PROTESTORS AND DISSENTERS RAPPED BY CONG. BURLESON

Congressman Omar Burleson "protested the protesters" in his speech to a near-capacity audience at the Friday evening's Chamber of Commerce banquet.

Speaking to members and guests, he "laid it on the line" his thoughts concerning the rank and file of dissenters and protesters across the United States.

"I believe in the right to protest," he said, "but when those

name protesters refuse others their rights, then I think it's time for us to protest. You hear the protesters declaiming his freedom of the right to protest, yet they refuse others this same freedom."

In a clear and concise voice, he protested the Rap Browns, the Gleasons, the sordid activity during the Chicago Seven trial and attacking the very things they their signs and parade around even "those clergymen who hoist should be upholding."

Burleson also took a punch at the embattled welfare program, and the "left wing" group in Congress which is trying to abolish the seniority program in the legislature and those who would do away with the defense program of America.

In speaking of the welfare program, Burleson said, "I had rather have George Mahon with his seniority in charge of the House Appropriations Committee. Bob Poage in charge of the Agriculture Committee than any renator or congressman who was appointed by this left wing group."

He concluded his speech with urging "some of us who have not moved with the tide, do so now, do a little dissenting and protesting."

"But let's do our dissenting and protesting for the betterment of our great country and not to tear it apart as some would have us do," he said.

Highlighting the annual affair was the recognition of Outstanding Citizen and Outstanding Farmer. Joe Earl Lassiter was named Outstanding Citizen and Pete Morgan, Outstanding Farmer. Morgan was unable to attend the banquet and his trophy was accepted by his son, Allen Jr. Mor-

Johnny Hammond, incoming president of the chamber, stressed the importance of a program for retired persons in Merkel.

City, School Board Elections Saturday

Candidates for City Council posts and School Board in Merkel and Trent are hopeful that voters will turn out this Saturday in goodly number to mark their ballots.

As of Tuesday evening's absentee deadline no one had cast their votes in the Merkel City Council election and only one vote in the school board election.

"With an uncontested race for the council posts, we are afraid that city election will be small," said city secretary, Roy Kimbrell. "However, it might be that citizens of Merkel will feel the need to assert their democratic right to vote and turn out in a good number. We are hoping this is the case."

Kimbrell pointed out that candidates who are going to give of their time for these jobs like to know that voters are interested enough to come out and vote.

"Whether there are opponents or not, we, as citizens of Merkel can show our interest by coming to the polls Saturday," said Kimbrell.

Running for council posts to be vacated by Clyde Wurst, Bob Bose and Ted Smith, are Mack Seymore, Pete Morgan and Smith who filed for re-election.

Filing for the Merkel School Board positions are incumbent, Danny Doan, Bob DuBose, D. C. Hendricks and Robert Stephan.

Voters will also vote during the School Board election for the County School Trustee at Large. Candidates running for this position are Sam Beam and James Domy.

Both city and school elections will be held at the Merkel High School gymnasium and polls will open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

Election judge for the city election will be Mrs. Pat Cypert and Bryan Dunagin will judge for the school board election.

Candidates for the Trent School

Board Election are Ronnie D. Freeman and Yates Sipe. Also seeking school board positions are Mrs. Eldon Hicks, and Mrs. Lena McWilliams, for a write-in vote. Election will be at the Trent City Hall and judge will be W. P. Hood.

Polis will open at 7 a.m. Candidates in the Trent City election is Billy Wayne Harner for mayor, two council vacancies will be filled by write-in votes.

Election will be held at the city hall and election judge is G. L. Quattlebaum.
