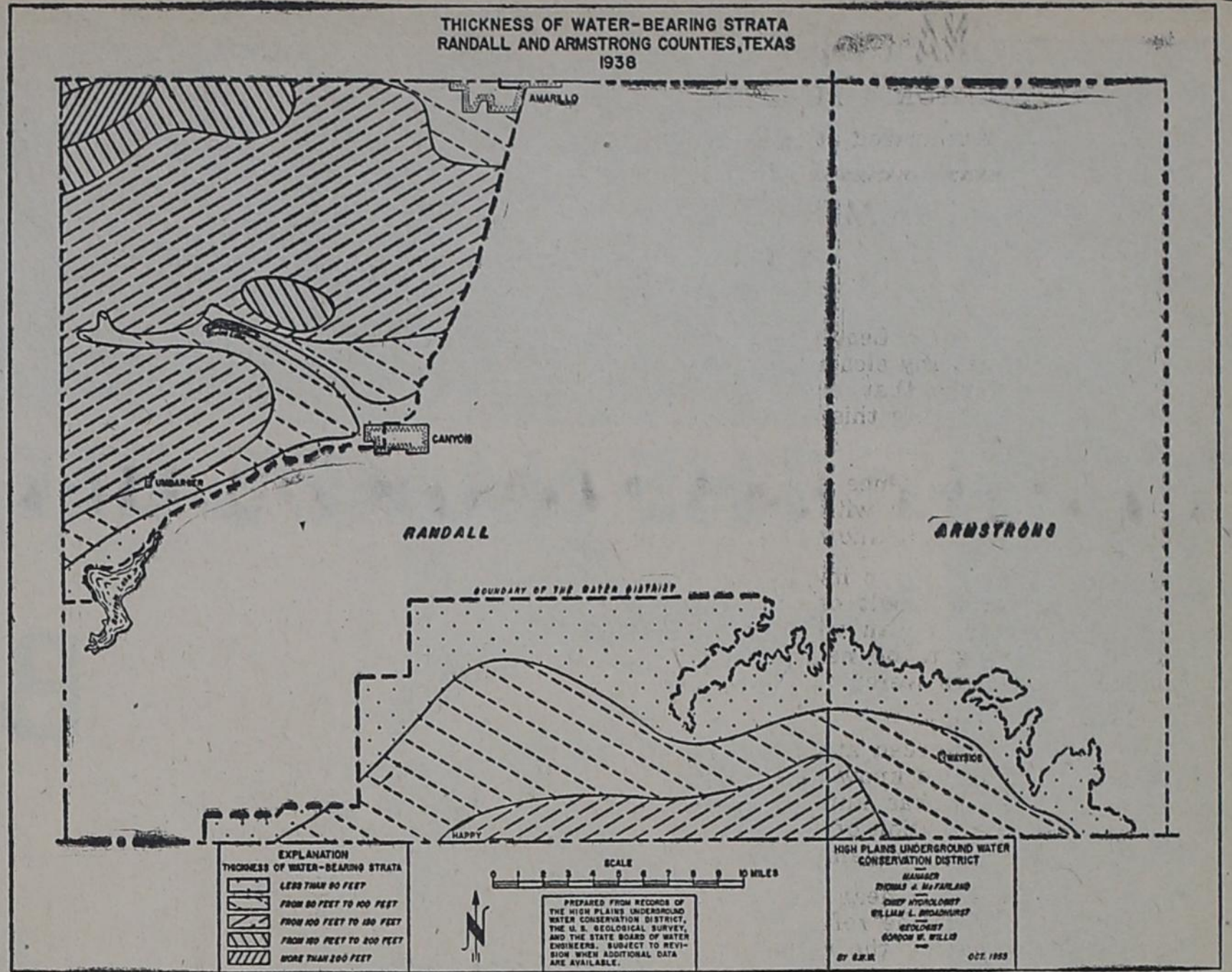

Dairy herd improvement associations have been operating in Texas since 1927 and are credited with doing much to improve both milk and butterfat production in the participating herds. For herds in DHIA, milk production, since 1937, has been increased 1,751 pounds per cow and butter fat 48 pounds. The average Texas milk cow produced last year 3,400 pounds of milk and 140 pounds of butterfat while the average for the cows in DHIA were 7,260 pounds of milk and 315 pounds of butterfat.

