



In order to assist cotton producers in their fight against insects pests, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has Insects in the High Plains" and copies are available at the offices of all county agents in cotton producing counties.

Copies of the revised guide are now ready for distribution from his office to any interested cotton grower.

The guide not only lists the recommended chemicals but also the amounts of each needsuggestions are also given on the safe use of insecticides. Recommendations in the guide are based on the results of continuing research conducted throughout the state by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Entomology Research Division, U.S. Department of Agriculture.
