Death Claims "Uncle" Joe Winter, 75, Owner of Land Where Deme Was Drilled in 1926.

Uncle Joe Winter, 75, pience Jones county farmer, on whose place the discovery well in the Noodle Dome oil field was drilled in 1926. died at 9:20 last Friday morning at his home in the Shiloh community

He had suffered a heart attack three weeks before and remained in the Sadler Clinic here for a week. After returning home he had a brain hemorrhage a week later and was recovering when the second attack occurred Friday morning.



And in 1905, the Prussian aeronautical observatory flew a kite which attained a height of four miles!