Randall, Armstrong Water Survey Out

The portions of Randall and Armstrong Counties within the boundary of the High Plains Under- ground Water Conservation District have been combined on the accompanying maps. About 275,000 acres of Randall County and about 39,000 acres of Armstrong County are within the boundary of the Water District.

The area within the Water District in Randall County contains about 3,380,000 acre-feet of ground water in storage available for pumping. In Armstrong County the

amount of ground water in storage available for pumping is about 279,000 acre-feet.

The map in plate 1 shows the thickness of the water-bearing strata between the water table and the redbeds in 1938 before an appreciable amount of water had been pumped from the reservoir.

The volume of water remaining in the underground reservoir was determined by subtracting the volume of material unwatered since 1938 from the total volume of saturated material in 1938 and multiplying the remainder by the coefficient of storage of 15 percent.

These data show about 3,940,000 acre-feet of water was in storage in Randall County available for pumping in 1938, and about 557,000 acre feet of water, or about 14%, has been removed from storage since 1938.

In Armstrong County, the data show about 325,000 acre-feet of

water was in storage available for pumping in 1938, and about 46,000 acre-feet of water, or about 14%, has been removed from storage since 1938.

The approximate quantity of underground water in storage, available for pumping, beneath an individual farm may be determined by multiplying the number of acres in the farm by the thickness of the water-bearing strata underlying the farm and then multiplying by the storage coefficient of 15 percent.

HAS NEW INSTRUMENT

The University of Texas chemistry department has a new instrument, an infra-red spectrophotometer, which can accomplish in two minutes an experiment which formerly took a laboratory student six hours to perform.

The instrument was given to the university by Columbia Southern Chemical Corporation.

By comparing the color intensities of solutions, the spectrophotometer can accurately determine the identity of a solution, as well as its concentration and purity.

