



Washington, D. C., Oct. 20-Congressman Omar Burleson has been extended an invitation by Secretary of State Dean Acheson to visit the fourth regular session of the General Assembly of the United Nations which is now in progress.

Congressman Burleson received the invitation, with the expression from the secretary that the Department of State would like very much to have the congressman, as a member of the House Foreign Affairs committee, visit the United Nations to observe the operations of the General Assembly, its Committee and the United States Delegation to the Assembly. He said that he believed such a visit by senators and congressmen chosen from the Foreign Rela tions, Foreign Affairs, the Appropriations committee of both houses. and the Armed Service committees would be of great value to both the United Nations and to the congress.

Burleson has not yet responded to the Secretary of State's invitation. but expects to do so when plans for adjournment of congress are definite. He says he hopes he can ac cept, but is not certain because of prior commitments.




