Fire which partially destroyed a four-room cottage in South Merkel at 4 a. m. Wednesday claimed the life of Herman Lloyd Daniel, four-monthsold son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Dan-

The fire occurred at the home of Mrs. Daniel's mother, Mrs. S. A. Goodman, where the couple lived.

Mrs. Goodman was awakened by the crackle of the flames in the adjoining room-the kitchen. The baby was on a bed in he! room, and, after she had awakened her daughter and son-in-law in the next bedroom, fire was said to have blocked their attempt to reach the child. Firemen penetrated the dense smoke to remove the baby in a blanket, and he was carried to a doctor's office. Death from smoke inhalation had already claimed the life, the physician reported. The paby was also severely burned.






