To say this area is dry, weatherwise, could compare with the understatement of all times, as this is being written. We overheard a veteran farmer comment this week that he had wished for a half-inch rain many times during his career in agriculture, but he believed he was wanting one now more than he ever had before. If said farmer hadn't been so serious, the statement would have been even more amusing.

With the temperature knocking on the door of 100 degrees Monday and the wind blowing what seemed to be that many miles an hour, there was some discouragement for most all kinds of agricultural projects. "It's days like this," commented said farmer, "that I'm glad I'm farming just the little dab I am instead of the three sections or so that I often wish I was. There's not as much of it to dry out and blow away the way it is now!"

That, friends, could be considered looking on the bright side of a dry, windy picture.

General Telephone Co. is putting out some feelers of late in regard to making it possible for Bovina and Friona to be on the same telephone hookup. In other words, the company is interested in how the people would feel about making a call between Friona and Bovina a local call instead of long distance as it is now.

Allen Waldrip, the company manager for this district who lives in Littlefield, was here a few days ago discussing the proposal. He pointed out that arrangements to provide the service could be made by the company if a majority of the people who would be concerned were in favor of it.

Cost? Yes, there will be an additional cost, he pointed out but that cost would be only enough to pay the company's expense for such a setup.

We asked him, and we shouldn't have, if the company had plans for a price increase, anyway. He said there are no such plans that he knows of. Our first thought was that if a rate increase was forthcoming anyway, we might as well have the additional service, Waldrip assured us, though, that there was no connection between the proposed additional service and a planned rate increase.

The second biggest drawback to the proposal--the first is the money--is that the rural exchanges at Friona and here wouldn't be included in the plan. A call from the Farmer exchange to Bovina would still be long distance after Bovina and Friona proper are connected. The same would hold true for telephone subscribers on Tharp. Their calls to Friona would continue to be long distance.

The additional service proposal is something to think about and we are convinced that it could become a possibility if the people in Bovina and Friona want it and are willing to pay a slightly higher phone bill each month. Friona folks are encouraging the idea, we understand.

It's something that could be of benefit to both communities and the residents thereof.

The start of another boys' baseball program is less than a week away here.

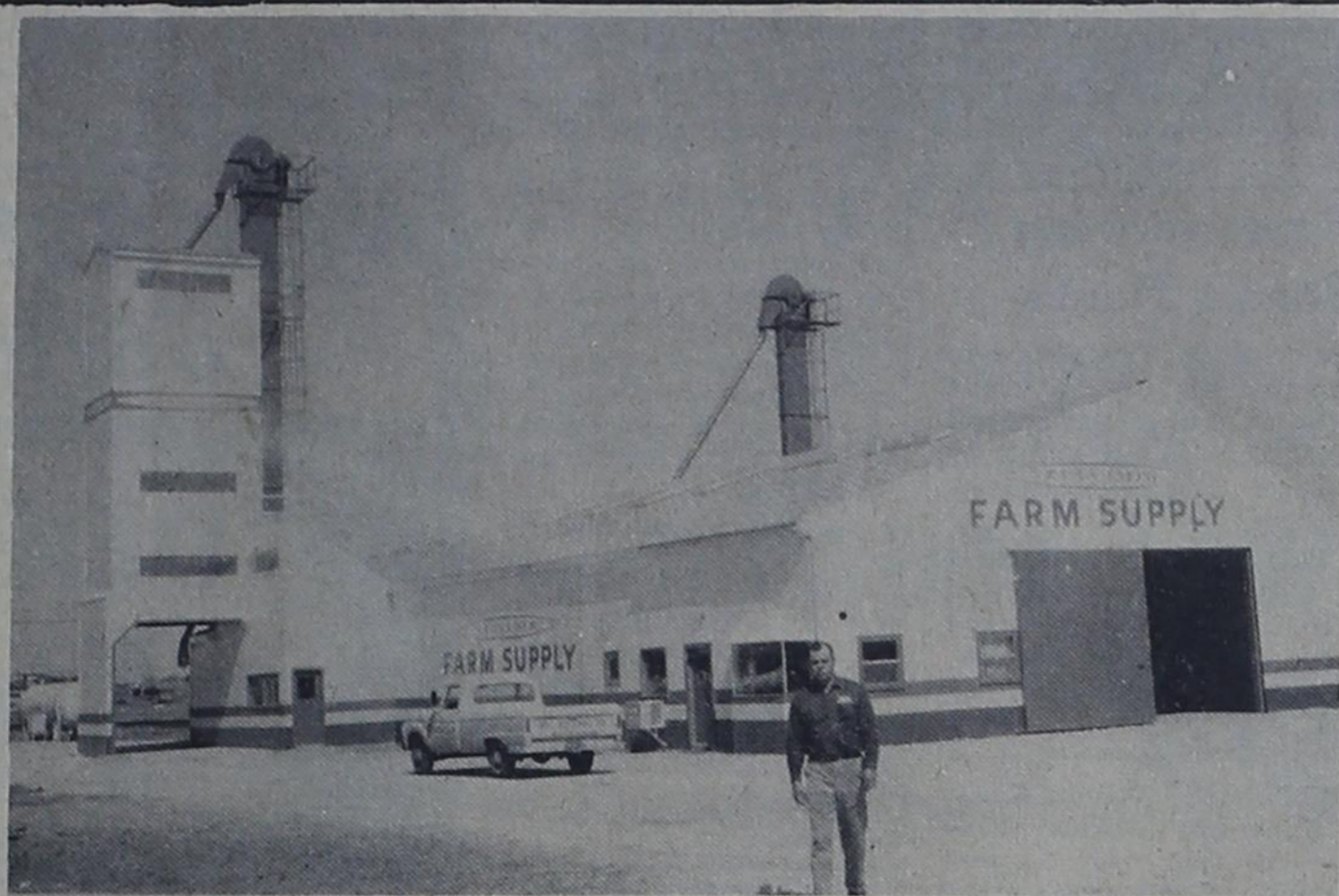
Spectators can get more out of the season if they'll get in on the first of it and watch the teams improve as the season progresses.

