Carriker also said he would be more than glad
to face Jenkins in a one-on-one debate, if one were planned between now and November.

## Plans made for farm census

Plans for the 1982 Census of Agriculture are on schedule according to Bruce Chapman, Director of the Commerce Department's Census Bureau. The census, to be taken starting next January, will provide basic information measuring the
rends in number of farms, commodity production, land use, and income levels in agriculture. Chapman indicated that the rapid changes occuring in agriculture due to the declining farm ncome situation, along with continuing high
interest rates, makes the information from the agriculture census extremely important to the nation's policymakers as well as farmers
themselves. Chapman points out that complete themselves. Chapman points out that complete
and accurate responses by farmers will ensure a high quality picture of the agriculture industry to everyone's benefit.
Census forms will be mailed out in late Cecember to 2.5 million farmers and ranchers to ole reduce the burden on respondents through greater ease in reporting, the census form will vary by region, and questions
reworded to be more understandable While the basic census program is included in he proposed 1983 budget, the agriculture ensuses of Puerto Rico, the Virgin Island, and to the basic census, and a series of later surveys were dropped. These deletions were among other changes in bureau programs resulting
budget reductions, according to Chapman.

Econic Censuses, which cover manufacturing transportation, mining, retail and wholesale
