UNION COMPRESS, which has had warehouse facilities in Bovina for a number of years, has undergone a change, both in their company name and in the scope of the business.

The company is now known as West Texas Industries, Inc. Houston Hoover, manager of the Bovina facility, announced this week that the change was brought about because of the diversification of the company's business.

At the same time, he announces that the diversification program will affect the local warehouse. Hoover plans to use the largest warehouse at the Bovina location as a storage facility, and rent spaces by the year for storage of everything from Winnebagos to combines.

The large warehouse is as big as a football field (actually measuring 195x300 feet), just under 60,000 square feet. Hoover thinks the facility would be ideal for farmers to store their expensive combines, trucks and other equipment during the 10 months or so they are not in use. It would be an ideal way for farmers to get their equipment in out of the weather.

Hoover has installed a 19.5x16 foot door at the south end of the warehouse to take care of large equipment. He has the building marked off in "bays" that measure 1550 square feet—enough to accommodate several pieces of equipment.

The storage facility won't be limited to farm equipment, but will be open to general storage.

Sounds like a good idea on the part of Hoover, if farmers of the area will avail themselves of the facility. Bovina's location is such that even for the farmer with more than one piece of land, the warehouse will serve as a central location.

DR. JAMES BLAKELY, a former speaker at the Bovina Chamber of Commerce banquet, spoke at the Friona Chamber banquet Monday night, and "Doc" Blakely is just as funny as ever.

Dr. Blakely, in an effort to explain enthusiasm, told about the young woman running an ad in the classified section. It said "Young secretary needs job. No bad habits. Willing to learn." That, Blakely said, was an example of enthusiasm.

Blakely gave the following quotation: "The end of the world is evidently near. Children are not obeying their parents. Every man wants to write a book." Although the quote sounds like it could have been written or said anytime lately, it came from an ancient manuscript, Blakely said, that had been estimated to date to around the year 2800 BC. So things haven't changed much in this old world for the past 4,000 years or so.

POLITICS CONTINUE to simmer in the county, with the filing deadline creeping up. The deadline is Monday, February 2, and not in March as we had reported earlier.

The Friona precinct will elect a commissioner this year, and as of Tuesday morning, there were four candidates announced on the Democratic ticket for the position.

The Farwell-Oklahoma Lane precinct likewise has a commissioner's race, and three men have filed for that position.

We also learned this week that Doyle Elliott, a Friona attorney, will run for District Attorney against longtime office holder Jack Young of Muleshoe.

We already had a race for the Sheriff's office, with Bill Denney opposing Charlie Lovelace, so it looks like voters will have ample reason for going to the polls this year.

We will also have the opportunity this year of having the presidential candidates on the primary ballot for the first time.

As a precaution, officials urge all voters to re-register for voting during 1976. Voters will have to get registered by the first of April in order to be eligible to vote in the May 1 primary.

Better do this at your earliest opportunity, so you will be eligible to have a part in what bids to be a big political year.

Damaged Chair 'Just Dumped'

"Now, why would anyone do something like this?" asked Elton Venable, pointing to a badly-damaged wheel chair he had salvaged a couple of days ago from the dump ground here.

It wasn't just any wheel chair—it was one which the American Legion Post in Bovina had loaned to someone in need.

The service organization here owns a wide variety of hospital-type equipment specifically to loan people in temporary need of such items as wheel chairs, crutches, etc.

The wheel chair Venable discovered at the city dump sported one completely crushed wheel, torn armrests and the other wheel was bent out of shape,

perhaps when the chair was thrown out at the dump.

"We know who the chair was loaned out to," said Venable. "We keep a record of who borrows these things." Venable said the chair costs about \$100 and could be repaired. "It wouldn't have been so bad if the people had just brought the chair back to us and explained the damage," he commented in pointing out that if he hadn't found the chair it would have been lost forever.

"The American Legion does this as a service to people who live in our community," he continued.

"I just don't understand why they will damage the equipment and then destroy it."

BY COMMISSIONERS

50% Property Tax Increase Proposed

Parmer County Commissioners took initial steps toward raising county property taxes an estimated 50 per cent in a meeting at the courthouse Monday of last week.

The Commissioners Court voted unanimously to increase the assessment ratio from 10 per cent of "market value" to 15 per cent. The percentage ratio is used to determine the assessed value of property for tax purposes and the five per cent increase will mean a tax increase of about 50 per cent if the present tax rate of \$1.42 per \$100 valuation is retained.

Final action will not be taken until the court's next regular meeting Monday, however, commissioners indicated last week that the \$1.42 rate would probably be retained.