# Bovina Gets Approval For Project Headstart

Project Headstart, a program financed by the federal government to better prepare children from low income families to enter the first grade, will be conducted in Bovina again this summer, Superintendent Otis Spears announces.

Word was received here last week from Senator Ralph Yarborough that the program for Bovina Independent School District was approved.

A grant of \$5,644 has been made through the Office of Economic Opportunity.

The program here is designed for 40 pre-school children. It is scheduled to begin Monday, June 6, and will continue 40 school days, ending July 29, Spears announces.

Children who participate in the program will receive two meals, breakfast and lunch, each day, get medical attention,

have classroom learning activities and supervised field trips. Two teachers will be employed for the program. In addition to the teachers, two cafeteria workers and a school bus driver will be hired.

This year's program is designed for 10 more students than was last year's. The grant

**\$500 Above State Schedule --**

**Teachers Get Pay Increase**

Base pay for teachers in Bovina Schools will be increased by \$300 next year.

At a special meeting of the school board last week, a decision was made to increase the "above state schedule" pay for teachers in Bovina Independent School District from \$200 to \$500, according to an announcement from Superintendent Otis Spears.

Most teachers who were already receiving more than the minimum set by the state were not effected by the raise, the superintendent points out.

Those who will receive the pay increase with the beginning of next school year are those who are now receiving the minimum set by the state plus the \$200 paid by the school district.

Included in the group which was already being paid more than \$500 a year above state schedule are instructors of science, math, special education and band and administrators and coaches.

Athletic Director Roy Stone, who is head football coach, also received a pay increase.

The school district here has been paying \$200 above the state schedule for the past two years.

"The increase to \$500 above state schedule will put us in a better position to employ new teachers as we need them," Spears commented about the recent school board action.

