Salaries of all non-elected employees of Taylor county and of two elected officials were raised Monday by county commissioners who based the necessity of the raise ca the increased cost of living.

Raises for each office in the county amounted to approximately 10 per cent although the raise in each em ployee's salary may not necessarily be 10 per cent, County Judge Wiley Caffey said. Raises were given according to the recommendation of officials of each office.

Taylor county commissioners from \$2.750 to \$2,000, the maximum salary allowed commissioners in counties of Taylor size by the state, failed. Commissioner Luther J. Webb made the motion to increase such salaries, seconed by Heuston Robertson. Judge Caffey voted against the increase when the vote was deadlocked by the opposition of Commissioners A. L. Cleveland and Floyd Tate.

Commissioners also approved the quarterly report of J. R. Clark, county treasurer. The report shows a balance on Dec. 31 of \$322,229.42 after \$181,605.67 was paid out last quarter. Bond and warrant indebtedness included: \$936,000, outstanding; \$742.000, bonds redeemed; \$705, 000, original issue. Securities owned by the county totaled \$76,500.




Have you ever mapped—with pins and thread, or with pencil on paper—the daily "chore route" of your farm or ranch? Have you figured how much back-tracking you do, how many unnecessary extra steps you walk in a day? Have you taken time to save time, and steps, and labor?





University of Arizona The control of roundworm on sheep ranches has been successfully tested by Dr. W. J. Pistor, University of Arizona Animal Pathologist. It consists of feeding a mixture of



1 part phenothiazine with 9 parts of ordinary 1 part phenothiazine with 9 parts of ordinary *Walter Armer* granular salt. It resulted in cutting down loss of sheep and in marketing lambs in better condition. Today a high per-centage of sheep on Arizona farm lands receive the 1-9 phenothiazine and salt mixture.

This new treatment is economical as well as effective. It practically eliminates the necessity of drenching each animal individually to control roundworms—a costly and possibly dangerous practice.

A great family "man" is Fiber Zibethicus, better known to Amer ican farmers as the muskrat. He raises his many offspring in marshes, and about streams, lakes and ponds. Muskrat tracks are easily recognized by the drag of his knife-like tail, which shows up well in soft mud.