The commissioners agreed the tax increase will be necessary to keep the county from operating "in the red" in the future.

Commissioner Jimmy Briggs of Lazbuddie pointed out that eventually all property in the county will have to be reappraised to place realistic market values on property. However, the commissioners agreed that "the cheapest way out" for the present would be to increase the assessment ratio.

County Attorney Johnny Atkinson said a county-wide reappraisal would cost approximately \$80,000. To avoid the costly procedure, the county attorney reported it would be legal for the commissioners court to raise the assessment ratio.

An example of the proposed plan would be as follows: if a property has a "true or market value" of \$10,000, it has had an assessed valuation of \$1,000 using the 10 per cent ratio. Using the proposed 15 per cent ratio, the assessed valuation would be \$1,500. Using the \$1.42 per \$100 valuation, this would be an increase in taxes from \$14.20 to \$21.30.

This past year the "market value" of property carried on the county tax assessor's books was \$191,920,800 with an assessed valuation of \$19,192,080. Tax collections from that 1975 amount are expected to total \$260,499. Using the proposed 15 per cent ratio, tax collections for 1976 would total about \$390,000.

In addition to Briggs, other commissioners attending the meeting were Charlie Jefferson, Tom

Lewellen, Cecil Atchley and County Judge Paul Fortenberry.

In other matters on the agenda, the court approved county officers' salaries, approved payment of \$10,000 to county fire departments and worked out an arrangement for court house insurance.

A back hoe for Precinct 3 was purchased, on a bid of \$9,848 from Tucker Equipment Company of Clovis. Other bids were received from Amarillo and Odessa firms.

The annual supplemental payments to the four county fire

departments, to help cover expenses incurred in fighting rural fires, were approved. \$2,500 each is paid annually to the fire departments at Bovina, Farwell, Friona and Lazbuddie.

The county tax assessor was authorized to proceed with preparation of a tax ratio of 15 per cent of true or market value.

After discussion of bids from five firms on insuring the court house and its contents, it finally was suggested that the five insurance (Continued on Page 7)

REC Honors 150 Years Of Service

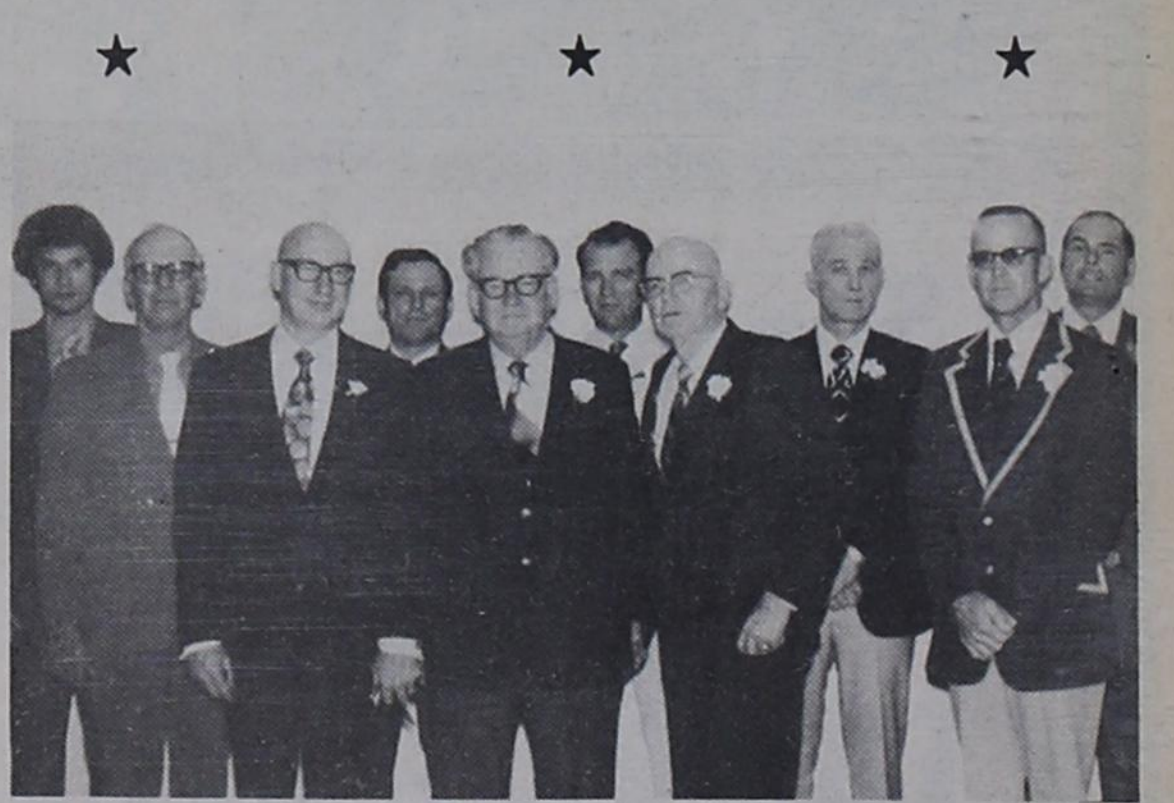
Employees and directors of Deaf Smith REC were honored recently for a total of 150 years of service. The recognition was held at the REC's annual Christmas party and dinner.