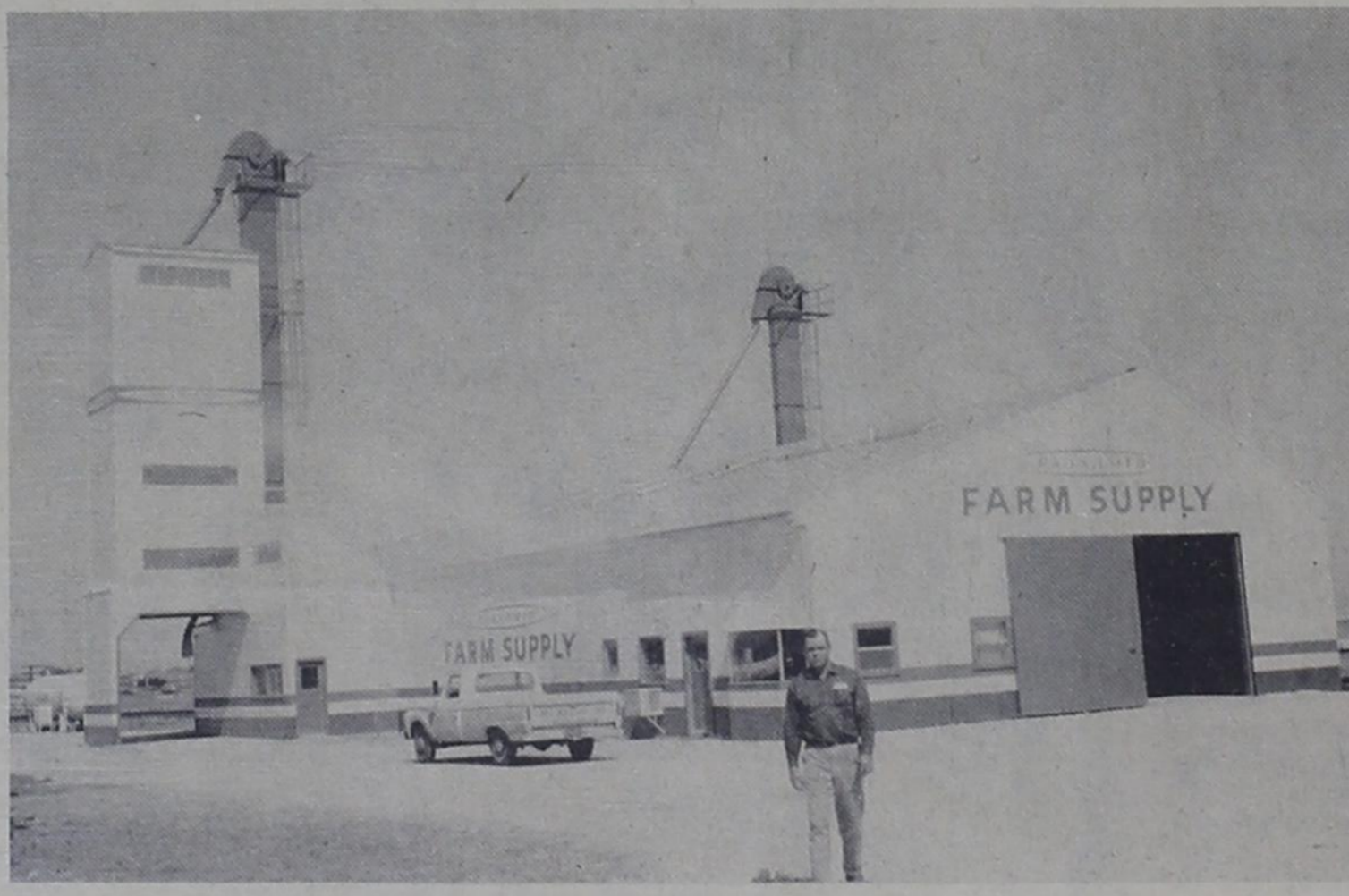

## On The Farm In Parmer County

We have been busy getting a lot of crop demonstrations out in the past couple of weeks. There is one, a wheat variety demonstration, that needs to be looked at real soon by farmers interested in seeing some new varieties. The wheat variety demonstration is located on the A. L. Reznik farm, 8 miles north and 2 miles east of Friona. Drive by A.L.'s house and the plots are located about 1/4 mile east of his house.

**COTTON INSECTS**  
We know of several farmers who used an insecticide at planting time this year. They should have the early season insect problem pretty well under control.

In order to assist cotton producers in their fight against insects pests, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has released the 1966, "Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects in the High Plains" and copies are available at the offices of all county agents in cotton producing counties.

Copies of the revised guide are now ready for distribution from his office to any interested cotton grower.

The guide not only lists the recommended chemicals but also the amounts of each needed for insect control. Advice and suggestions are also given on the safe use of insecticides.

Recommendations in the guide are based on the results of continuing research conducted throughout the state by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Entomology Research Division, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Cotton growers are advised to inspect their cotton fields to determine the degree of infestation and to check for such pests as thrips, aphids and later on fleahoppers which may influence the choice of insecticides before applying an insecticide. Call or come by the County Agent's office for your guide on controlling cotton insects.

### TREE BORERS

## At Home In Parmer County

**COLD WATER LAUNDRYING**  
The appearance on the market of cold-water detergents, aroused much interest in cold water laundrying. Is it safe from a bacteriological standpoint? This is the usual question asked. Many homemakers have not thought about this where bacteria control is important.

The fact is, that cold water destroys less bacteria than hot water. Research has already shown that large number of bacteria survived even in hot-water laundering unless a disinfectant was added. Experiments proved that many more bacteria survived cold-water than hot water washing when a detergent but no disinfectant was used. This all must be taken into consideration.

The general conclusion is that cold-water laundrying is satisfactory from standpoint of bacterial safety if a chlorine or quaternary disinfectant is used in the same amount recommended for hot-water laundrying.

Shade trees are attacked by several species of borers. The two most important are known as roundheaded and flatheaded borers.

Since the presence of borers is not always evident until it is too late to prevent extensive damage, good tree management is important in preventing borer attacks.

We suggest that the trunks of young or transplanted trees be wrapped with nursery wrapping paper, burlap, aluminum foil or newspapers to prevent egg laying by adult borers. Wrapping also aids in preventing sun scald and mechanical injury. Injured areas of the bark are particularly vulnerable to borer attack.

The trunks should be sprayed with dieldrin, DDT or malathion before they are wrapped. Be sure to use the wettable powder form of these insecticides to avoid injuring the bark of the young trees when the wrapping is applied. Keep the wrapping on all year and replace it if it becomes torn.

Keep the trees healthy and stimulate vigorous growth by proper fertilization and watering.

Prune out all dead or dying branches and paint the wounds with a good wood paint. Wounds made by lawn mowers or other machinery should be treated in the same manner.

Trees and shrubs should be selected which are adapted to the area and those which are not so susceptible to borer attacks. Ash, cottonwood, linden, soft maple and poplar are quite susceptible.

It is very important that the insecticides be applied early in the spring before the young borers get into the tree. Once they are in the tree control is very difficult. It is the larvae of the borers which cause the damage.

Information is available from the County Agent's office on borer control and on other subjects dealing with the control of insects on ornamental plants. Ask for the copy of L-199, "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Ornamental Plants."