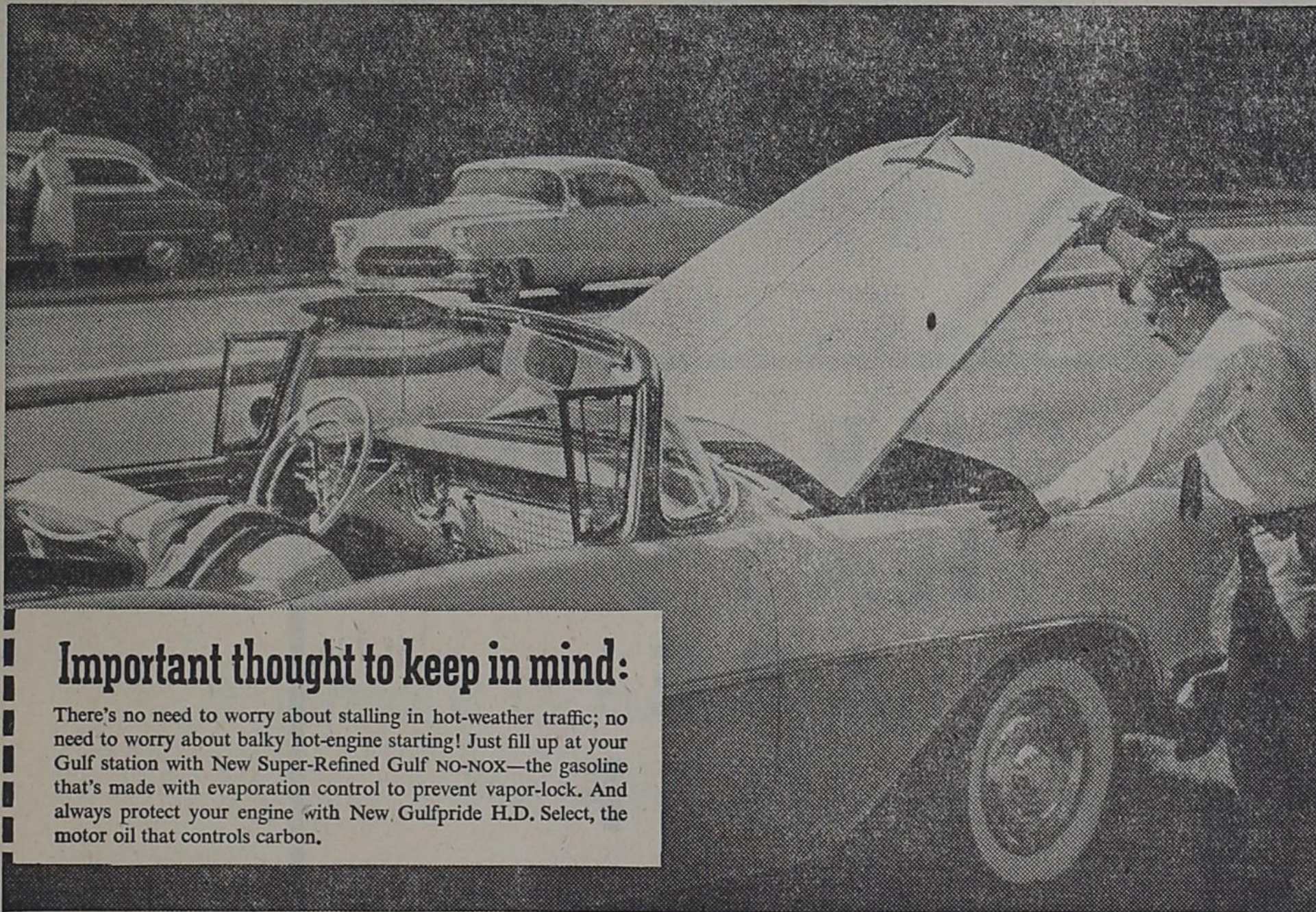
Oil Men Learn Old Indian Trick

While massive, deep-boring drills have replaced the American Indian's oil-gathering trick of laying a blanket on a petroleum-filmed stream and then wringing it out, there's one Indian trick modern oil men continue to rely on in emergencies.

Usually, the first thing visitors to a petroleum refinery notice is the flame they see burning atop the tall flare stacks. "What's it for?" they ask, "and how do you get it lit?"

The flame is a safety precaution that constantly burns off excess and demonstrating that all's well. If a high wind ever extinguishes it, an electrical device, operated from inside the plant, ignites it. There's a standby circuit, in case the first fails.

And at one plant, if both fail (which hasn't happened yet), there's an employee available who is an expert bowman. Reverting to the ancient skills of the American Indian, he actually relights the flare by shooting a flaming arrow.