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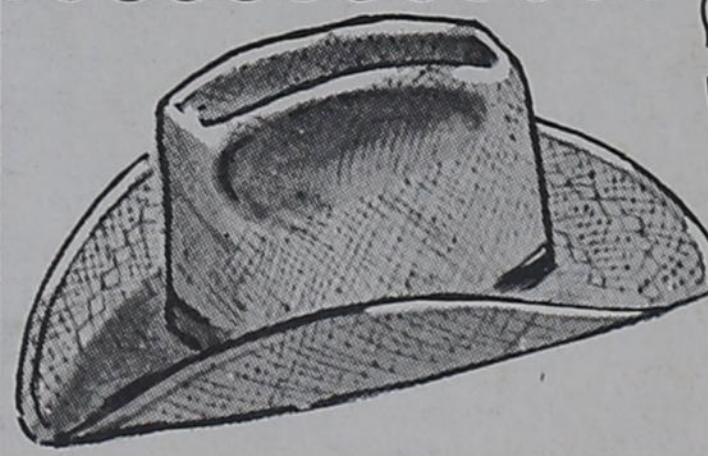

ROY ROGERS MOVIE

World Premiere Set At Lubbock

Roy Rogers is back. After a 20-year absence from movie making, the legendary star returns in "Mackintosh and T.J." which will have its world premiere at the Winchester Theatre in Lubbock Thursday, Feb. 5.

A gala evening is planned for West Texas' first world premiere of any major movie. Roy Rogers will be on hand for the event which will benefit the Ranching Heritage Center at The Museum of Texas Tech University.

The center, now planning its formal opening for July 2-5, is an authentic outdoor exhibit depicting the history of ranching in America's West.

Those attending the premiere will have a reception at 7 p.m. in the lobby of the Winchester. The film will start at 8 p.m. in the lobby of the Winchester. The film will start at 8 p.m. Those who purchase Golden Row tickets will attend an after-theatre supper party with Roy Rogers. Tickets are \$10, \$25 and \$50. "Mackintosh and T.J." is a contemporary western, filmed at the 208,000 acre 6666 Ranch, 92 miles east of Lubbock near Guthrie. None of the sets were constructed. All are set against the

backdrop of the famous 6666. Instead of a 10-gallon hat and buckskin, Rogers' costuming is usually a straw hat and cotton shirt. Instead of Trigger, Roy's transportation is a broken-down pickup truck.

Rogers' co-star is Clay O'Brien who was born six years after Roy's last picture, "Son of Paleface," was released.

O'Brien is no newcomer, however. Now 14 years old, he began his career when he was 9 in "The Cowboys." He followed that with another John Wayne vehicle, "Cahill, U.S. Marshall." Most recently, he added a Huck Finn appeal to Disney's "Apple Dumpling Gang," and he has played opposite Fess Parker and with James Garner in "One Little Indian."

Rogers, the star of 87 feature films before the long dry spell, chose "Mackintosh and T.J." because of the story.

There's action-bronch busting, brawls, a rabies epidemic, and even murder.

"But it's the relationship between the tough old cowboy and the fatherless boy that gives the picture its 'heart,'" said Roy. Roger adds understanding to the part as he himself is the father of nine-four of his children adopted and one a foster child.

Director Marvin Chomsky, whose array of film credits includes television's award-winning four-hour special on the Klu Klux

Klan, calls Rogers "one of the most unflappable actors I've ever worked with."

Larry Mahan, six-time "All American Cowboy" who holds more rodeo records than anyone, plays one of the 6666 hands. After watching Rogers ride, he offered to "be his agent" if the cowboy star ever wanted to join the rodeo circuit.

Music for the film is by Waylon Jennings of Littlefield, Texas.

The film also stars Billy Green Bush, Andrew Robinson and Joan Hackett. The screenplay is by Paul Savage. Penland Productions of North Hollywood, Calif., produced the film.

First comments, according to Tim Penland, producer, indicate that audiences will see the picture as "top rate entertainment for the whole family."
