HERBERT HOOVER **ASSUMES OFFICE** U. S. PRESIDENT

Sworn In as Nation's Chief; Charles Curtis Takes Oath as Vice President.

Washington, March 7 .- The administration of the Federal government passed Monday from Coolidge and Dawes to Hoover and Curtis, amid inaugural splendors which even a chill, dripping rain could but partially dim.

Taking his oath of service in the presence of many thousands who sat in the open to hear him, unmindful of the penetrating bombardment from the skies, the new chief executive made the enforcement of prohibition a high peak of his declaration of faith.

Then, as the concluding act of the inaugural drama, he reviewed a parade of military and civilian units which made history. Soldiers and the marching clubs of many States trudged with flags flying and bands playing despite the rain, while aloft the giant Los Angeles, four blimps and several formations of airplanes made an aerial music new to the pageantry of inaugurations.

Calvin Coolidge, the burden of responsibility lifted from his shoulders and the shouting and tumult of a political career behind him, turned from the inaugural services before the parade began, paused a moment at union station to say a very brief farewell over a nationwide radio net, and within an hour and a half after his successor had taken office, was on his way back to Northampton.

Speaking to all the world in an inaugural address delivered from the historic east steps of the Capitol, the new chief executive declared disregard of law the Nation's greatest peril, and appealed directly to his fellow citizens to help secure observance of the prohibition law.

With hand upraised, he had repeated the words of the official oath of office, administered by Chief Justice Taft, shortly after noon, and had kissed the Bible at a passage saying, "He that keepeth the law, happy is

START MOVE FOR LARGE HOSPITAL FOR CHILDREN

Leading Texans Would Erect Non-Profit, Non-Sectarian Institution at Dallas.

Dallas, March 14.-The first move for children of the southwest.

southwest, the nearest being located in St. Louis and Denver, according to Dr. B. W. Caldwell, of Chicago, secretary of the American Hospital association, who has strongly endorsed the Texas project.

Headed by J. Edgar Pew, vice president of the Sun Oil company, a group of leading Texans have formed a board of sponsors that will seek the establishment of a Texas Childrens Hospital. This body is now being enlarged with representatives from leading cities and towns of the state. It will be the permanent organization of the institution.

The hospital will be non-profit, nonsectarian institution, it is stated. Its doors will be open to children of the southwest on a basis of complete equality, regardless of financial responsibility. To this end half of its 100 beds will be designated for totally free service and maintained by a \$1,000,000 endowment fund. The hospital building will cost \$600,000. Ground has already been given across the street from the Shrine Crippled Children's Hospital in Dallas, where the two institutions will work in close

Realizing that such a hospital can- our garage patrons. not fully serve Texas unless its facilities are made wholly available, the institution will be placed at the disposal of physicians throughout the state, not only for the treatment of their own patients, but for research and study of the latest developments in that highly specialized branch of medicine, Pediatrics-the treatment of child diseases

This entire project had its inception with three men: G. B. Dealey, publisher of the Dallas Morning News; P. R. Freeman, who recently built a \$70,000 free children's clinic upon which he settled an endowment of \$200,000, and W. M. Whitenton, former vice president of the M. K. & T. railroad. These men have interested a large number of equally prominent Texans throughout the state and members are still being invited to the board of sponsors. the permanent organization of the hos-

The \$1,600,000 necessary to build and endow the hospital will be sought from the philanthropic people of Texas in a fund activity to begin soon. The various departments of the hospital are to be reserved for donors for their use in the establishment of personal memorials to loved ones or to perpetuate family names. Instead of numbers, the various departments and rooms will be known by their memorial names, thus making this hospital a register of those whose enterprise has brought prosperity to Texas and the first place in the entire southwest for the adequate treatment of children. State headquarters of the undertaking have been opened at 505 Republic Bank building, Dallas, under the direction of Mr. Pew.

ONE FATALITY IN STOCK SHOW FIRE

Fort Worth, Texas, March 14 .-- A charred body, later identified as that of W. R. James of the city, an exhibitor at the show, was found in the ruins caused by a fire which destroyed Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show buildings shortly before noon Monday.