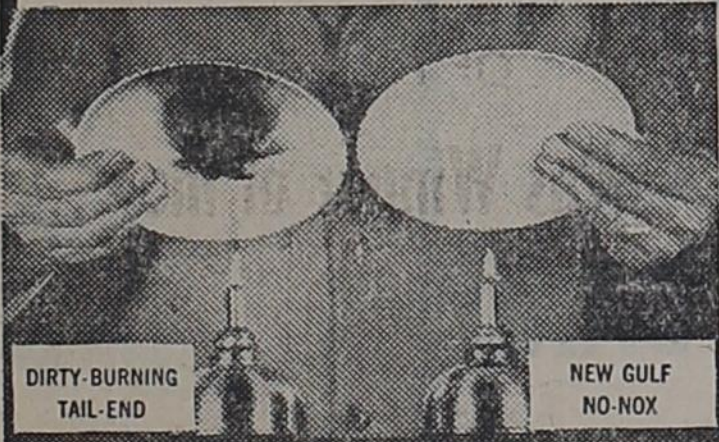

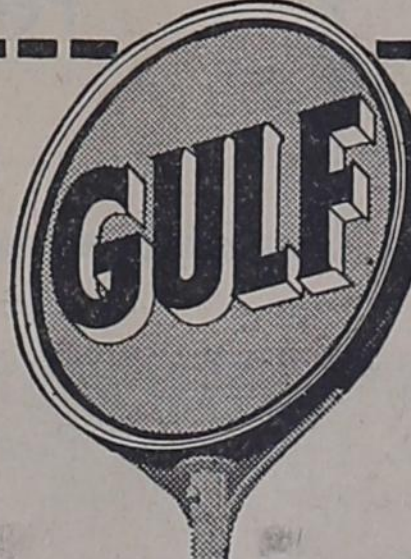

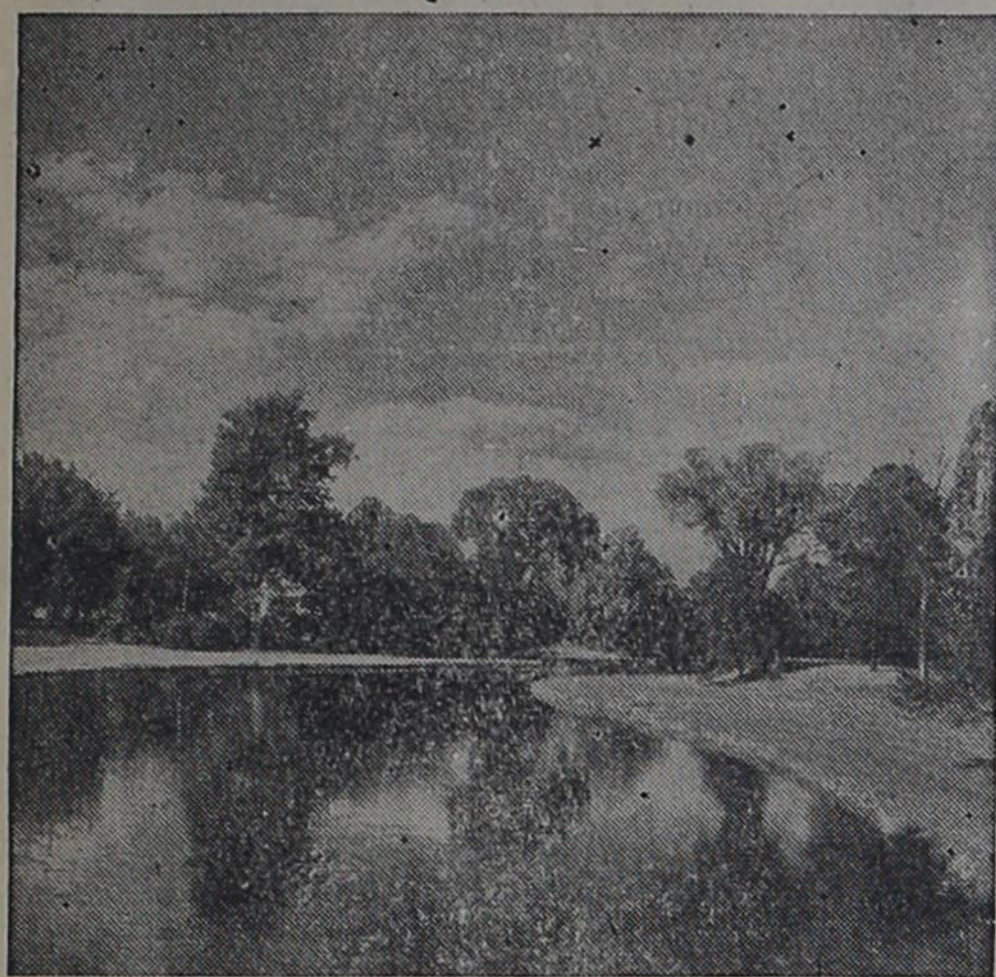

Filter clouds into your snapshots for attractive scenic shots this summer.

The Mystery of the Clouds that Disappeared

A bright blue sky, tastefully decorated with fluffy white clouds, are the snapshotter's delight. There's no better background for pictures of any kind—whether your subject is a beautiful landscape or a pretty girl.

You wait most impatiently for such pictures to come back from the photofinisher. But when you see them, the first glance tells you that the scene isn't quite as you remember it. The clouds are gone! Vanished . . . disappeared, not a trace of one in sight.

There is an explanation—and a solution to this mystery.

We see the clouds because they stand out against the blueness of the sky. But black-and-white film doesn't "see" colors as such. It records colors according to their different brightnesses in a corresponding range of grey tones. Thus, in your snapshot, the blue

sky becomes light grey and the clouds don't show.

But it is an easy matter to trap those elusive clouds—just slip a filter over the lens of your camera to cut out some of the light from the sky so that it will be recorded in darker tones.

There are many types of filters, most of them for special purposes. Talk to your photo dealer about the one that is best for you. And, if you are a box camera user, don't be scared by any talk of filter factors and adjusting the camera's settings to make up for the light you cut out. Today's black-and-white films have so much exposure latitude that you'll get good pictures anyway.

Filters are very inexpensive—and they'll save you from pondering the mystery of the clouds that disappeared.
