

Twenty Cities In Transportation Planning Work

AUSTIN - Twenty of the 22 Texas cities having populations of 50,000 or more have completed steps to participate in urban transportation planning programs in cooperation with the Texas Highway Department.

The other two cities - Abilene and Texarkana -- are working with the Highway Department officials, but technical difficulties have delayed completion of the formal steps necessary to activate the planning surveys.

The Federal - Aid Highway Act of 1962 provides that all cities of 50,000 population or more must initiate urban transportation studies by July 1, 1965, if they wish to continue participation in the Federal Highway Program.

D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, complimented urban officials in the 22 cities for their quick action in getting metropolitan transportation studies under way in Texas a full year before the deadline.

The Federal Government will no longer approve the use of Federal Highway Funds in urban areas not participating in the transportation surveys after July 1, 1965, according to the act. Federal financial participation is from the Highway Trust Fund set up in 1956 and derived from highway use taxes.




