# Badgers put up a fight as Marlin advances

The state's second ranked team, the Marlin Bulldogs ended the Merkel Badgers basketball season Tuesday night in Stephenville as Marlin beat the Badgers 45-35.

Marlin advances to the regional tournament this weekend in Lubbock.

The loss ended the boys season as they posted a 26-5 season record and a 12-0 district championship record.

In the first quarter, Marlin jumped out to an 11-7 lead as they hit a three pointer with 34 seconds remaining in the quarter. Strong inside play from Merkel's post man Kenneth Jowers kept the game close. Marlin used it's height advantage well in the first period grabbing offensive rebounds.

The Badgers kept within 5 points until 5:28 left in the half when Jowers hit two free throws to tie the game at 13. Senior Ted Seymore hit a three pointer a minute later and the Badgers had their first lead of the game 16-13 with 4:26 left in the half.

Marlin took the lead back until Wade Toombs was fouled with 2:30 left in the half and he converted the 1-1 to give Merkel and 18-17 lead.

With 34 second remaining in the half, the Badgers decided to play for the last shot and Shayne Newberry's buzzer shot hit the rim and bounced off and Marlin took a 23-19 lead into the locker room.

Marlin came out cold in the second half missing six shots in their first five posession while the Badgers monty Griffin hit two three pointers and the Badgers led 25-23.

With 2:31 remaining in the third quarter, Marlin stole the ball, made the layup, drew the foul and converted the three point play to go back on top 26-25 and they never lost that lead.

A backcourt violation on the Badgers with 1:24 remaining in the 3rd quarter gave Marlin the ball as the Bulldogs hit a three pointer to take a 29-25 lead. Marlin hit another three point play to take a 32-25 lead into the final quarter.

A bucket by Jowers on a strong inside move and a pair of free throws by Brit Pursley cut the Marlin lead to 34-29 but Marlin pulled away after that.

The Bulldogs went into the spread offense with 3:30 left in the game and managed to kill 1:20 off the clock before a turnover gave the ball back to the Badgers.

Over the span of the final 2:10 of the game, the Badgers had the ball eight times and only managed three points, trailing by seven during most of that time. The Badgers turned the ball over six times in the final two minutes as Marlin pulled away for a ten point win.

Kenneth Jowers led the Badgers with 10 points. Monty Griffin had 8, Shayne Newberry 6, Ted Seymore 5, Lynn Hays 3, Brit Pursley and Wade Toombs each had two and Tony Trevino



This week's topics are medical expenses and Capital Gains. Medical Expenses

You may deduct, as an itemized deduction the excess of 7.5% over adjusted gross income and unreimbursed medical expenses you have paid during residence if you are age 55 or older. the year. Expenses for medical care nosis, mitigation, treatment or prevention of disease, or for the purpose of affecting any structure or function of the body. Amounts paid for transportation for the care dedesribed above and qualified accident and health insurance are also qualified medical expenses. The only drugs government and take a lot of money that count as medical expenses are prescribed drugs and insulin. Expenses for your general health are not deductible.

You may deduct amounts paid as voluntary premiums under Part B of medicare and medical insurance. This amount is usually withheld from the social security check you receive. You can decuct the cost of meals and lodging if it is a medical related trip. The cost of meals is limited to 80% and lodging is limited to \$50 per night for each eligible person. If you do not want to keep up with your actual transportation expenses, you can deduct nine cents per mile for qualified medical transportation.

You can deduct doctor prescribed permanent improvements such as swimming pools, hot tubs, elevators to the extent the total expense exceeds the amount by which the improvements increase the value of the property. Any detachable items such as air conditioners or humidifiers can be deducted in full. All the costs of operating or maintaining a medical capital asset are deductible.

You can only deduct payments actually made during the year, however, were separated for the rest of their if you use a credit card as payment you may deduct the expense in the year it was charged. Any reimbursements from insurance should be used to reduce your deduction. If you receive the reimbursement the year after you deducted the expense you have to include this in income up to the amount of the earlier deduction. If no deduction was taken then your reimbursement is not income.

For tax years beginning after 1986, self employed taxpayers may deduct as an adjustment to income on the front of the return, 25% of the amount you pay for medical insurance for you and your family.

This deduction can not exceed your net earnings from self-employment. This deduction may be taken even if you do not itemize.

The medical expenses are only a portion of what is considered an itemized deduction. This combined with the other itemized deductions must be greater than your standard deduction to be of any tax benefit

Although the IRS has taken away a major tax break allowing you to exclude 60% of the gain from the sale of a cpital asset held over 6 months. they have put a maximum tax rate of 28% for itemjs sold in 1987. The maximum income tax bracket for 1987 is 38.5%. If you have a capital gain that when combined with your other income puts you into this 38.5% bracket, you can use the alternative computations and figure the tax on the capital gain at 28%. After 1987 all capital gains are taxed as ordi-

nary income. Capital losses are still allowed in full against capital gains. If the losses are more than the gains, up to \$3,000 of the excess loss is allowed. Any loss over \$3,000 is carried over to future years to offset against income.

Even though you do not receive the capital gain exclusion you must still distinguish gains and losses as either ordinary or capital. This is because capital losses are still deductible and there are other areas

Orphan train

Dear Editor:

A search is presently underway for "Orphan Train" riders now living in Texas, or were brought to Texas as

Between 1854 and 1929, over 150,000 oprhaned, abandoned and homeless children were taken out of the institutions of New York City, and transported by trains to rural America. At stops along the way, the children were lined up on railway station platforms, churches, schools, and opera houses for local residents to look them over and perhaps choose a child to take into thier homes.

Those not choses were loaded back on the train, traveling to the next stop where the entire process was re-

This became known as the "placing out" system and the trains were often called "Orphan Trains"

Texas had received 1,527 of these children by 1910, according to a New York Children's Aid Society report.

"Baby Trains" or "Mercy Trains" carried infants up to the age of three years old from the New York Foundling hospitals to prearranged foster homes. A numbered cloth tag was sewn onto the infants underclothing and a corresponding number given champs. (Staff photo) to potential new parents. When the train arrived, folks holding a number card would board the train and find their child.

Federal child welfare reform laws were enacted in 1929. The "Orphan Trains' were stopped forever. The Orphan Train Heritage Society

of America is a nationwide clearing house for information concerning the history of the placing out programs from 1854 until 1929.


