BILLY HAYNES MARKETS FIRST BALE 1948 CROP

First bale of cotton grown in Taylor county in the 1948 season was brought into Merkel Monday by Billy Haynes.

The cotton, classed as middling 15-16, was grown on the Haynes farm, seven miles southeast of Mer-, kel. It weighed 511 pounds, from 2,200 pounds of snap cotton, and was ginned by the Farmers Coop Society No. 1 gin.

Second and third bales to reach Merkel were ginned by the Guitar gin. A. C. Middleton of Trent produced the second bale, which weighed 436 pounds, from 1,850 of snap cotton, and was classed middling 15-16. while the third bale was brought in by J. H. Horton, of Noodle, It weighed 584 pounds, produced from 2,000 pounds, and was classed middling. one-inch staple.

The business men of Merkel were raising money for first, second and third bale premiums.

FORECAST 1948 **CROP AS OVER 15 MILLION BALES**

of Aug. 1 Condition.

bales was forecast Monday by the Department of Agriculture, based on indications Aug. 1.

Such a crop would be the seventh largest on record. The top yield was 18,946,000 produced in 1937.

The 1948 indicated crop is 3,318,-000 bales more than last year's crop and 3,155,000 bales more than the ten-year (1937-46) average.

Monday, a Texas 1948 cotton crop was predicted-69,000 bales larger than last year's crop.

The current crop is expected to total 3,500,000 bales, which would be the largest crop produced since 1937

by gift, devise or descent, shall be the separate property of the wife; and laws shall be
passed more clearly defining the rights of
the wife, in relation as well to her separate property as that held in common with her
husband; provided that husband and wife,
without prejudice to pre-existing creditors,
may from time to time by written instrument
as if the wife were a feme sole partition between themselves in severalty or into equal
undivided interests all or any part of their
existing community property, or exchange between themselves the community interest of

existing community property, or exchange be-tween themselves the community interest of one spouse in any property for the community interest of the other spouse in other com-munity property, whereupon the portion or interest set aside to each spouse shall be and constitute a part of the separate property of such spouse.

"Section 28. The Legislature shall, at its first regular session after the publication of each United States decennial census, apportion the state into senatorial and representation of the state into senatorial and representaeach United States decennil census, appor-tion the state into senatorial and representa-tive districts, agreeable to the provisions of Sections 25, 26, and 26-a of this Article. In the event the Legislature shall at any such first regular session following the publica-tion of a United States decennial sensus, fail to make such apportionment, same shall be done by the Legislative Redistricting Board of Texas, which is hereby created, and shall to make such apportionment, same shall be done by the Legislative Redistricting Board of Texas, which is hereby created, and shall be composed of five (5) members, as follows: The Lieutenant Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Attorney General, the Comptroller of Public Accounts and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum. Said Board shall assemble in the City of Austin within ninety (90) days after the final adjournment of such regular session. The Board shall, within sixty (50) days after assembling, apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts, or into senatorial or representative districts, as the failure of action of such Legislature may make necessary. Such apportionment shall be in writing and signed by three (3) or more of the members of the Board duly acknowledged as the act and deed of such Board, and, when so executed and filed with the Secretary of State, shall have force and effect of law. Such apportionment shall become effective at the next succeeding state wide general election. The Supreme Court of Texas shall have jurisdiction to compel such Commission to perform its duties in accordance with the pro-

next succeeding state wide general election. The Supreme Court of Texas shall have jurisdiction to compel such Commission to perform its duties in accordance with the provisions of this section by writ of mandamus or other extraordinary writs conformable to the usages of law. The Legislature shall provide necessary funds for clerical and technical aid and for other expenses incidental to the work of the Board, and the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to receive per diem and travel expense during the Board's session in the same manner and amount as they would receive while attending a special session of the Legislature. This amendment shall become effective January 1, 1951."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article VIII of the Constitution be amended so as to be and read as follows:
"Section 1-a. From and after January 1.

"Section 1-a. From and after January 1, 1951, no State ad valorem tax shall be levied upon any property within this State for general revenue purposes. From and after January 1, 1951, the several counties of the State are authorized to levy ad valorem taxes upon all property within their respective boundaries for county purposes, except the first Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) value of residential homesteds, not to exceed thirty cents, (30c) homesteads, not to exceed thirty cents (30c) on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation, in addition to all other ad valuent taxes authorized by the Constitution of this State, provided the revenue derived therefrom shall be used for construction and maintenance of Farm to Market Roads or for Flood Control, except as herein otherwise provided.

"Provided that in those counties or political subdivisions or areas of the State from which tax donations have heretofore been granted, the State Automatic Tax Board shall continue to levy the full amount of the State ad valorem tax for the duration of such donation, or until all legal obligations heretoforauthorized by the law granting such donation or donations shall have been fully discharged, whichever shall first occur; provided that if such donation to any such county or political subdivision is for less than the full amount of State ad valorem taxes so levied, the portion of such taxes remaining over and above such donation shall be retained by said county or subdivision."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be and the same is hereby amended, by adding another Section to follow Section 3, and be designated Section 3a, to read as follows:

"Section 3a. If, at the time the Legislature shall canvass the election returns for the offices of Governor and Lieutenant Governor, the person receiving the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, has died, then the person having the highest number of votes for the office of Lieutenant Governor shall can as Governor until after the next general election. It is further provided that in the event the person with the highest number of votes for the office of Governor, as declared by the Speaker, shall become disabled, or fail to qualify, then the Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until a person has qualified to the office of Governor has participated. Speaker, shall become disabled, or fail to qualify, then the Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until a person has qualified for the office of Governor, or until after the next general election. Any succession to the Governorship not otherwise provided for in this Constitution, may be provided for by law provided, however, that any person succeeding to the office of Governor shall be qualified as otherwise provided in this Constitution, and shall, during the entire term to which he may succeed, be under all the restrictions and inhibitions imposed in this Constitution on the Governor."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the date provided by law in the month of November, A. D. 1948, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for gubernatorial succession in the event the Governor-elect dies, or becomes dis-


