

the actual cost involved. "We need to study it to see which method would be the best deal," Sadler told the Council.

Turning to the proposed budget, attention mainly concerned pay raises for eight employees while salaries of six others will remain the same.

One of the proposals consisted of a 10 per cent increase with 5 per cent being paid upon approval and another 5 per cent at the end

of six months. However, Sadler suggested a straight 5 per cent formula in order to figure the cost and to give him the figures to complete the proposed budget.

This will be on the agenda at the next meeting.

Sadler then gave a report on the improvements being made at the park and praised all the new improvements and the acceptance by the youngsters. He also praised all the private donations being made to add tables, concrete slabs and barbecue grills.

Mayor Allen then asked for and received permission to send Sadler to Abilene Wednesday to complete preapplication for the \$80,000 HUD grant. This is for Phase 2, 3 and

4, as required by HUD for the funds which will be used for water and sewer improvements.

Sadler also noted that it appears the full request for \$134,722 may be approved for water and sewer facilities to the Industrial Foundation, "If we do gain approval we will be only one of three towns in the state to do so," he said, Lamesa is still doing paper work to get its request and Burnett is the other, Sadler said.

Thames was appointed by Taylor County commissioners to fill the post until the fall general election. He also filed for election to the position in the May 1 Democratic primary.



"And the nutritional centerpiece eggs also can be made into hot deviled egg in cream sauce, cheese fondue potatoes souffle, scalloped ham, eggs and potatoes and vegetable - egg casseroles," she added.

Another suggestion for cheese in the center of a is invited. plate of watercress, surrounded with gelatin, eggs and deviled eggs. Nut bread sandwiches would be a good accompaniment to this plate.

"A gelatin ribbon salad with layers of cooked green peas, diced raw celery, diced cooked celery and sliced hard cooked eggs satisfies nutritional requirements -- and tastes good too," she said.

Children will enjoy a "make believe" fried egg for dessert. Place a peach round on a slice of plain cake and surround it with whipped cream. Or candy Easter eggs on iced cupcakes will be favorites too. Also, chiffon pies in pastel colors are a light dessert that would be suitable if the meal was especially rich, Mrs. Sweeten

"Another fancy dessert is a butterfly cake. Cut a round layer cake in half. Turn the layers so that the cut side is on the outside, ice the cake and then decorate with chocolate chips, shaved chocolate and colored frosting for a glamorous butter-

fly," she said. She suggested that children would love a bunny cake. Make the face on the round cake and cut the ears out of the second round layer. Use colored coconut or jellied candies to decorate the eyes, nose and mouth and use toothpicks for whiskers.

"Child abuse and neglect can touch even the smallest community," according to Ann Carson, Regional Co-

ordinator for the Child Abuse Campaign, Lubbock. "There is a need for every person who suspects that a child is being abused, physically, emotionally, or sexually, to report the situation to the local Child Welfare Office. Or he can call the toll-free 'hotline,' 1-800-292-5400." Ms. Carson went on to say

that it is important to report neglect because the child may be exposed to dangerous persons or situations. "Ac- treatment." cidents are the leading cause of death among children," she added, "and accidents occur often in cases where the child is chronically neglected.

'Under the law, the State Department of Public Welfare is responsible for all

A record 60,600 reports of and at allincome levels. Perhaps this is because child child abuse, neglect, runaways, children in need of abuse most commonly occurs in cycles, i.e., people tend to be the kind of parents their parents were.

"It should be kept in mind," Miss Carson said, "that it is not necessary to have proof that child abuse or neglect exists before making a report. The Child Welfare Unit will be responsible for proving or disproving the situation exists, so a suspicion is sufficient for a report.

"We also accept anonymous calls, but it is not really necessary to remain anonymous because the name of the person reporting is held

in confidence anyway. "Some people are hesitant to report because they hate to see the children removed from the parents. However, this will not necessarily happen. Whenever possible, children remain in the home during the treatment period or are returned following
