

GRAIN SITUATION - Feed grain producers will do well to review the recent reports with regard to the number of cattle on feed. USDA's Crop Reporting Board reported that cattle and calves on feed February 1, 1978 for slaughter markets in the seven states preparing monthly estimates totaled 8,614,000 head, 9 per cent more than a year ago and 3 per cent higher than February 1, 1978. Marketings of fed cattle totaled 1,740,000, 9 per cent above last year and 19 per cent greater than 1976. Placements of cattle and calves on feed in the seven states during January totaled 1,639,000 head, 20 per cent more than last year and 19 per cent greater than January 1976.
